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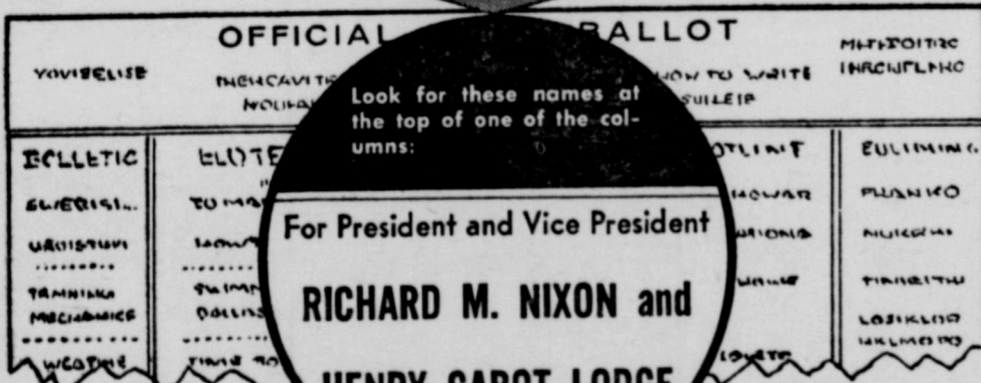

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Seven varieties of safflower were tested at the High Plains Research Foundation during 1959 in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The yields ranged from 285.12 to 589.19 pounds of seed per acre. The high yield was produced by the N-4051 variety.

These varieties were planted on March 19. Each received two irrigations of 2 inches on April 6 and May 29. There were 29.42 inches of rainfall during the growing period. A fertilizer application at the rate of 300 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre was topdressed on May 29. The safflower plants withstood two light frozes during the early seedling stage of growth. A light hail on May 17 caused some damage to the top of the plants. All plots were sprayed with Endrin and Chlorodane on May 27 and June 25.

There was considerable variation in the yields of the 7 varieties with all seed yields low. The plants received continuous heavy rainfall during the seed development period. This situation was probably responsible for the immature seed found in all varieties. Leaf rust caused considerable damage to all varieties. Insect damage was very slight. Early planting was probably responsible for less insect damage.

The N-4051 variety was superior to all other varieties in the test from the standpoint of yield ability. This variety also ranked high in height, stand, number of heads and number of seeds per head. The lowest yielding variety, U. S. 10, was superior to all others in seed size.

Safflower is considered to have possibilities in the High Plains agriculture, and research will be continued over a period of years at Halfway.

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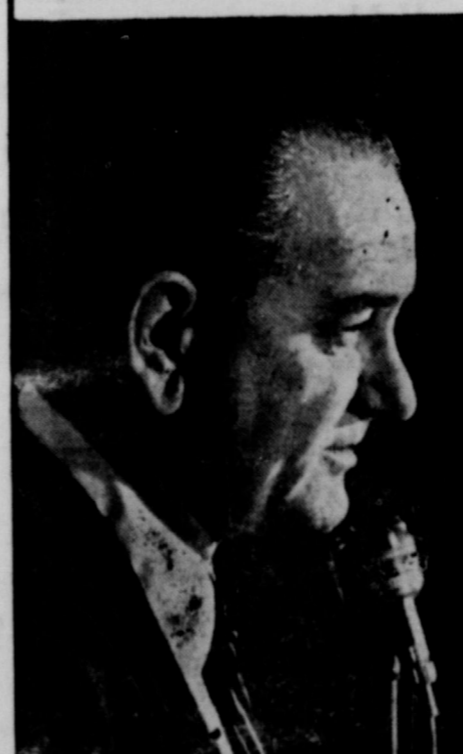
