Cotton Harvest in Full Swing; 26,236 Bales Ginned To Date

Although cotton was generally early in the Springlake and Earth areas, intermittent rains slowed the harvest. However percentage to date is much higher than at this same date last year.

The season's total for this area, now stands at 26,236 bales, this compared to 7762 bales last year at this time. Farmers have estimated 80 percent of this year's crop has already been harvested.

The bales ginned in Lamb County has now passed the 100,000 mark.

The Agriculture Department in Washington forecast Texas cotton production this season at 4,250,000 bales. Such a figure is well above the 3,632,000 bales ginned last year in the state.

This crop was grown under rigid government marketing quotas and soil bank land retirement program designed to help prevent over-production.

The remainder of this year's crop will be gathered with mechanical pickers. Local gins are ginning 24 hours a day.

S. H. Chaney Slowly Improving At Lubbock Hospital

S. H. Chaney is slowly improving at Saint Mary's Hospital in Lubbock.

Chaney is suffering from a crushed right leg, in a tractor accident at his farm two weeks ago. Due to badly shattered bones, Chaney did not undergo surgery as previously reported. His right arm will be re-set this week.

Blood transfusions are being administered daily.

Blood donors are needed to replace blood at the Blood Bank in Lubbock.

Bids will be accepted by uniform companies until December 1. Pat McCord gave a report on the uniform fund raising campaign to begin soon.

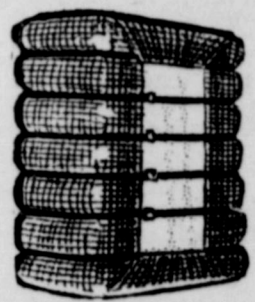
Approximately 25 members attended the meeting.

Local Resident Faces Federal Charge on Narcotics Possession



Charges are pending for Jimmy DeLuna for the possession of narcotics, after being arrested by Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. Saturday night in Earth.

Deputy Smith said, "DeLuna was arrested after a search was made on him, finding a tobacco can of marijuana in his possession."

DeLuna was placed in the county jail at Littlefield, where charges are pending before Federal Court action.

Two other Latin-Americans were arrested along with DeLuna for drunkenness, by Deputy V. L. Smith, Sr. of Olton and Deputy V. L. Smith, Jr. of Earth and tried in the Justice of Peace Court, fined, and released.

Other reports from Deputy Smith was an auto theft and traffic violation, by Harry South, who gave his address as Ohio and no named town.

South was being chased out of Muleshoe toward Earth on Highway 70 for DWI and exceeding the speed limit, by Sheriff Dee Clements of Bailey County.

Clements car was badly damaged as South stopped his car immediately in front of Clements car as both pulled off on the shoulder of the road. South did not completely stop and regained speed. Clements car became hot from the search. Deputy Smith was called to make an arrest. He located South at Kimbell Gin where he made attempts to steal two different cars of employees at Kimbell Gin Co. Smith was notified by Bill Corzine of South's whereabouts.

South was returned to Bailey County jail where he was charged with auto theft and traffic violation.

Smith also reported a wreck two blocks north of the caution light in Springlake Sunday night. No one was injured in the accident. Two Latin-Americans driving a 1946 Chevrolet and a 1953 Mercury collided as one car attempted to pass the other as it was being pushed by another car. Smith said "the Texas Highway Patrol completed the investigation and names of the drivers were not known." Both cars were badly damaged. The Chevrolet being completely demolished.

Let Us Reason Together

By W. E. IRVINE

"What shall be the end of them who obey not the Gospel?" . . . I Peter 4:17.

The word "end" as used in this passage means destiny. The answer to the question is quite plain in this Scripture: "In flaming fire taking vengeance on them that know not God and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ; who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord and from the glory of His Power." (II Thes. 1:8, 9) Thus, obedience of the Gospel is essential unto salvation. Sometimes we hear men say, "there is nothing man is to do." However, the above Bible statement teaches otherwise.

What does it mean to "obey the gospel?" The gospel of Christ is composed of facts (II Cor. 15:1, 4), promises (I John 5:11), and commands (Acts 2:35 - 38). In Acts 2:35 - 38 we hear the people on the day of Pentecost ask, "What must we do?" Peter, preaching the gospel, said, "Repent ye and be baptized, everyone of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins . . ." (Acts 2:37, 38). Repentance and baptism was included in the Gospel, commands of the gospel. In Acts 8th chapter we read of Phillip, "preaching Jesus" to the Eunuch, after which immediately the Eunuch asked, "See, here is water, what doth hinder me to be baptized?" (Acts 8:36). Phillip asked him if he believed in Jesus Christ is the Son of God, (verse 37). Thereupon, Phillip baptized him. After his baptism the Eunuch went on his way rejoicing. What was included in the preaching OF JESUS? Believing, confessing and baptism. Which one of these commands in the above two examples of conversation would YOU leave out as being unnecessary for salvation? As being part of the gospel we must obey? Belief? Repentance? Baptism? 1958 Christmas Expected To Set Mailing Record

Postmaster M. E. Kelley said today, "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early For Christmas' campaign immediately because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all time mailing record."

The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully - make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes FULL NAME, STREET and NUMBER, CITY, ZONE and STATE.

He went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated carton, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas cards. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up - to - to - date.

Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Kelley reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails through on time. He is making many advance preparations to handle the 1958 Christmas mail rush, with extra mail clerks, carriers, and expanded facilities all around. Speaking further about his plans, the Postmaster said, "With over 170,000,000 people in the United States today, that means more Christmas mail than ever before, and that's why the Post Office needs your help in planning your Christmas mailings well in advance."

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferably well before December 10th, and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15th, or at least a week before Christmas.
