



Higher Postal Rates Effective Friday, August 1

New Postal Rates enacted by Congress go into effect at 12:01 a.m. Friday, August 1.

All mail postmarked after that time must be stamped with the following postage: Four cents instead of three cents on first class letters, seven cents instead of six cents on Air Mail letters, three cents instead of two cents on postcards, and four cents instead of three on Air Mail postcards.

All the nation's 36,695 postoffices are ready for the switch with supplies of new denomination stamps. They will sell a new four-cent embossed, stamped envelope and a seven-cent embossed Air Mail stamped envelope.

Most of the new second class rate increases also voted by Congress do not become effective until January 1. An immediate exception is a one-cent hike on newspapers and magazines mailed by individuals.

Starting August 1, third class mail, including greeting cards, circulars and merchandise will cost three cents for two ounces and a cent and one-half for the next two ounces and a cent and one-half more for each additional ounce. Books, ounces and a cent and one-half more and catalogues will go at those rates.

Parcel post rates remain unchanged but the Post Office Department has an increase pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

There will be no period of grace for letters, writers who put only a three-cent stamp on their letters.

"The Post Office has no alternative but to collect postage due when the new rates go into effect, an official said.

Goodwin - Corzine Win in First Primary, Saturday

County Judge Pat Boone, Jr. polled an easy victory over Paul Lewis, as Mrs. Bill Pass and Mrs. Lucy Moreland made their way into a runoff in the County Treasurer's race in Saturday's Primary.

Clyde Goodwin won a victory in the precinct two County Commissioners race and W. A. (Bill) Corzine took his two opponents with out a runoff.

Goodwin carried Earth with 306 votes, W. W. Powell 117 and Thurlo Branscum 43. Goodwin led all other boxes including Pleasant Valley, North Sudan, Sod House and absentee with a total of 423, Powell 145 and Branscum 59.

Corzine swept Earth with 322 votes, J. L. Walker 51 and J. of P. L. H. Randolph 69 with a total vote. Corzine 361, Randolph 101 and Walker 87.

Precinct four Justice of the Peace O. M. Edwards also made it into the select circle, winning his race easily over two opponents and G. W. Davis. Precinct 5 won Justice of the Peace over the incumbent candidate.

In the State Election Gov. Price Daniel won his race without even a runoff.

State Senator Andy Rogers swept to victory over his opponents with out a runoff.

In the U. S. Senate Race, Sen. Ralph Yarborough swept to a surprisingly easy victory over Blakeley.

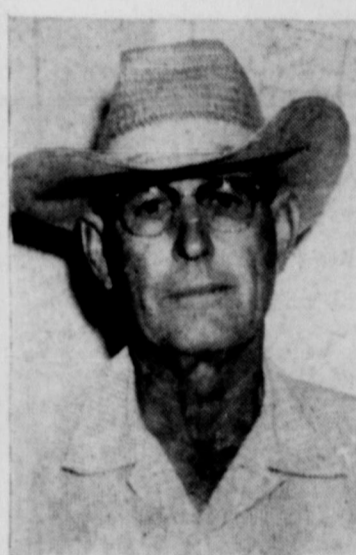

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 11 of Article XI and to read as follows: "Section 11. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

Section 5. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
