# Rep. Clayton Chairman Of Counties Committee

AUSTIN--SP--House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher today announced the appointment of State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake as Chairman of the House Committee on Counties.

The Springlake Representative is one of only five House Members who will serve as both a Chairman and a Vice Chairman of House Standing Committees. The Committee on Banks and Banking will have Clayton as its Vice Chairman. Mutscher said that 8-year veteran member will return to two committees on which he served last session: State Affairs and Conservation and Reclamation. He has also been asked to serve on the Rules Committee.

The 21-member Counties Committee has jurisdiction over all matters relating to Counties, their creation, organization, boundaries, government and finances, and the compensation and duties of their officers.

"The Committee system is the heartbeat of the Legislative process. It is at this level that the citizens of Texas have an opportunity to express themselves concerning legislation," Mutscher said. "This 62nd Legislature will be faced with many difficult challenges and I feel fortunate to have Mr. Clayton in the leadership of these two important House Committees."

Mutscher was recently re-elected unanimously to the Speakership, and he is one of only five Texans to be so honored with a second consecutive term.

# Meters Show Little Change

Earth showed a very little change in its growth or loss during 1970 according to a check of utility meters in the city this week.

A check with Pioneer Natural Gas Company showed a gain of one meter in the city from December, 1969, to December, 1970. That company reported a total of 426 gas meters at the end of 1969 compared to a total of 427 at the end of 1970.

City water connections were down 2 meters within the past year's time. They reported 415 meters at the end of 1969 as compared to a total of 413 by the end of 1970.

A check with Southwestern Public Service Company revealed that residential meters were up 7 in 1970 with a total of 755 at the end of 1970 as compared to 748 by the end of 1969.

# Farmers Receive Cotton Allotments

Allotment notices on Lamb County's 1971 base cotton allotment of 132,950 acres were mailed from the ASCS office last week to individual farmers.

Producers will receive their yields in an additional notice when all 1970 cotton production has been turned into the county office. Lanar Aten, county ASCS executive director, is urging all farmers who have not turned in this production to do so in order that notices may be prepared prior to sign up.

The base allotment is not a limitation on how much a farmer can plant but will be used for purposes of how many acres will be paid for and an acreage of how much the set-aside will be.

Marketing quotas are not in effect for 1971, 72 and 73 whether a farmer participates or not.

Producers are not required to participate in the cotton program on all farms in which they have an interest in the cotton crop. In addition they do not have to plant within the allotment on other farms in which they do have an interest in the cotton crop.

The prevented planting and failed acreage provisions will be the same as in the past except that if the prevented and failed acres are planted to another crop the payment will be reduced by one-third. The

Barry Love, starch plant manager, spoke on the progress of the plant and stated 38,000 bushels of corn have been ground to date. The yield has been 1 1/2 million pounds of starch, 152,000 pounds of germ and 55 tons of high protein meal.

PRESS RELEASE— from office of Representative Clayton reported today that House Bill No. 103 that he introduced relating to the Activities of the Coordinating Board, had been introduced because of misleading information received about the board's action. Clayton stated, "I am convinced the board is doing its job properly and there is no need for the legislation. The concern has arisen over the need for an expanded Junior College program. In checking the matter, inquiries showed that the board is concerned about the expansion of a Junior College program and is doing what it can to promote it."

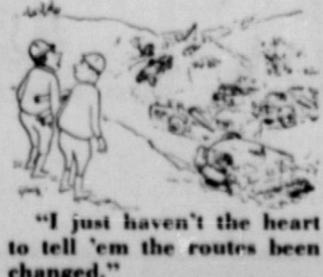
Clayton stated that he believes there is a real need for two or three Junior Colleges in our immediate area. The Junior College program can greatly assist the state in carrying out Vocational and Technical programs on a two year basis as well as in preparing those students who desire additional education.

The telegram was unsigned.

Clayton said, "Our new senator has already shown the respect he has won from his colleagues by the committees to which he has been assigned, the Texas Panhandle and South Plains area can consider itself very fortunate that Lloyd Bentsen has been appointed to Public Works Committee of the Senate. That committee not only has jurisdiction over the highways and other public facilities, but most important it has jurisdiction over water development which is the main concern of this part of the state. We all know the strong support Senator Bentsen has pledged to the development of our area and now as a member of Public Works Committee is in a position of strength to work effectively in this field. The senator sought an appointment to the agricultural committee, but Clayton said, "He considered the Public Works Assignment of even greater importance to agriculture and water resources development for the area."

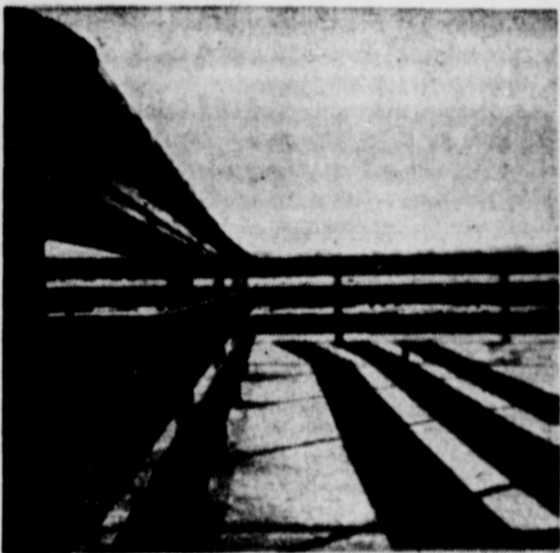
