Damages resulting from the hail storm which hit this area Sunday night were exceedingly high.

Farmers in this area struck by the storm were almost totally ruined, some however reported only 50 percent to 75 percent damages.

Damages to the new grade school building were estimated to be about \$1500.00, according to Tom Clatterbaugh. The roof from four of the new rooms in the building was completely blown off.

The First Baptist Church windows received quite a beating from the hail which broke out 55 small windows, and a total of 13 windows were broken out in the Cletis Clayton home.

A new barn just recently completed on the Pat McCord place was blown over leaving everything in the barn intact not moving even a sack.

Several other city residences received broken windows the E. O. Cundiff residence lost a picture window in the storm.

The hail covered a fifteen mile long strip, beginning about 7 miles west of Earth and with the width of about 2 to 3 miles and toward Springlake it seemed to gradually grow wider turning northward until it reached almost to Sunnyside community, 7 miles north of Springlake.

were left without a leaf remaining on the stalk. Potatoe farms which would have been ready for harvest, in from 2 to 3 weeks, were beaten down and will have to be harvested now, making about half the yield that another 2 or 3 weeks would have made.

The farmers have gone back into their fields, those that are dry enough to begin replanting, and have begun the task of replanting. Several farmers are being assisted by those who did not receive damages in the storm. It was reported that farmers past the two to three mile wide strip of the hail area, received only a light rain.

Rex Angeley one of the farmers who was hailed out and is now replanting cotton said, "I have never been hailed out before in my 8 years of farming, and I had never realized how nice it was to have farmers come up and ask to loan me seed to replant," and he went on to say that "If I used all the men and tractors that had been offered to me, that my whole replanting job would be completed in one day." Farmers in this area are really finding they have fine neighbors all around them.

Some farmers have decided on planting feed while others are replanting cotton. Mr. W. H. Parish plans to plant some of his land in lettuce. While still several farmers are not replanting as they hope they have one stalk left out of every 3 or 4, therefore they will cultivate and hope they can pull it through.

Yesterday we got a very long letter from you and also one from mother with the colored pictures. It's really to bad about them ruining the film. We were disappointed of course but I suppose it couldn't be helped. Maybe we can take some more. Next week we are to get back our second roll of slides. I can hardly wait. We are both getting to be camera bugs over here. Even Kenneth is really getting on it. That's all he thinks of, but we both know it is an opportunity of a lifetime. We can't seem to take enough pictures of all the things we want to remember. The more we're here the better we like it. Absolutely, it's amazing. When we think of what we could have missed if we had been stationed in the states. We both agree that we wouldn't change this for a state-side assignment for anything. It's all going to go awfully fast seems to me like. You can't realize that when you're in the states. As we all know how all of us dreaded overseas duty for Kenneth, but now we can see how silly we were. Now that we're here they are stationed in the states. They just don't know what they are missing over here. It is really something that we will never forget.

These people are very nice and quite interesting. Most of them adore all American couples. And we never had it so good. We know practically all the families in the neighborhood now and they are very friendly and try to make you feel right at home. They all knew about Ken being sick and every time I went outside I saw someone who was asking about him. They were really quite sympathetic. I think by the time we come home I should be able to understand German pretty well. Most of them don't speak too much English, the

Lemon-Cream Coconut Birthday Cake



Here's a suggestion for a springtime birthday cake. It's as colorful as the yellow daffodil, and you can make it quick as a bunny. This recipe combines two of the new mixes which make cooking so easy for the modern housewife. Make the two layers (8 or 9 inch) with your favorite yellow cake mix, then between the layers and over the top and sides spread Lemonade Filling.

Make this filling with a can of California's frozen concentrate for lemonade. Packed in the handy 6-ounce can is the juice of tasty, tangy fresh California lemons, just with sugar added.

California Lemonade Filling
 1 can (6-oz.) frozen concentrate for lemonade
 Water to make 1½ cups liquid
 ½ cup sugar
 2 tablespoons cornstarch
 2 tablespoons flour
 2 egg yolks
 2 tablespoons butter

Method: Mix concentrate for lemonade with water to make 1½ cups liquid. Combine with sugar, cornstarch, and flour and cook over direct moderate heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Boil 1 minute. Remove from heat. Beat a little of this mixture with the slightly beaten egg yolks. Beat into remaining hot mixture. Return to heat and cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add butter.

When the Lemonade Filling cools, spread thickly between both layers. Put together, then spread over top and sides of cake. Sprinkle shredded coconut generously over top and sides of cake.

and been in the area when it was happening. The middle aged people all have. Like our landlady and her husband. He was in the war. And was wounded pretty badly by bombs she told me his leg and foot were badly hurt and he wears a special made shoe for one of his feet and has to use crutches some. She said he was in the hospital 3 years. I truly think that the majority of families just like them average class of people of Germany, do realize what the U. S. is doing for them and do appreciate it all. I know all these people around here do. They all know how good they are having it now compared with when Hitler was here. They all hate him. And believe me they are a long way from having it good, as you might call it, compared to us at home. Really their ways are still quite primitive compared to ours but are happy about it because they've always had so LITTLE and when I say little I mean really little too. It will really take time for them to come out of it all. But they really make a lot of progress as it is now I suppose. They undoubtedly must be a strong people to have stood up under it all. I don't believe the American people could have stood up under it. We are all so used to so many luxuries. The other day I was talking to a German girl in our block. She is 15 and has a bicycle and she really thinks that's something. I told her I used to have a bicycle when I was her age in America. Then I said we had a car (auto) in America. My goodness that was something. She says, "You have a bicycle and a car too?" How EX-TRAVAGANT! They are perfectly happy for a bicycle as they use them as we do our cars. Go absolutely everywhere on them. All over Germany. And they waste absolutely not one bite of food ever! It makes me feel terribly bad thinks its just horrible. Since we Americans are supposed to try and get an example for them, I have really been trying to be more saving and have succeeded in doing so usually. They never have any garbage food. It can make you feel pretty silly to be the only one in the building that does. So silly in fact that you make yourself cut down on it. I know that sounds funny at home. But its just

another luxury I suppose you would call it, that we don't think a second time about it. But one they've never had and just flat don't understand times before they waste absolutely nothing. All the family drinks coffee, including all the kids, for breakfast and eat bread. That's all the German breakfast consists of. Well not one drop of coffee is poured out. Should there be some left in the cup, it is saved until next time. Same way with everything. I know that sounds funny at home. And when they smoke a cigarette you can believe me there will be nothing left but ASHES when they get through with it. There is no cigarette butt left. They smoke them right down until they burn their fingers and as I said there just isn't a cigarette butt left. Just ashes. They might smoke on one cigarette several times. A lot of them do. Will

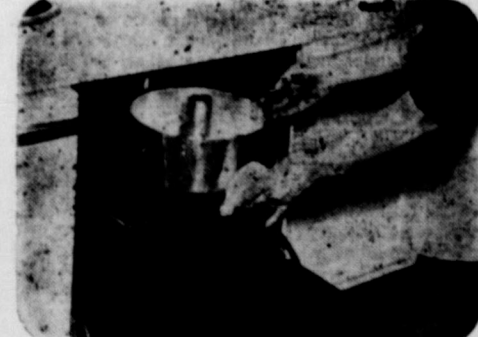

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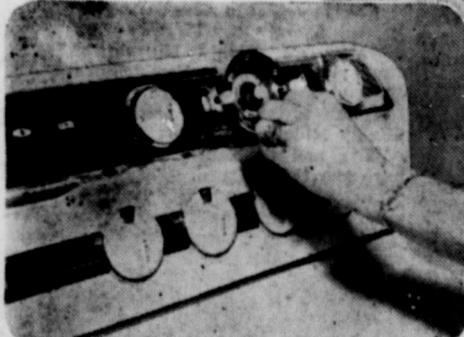

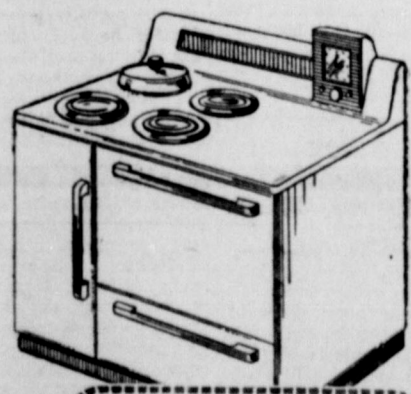

And on they have special CHEAP rates for army personnel, so really makes traveling over cheap. There are 2 or 3 army camps in Heidelberg. They are run like the government but the army people and can be used only for them. It's just a way of government to help out the people by paying them to run the hotels and by leasing them, it helps Germans in the long run, and it's nice for us too.



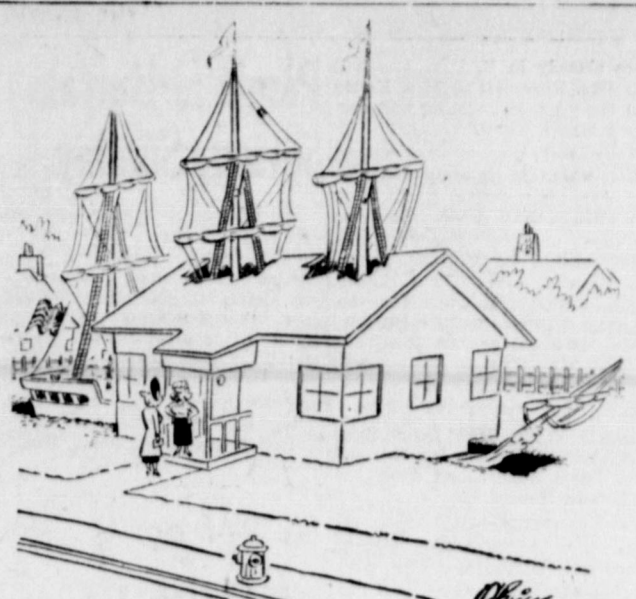

ven to the grocery store that's what they bring their groceries home in. They don't buy many things like that at once but go often. They would never think of buying so many groceries as we do at home all at once. And they go every day for milk and use these bags, altho most of them use tin. They look about like a half gallon thermos bottle except they are tin and have handles. Very few have bottles and they only buy enough milk for that one particular time of day. --because there is no refrigerator you remember! Sometimes I see them go in and buy just a cup full or a glass full. There is a small milk and butter store across the street from us so I sit by the window and watch them a lot. That is all they sell in there -- milk and butter. The milkman delivers to the store early every morning. Then the people go buy a little at a time. It comes in these big milk cans to the store. Don't know why they don't bottle it up. You have to carry your own container over there to get the milk in.

There are lots of dogs over here. I don't see where they can keep them since you have to live so crowded up. The dog never gets to roam outside on the streets by himself. You never see a stray one like that. Most of them are on leashes and they are all smart. As for obeying their masters, they really hop when the Germans talk to them so they even understand that language and I don't. They take them with them everywhere they go. If they go over here to buy milk their dog goes too and right in the store with them or on the streetcar too. I've seen several on the streetcar and they behave pretty nicely to. There are lots of these Dachshund, you know that dog that is so long and short.

There are lots of bicycles and some with little motors on them to make them go. You see lots of old men and women riding a bicycle and the kids too.

The kids over here play out on the sidewalks mostly as no one knows what it is to have yards. They roller skate a lot and the boys shoot marbles a lot. I've seen some thing on the sidewalks a

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for the German road signs -- have road signs just as we have to learn to read them what each one means just as we learn at home. I learned once but have just about forgotten them. Kenneth has learned and has his drivers license here. They give you a test on German road signs and differences about their speed limit. There is no driving test since already have our drivers license in the states, just a written test. You can really learn what is in their language is when live right with it every day -- in and day out as we do. Not I mean we can speak it but

I don't have much trouble any more understanding what they mean.

It is raining some this morning and looks all gray and cloudy outside right now, but the sun will probably be back out in 5 or 10 minutes. That's the way it does.

We went down town Saturday evening again with another couple. We walked so much I haven't gotten over it yet. I know I haven't walked this much in all my life as I have waded since I have been here. Everything you do and everywhere you go you have to walk since we don't have a car. My shoes are beginning to tell it even! I've been kidding Ken about it.

There's a street down town on the main street that's called Hauptstrasse. (Cap you pronounce that?) Everyone always talks about it -- and the Bahnhof, too. The Bahnhof is the area downtown around the train depot. Bahn in German so I've been told means "go" and hof means "steel". So there you have a train depot in German. And strasse is street to us. Anyway we went in the clock shop down there on the Hauptstrasse, and did they have some beauties. I am afraid we couldn't send one home without it getting broken.

The clothes here are kinda pretty. There is a slight difference in the way they are made but

they are kinda cute. They have some very nice looking things, I see lots of sweaters especially that I like very much and all this woolen material is beautiful. They believe in displaying all their material. I suppose they sell more material than ready made things. Right below us here where we live they have some very gorgeous woolen materials and they make you a suit either for men or women. They are pretty I wish we could both get a suit like that some time while we are over here. It's all handmade and fitted to you. I haven't seen to many shoes here. I really care for here. They have lots of them and most of them are very thick soles on them. They last longer that way. That's why the Germans wear them. Practically every man carries a brief case here and every woman carries these huge leather bags like are so popular at home now except they are even bigger over here. They are always leather and most of them have zippers on them. When they go shopping e-

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Let Us Reason Together

"WHAT SHALL BE THE END OF THEM WHO OBEY NOT THE GOSPEL . . . ?" 1 Peter 4:17.

The word "end" as used in this passage means destiny. The answer to the question is quite plain in this Scripture: "In flaming fire taking vengeance on them that know not God and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ; who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord and from the glory of His power." 2 Thess. 1:8-9. Thus obedience of the Gospel is essential unto Salvation. Sometimes we hear men say, "there is nothing man is to do." However the above Bible statement teaches otherwise.

1. Obey Gospel. The gospel of Christ is composed of (a). facts: 2 Cor. 15:1-4. (b). Promises: 1 John 5:11; Acts 2:38. (c). Commands: Acts 2:38-42. In these passages we hear the people on the day of Pentecost ask, "what must we do?" Peter, preaching the gospel, said, "Repent ye and be baptized everyone of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins . . ." Repentance and baptism was included in the gospel, commands of the gospel. In Acts 8th chapter we read of Phillip "preaching Jesus" to the eunuch, after which immediately the eunuch asked, "See, here is water, what doth hinder me to be baptized?" Acts 8:36. Phillip asked him if he believed in Jesus and the eunuch answered, "I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." Verse 37. Thereupon Phillip baptized him. After his baptism the eunuch went on his way rejoicing. What was included in the preaching OF JESUS which Phillip did? Believing, confessing, and baptism. Which one of these commands in the above two examples of conversion would YOU leave out as being unnecessary for salvation? As being part of the gospel we must obey? Believe? Repentance? Baptism? Be careful, for remember the question **WHAT SHALL BE THE END OF THEM WHO OBEY NOT THE GOSPEL? ? ?**

Drouth Causes Cut In West Texas Cattle

A 50 percent reduction in live-stock numbers has been noted in the Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos areas of Texas since drouth began in 1943. Many ranchmen who prior to 1950 did little supplemental feeding were averaging \$25 annually for feed expenditures for each animal until the end of 1953.

These findings have brown out of a study by two agricultural economists at Texas A. and M. College on the economic effects of drouth on the resources of West Texas ranches. Most of the 162 ranch operations studied by C. A. Bonnen and J. M. Ward were within 100 miles of San Angelo, the area hardest hit by the drouth. At San Angelo, a 60-inch rainfall deficiency accumulated in the 11-year period, 1943 - 53.

Grass clipping studies at the Sonora Ranch Experiment Station yielded only 20 pounds an acre of air-dry forage in 1951 and none in '52 and '53.

Between 1950 and 1953 the economists found a 37.5 percent decline in net worth among one group of ranches. At the end of this period, short-term debts of the same ranches amounted to 103 percent of the value of their livestock numbers 20 percent, cash 50 percent, and total assets were down 20 percent, while liabilities including a 10 percent rise in land mortgages, were up 38 percent and life insurance, 42 percent.

Another group of 92 ranches which received special livestock loans from the Farmers Home Administration owed in short-term debts 206 percent of the value of their livestock. This group represented the more extreme financial conditions among ranchmen.

Sharp changes in prices of livestock during the period complicated by the drouth problems for both ranchmen and credit agencies. Bonnen and Ward reported. As prices rose, ranchmen were reluctant to reduce stocking rates probably speculating on a break in the drouth. This led to heavy use of high-priced feed in expectation of continued high prices, and expanded borrowing when the expected prices did not come about.

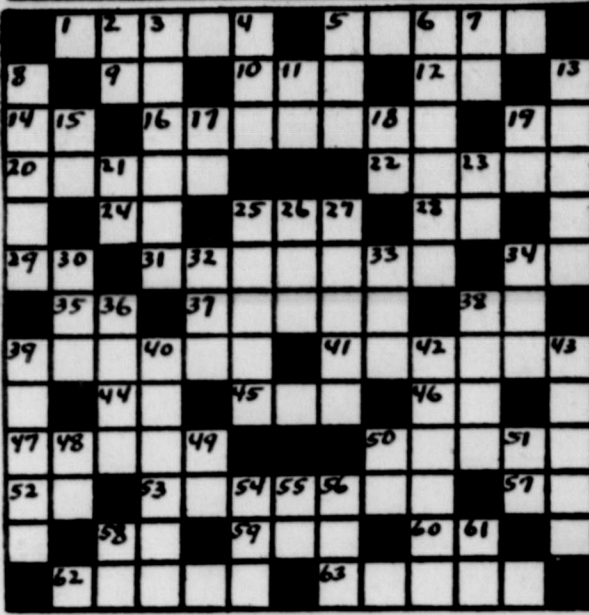

EDITORIAL — Farmers Prepare To Plant Cotton Over —

Earth, Springlake and the surrounding area received a blow Sunday night, when the elements turned loose dropping hailstones ranging as large as two inches in diameter to smaller sizes and falling thick. Leaving a strip of at least 15 miles in length and ranging from 3 to 5 miles in width, where the crops were completely wiped out. In fact the weatherman reported Sunday nights damage to be the largest ever covered by hail in this vicinity.

Farmers Monday were in town comparing damage, and trying to decide just what best to do with their land. Most farmers have made their decisions in favor of replanting cotton, while others are planting maize. Each farmer realizing of course it is very late to try to grow a cotton crop and get it harvested before the frosts come. But they feel there is a risk involved in any crop planted now and are ready to try again on cotton.

"Babe" Didrikson Autobiography Being Published

Mildred (Babe) Didrikson Zaharias, the Texas girl who became the world's greatest woman athlete, made it clear today that she is not claiming the all-around athletic ability which some people have credited to her.

In the current (June 25) issue of The Saturday Evening Post, she says that touch tag is as close as she actually came to playing football, although it's been printed hundreds of times that it was one of her sports, along with some other things she never did, like boxing and wrestling.

The Babe tells about it in part one of her autobiography, "This Life I've Led," in which she indicates that the football legend might have been the outgrowth of a contrived movie short where she romped through the Southern Methodist team, with players diving at her and missing tackles.

When it came to boxing, she explains, the lone time she had the gloves on was to pose for a publicity picture with Bill Stribling. "And," she adds, "my husband, George, did all the wrestling in the family."
Mrs. Zaharias reports on making a point of meeting Babe Ruth, the original Babe, adding that the last time she saw him was at Coral Gables, Florida, in 1948, when they played in a charity golf exhibition.
"It was a cancer benefit," she recalls, "and here he was going to die of cancer, and I was due to come down with it myself, although neither of us knew that at the time."

ITS THE LAW in TEXAS . . .

A properly drawn will can be the means of short-cutting many legal formalities and save a great deal of time in distributing the estate of a decedent among his rightful heirs. It may also serve to save many dollars in legal fees and court costs.

As an example, whenever a person dies without a will and it is necessary for the probate court to appoint an administrator of his estate, the person so appointed is required to post a bond. This bond is for the purpose of insuring the faithful performance of his duties. When signed by individuals, the amount thereof must be double the estimated value of the property of the estate plus a reasonable amount to cover prospective rents and other income from real estate involved.

When issued by a bonding company, the estimated value of the personal property need not be doubled. The administrator's bond must be kept in force until the estate is finally closed and he is discharged from his obligation by the court.

The same rule applies to an executor under a will, unless the testator has specified that no bond shall be required. This provision may be inserted or left out of the will at the option of the maker. Needless to say, there are situations in which the bond serves a real purpose. But when not needed, the statutory requirements may prove a distinct annoyance to the executor and a burden upon the estate in the form of annual premium payments.

Another example: A court appointed administrator may not sell any property of an estate without an order of the court authorizing him to do so. He must make application to the court for approval of each sale. The court must be advised of and apply to the making of mineral leases and other transactions.
