



Jean D. Howard, Formerly of Earth, And Son Drown Sunday Near Abilene

Jean Dewitt Howard, 31, of 1510 Bridge Ave., Abilene, and his youngest son, Scott, 7, drowned Sunday around 3 p.m. in Baird Lake, near Abilene.

Six boats from the Taylor County Rescue Service arrived at the lake shortly after 6 p.m. The boys' body was located at 6:58 p.m. and his father's at 7:03 p.m., both in approximately 30 feet of water.

Howard operated Howard and Son Garage, in Abilene, with his father, Waymond D. Howard.

Only witness to the accident was Don W. Richards, who had been in the boat just a few minutes before the accident.

Richards said he was with the two victims in a three section homemade aluminum boat which Howard had borrowed. Howard had used the boat Saturday, but without a motor and had not had any trouble. Richards said Sunday he had an outboard motor on the back of it.

Richards had gotten out of the boat and Howard and his son were checking a trotline.

Richards saw the boat tip over and though he was not a good swimmer, he immediately went to their rescue. Unable to find them, he returned to shore and secured help. It was about an hour before the search, directed by Sheriff Lee, could be assembled and begun.

Jean Howard was born Oct. 27, 1926, at Compress. The family later moved to Earth and he graduated from Springlake High School and attended Texas Tech. He entered the United States Merchant Marines in January, 1945, and was commissioned an ensign.

He wed Montez Hudson here on May 28, 1946. While he was in service his parents moved to Abilene where they now reside.

His son, Scott, was born May 8, 1951 in Abilene and finished the first grade at Fannin Elementary School this year.

Survivors include the wife, a son, Randy, 9; a daughter, Jerri Sue, 8 months; two brothers, R. L. and Carroll, both of Abilene and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Waymond D. Howard of 1741 N. 15th St.

Howard was a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Huslon.

Funeral services for Howard and his son were conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday in the Kiker Warren Chapel in Abilene.

Rev. Trotter of Dumas, formerly pastor at the Fair Park Methodist Church, Abilene, of which Howard was a member, officiated. Burial was in an Abilene Cemetery.

W. F. "Bill" Rudd, 58, died Wednesday at 4:50 p.m., while enroute to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Rudd sustained fatal injuries when the disc which he was using to cut weeds along a bar ditch passed over his limbs after he had fallen or jumped from the tractor which he was driving. The accident occurred two miles south of Earth around 3:30 p.m.

Commissioner Sam Cearley and Clyde Goodwin were within one hundred yards of Rudd at the time. Neither were eye witnesses to the accident but noticing the tractor loose they rushed to the scene and found him injured.

The Amberst ambulance was summoned. In the meantime, Mrs. Wanda Shelby, a registered nurse, was rushed to the scene of the accident to render aid until the ambulance arrived.

Rudd was taken to the Amberst Hospital. Upon arrival, he was sent on to Lubbock.
