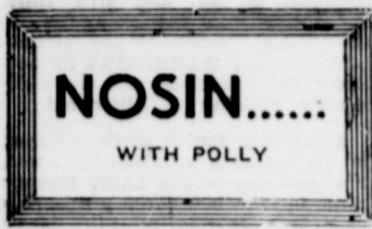

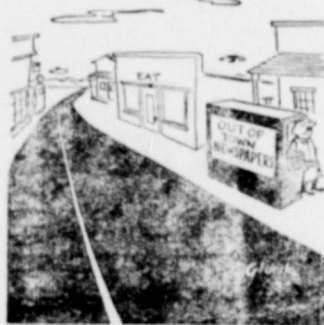

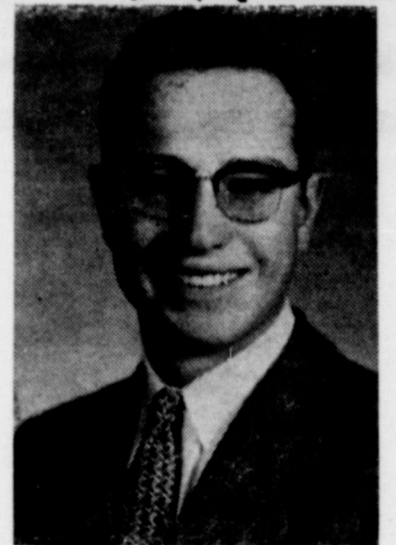

## Openings Available To Patrolman School

Austin—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today more than 100 openings are available for men between 21 and 35 in the uniformed services of the DPS.

He said applications for entrance in the next student patrolman school, a 16-week training period at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy at Austin, will be accepted until October 29.

"With the increase in salaries voted by the last session of the Legislature, we are now in a position to offer pay that is in line with business and industry," Garrison said. "But when all benefits are considered, as well as the fact that these jobs offer a career of service to their fellow Texans, we regard them as outstanding opportunities for young men."

The DPS director explained that a larger number of vacancies exist at the present time as the result of men being called into the military service, and a recently authorized increase in the department's uniformed services.

He said that upon completion of the 16-week training course, graduates will become commissioned officers and will be assigned to the field. The salary while in training will be \$331 per month and will increase either to \$395 or \$412 per month upon graduation, depending on nature of assignment. Longevity pay increments of \$10 extra per month will be added for each five years of service for each of the uniformed services, which are the Highway Patrol, License and Weight ser-

vice, Motor Vehicle Inspection service and the Drivers License service.

In addition, uniforms and equipment will be provided, and the officers will participate in the state retirement plan.

Applicants must have a high school education or the equivalent, be in good physical condition and be of good moral character. They must be not less than five feet, eight inches, nor more than six feet, four inches tall; and weigh not less than two pounds nor more than three pounds per inch of height.

Those who meet the basic qualifications on their applications will be permitted to take a written examination which will be given in several cities over the state October 24, 25 and 26.

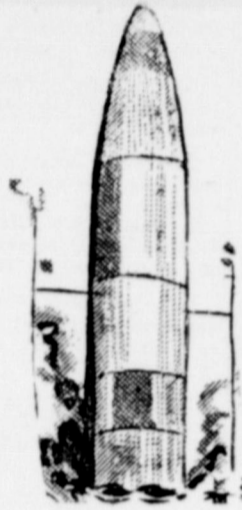
College Station—A large portion of Texas' 1961 grain crop is now in storage throughout the state. This represents a large investment on the part of many people, but in some instances this could turn into large losses if the storer is careless about insect damage, say C. F. Garner and R. L. Ridgeway, extension entomologists. Proper care on the part of the storer can prevent such damage, however.

Periodic inspections at about two-week intervals should be made to determine whether or not injurious insect infestations are present. By taking probe samples at various areas and depths, and then sifting the grain through 10 to 12 mesh screens, the owner can determine if insects are present. If one granary weevil, rice weevil or lesser grain borer, or as many as five insects of other species such as flour and grain beetles, cadelle or grain moths, are found per quart sample of grain, the shortage bin should be fumigated, say the entomologists.

Before fumigating the bin, the owner should remove any wasted grain that may have accumulated outside the structure. A recommended residual spray should then be applied to the outside walls and any other areas around the structure that may harbor insects.

There are several precautions

that should be taken before and during the fumigation process. All electrical equipment should be checked and any defective wiring. No one should be allowed to smoke near the building or equipment during fumigation. Any hose used should be long enough to allow the equipment to be placed a safe distance away from the structure, and all hoses and connections should be checked for leaks. In most cases especially if they are working inside the storage structure, the person applying the fumigant should be equipped with proper gas masks. A mask with a full faceplate and a United States Bureau of Mines approved canister should be used. No canister should be used after it has had 30 minutes continuous exposure to the fumigant. Any fumigant that comes in contact with the user should be washed off immediately, the entomologists warn.

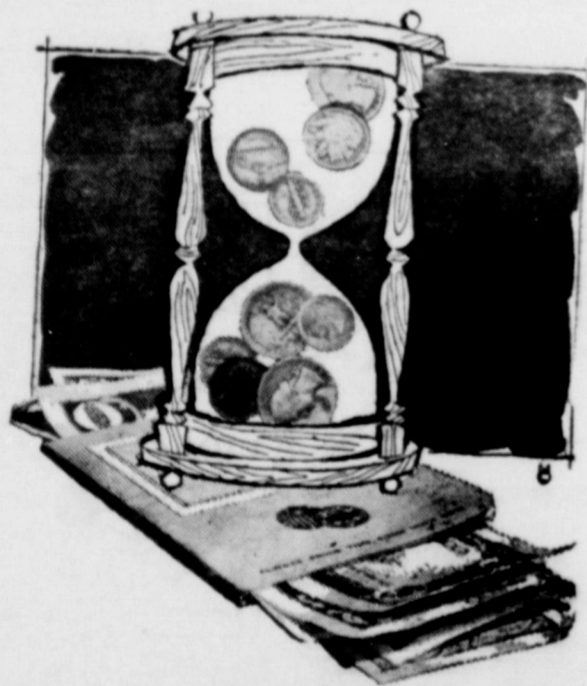

## Tire Dealers Must Pay Floor Stock Tax By Tuesday

Tire dealers were reminded today of the October 16 deadline to report their Federal floor stocks tax.

In a joint statement, District Directors Ellis Campbell, Jr. of Dallas, and R. L. Phinney of Austin recalled that this is the tax passed into law effective July 1, 1961, and placed on highway type tires, inert tubes (except bicycle tires and tubes), and tread rubber held by wholesalers, jobbers, distributors, and retailers as of that date.

Floor stocks tax returns should be prepared on Form 3174 and, together with the tax payment, sent to the Internal Revenue District in which the taxpayer's principal business is located.

Forms 3174 and instructions are available in all IRS offices.

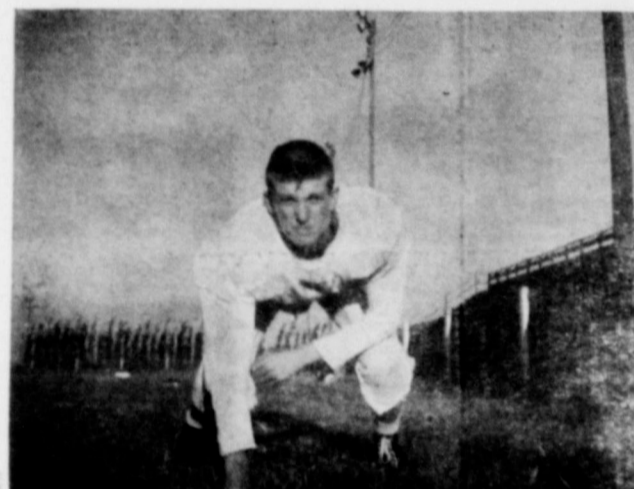

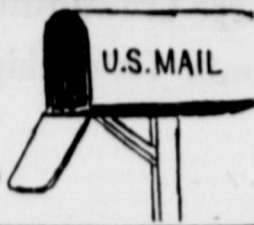

## Change In Social Security Retirement

Few people will dispute the saying that the only thing constant is change. During the past 25 years, you've witnessed perhaps more changes than any other generation in history. Some of them have had little to do with you directly; others have been vital to your well-being.

During those years, you've grown older, presumably wiser, you're probably better off financially . . . and you've come a lot closer to retirement.

But, even the law that helps you to retire, social security, has changed during those years—12 times to be exact. The latest change, affecting more than four million people, may be one that directly affects you.

For instance, you probably know that it is now possible for you to retire at 62. But do you know exactly what happens if you do? And do you really want to retire?

You can get the information necessary to answer "yes" to the first question by visiting your nearest social security office. But in the second, you will have to decide for yourself.

You don't have to retire at 62, 65, 70 or any other age for that matter. If you do retire at 65, you will receive your full benefit from social security. If you retire before that age, you will get less (20 percent less if you retire at the minimum age, 62).

On the other hand, you can earn up to \$1200 a year while you are retired and still draw the same benefit you would get if you didn't work. Pension plans and insurance do not count in the \$1200—only your earnings.

With a little figuring, a healthy worker, employed at a steady job, might still find he can earn more and save more for his retirement by working more. There's a good chance that he would never retire at 62, perhaps not even at 65.

The new changes helps those people who are in poor health, and those who might not be working. It helps victims of technological unemployment or of forced retirement. These are the people who will benefit directly.

Yet, you benefit in general from the extra protection of the law.

If you have all the facts, you can make a wise choice. Write or step in at your nearest social security office and get all the information. Avoid being a "quick-change" artist. Take the time to study this change. As you grow older, you'll recall that you were wiser if you do.

## Three Local Students Enrolled At LCC

Three students from Earth are among the student body of 450 that enrolled for the fall semester at Lubbock Christian College, Lubbock, according to E. R. Higgins, director of admissions. LCC, a Christian liberal arts junior college in its fifth year of operation, last year had 283 students.

The three are freshmen R. L. Porter, pharmacy major, son of Mrs. C. W. Mick, Dixie June Phillips, secretarial science major, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Phillips, and Linda Joyselle Beasley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Beasley.

Lubbock Christian College registered its fifth consecutive record enrollment this fall as approximately 424 registered on the first day, with late enrollment expected to boost the number to 450, an increase of 67 over last year's high, reported Higgins.

Higgins said that this enrollment boom seemed to show the confidence that the people in this area have in LCC, and that the full accreditation last spring by the Texas Association of Colleges was certain to have influenced the student increase.

LCC's student population shows a varied and wide-ranged background. Of the total 426 students, 79 are from Lubbock, 215 from Texas, and the remainder represent 5 foreign countries, 13 states, and 174 different towns and cities.

## Research Foundation At Halfway Receives Gifts For Program

The Murray Gin Co. and the John E. Mitchell Co., both of Dallas, have presented the High Plains Research Foundation with a 29 Saw Gin and a Mitchell Convertible Machine for the Foundation's cotton research program.

The gifts were secured by Wilmer Smith of Wilson and Dixon White of Lubbock, members of the Board of Trustees for the Foundation, and Guy W. Nichols, Muleshoe, President of the Plains Ginners Association.

The new small gin will permit the ginning of samples as they are harvested. These samples can be promptly sent to the classification office and the Textile Research Laboratory at Texas Tech. The analysis of research results by the Foundation's staff can proceed without the delays as experienced in the past. Use of this equipment will accelerate completion of the research reports. This will place the results in the hands of farmers and the cotton industry in time to use in planning the next season's cotton operations.

The Foundation has fifteen different research projects on cotton. A large number of different cotton samples must be ginned and analyzed to complete the reports.

Frank Moore, President of the Foundation, expressed the appreciation of the Board of Trustees and the staff to the Murray and Mitchell Companies for the gifts, the use of which will mean so much to the agricultural economy of the area.

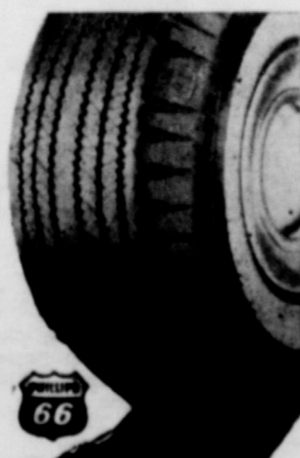

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## Frank Wuerflein To Receive American Farmer Degree At Kansas City

From the 35,000 PFA members in Texas, 35 will be awarded American Farmer Degrees in Kansas City at the National Convention this week. Four of these candidates are from Area 1, which consists of all of the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas. A local boy, of the Pleasant Valley Community, Frank Wuerflein, a 1958 graduate of Muleshoe High School, will receive one of these degrees. Because of his large scale farming operations and the urgent need for being on hand at this critical time in his harvesting process, and since his mother is a widow and his brother has recently been drafted into the service, he could not spare the time to attend the convention.

To be eligible for this Degree, a candidate must (1) have held the degree of State Farmer, have been an active member of the PFA continuously for 35 months, and have a record of satisfactory participation in the activities of the local chapter and State Association. (2) He must have satisfactorily completed at least 2 years of instruction in Vocational Agriculture, have been out of High School for at least 12 months prior to the convention at which degree is granted, and have in operation an outstanding program of supervised farming productive projects which must show comprehensive planning, continuation, growth, an increase in scope with records to substantiate such accomplishments. (3) During the period covered by his application, the candidate must have earned by his own efforts from farming and other agriculture work, and have deposited in a bank at least \$1,000.00. (4) He must show outstanding ability as evidenced by his leadership and cooperation in student, chapter, and community activities, and have a satisfactory scholarship record certified by the local school superintendent. (5) A state association may submit the application of one candidate for each 1,000 active members. Date must be recommended by the (6) The American Farmer National Board of Directors and National Board of Student Officers.

Some of Franks projects in the past have been: Beef Cattle, hogs and pork production, field crops, consisting of cotton, corn, milo, wheat, and oats. His 1961 projects are: 44 acres of wheat, 42 acres of oats, 44 acres of milo, 53 acres of cotton, and 7 sows and 16 feeder pigs.

Some of his leadership activities consists of chapter conducting, crop judging, land judging, beef cattle judging and dairy cat-

te judging. He was vice-president of the Muleshoe Chapter in his Senior year, and received his Lone Star Farmer Degree in July 1958 and has recently helped in establishing the Young Farmers Chapter at Muleshoe and serves in the office of reporter for this group. He is also an active member of the Earth Baptist Church.

### Higher Level Urged For National Cotton Acreage Allotment

Washington, D. C. — Representative George Mahon advises that he has urged Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to fix the national cotton acreage allotment for the 1962 crop at a higher level than the 1961 allotment, and in no event at a lower figure. The 1961 allotment is 18,400,000 acres. The Secretary is required to make his decision by October 14.

Mahon stated that a moderate increase in 1962 over 1961 is necessary in order to make sure that the American cotton producer will be able to maintain his fair share of the world market in addition to supplying domestic needs. He said that a reduction would stimulate foreign production and be unacceptable to domestic growers.

Cotton growers and producer groups have appealed to Members of Congress and government officials in regard to the cotton acreage. Mahon stated that he had discussed the matter with various officials of the Department of Agriculture in addition to the Secretary and had wired the President and discussed the acreage situation with members of the White House staff.

**Consult County Agent Before Building**

College Station.—If you are planning any new construction on your farm, you'll likely profit if you check with your county agricultural agent. He can tell you about the farm building plan service that is available from Texas A&M College and can show you what plans are available, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer.

The plans are for typical farm service buildings and home which are recommended for the many different farm situations throughout Texas. The plans were developed over many years on the basis of research and field experience. Agricultural engineers at Texas A&M say most farmers build no more than one building of any type during their lifetime. Therefore, reliable information is necessary to help plan and construct the most suitable building for any one specific purpose.

In selecting plans, the entire farm operation and the probable use of other buildings must be carefully considered. Any building that does not permit the best use of labor and equipment, or that does not do the job for which it is needed, should be remodeled, Allen says. Consideration should be given to the flexibility and possible future needs when selecting a plan for a new building. Also, a visit to another farm where a building similar to that planned is in use would be time well spent.

A catalog of over 500 building and equipment plans is available from your county agent. He can advise on selection of the plan that will most nearly fit your needs. Plans can be obtained by the county extension agent free of charge.
