## Parade, Barbecue to Precede Annual Rodeo

### Earth Leads County In Population Growth, Almost Triple Size Since 1950

Earth leads all Lamb County towns in rate of population growth since 1950, a Texas Employment Commission report shows.

According to the TEC survey Earth has a 1958 population of 1,500; almost triple the population of 541 in 1950.

Along with an increase in population, Earth has also progressed in numerous other ways. A sewer system for the city was added, a moqui to control plan was put into effect the main street widened, a city park area begun, street markers erected, church additions and parsonages were built, along with many new homes and businesses. Further progress will be noted shortly when construction begins on the paving of several blocks of streets within the residential area of the town.

Lamb County's population was estimated at 25,090, a 25 percent growth over the 20,015 in 1950.

Other county towns, with their 1950 population figures in parentheses, are: Littlefield, 9,275 (6,558), Oilton, 2,500 (1,200), Srdan, 1,400 (1,336), and Amterst 915 (917).

Other items revealed in the TEC survey showed Lamb County with a workforce of 8,580 workers. It showed 250 persons unemployed.

Of the 8,580 workers, 3,900 are farm workers, the TEC report said.

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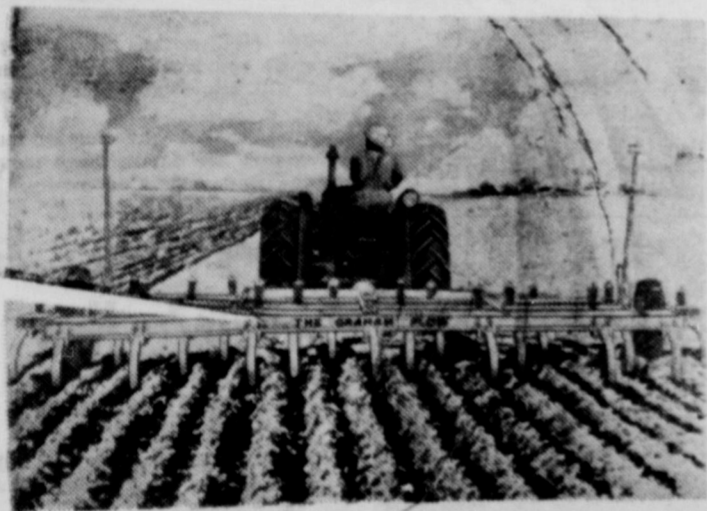

### Texas DPS Will Do All Possible To Keep Highways Safe For July 4th Drivers

An already serious shortage of farm laborers is mounting daily throughout the Texas High Plains and the handicaps now imposed by the Texas Employment Commission on the recruiting of Mexican Braceros is being viewed with grave concern, W. O. Fortenberry, President of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., said today.

Fortenberry said that the labor shortage could greatly impair crop production on the High Plains this year, especially with vegetable farmers at present and even with cotton producers as the cotton crop progresses.

Much labor is needed now by many cotton producers to help chop and weed cotton fields. However, uncooperative help from Texas Employment Commission officials has allowed only a trickle of farm labor.

Tuesday, June 3, the Bracero Committee of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. composed of W. T. Millen, Muleshoe; W. G. White, Lamesa; P. A. Nafzger, Olton; J. T. Fulford, Brownfield; and J. D. Smith, Littlefield, met and adopted two resolutions pertaining to the labor situation.

The Committee endorsed the position taken by the National Farm Labor Users Committee favoring extension of Public Law 78, which governs the use of Mexican Nationals for farm labor.

Proper administration of present provisions of Public Law 78 will work satisfactorily, this farmer favor its extension, a spokesman explained.

In the other resolutions adopted by the PCG Bracero Committee, it was stated: "It is the concern of this group that the in-

tervention of Public Law 78 is being circumvented through administrative actions of local and regional agents of the U. S. Department of Labor and Texas Employment Commission.

While no specific details were announced, Chairman Millen said specific examples of misinterpretation of some of the rules under Public Law 78 have been gathered and would be presented in Washington, D. C. June 9 — 14 when representatives attend hearings on Public Law 78.

The Committee charged that the labor shortage in West Texas was triggered by a Department of Labor ruling that domestic labor resources must be exhausted before Mexican Nationals can be imported.

"However in practically all instances where domestic labor has been contracted, such labor has refused to come to the High Plains area and work in agriculture, yet the Texas Employment Commission continually refuses to certify our counties and organizations so that Mexican Braceros can be obtained", Chairman Millen explained.

Representatives who will probably accompany Millen to Washington include Otho Smith, Littlefield; White and Nafzger in addition to George W. Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice President of the PCG.

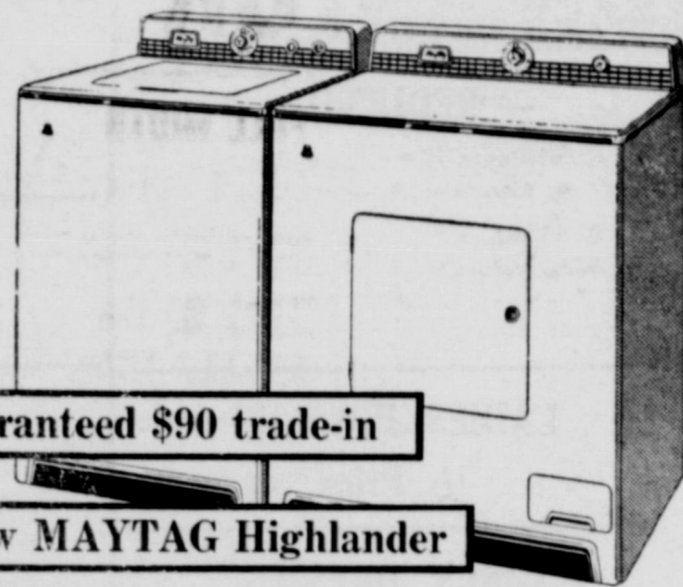

### Insect Control Guide Is Now Available

Insect activity usually increases as the weather becomes warmer. Flies, mosquitoes, moths and other insects endanger health, feed on fabrics, contaminate food and are general nuisances. Up-to-date control measures are needed to fight these insects. A leaflet compiled by extension entomologists offer directions for choosing and applying insecticides.

The bulletin, "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects," classifies all major pests except the termite into specific categories related to type of damage. Insects are illustrated for easy identification, and concise control measures are given for each insect. Also listed are some important cautions to observe in using insecticides.

Copies of the "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects" are available from your county extension office.

### Farmers Advised To Be Wary Of Cotton Insects

Higher net profits may be the reward of Texas High Plains farmers who go all out to control insect infestations and weeds to produce high quality yields — especially in cotton, W. O. Fortenberry, president of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., said today.

Fortenberry said there are a number of excellent reasons why cotton growers should take every effort to control weeds and insects this year: for it will pay big dividends to see that a full cotton crop goes to the gin rather than be consumed partly by insects, or choked out by weeds.

First, producers are assured a minimum price of at least \$190 per bale (middling linc) for lint and seed in 1958. The Government loan insures the grower: this amount and cotton can sell higher.

Also, the sub-soil moisture is the best in many years. Farm officials say that sub-soil moisture is adequate to insure a better than average crop. With timely rains on non-irrigated land, a record breaking yield could be made.

Cotton insects can be counted on to be a limiting factor in production if they are not controlled. There has been plenty of host plants for the thrips, aphids, fleasoppers and even bollworms to hibernate in or feed on this past winter and spring. Cotton plants will grow and fruit much during June. This is a critical month for these insects to build up. With favorable fruiting and growing conditions, conditions also are favorable for insects and the grower must, therefore, control insects or have them take a terrific toll from his crop this year.

Weeds also must be eliminated since they rob cotton plants of precious moisture. Fred C. Elliott, Extension Cotton Specialist, says the second highest cost item in cotton production is for grass and weed under control.

Last year, Elliott said the State's cotton producers saved an estimated 16 million by using rotary hoes, chemicals and oils in

efforts to keep weeds and grass under control.

Another loss that could be costly to Texas High Plains farmers is lower grades caused by insect "spots". This often amounts to

more than \$25 per bale and in most cases, the cost of insect control is more than paid for by the reductions in "spots", alone.

Fortenberry also reminded growers that 1958, more than recent years, is the time to market high quality cotton. "With the demand good and parity higher than last year, the farmer with better quality cotton is certainly going to have higher net profits from his 1958 cotton crop," Fortenberry concluded.

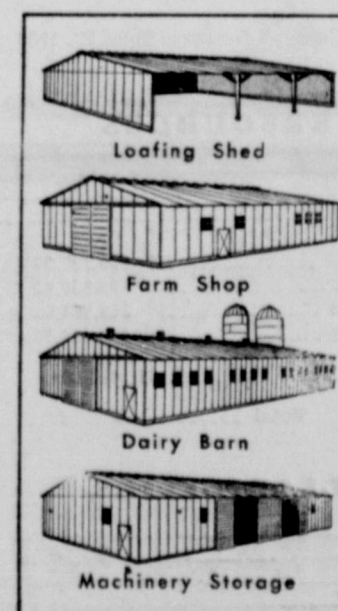

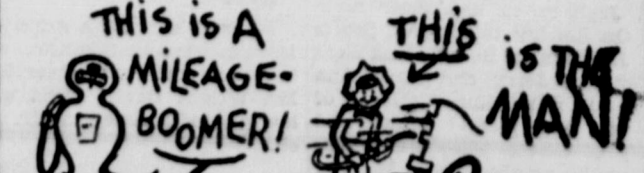

**H. P. S. Installs 1100 Feet Of Concrete Pipe**

Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Advisory Council of the High Plains Station, announced today the completion of laying 1100 feet of 15 inch concrete pipe on the 310 acre farm at Halfway.

Mr. Les Brown, President of Standard Concrete Pipe Company of Lubbock, donated this 1100 feet of concrete pipe through Standard's Plainview office.

This 1100 feet of underground pipe added to the 2900 feet contributed by Gifford Hill Western and Brown Supply in 1957 makes a total of 4000 feet now in use at the

High Plains Station. An additional 1700 feet of pipe is required to connect all three irrigation wells together.
