## Earth City Commission Calls Bond Election

The Earth City Dads met Monday night and voted to call a bond election to be held April 3 in the City of Earth, on the issuance of bonds for a new City Hall and community meeting room combined. Also on the issuance of bonds for waterworks system improvements and extensions.

At the election propositions to be submitted are: Shall the City Council be authorized to issue bonds in the amount of \$20,000 for building a new City Hall and \$10,000 for waterworks system, bonds maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than 20 years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate of not more than five (5) per cent per annum. A community room will be built on the present site of the community building.

There will be no new taxes levied for the bonds.

The proposed community room will be designed and built to accommodate approximately 100 persons at a banquet or approximately 150 seated. The meeting room will also have kitchen, storage, and rest rooms.

The election will be held in the usual polling place, the Earth community building.

Carroll McDonald will serve as presiding judge, assisted by Phil Raught.

Mrs. Minnie Pate and Mrs. V. J. Sigman will serve as clerks.

## Speed Zones Set By City Officials

City officials of Earth passed and approved an ordinance on March 5 fixing the maximum rate of speed for motor vehicles; allowing for speed zones also providing for penalty and declaring an emergency. The ordinance will be found elsewhere in the paper.

It is now unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle upon any street, roadway or highway within the city limits of Earth at a greater rate of speed than thirty miles per hour, except where speed zone signs are erected indicating a higher or lower rate of speed.

Speed zones include all of U. S. Highway 70 within the city limits, also all of F. M. Road 1055 (Amherst Street) and Dimmitt road within the city limits.

Any person violating any speed limit designated by speed zone signs, upon conviction will be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$200.

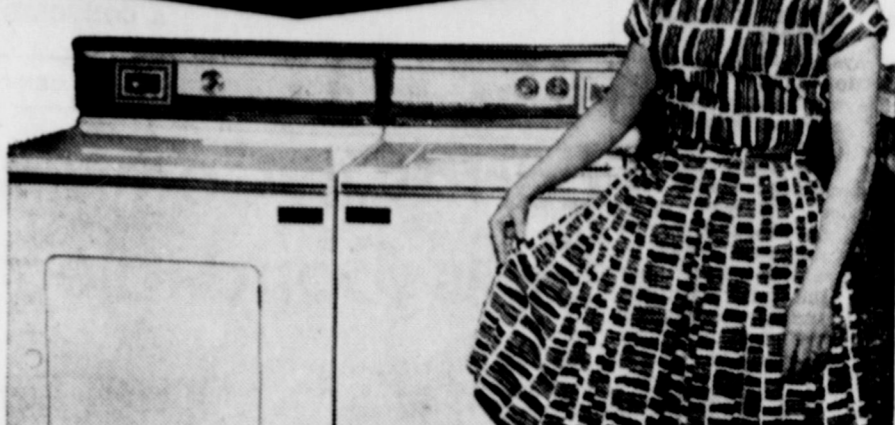

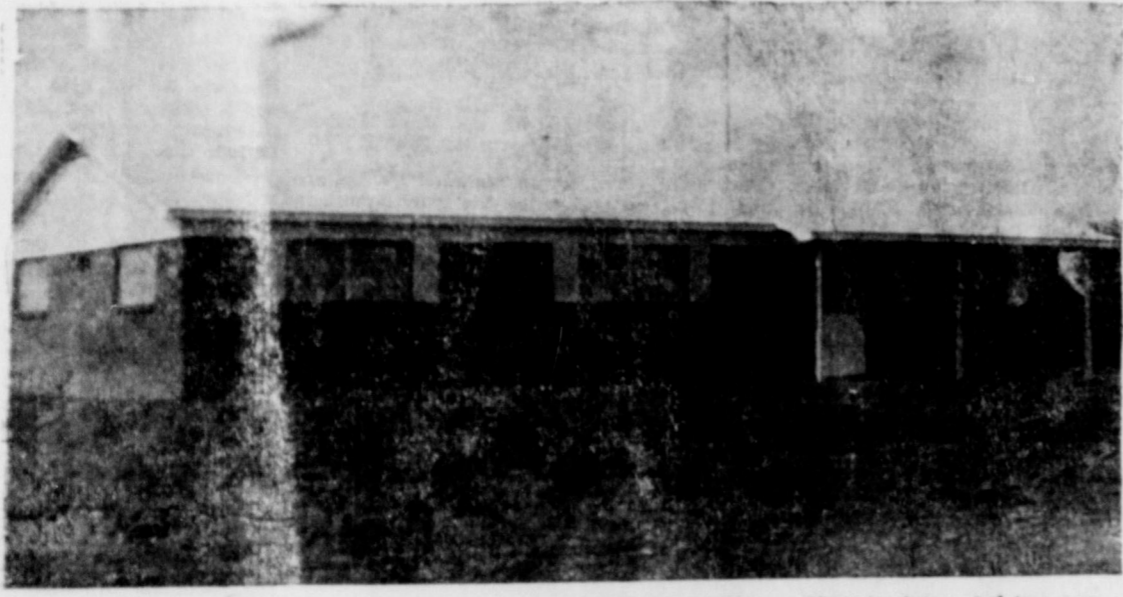

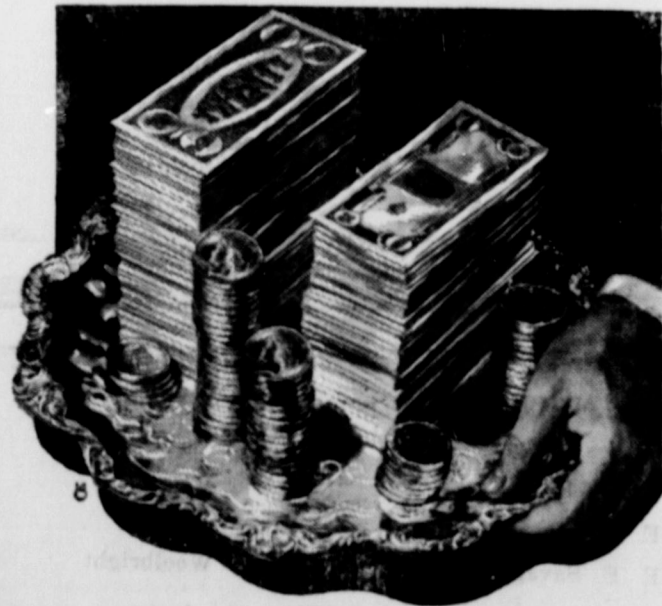

## LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 51  
AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE MAXIMUM RATE OF SPEED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES; ALLOWING FOR SPEED ZONES; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City Council of Earth, Texas, upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigation, find it necessary to establish maximum speed limits, and create speed zones in certain areas, all in the corporate limits of the City of Earth, Texas.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Earth also finds it is necessary to immediate preservation of the public health and safety to provide for the immediate enactment of such measures, constituting an emergency; NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Speed limits of Thirty (30) miles per hour; It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle upon any street, roadway or highway in the City Limits of the City of Earth, Texas, at a greater rate of speed than Thirty (30) miles per hour, except where speed zone signs are erected indicating a higher or lower rate of speed, in which case the speed indicated by the speed zone signs shall be the maximum speed permitted. And it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle in excess to the speed limits indicated on any official speed zone sign.

SECTION 2. The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of U. S. 79 within the Corporate Limits of Earth, Texas; the maximum legal speed limits shall be as follows:

Beginning at the west city limit the maximum legal speed limit for both eastbound and westbound traffic shall be 50 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.300 miles; thence 35 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.486 miles to the center line of Elm Street; thence 40 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.210 miles; thence 55 miles m.p.h. for a distance of 0.300 miles; thence 60 m.p.h. during the daytime and 55 m.p.h. during the nighttime for a distance of 0.200 m.p.h. to the east city limit, the center line of the county road.

And all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of F. M. 1055 (Amherst Street) within the Corporate Limits of Earth, Texas; the maximum legal speed limit shall be as follows:

Beginning at the north city limit, center line of a county road, the maximum legal speed limit for both southbound and northbound traffic shall be 60 m.p.h. during the daytime and 55 m.p.h. during the nighttime for a distance of 0.200 miles; thence 55 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.385 miles; thence 50 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.200 miles to the center line of North West Third Street; thence 40 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.432 miles to the center line of South East Third Street; thence 55 m.p.h. for a distance of 0.282 miles to the south city limit.

And all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than Ten (\$10.00) nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

SECTION 5. That the hazards, dangerous to public health and safety, creates a necessity requiring all rules providing that no ordinance shall be finally passed on the day of its introduction be suspended; and this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure, to take effect from and after the date of its first publication. AND IT IS SO ORDERED.

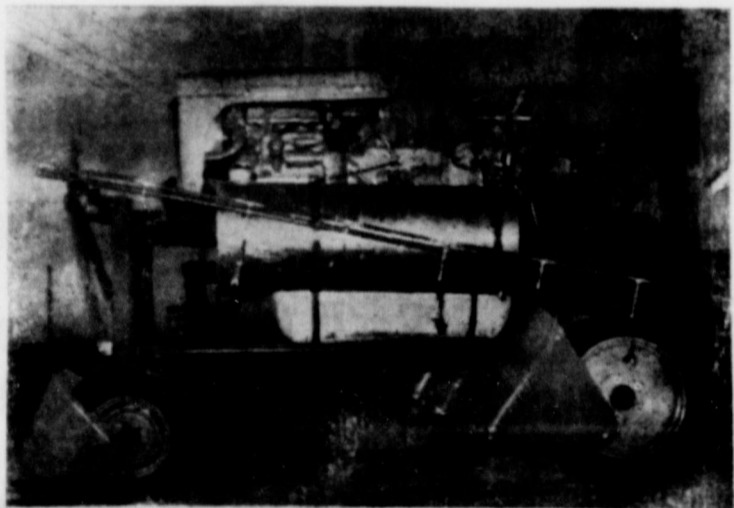

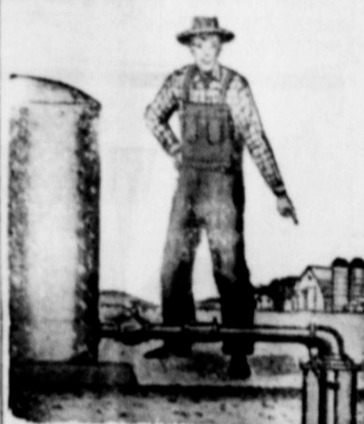

"Shall the City Council of the City of Earth, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$20,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Twenty (20) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Five per cent (5%) per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of constructing a new City Hall, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas?"

**PROPOSITION No. 2**  
"Shall the City Council of the City of Earth, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$10,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Twenty (20) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Five (5%) per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of improving and extending the City's Waterworks System, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas?"
