### Texas Politics Nears Showdown In General Election

Between a million and a million and one half Texans will go to the polls November 6 to elect an entire slate of state executive officials, county officials, 31 state senators, 159 members of the state House of Representatives and 23 U. S. Congressmen, including Congressman at large.

For the first time since reconstruction days, the Republican Party has a large number of candidates, including eight for major state posts, nearly 100 for legislative posts and a number for county and congressional seats.

Most active of the GOP candidates is 43 year old Jack Cox, Breckenridge oilman, who is seeking the governor's chair. However, 45 year old, former Navy Secretary John Connally, is matching Cox in campaign steps.

This 1962 general election ballot is the longest in the memory of veteran reporters since the ballot contains 14 Constitutional Amendments, the largest number ever to face Texas voters. In the years of 1919 and 1935, ballots contained 13 amendments. Of these 26 amendments, 13 were adopted.

The Democrats have adopted a 71-point 'Progress' platform, submitted by gubernatorial candidate, John Connally.

In the Lamb County race for County Judge, J. B. Davis, Democrat faces Ray Keeling, Republican. For county school superintendent, C. Roy Stevens, Democrat and Mrs. D. P. Eaton, Republican. Democratic candidates in the remaining county posts have no opponents.

For State Representative, 91st District Democrat Bill Clayton of Springlake faces Republican Frank Ford of Dimmitt.

For Governor, Democrat John Connally, Republican Jack Cox and Constitution Party candidate Jack Criswell face each other.

Other candidates are Lieutenant Governor, Democrat Preston Smith and Bill Hayes, Republican. Attorney General, Democrat Waggoner Carr and T. Everton Kennerly, Republican.

For Congressman - At - Large Joe Poole, Democrat and Republican Des Barry. For Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term) Ben Ramsey, Democrat and Bernard M. Hanson, Republican.

For Commissioner of General Land Office, Democrat Jerry Sadler and Albert B. Fay, Republican. For Commissioner of Agriculture, Democrat John C. White and Republican Harry Hubbard.

For Congressman, 19th Congressional District, Democrat George Mahon and Republican Dennis Taylor will face each other.

Charles Jones, County Clerk reported that 49 absentee votes had been cast by 2 p.m. Tuesday. The deadline for absentee voting is 5 p.m. Friday, November 2.

The polling place in Earth will be at the Earth community room, Tuesday, November 6 from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Election judge will be O. B. Whitford.

Springlake voters will cast their votes at the Springlake community building.

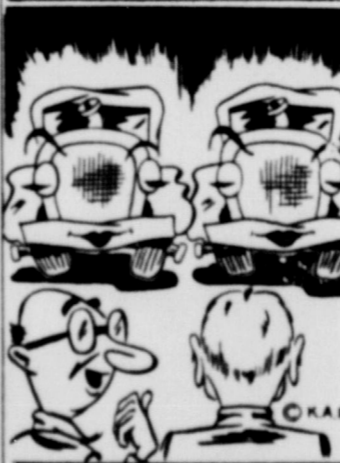

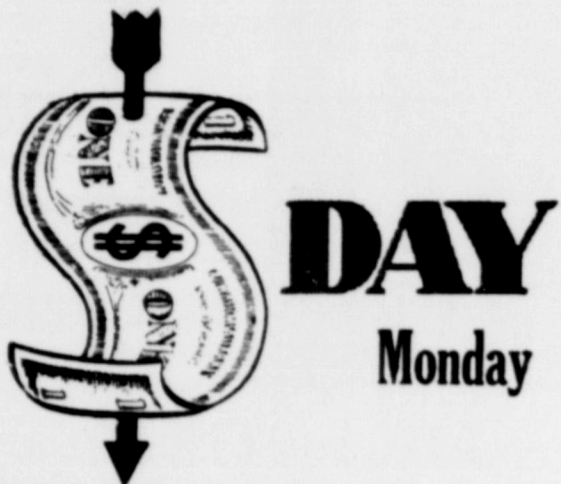

## Springlake Rally Falls Short 25-21

You looked good, Freshmen just keep up the good playing and you will have a good season to be proud of.

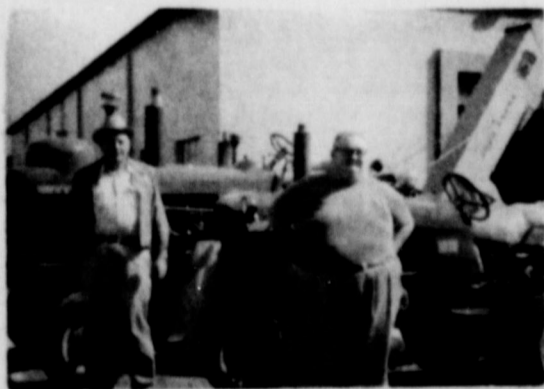

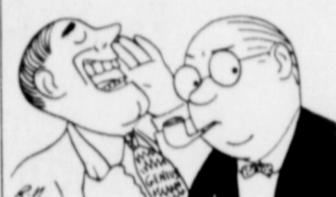
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SCUM CUTS BOAT SPEED—Barnacles and other marine life in salt water are known to slow a boat's speed immeasurably. But bottom-fouling of boats occurs in fresh water, too.

Engineers at Johnson Motors found that a 16-foot boat with a 40 h.p. motor lost almost 10 mph of its normal speed and would not plane with a six man load after only 30 days storage in a boat stall.

Cause was simply the normal fresh water scum accumulation. Performance was restored after the hull was thoroughly cleaned.

To stop bottom-fouling you must thoroughly clean the bottom of the boat. Sometimes it's a tough job. If the scum is thick, try using a Choragil or some fine-wire-mesh cleaner such as you'll find in Mama's kitchen.

Betcha many motors have undergone a tune-up or overhaul when a simple wash job or bottom scrubbing might have sufficed.

SINKER NEWS—It's not often that sinkers make news. But the Water Gremlin Co. of White Bear Lake, Minn., has fractured the sinker market with an outstanding new development.

They are making "Rubbercor" shot and sinkers, specifically designed for monofilament line.

Inside is a hard rubber insert. When you want to add weight to your line, simply lay the line in the groove in the sinker and twist the rubber insert. This automatically centers the line into the lead weight, and holds it firmly.

There's no hitting, pinching, tying, lead cutting or tooth busting and best of all, no damage to the line.

Don't know how it is out your way, but fishermen on Lake Austin are having a ball. Chances are that's what's happening elsewhere too.

Don't have to put in much time either. You fish for a couple of hours and that's it. You either fill your stringer or come back empty handed. No use devoting any more time to angling than that, 'cause they just aren't biting before 4:00 a.m., or after 6:00 a.m.

We're speaking, of course, of those big, lunker-size bass. That's the kind they're bringing in, too.

Get to the lake about an hour before daybreak and you may land a "Lulu" well before dawn. But more than likely, you'll latch onto your best bass just as daylight comes. Sometimes you'll take a good one within an hour after daybreak.

From then on, however, it'll be a dry run—so you may as well go home. And that's what Austin anglers do.

Favorite lure? They're hitting black topwaters, such as the Jitterbug, 'til dawn. Then a silver-colored topwater—either a Jitterbug or a Heddon Spook, after the light begins to show.

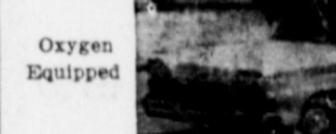
Some results have been achieved with jigs, especially the flipper type, like the Extractor.

Right now the greatest success is with topwater-lures. How do they work them? In the first place, fishing is from a boat, usually a 14 foot aluminum or fiber glass. Generally it's equipped with a 25 or 35 h.p. outboard—to get to the "spot" in a hurry.

Once "on location," the big motor is stopped and an electric trolling motor takes over. Casting is done in almost total darkness, of course, to a spot as close to the bank or the edge of the moss as possible.

Lure is allowed to rest four or five seconds then started on its wiggly, gurgly way to the boat.

Strikes usually occur just as the lure goes into action.

### George Mahon Re-opens Lubbock Law Office

Representative and Mrs. George Mahon were in Earth Monday visiting friends and inspected the new offset printing method at the Earth News-Sun. Representative Mahon has returned to West Texas following the adjournment of Congress and reopened his Lubbock office. Mahon said that he would not remain in his Lub-

bock office regularly, but would visit about the 10-county Congressional District as much as possible. In commenting on the recent Congressional session, Mahon said, "The International situation continues to be of a major concern."

"The President under our constitution, not Congress, is responsible for the conduct of foreign affairs. Through the defense bill which I ranted in the House, Congress has provided for a sharp increase in our military strength. We are in a position of unquestioned

military superiority and the President can deal from a position of strength," Mahon said. Mahon noted in hindsight the errors of former President Eisenhower and President Kennedy in handling the Cuban situation are obvious, but "the fixing of blame does not solve the problem."

"Congress," Mahon said, "did about all it could do in dealing with Cuba short of a declaration of war." "Castro must be eliminated," said Mahon, "and I voted to authorize the President to use all necessary force, including the armed services, in dealing with Cuba."

### United States and Russian Teams To Play At Lubbock

Dropping political hostilities and taking up the combat of the basketball court will be two teams from the United States and two teams from Russia who square off in Lubbock's Municipal Coliseum November 21 with game time slated for 7 p.m. Meeting in the first of the doubleheader feature will be the Soviet National Women's Team and Hutcherson Flying Queens from Wayland Baptist College, Plainview. In the second game the Soviet National Men's Team will battle an all-star male team made up mostly of players from the regular

Phillips 66 Oilers of Bartlesville, Okla. It will be the third series of games for the Russian women and the Flying Queens. The first encounter for the two was in the fall of 1960 when the Soviet squad toured the United States. The next clash was in the spring of 1961 when Flying Queen coach Harley J. Redin piloted a U. S. all-star team which toured behind the iron curtain. Three of this year's Flying Queens are among the starters who were on the 1961 tour. 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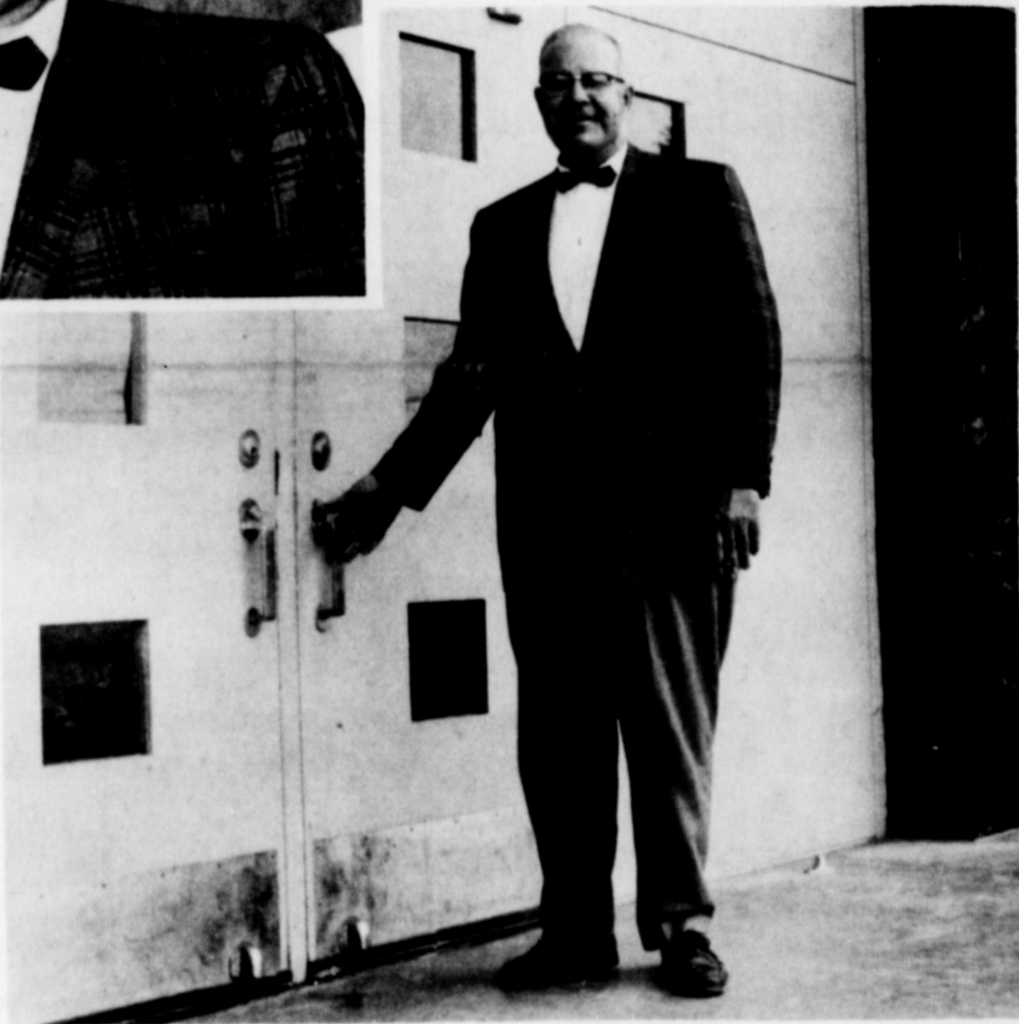
