Lamb County Cotton Acreage Raised For 1957

Referendum Committees and Polling Set In 1957 Cotton Marketing Quotas

Members of community referendum committees who will be responsible for conducting the cotton marketing quota referendum throughout the county on December 11 were announced November 28, 1956 by the Lamb County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. All members are farmers eligible to vote in one of the referenda being held. Many of the referendum committees are also elected community committees.

Arrangements for the establishment of polling places in all of Lamb County's eight cotton-growing communities have been completed. All persons who, as landlord, tenant or sharecropper and their wives, engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1956 are eligible to vote in the upland referendum. This includes growers who participated in the 1956 Upland Cotton Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank. If there is any

question about eligibility, farmers are asked to check with their County ASC Office.

Chairmen and Workers of High Plains Experimental Station Meet Thursday

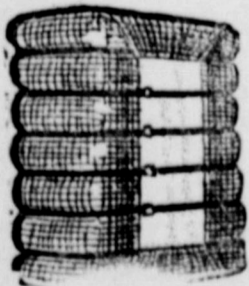

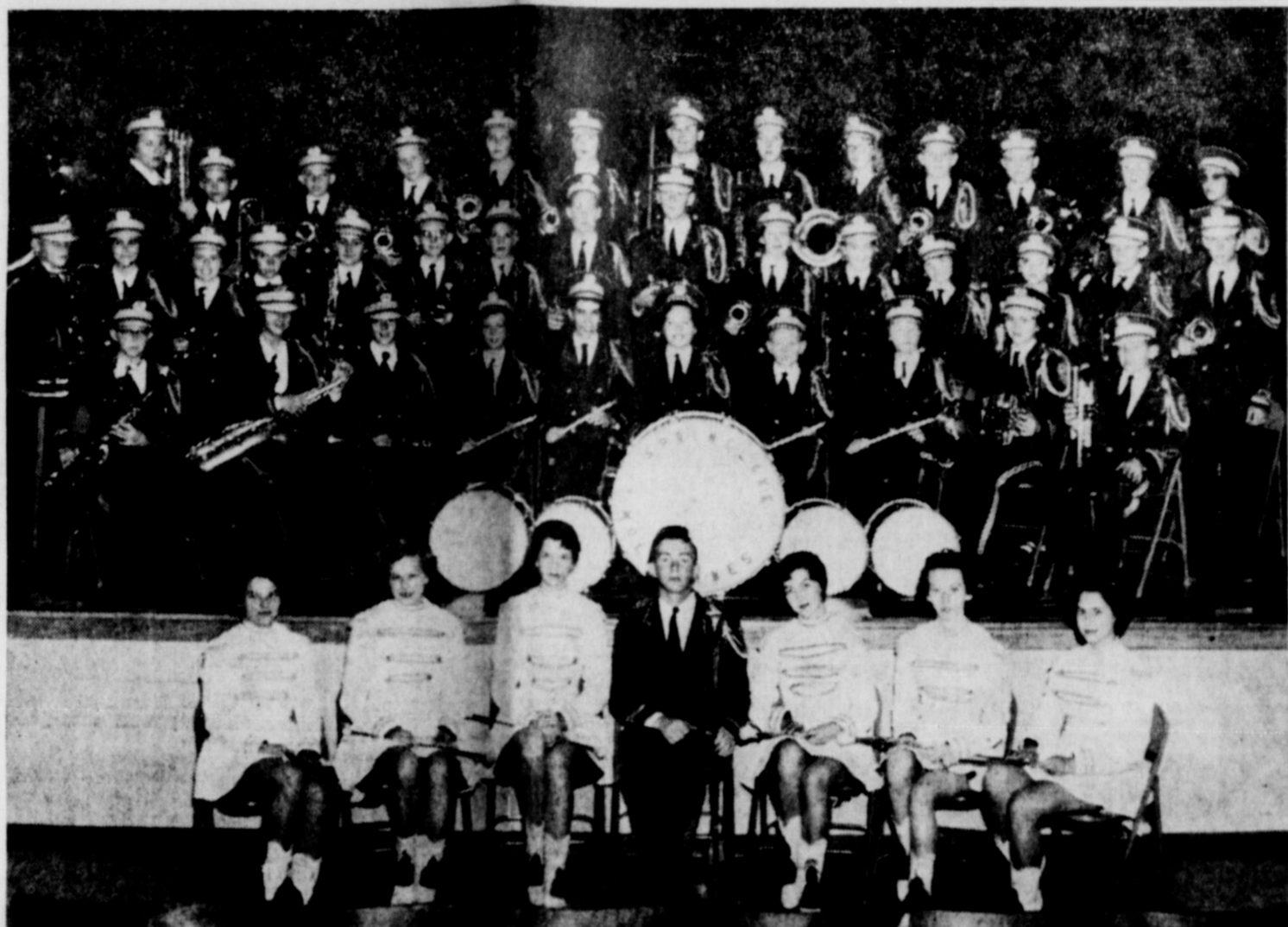
Gin Employee Receives Injuries Last Thursday

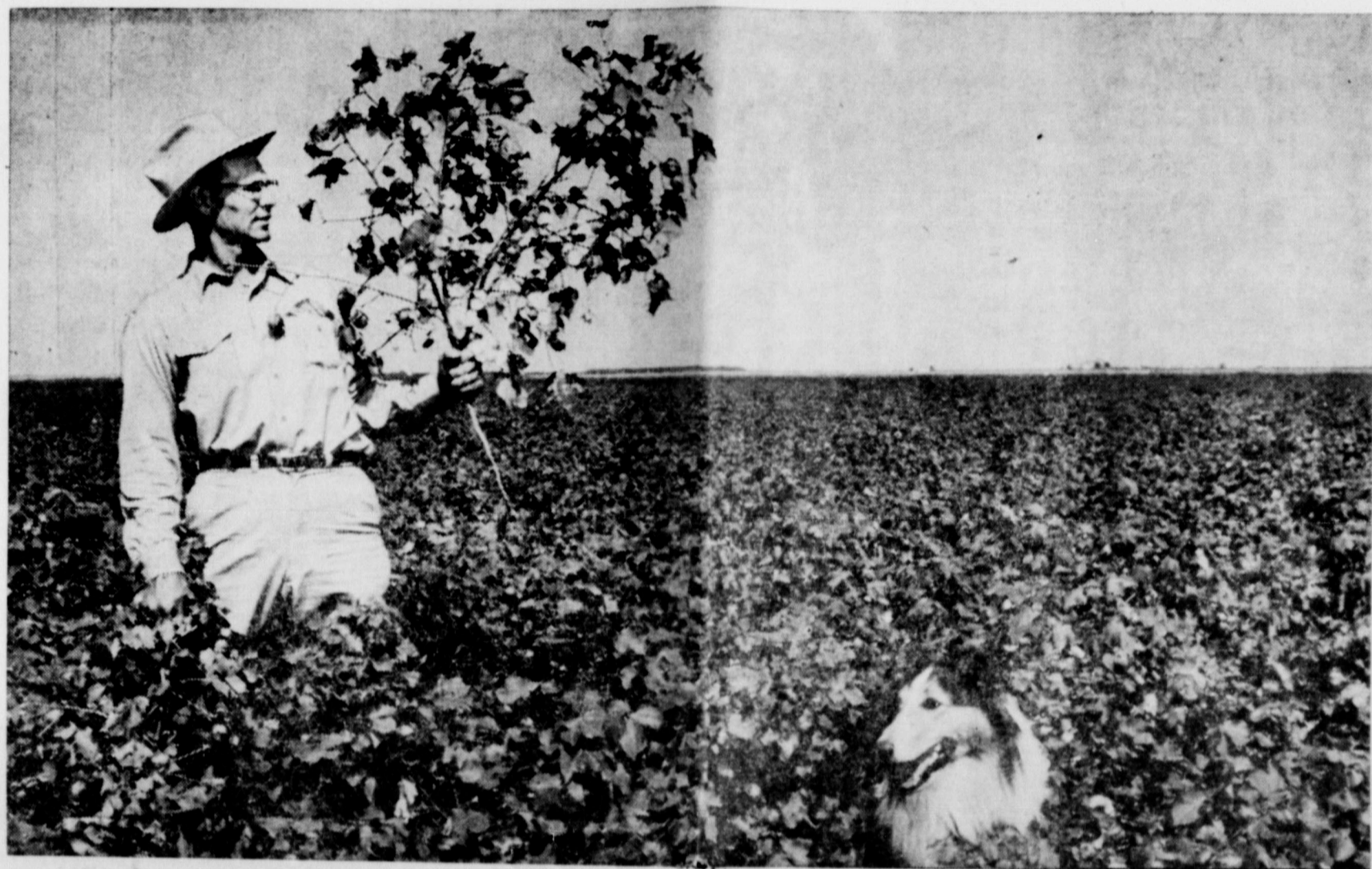

Blightmaster Cotton

From what we have seen recently, the new cotton variety, Blightmaster, promises to be popular. It not only yields well, but has considerable resistance to bacterial blight.

In the Plains country, 1956 has been a year when bacterial blight (angular leafspot) has done heavy damage to the cotton. It has lowered both yield and quality. There will be many spotted bales due to bacterial blight, and they will be penalized heavily. The difference in loan value between Middling White and a Middling Spotted cotton is about \$21 a bale.

The only good way to fight bacterial blight is to grow a blight-tolerant variety. Many of the varieties now popular are not resistant to the disease. On a trip to the Rolling and High Plains late in August, we saw many fields of sick cotton. Sick, because bacterial blight had prac-

tically defoliated it. And, finally, the disease had showed up in dark spots on the bolls, eating through the hull to stain and spot the lint.

A year like this one, disease does more damage to cotton on the High Plains than insects. The big need in this area is for varieties with blight resistance. And we predict that in the years ahead any variety that holds its popularity on the Plains must have it.

Blightmaster promises to be a good variety in the Rolling Plains area. Aubrey Lockett has 100 acres of Blightmaster near Vernon this year. When visited, it was heavily fruited, free of blight. It had been sprinkler irrigated. Sprinkler irrigation in a windy country spreads blight rapidly, and is a severe test of blight resistance.

Blightmaster is also making a fine showing on the Chillicothe Experiment Station.

Frank Gray, who farms 1,800 acres under irrigation near Lubbock, has 400 acres of Blightmaster cotton. Much of it will make 2 bales per acre with one to two post-planting irrigations.

Blightmaster is not as early maturing as the most popular varieties now being grown on the High Plains. For this reason, C. B. Spencer of the Texas Cottonseed Crushers' Association believes that Blightmaster is best adapted to that part of the High Plains in the immediate vicinity of Lubbock and southward. It is also likely to prove an excellent variety for the Rolling Plains, he says.

When the 1957 crop is harvested, there will be plenty of Blightmaster seed available. A fair amount is ready for distribution this year. And within the next few years, we believe that all the important breeders who supply seed to the central and western part of the state will have bred blight resistance into their varieties.

Cotton Growers To Vote On Marketing Quotas On Tuesday, December 11 th

The referendum on upland cotton marketing quotas, to be held throughout cotton producing areas on December 11, will be the eleventh vote of its kind. Doyle Turner, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today.

The first vote on cotton marketing quotas was held in March 1935 and the last previous cotton referendum was in December 1955. In the last vote, 93 percent of the farmers voting expressed approval of using the quotas for the 1956 cotton crop. At least two-thirds of the farmers voting must favor quotas before they may continue in effect.

Under legislative provisions, the

Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim a national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for upland cotton whenever he finds that the total supply exceeds the normal supply. At the time the Secretary issued

the proclamation for the 1957 crop, the total supply of upland cotton for the 1956-57 marketing year was estimated at 27.5 million running bales, which includes on August 1, 1956 carryovers of 14.1 million bales, 1956 production of 13.4 million bales (the August Crop report) and estimated imports of 59,000 bales. The "normal supply" figure of 17.7 million bales included estimated domestic consumption of 9.1 million bales and exports of 4.5 million bales, plus a

39 percent "carryover" reserve of 4.1 million bales. Thus the prospective total supply for 1956-57 at the time the quota was proclaimed exceeded the normal supply by about 9.8 million bales.

Marketing quotas operate through acreage allotments. A grower who exceeds the cotton acreage allotment for his farm, under a cotton marketing quota program will be subject to a marketing quota penalty of 50 percent of parity on the farm's excess produc-

tion. Growers who do not exceed their cotton allotments may market free of penalties all the 1956 cotton production from their farms

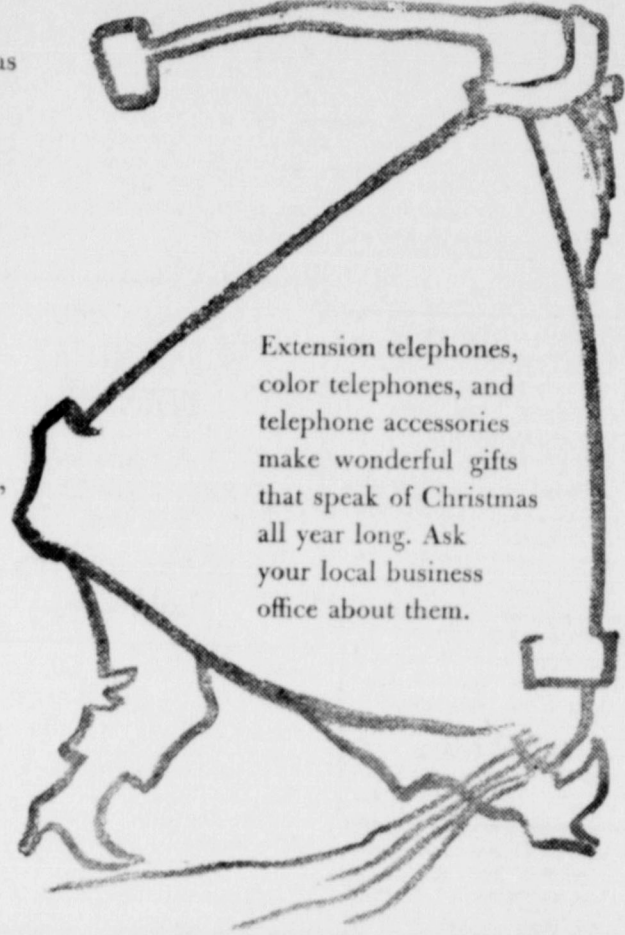

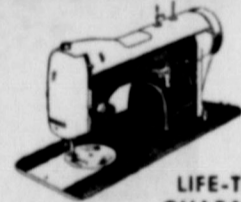

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Representative George Mahon Urges Benson To Set Up Spotted Cotton Loan Guarantee

LUBBOCK, Dec. '56 (Special)—Rep. George Mahon has wired Secretary Benson, urging him to immediately set in motion plans which will guarantee a loan basis on light spot cotton for the 1957 crop year.

This action followed a meeting in Lubbock of representative farmers from approximately 30 West Texas counties on November 28. At the meeting a resolution was unanimously approved calling upon the Department of Agriculture to include a specific loan on light spot cotton in the government loan program.

Attending the meeting were representatives of the Plain Cotton Growers Association, Farm Bureau Union. Other industry and producer groups were also represented.

In his message to Sec. Benson Mahon pointed out that the nations cotton growers were losing millions of dollars annually by reason of the refusal of the Department to grant a special loan on light spot cotton.

Mahon pointed out that over a period of years he had joined with other West Texans in seeking a special loan on light spot cotton. This year such a loan was endorsed by the House Committee on Agriculture in a report made to Congress, and a Congressional hearing was held in Greenville, Texas, in October at which time the Department of Agriculture was condemned for its failure to provide for a special loan on light spot cotton for the 1956 crop.

Mahon expressed belief that the united front which has now been presented by all farm groups should mean a great deal in the campaign for a government loan basis on light spot cotton for 1957.



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Good Roads Group Names New Officer

Callan Graham of Houston has been named executive vice-president of the Texas Good Roads Association. He will assume active management of the Association at Austin on December 1.

Charles K. Devall, publisher of the Kilgore News-Herald and president of TGRA, announced today that Graham had accepted the position and will succeed Jim Lindsey who resigned November 1.

A World War II pilot in the China-Burma-India theatre, the 42-year-old attorney served in the Texas Legislature from 1949 to 1952 as representative from Junction where he had served as Kimble County Attorney and District Attorney of the 112th Judicial District. Graham is resigning his present position as general counsel and assistant to the executive vice president of the Texas Manufacturers Association at Houston to accept the Texas Good Roads Association post.

Devall said that members of the Texas Good Roads Association ex-

ecutive committee were "very happy to secure the services of Callan Graham, especially at this time since we are facing the most active decade of road-building progress in history."

"Graham is a seasoned, experienced executive with a first-hand knowledge of the many problems facing the Texas highway program," Devall said. "We believe he will provide the high caliber of active leadership which the Association's program requires."

Ed C. Burris, executive vice-president of the Texas Manufacturers' Association, also praised service with TMA and expressed regret that he was resigning.

"Callan Graham will be a fine man for the important work of the Texas Good Roads Association and we are happy that he will have

this exceptional opportunity to work for Texas progress," Burris said.

Graham was born in Del Rio. He attended public school in Kimble County and graduated from the University of Texas. Following graduation he returned to Junction to practice law.

He is a past president of the Rotary Club at Junction.

After his legislative service, Graham practiced law in San Antonio three years before assuming his duties in the Houston office of TMA.

Graham is married to the former Maude Boone of Junction. They have three sons and one daughter.

\$1500 Set Aside For Study - Research On Tuberculosis In State of Texas

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Recognizing research advances which have drastically cut the national TB death rate, members of the Texas Tuberculosis Association's research committee have set aside \$1500 to stimulate further study and research on T B control in Texas.

Dr. Daniel E. Jenkins of Houston head of the committee, believes that scientists may be on the threshold of new discoveries which will reduce the great number of TB cases still persisting. The US currently has 1,200,000 cases, both

active and inactive, needing either actual treatment or medical supervision. Of these, 250,000 are not under treatment and are exposing others in their communities.

"In 50 years of fighting the disease, we've found the answers to many problems", asserted Dr. Jenkins in discussing the half-century siege of tuberculosis by TB associations. "But medical research is often frustratingly slow. The tuberculosis problem in Texas is very large in comparison with many other states where the disease has

been more completely controlled.

"Despite money allotted to research each year from Christmas Seal funds," he continued, "here in Texas we feel that we need to set up a fund especially for research in the state. It's a 'baby fund,' of course, but doctors on the research committee hope that it will be a nucleus for donations from local tuberculosis associations or medical endowments."

Letters were today directed to medical and pre-medical schools over Texas, inviting would-be recipients of the \$1500 to apply to the research committee of the Texas TB Association in Austin. Research may be current or proposed, either in the basic sciences, or a long clinical, sociological or public health lines.

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
