Plains Gas Users Review Recent Legislative Effort

Farmers representing twelve Panhandle and South Plains Counties heard a report Tuesday night, February 6, at the Hilton Hotel in Plainview from David Burgess, President of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association regarding the effort made by the group to secure legislation at the recent Special Session of the Legislature.

The legislation sought would have given to farmers the same right of appeal to the Railroad Commission as is presently enjoyed by incorporated cities, towns, and villages, when the farmers are served by gas companies who sell to domestic consumers within the limits of incorporated cities, towns or villages.

The meeting was attended by over 100 farmers and businessmen, which was the largest delegation ever present at a Board of Directors meeting of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association. Burgess commended the group on the conduct of their effort to secure the legislation in Austin, and the group enthusiastically responded and without exception expressed determination that no effort would be spared until relief had been secured. The Board of Directors was commended for the efforts made at the special session of the Legislature, and many farmers present expressed gratification that the legislation went as far as it did, passing both the House and the Senate, and then getting bogged down in the closing hours of the Special Session.

Mr. Burgess reported to the group that more than 400 busy irrigation farmers and businessmen had paid their own expenses to Austin and devoted their time in a well-coordinated effort to obtain corrective legislation. Reports from Lubbock, Lamb, Potter, Randall, Swisher, Castro, Floyd, Briscoe, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Bailey, and Hale Counties indicated that the Plains Irrigation Group was rapidly growing in size and that farmers over the entire area would be forthcoming and that by a strong united effort, irrigation farmers could be given the right to have their gas rates reviewed so that they could buy gas at a fair price.

Construction began last year in November on the building. Rev. William Galindo is pastor of the Church, having begun duties there last September.

He is a student at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview and commutes to Earth each weekend to hold services.

\$2000 In Prizes To Be Awarded At Lamb County Jr. Fat Stock Show

Lamb County's Annual Junior Fat Stock Show, will be held at the Littlefield fairgrounds Friday and Saturday, February 16-17, and is offering approximately \$2,000.00 in prize money to County 4-H, FFA and FHA boys and girls who are entered in the show.

At the entry deadline a total of 80 lambs, 194 barrows, 20 Shetlands and 49 steers were entered in the show. Because of the large number of lambs and hogs entered show officials will sift out the lambs which weigh less than 70 pounds or more than 130 pounds and hogs which weigh less than 170 pounds or more than 240 pounds.

Pioneer Natural Gas Gives Their Ideas Concerning Irrigation Gas Service

Pioneer Natural Gas Company sent letters to irrigation gas users on the Plains recently informing them of their views and ideas concerning irrigation gas service.

This letter implied that in September they were furnished a list of the members of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association by the Association. They were unable at that time to supply a complete list, and Pioneer Natural Gas Co. is making every attempt to reach all members of the Association and other interested customers with their ideas concerning irrigation gas service.

C. I. Wall, president said, "we feel that the recent activities in Austin during the special session of the Legislature were not characteristic of the Plains area, Pioneer, or farmers of the irrigation area we serve. We believe that the long-range interests of the Plains farmer and Pioneer are divergent and that differences should be worked out within the area rather than fought in the Legislature or courts with the possibility of considerable expense to everyone involved."

"Certain areas of the State, principally the North Plains, Rio Grande Valley, and Trans-Pecos regions desire extensive irrigation gas service and do not have it. They do not want any legislation which would discourage expansion of this service by those regularly engaged in the gas business or others. Their opposition, together with that of Pioneer and some of the farmers and others in the area we serve, resulted in no legislation being passed at the special session."

Mr. Wall speaking for the Company, said, "we believe and have stated a number of times that an organization of irrigation gas users which could be recognized as speaking for our irrigation customers as a whole would be of considerable assistance in obtaining the best to you. Something of this type was achieved during the period in 1956 when the rupture of plastic pipe in some areas was causing extensive leakage and threatened interruption of service to many farmers during the peak watering periods of August. This was, however, temporary."

He went on to say, "right or wrong, it has been our impression that the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association has been directed toward an attack on Pioneer rather than a cooperative effort. We believe that by talking and working with a representative group of farmers solutions can be reached. Perhaps early agreement would result only on smaller problems and suggestions but this would be progress and groundwork for further effort."

He went on to say, "the Gas Company is now studying more closely applications for additional wells except where contractual or verbal commitments have been made. The studies are being made to determine whether or not additional investment in transmission capacity will be required to provide service to these wells under peak demand conditions. We expect that we will be able to serve those additional wells except in areas where additional wells have not been possible for over a year due to serious capacity and supply problems, the solution of which would require considerable expenditure."

Wall said, "every request for service or application made up to date of the recent letter and subjected to this closer study has been approved for connection."

THE SPIRIT OF AMERICA

"The Will to Win or Lose? Which

By C. L. Kay

On January 23, 1962, Dwight D. Eisenhower's letter to the Special Preparedness Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Armed Forces was made public. In that letter, the former president expressed his views relative to the "muzzling of the military". He said:

"I am sure that all of us would deplore any move that would restrict public access to reliable information on the deadliness, implacability, totality, and cunning of the Communist assault on freedom.

By virtue of its vital mission to defend our country its long professional experience with Communist tactics and its highly developed educational system, our military is singularly well trained to provide to the public, as well as to the members of the armed forces, the implications of the extreme threat of Communist imperialism."

Mr. Eisenhower is to be commended for his views and his willingness to defend our armed forces personnel in a time of need. However, there are some who seem to disagree with the former president.

There are two aspects of this hearing that should shed some light on the real issues involved. The first deals with statements that are deleted from the speech, the second has to do with the source of the censorship.

General Trudeau testified that he was not permitted to say "The three Sputnik satellites lend substance to . . . (Communist) claims (of an intercontinental ballistic missile) and their lunar probes should clinch them." The State Department's comment on the statement was "Policy is to separate military from scientific

achievement of U. S. S. R. It is much easier for Soviets to hit the moon than to hit the Pentagon. Such remarks tend to frighten our friends."

General Trudeau's statement that "On such theories Socialism thrives" was deleted. The State Department's comment was, "Some of our best friends are Socialists." The most striking statement deleted from the general's speech concerned Arnold Toynbee's statement that "19 of 21 notable world civilizations have died from within and not by conquest from without." The State Department's answer to this was, "Toynbee is a highly questionable historian—not likely to impress the audience."

Who is doing the censoring of the speeches? The State Department. One of the censors, William A. Lawrence told the Senate Subcommittee on January 31, that "The State Department calls the time when military men make speeches about international Communism." The State Department seems to have made a habit of deleting the word "Victory" from speeches made by the military.

As a result of the hearing this far, I get the impression that somebody doesn't want us to win.

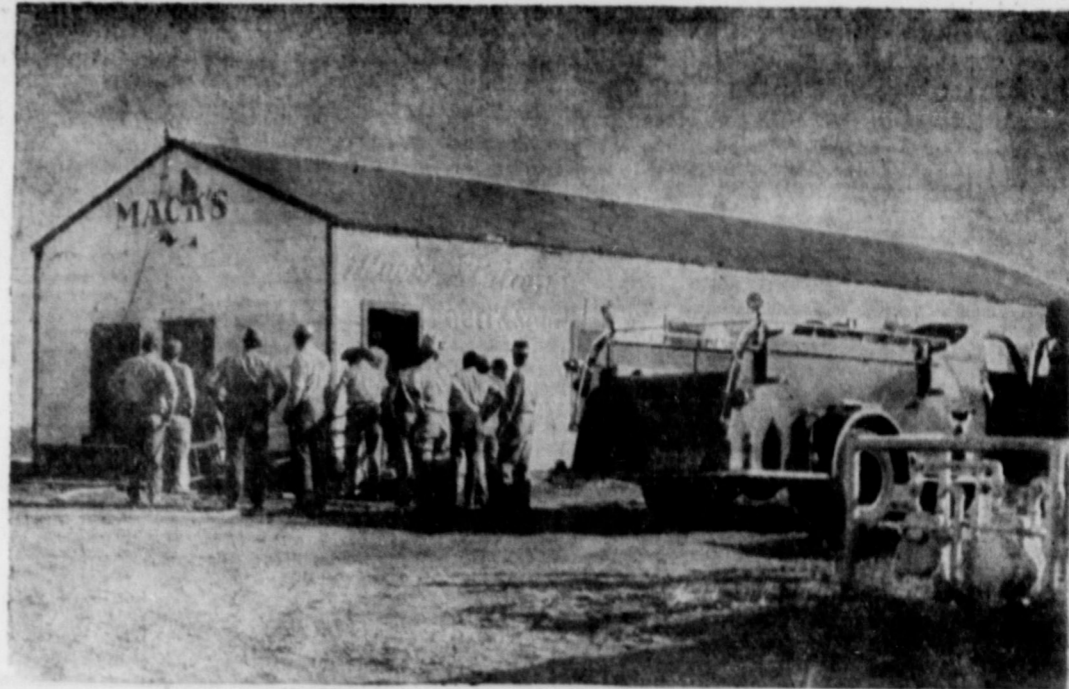

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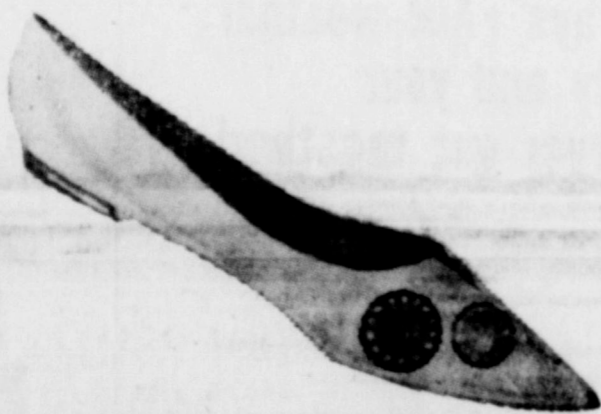

Taxpayers May Receive Retirement Income Credits

Taxpayers who had retirement incomes during 1962 may be entitled to "retirement income credits" on their federal income tax returns. This retirement income credit can be as much as \$240.00 for an individual taxpayer, John J. Sloan, Administration Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock Texas, reminded today.

Taxpayers with questions on this subject may get free Document No. 5018, Retirement Income and Credit, by contacting their IRS office.

Internal Revenue Officer Explains Deductible Taxes

John J. Sloan, Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock, Texas, explained today what state and local taxes may be deducted on federal income tax returns.

"You CAN deduct personal property taxes, state income taxes and real estate taxes, which are imposed on you. You can deduct state or local sales taxes, and state gasoline taxes if the tax is imposed upon you, the consumer. Auto license fees, and state capitation or poll taxes also are deductible.

"Cigarette taxes are deductible by the consumer in only a few of the states."

The IRS representative said that cigarette taxes paid after August 28, 1961, are deductible in Texas this year, for the first time, and that Texas state sales taxes paid on and after September 1, 1961, are also deductible.

He added: "If you had State income taxes withheld from your salary, or if you made estimated State income tax payments under a pay-as-you-go plan, you can deduct such amounts only for the year in which withheld or paid.

"If you are a tenant-stockholder in a cooperative housing or apartment cooperation you can deduct your proportionate share of the real estate taxes paid by the cooperative.

"In most cases, you cannot deduct special assessments for pavements or other local improvements, including front-foot benefits, which tend to increase the value of your property. Nor can you deduct Social Security taxes paid on the wages of your maid or other domestic help."

The IRS representative said you may not deduct customs duties or federal excise taxes on articles acquired by, or on service rendered to you, for personal or family use, such as automobiles, jewelry, cosmetics, telephone air, rail or bus tickets, etc.

Many questions about federal income tax returns can be answered by telephoning your local IRS office.

Social Security Rep To Be In Earth Next Wednesday

"April 16 is an important deadline for many of us, but especially for ministers who want social security credit for their earnings," said John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office. "Ministers who have not yet taken action and who do wish to participate in the social security program must indicate so by filing a waiver certificate with the local Internal Revenue Service office before April 16."

Mr. Hutton emphasized that the decision to participate in the social security program is up to the minister, but that his office will be glad to answer any questions or furnish information which may be helpful in making this decision. A leaflet which explains how ministers can obtain social security coverage is available from the social security office located at 1616-19th Street, Lubbock, Texas, or may be obtained by calling the office at PO 34456 or writing and asking for leaflet 331. "As of early last year, about seventy percent of the full-time ministers who are eligible for social security coverage have elected to have their earnings credited toward future old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits," said Hutton, quoting from a report of the Social Security Administration.

"Ministers who let the April 16 deadline go by without filing," Mr. Hutton said, "will not have a chance to participate in the social security program."

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Administration will be in Earth on Wednesday, February 22 at 1:00 p.m. in the Citizens State Bank and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

Millen Issues His Political Platform In State Representative Race

Millen's statement reads as follows:

"For many years I have spent much time and money working with various farm groups for a better agricultural climate for our area and have cultivated a wide circle of friends over the great state of Texas; many of whom wield a great deal of influence in area affairs.

"Having served in many capacities in these farm groups has, I feel, qualified me to represent



you as a man of the people. Among the area organizations that I have had a part in promoting are: The High Plains Water Conservation District, the Hi-Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, the Plains Cotton Growers, the West Texas Agricultural Employer's Group and I now serve as director of the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, the South Plains Soil Fertility Committee, and the Bailey County Farm Bureau. 9. Defend the recent tax placed on gas pipeline companies.
10. Modify the Auto Insurance Merit Rating Plan to make it more equitable.

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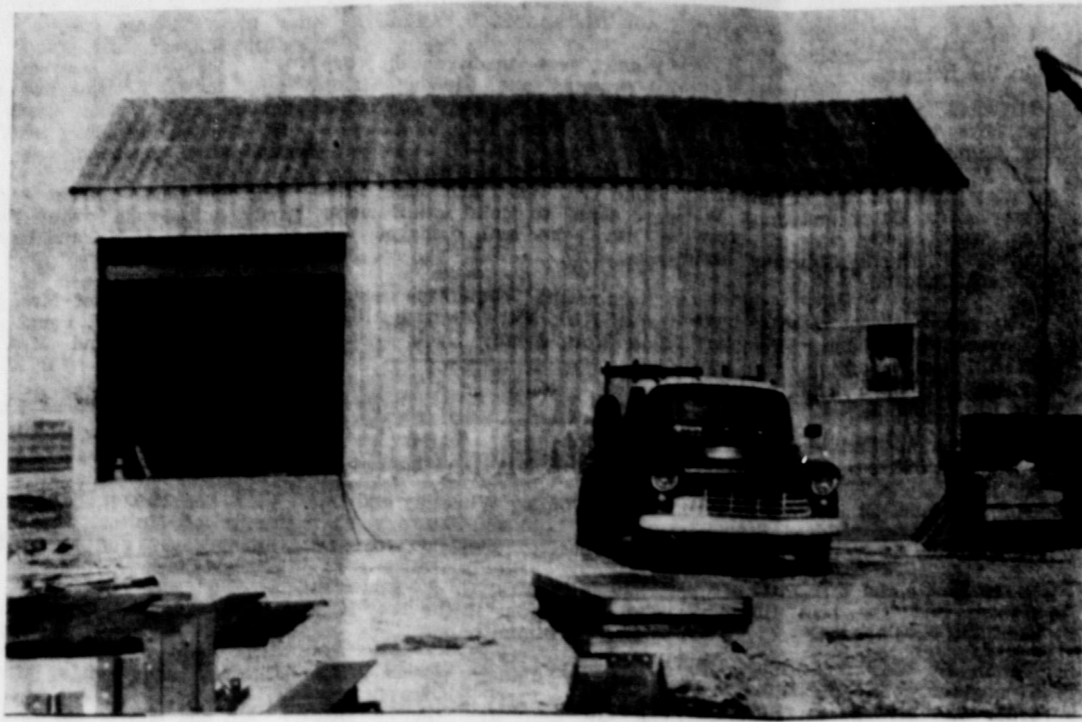
