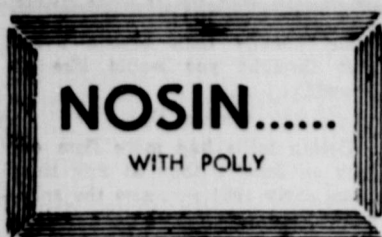

It was only five years ago, August, the first when I came to Earth to begin the Earth News-Sun. To me, it was the end of Earth. I remember I felt so alone that day, as I knew no one, and I definitely remember thinking of how much I would appreciate one of my sisters being with me as I drove around in the communities in the Earth territory hunting News correspondents for the various rural communities. I, who had lived such a sheltered life with one of my four sisters available always to go with me anywhere I went. Yet, now I was alone.

However as the day wore on I met Mrs. Bonnie Haber, Mrs. Oletta Sanders, Mrs. Irvin Ott and a few others. They, I remember impressed me as being the finest calibre of people that could be found anywhere on Earth, and I had found them at Earth. My days here somehow became filled with many more interesting people. The Kelleys at the postoffice and many others.

The first paper I remember was published Friday the 15th of August, and was called "YOUR NEWS-PAPER." It was later named in a contest by Mrs. Eagle.

Looking back through the files, I find we have recorded a complete history of the past five years of Earth. The openings of each new business, births, deaths, growth of the city, school news and county news.

No other media can boast of recording the history of an area like a NEWSpaper. Only a NEWSpaper can have a printed reference of events for future use. The Insurance Companies depend on the written copy from NEWSpapers sometimes to settle a dispute. Clubs depend on written articles and pictures for their scrapbooks, (and several honors have been won on scrapbooks, from articles published in YOUR Earth News, and we who own and operate YOUR NEWSpaper, depend on YOUR ADVERTISING and SUBSCRIPTIONS to keep your NEWSpaper in operation. (Any town without a NEWSpaper is a DEAD TOWN).

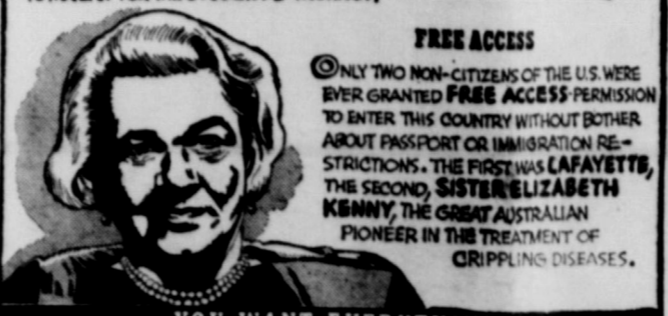

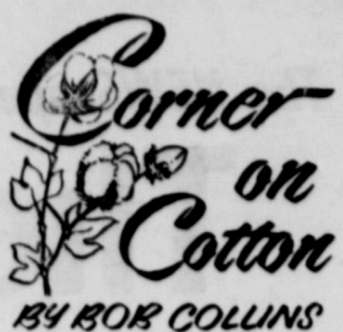

... also the merchant offers the spinner a constant source of supply... and he guarantees that the spinner will receive the cotton he wants... and guarantees quality, weight and delivery... and the merchant, or shipper, not only pursues markets but by his services encourages the spinners to use cotton in preference to other fibers... for all of this the merchant makes a profit of about one per cent.

Study Group
Committee made up of members from seven major cotton exporting countries will present its recommendations for averting a cotton price war to the Cotton Exporting Countries' Study Group within next two or three months... the study group is made up of members from 12 nations.

Weevils
A boll weevil lays an average of about 81 eggs... but sometimes she may lay 450... she only needs to be five days old to start laying... incidentally there are more male weevils than female... just thought you would like to know!

Orders Up
Cotton mills had more firm orders on June 1 than at any time since early 1951... also the spinners were getting higher prices... "mill margin" was at highest point since late 1956.

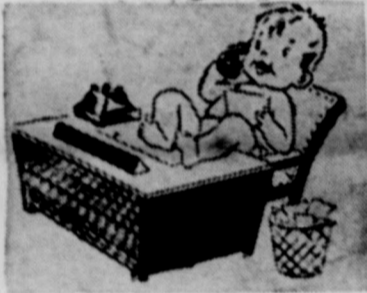

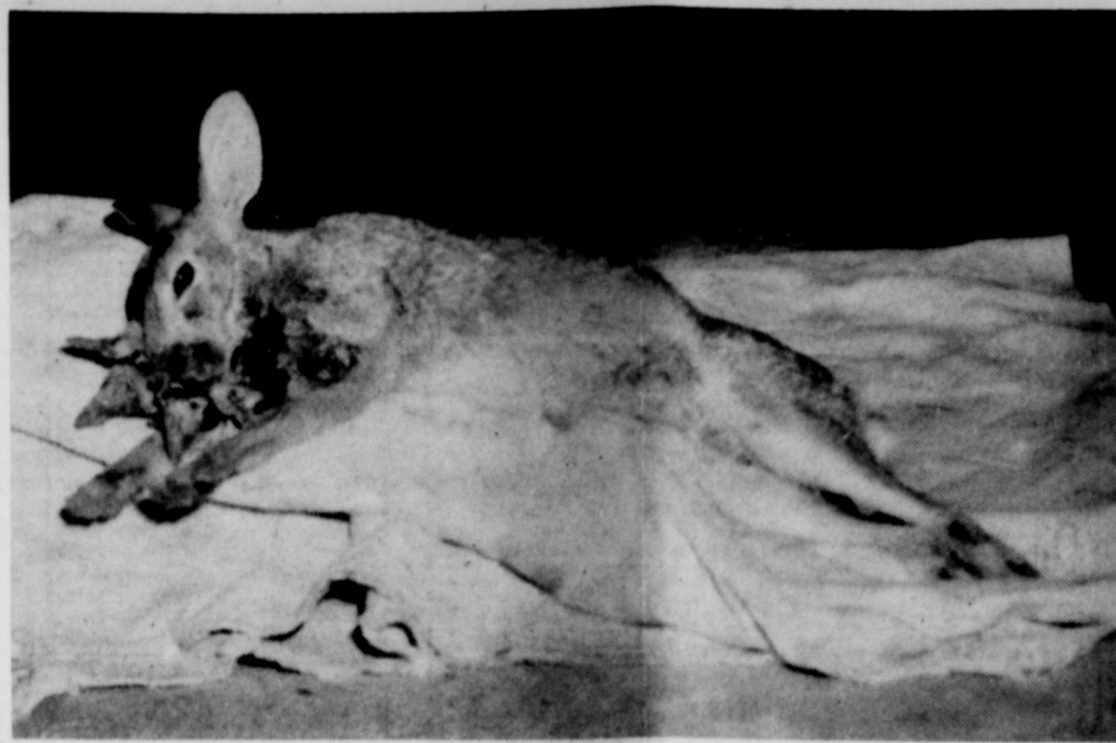

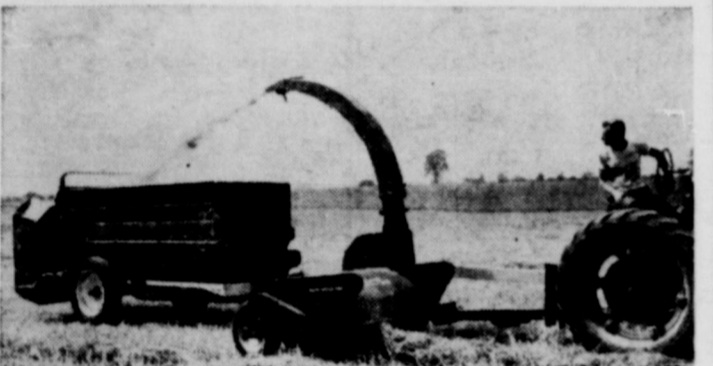

Editorials . . .

A CPA At Your Elbow

Continuing inflation over a long period of years may bring the day when a dollar bill is worth no more than 2 or 3 cents, says Louis H. Penney of San Francisco, president of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

Wage increases soon will push prices beyond the ability of many people to pay, Penney adds, pointing out that " . . . in the past 29 years productivity has risen 100 per cent while wages have gone up 260 per cent." He blames the situation on the monopoly power of labor unions to force wages higher and higher, and continued government deficit spending.

As to the tax problem, he says: "Every time they set out to simplify the tax law they make them more complex. An ordinary businessman can't live without an attorney and a CPA at his elbow."

Labor's Special Privilege

Writing in the New York World-Telegram & Sun, Lawrence Fertig deals with the problem of labor legislation in a mince-no-words fashion.

What is needed, he finds, "is a fundamental solution and not a palliative." He cites, as an example, the recent threat of a primary general strike which would bring the country to its knees. Here he says: "No other group in the U. S. could possibly threaten the country this way. Why? Because no other group has been granted such monopoly power by Congress (under the Clayton Act). No other group would be protected in such action under the law which exempts unions from injunctions by the court (Norris-LaGuardia Act) . . ."

Mr. Ferti is not exaggerating. The Supreme Court has held that, under existing law, "so long as a union acts in its self interest, and does not combine with non-union labor groups, the licit and illicit . . . are not to be distinguished by any judgment regarding the wisdom or unwisdom, the rightness or wrongness, the selfishness or unselfishness of the end of which the particular union activities are the means." In sum, the highest court has decided that the laws now on the books give labor organizations virtually unbridled license.

Mr. Fertig also points out that the weak Kennedy bill is almost totally inadequate in the light of the need, and ends with these words: "To get at the heart of this problem requires Congressional action to revoke the monopoly power which was granted; and to place unions, like all other organizations in society, under the rulings of our courts." We simply can't afford the kind of gross special privilege the unions now possess.

New Antibiotic Hits "Ringworm" Infections

Chances are good that you have, or will have, one of the so-called "ringworm" infections. It is estimated that 80 to 90 per cent of our population suffers one of these skin infections to some degree during their lifetimes.

While no statistics are available, since these infections are not reportable diseases and many people prefer self-treatment, it is believed that upwards of 10,000,000 people in this country alone now suffer from some form of ringworm.

You may be surprised to learn that what is commonly called "athlete's foot" is a ringworm infection. These fungi-caused infections also occur on the scalp, face, body and nails. In addition to causing great discomfort, they can be extremely embarrassing, especially on the scalp, where hair is usually lost in unsightly patches.



Self-treatment with easy-to-obtain powders, ointments and solutions is seldom successful, and can be dangerous, since you run the risk of irritating the infected area and possibly causing a more serious infection. Medical examination should be had as soon as you contract one of these skin infections.

One effective test the doctor has for determining the presence of fungus infection on the scalp is the Wood's light test, which is black light. In a darkened room and under this light fungi will glow.

The doctor now has available a new antibiotic, Fulvicin, that clears up most of the ringworm infections in weeks to a few months, depending on type and severity. It is taken orally and like other antibiotics is available only on prescription.

In one case studied a 67-year-old woman who had ringworm of the scalp since she was seven was cured within weeks by the new drug.

More boys than girls have scalp ringworm, probably due to their shorter hair, more contact during play and possibly barber's shears. It can also be picked up

from the back of theatre seats, and certain forms are carried on dogs and cats.

Athlete's foot is highly unpredictable and one should always take certain precautions to prevent it. Wear perforated shoes whenever possible, dry feet well and use a mild foot powder, never wear wet socks and it is best to wear cotton or wool socks, since they absorb perspiration better than the synthetic fabrics.

If, despite your best precautions, you do get a ringworm infection, your doctor might prescribe the new antibiotic, made available by Schering Corporation. This is the first successful oral treatment ever developed for superficial fungus infections.

Fungi (which are microscopic plants) live on the keratin in the dead cells of the skin. These dead cells are constantly being discarded, but the invading fungi somehow manage to stay on the skin. The antibiotic apparently comes from within and in some way not yet explained makes the keratin unusable as food for the fungi.

Highlights And Sidelights From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — With the bottleneck broken on a tax bill for spending, legislators began to look down the road.

Rep. Murray Watson of Mart proposed a resolution that pointed up the lawmakers' uneasiness about having more rough decisions before the year is out.

Watson's resolution called on Gov. Price Daniel to say immediately whether he would call another special session to raise money for the Hale-Aiken school improvement program.

Hale-Aiken proposals, which in-

clude an \$800 a year salary boost for teachers, would cost an estimated \$120,000,000 a year. There the governor will re-call the Legislature next fall to enact Hale-Aiken. Also floating around is the rumor that a cent per gallon hike in the gasoline tax is being "saved" for that purpose.

Watson charged, "I think there's been a definite deal made with the Texas State Teachers Association. . . . Somebody else should know what's going on here instead of

just the governor and the teachers' lobby."

Governor Daniel's supporters called this unfair. They declared that the governor, like everyone else, had a law it would be used after the dust settled from the fracas over raising money for the basic budget.

At last—When the Legislature finally voted out the new \$185,000,000 tax bill, it voted it out in a big way. Tally was 29-to-2 in the Senate and 115-to-24 in the House.

This is well over the required two-thirds to make the bill effective immediately on the governor's signing.

House, which had been hamstringing for seven months on the tax issue, came unstung so suddenly it surprised the bill's advocates. Voting ended good naturedly with "yea" votes recruited in the atmosphere of an old-fashioned revival meeting.

Most talked-about feature of the new bill is a severance tax of 1.5 per cent on natural gas. It was the first time the Senate had approved this tax. Many House members had said they would not vote for any bill that didn't include it. It will bring in an estimated \$15 to \$17,000,000 over two years if not ruled unconstitutional.

Three-fourths or more of the bill's revenue will come from selective sales taxes. Newcomers are a 3 per cent tax on jewelry and furs, a 3 per cent tax on hotel and motel rooms rentals, 3 per cent on boats, motors, cameras, air conditioners, 2 1/2 per cent on tobacco products other than cigarettes.

Taxes on cigarettes will go up 3 cents a pack; liquor and wine, 20 per cent; motor vehicle sales, from 1 1/2 to 1.5 per cent.

Utility gross receipts will go up 20 per cent, and the corporation franchise tax will go up by 75 cents per \$1,000 capital for one year, 50 cents per \$1,000 thereafter.

Ladies Day — Senate debate on the tax bill was enlivened by the arrival of a "women's march on the Capitol."

Gallery was filled with flowery hats and excited chatter as some 40 to 100 women (estimated varied widely) swept in "to show those lobbyists what's what."

Leaders were Mrs. Jud Collier of Mumford and Mrs. Minnie Fisher Cunningham of New Waverly, both workers in the militant liberal Democratic of Texas Clubs.

They were, according to Mrs. Collier, "infuriated by the scandalous lobby which has blocked addition on the tax bill." Specifically, they favored a bill heavy on gas taxes and light on selective sales taxes.

Legislating ended abruptly—Tax bills have had a lot of attention during the current special session of the Texas Legislature. But there were more eyes on charming Miss Carol Ralphs when she stopped in for a capitol building visit ever looked at a tax bill.

This fetching miss from Farron, Tex., whose theme song is "Remember the A-La-Mode" is America's Miss Dairy Princess. She was accompanied by Mrs. Anne Reeve, whose husband Lew is publisher of the Ocoola (Wis.) Sun. Mrs. Reeve is the chaperone for Carol's journeys about the country.

Miss Dairy Princess was introduced in the House, addressed the Senate, and was the recipient of complimentary resolutions from both branches of the legislature.

Then the lawmakers settled down to work again.

71 new patrolmen — A total of 46 new patrolmen now are manning Texas highways. These trainees have just graduated from the Law Enforcement Academy of the Texas Highway of Public Safety.

Also graduating were 20 drivers license patrolmen and five license and weight patrolmen.

Presenting diplomas to the group was Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the department. He announced that there still are 73 openings on the force. Eligible to fill these posts are young men 21 to 35 years of age—and they are badly needed.

City buses lose out—Another cause, apparently lost for this year, is that of exempting city bus

systems from state gasoline gaso-

line tax.

Rural area senators, led by Sen. Vardlow Lane of Center, voted it down.

City spokesmen say the buses, needed by low-income people, cannot stay in the black unless they get tax relief. San Antonio's transit system went to the wall, was taken over by the city.

Senator Lane made a scathing attack on "taking dare of Higrland Park" (a swank Dallas suburb) when the state is having a hard time finding money "to pay the old age pensioners."

Daniel opposes federal tax—Governor Daniel asked the National Governors Conference to join him in opposing an increase in the federal tax on gasoline.

President Eisenhower's recommended 1.5 cent per gallon increase to pump new life into the federal highway building program.

Governor Daniel charged the federal government would have plenty of money for the highway program if it would quit using gasoline tax money for other purposes. He said further gasoline taxing should be left to the states, which need the money worse.

Earlier this year the governor mentioned the gasoline tax as a possible source of additional future revenue. State gasoline tax is presently 5 cents a gallon, federal tax, 3 cents a gallon.

Railroads put 55,000 new freight cars in service in 1952 and have 110,000 more on order.

A Report From Ralph Yarborough

The Senate has passed and sent to the House for action a bill which can mean additional millions of dollars of income to our farmers each year.

This additional income from the farmer would come from finding and developing new uses for farm products.

It was my privilege to co-sponsor this bill with Senator Olin Johnson of South Carolina. It passed the Senate last session but died for lack of House action.

Under this proposal an Agricultural Research and Industrial Administration would be established under the Department of Agriculture.

The Administration is charged with conducting basic research to find new industrial uses for our farm products particularly those products which are in heavy surplus.

The proposal takes a realistic and scientific approach to helping solve some of our most pressing agricultural problems. With the hard times we have had on the farms in many areas we are overdue in starting concerted scientific research programs to help meet the problem. We have scientific research programs to develop methods of farm production; we need scientific research methods to develop uses for farm products.

There is strong indication here that the House will go ahead with passage of the measure during the current session.
