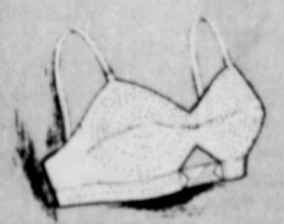

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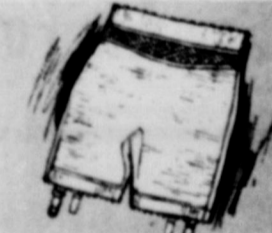

Law Changes Just In The Nick of Time

This event came about as a result of the illness of the groom's mother Mrs. G. C. Wondering how to solve the serious problem the couple turned to Lamb County Clerk, Mary Beth Willey for the answer. The couple decided to follow this advice they waited until January 1 and were at the courthouse at 8:30 a.m. Thursday waiting to get their license. Texas Banking Department To Include Customers Verification Of Deposits- Loans

Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner has announced that the Texas Banking Department is expanding its normal routine examination procedures to include a program of direct verification of customer's deposit and loan balances in State-chartered banks in Texas. He said that during future examinations Examiner personnel will mail verification forms to bank customers whose accounts are selected on a random sampling basis. The forms will request the customer to verify the deposit or loan balance indicated to indicate any discrepancies which might be noted, and to return the form to the Banking Department. In the event of differences or discrepancies, further contact with the customer will be made by Banking Department personnel.

Commissioner Falkner explained that similar verification programs are already in limited use

by various bank supervision agencies of the Federal Government.

These practices have also been used for several years in bank auditing by professional audit firms," he said. "As well as being a means of discovery of bank employee error or misappropriation, verification programs provide a psychological deterrent against defalcations."

The Commissioner stated that the development of a system for verification of accounts will

necessarily be gradual and will be based on experience accumulated by the Banking Department and by the various Federal agencies which are cooperating in the program. Certain banks which have already established audit procedures satisfactory to the Banking Department will be exempt from this phase of examination, in order to prevent duplication of effort. The pilot project calls for only a few Examiner personnel to be specifically assigned to perform these duties, with the rate of expansion of the program to be determined by the problems encountered.

It is hoped that the banking public will not be unduly concerned upon the receipt of these requests for verification of its banking activities, and bankers are being asked to publicize the project in their locales," Commissioner Falkner said.
