School Board Disciplinary Action of Administration

A called school board meeting officially opened Monday night at approximately 9:40 p.m. and continued until 3:15 a.m. according to the Lamb County Court Reporter who was present to record testimony of those called to testify by Attorney Mickey Ratliff, Littlefield. Ratliff represented Mr. and Mrs. Claude Holder and son, Guy Lynn Davis and Mr. and Mrs. J.B. Thomas and son, Larry Thomas. Although the meeting was scheduled to begin at 8 p.m., Ratliff was reported not willing to proceed until board member, P.A. Washington,

who was cutting grain near Dimmitt arrived for the meeting.

Ratliff then, declared the meeting opened for the hearing which continued until 12:45 a.m. when the Board excused the court and deliberated until 3:15 a.m. when those who had remained were called back into the meeting to be given the board's decision.

The meeting had been called for the purpose of settling a contested decision, handed down by the school administration regarding three senior band students who failed to attend a night band practice called by band director, Tom SoRelle. SoRelle had called the practice session in order to prepare the Wolverine Band for participation in the Marching Contest slated in Lubbock in the near future, feeling they needed additional practice periods before the event.

Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Cleavinger and son, Bob, were present as their son was one of the three students who had received the disciplinary action. They, however, were unrepresented by an attorney.

The parents had become dissatisfied when their sons were given a grade point of 50 and 9 weeks expulsion from band. The parents had asked the administration to go by the school handbook made up by the school administration, which according to their belief should have taken off 3 points per day from their grade and no longer than three days expulsion from band, when the students were absent without excused absence.

However, (unofficially) as your reporter was not present, the report is Mrs. Holder had given her son permission to go to Lubbock to see the Picadors play. I am unsure about the other two.

The court reporter estimated at one time 100 people present, others in the community cut the number down approximately 75, some saying 89, some 60, and so on.

Jerry Kelley, president of the school board said the hearing was open and school principal Ward Cooksey, band director, Tom SoRelle, Mrs. Pat Holder, Guy Lynn Davis, Mrs. J.B. Thomas and Larry Thomas testified.

After the hearing Mr. Ratliff was dismissed in order for the board to go into executive meeting and following much consideration and deliberation, it was the majority of the board's decision to uphold the disciplinary action of the administration. The vote was 5 to 2.

GOVERNOR UNDECIDED— Nixon, Tower Take Easy Win

President Richard M. Nixon won the greatest landslide victory a Republican ever scored in the South and captured McGovern's home state of South Dakota and was leading in New York City early Wednesday morning, where a Republican presidential nominee has not won since the election of Calvin Coolidge in 1924.

President Nixon, as early as 8:25 p.m. CST Tuesday, had surpassed the required 270 electoral votes. Less than two hours later, he had captured 35 states with 387 electoral votes.

Nixon piled up more than 65% of the vote in the first returns, and remained above that level as vote totals poured in from across the states in the heaviest turnout in history.

McGovern President Nixon on a telegram promising full backing of his efforts to bring peace abroad and justice at home.

Republican John C. Tower won over Barefoot Sanders with 719,048 votes to 589,263 for Sanders (unofficial).

The Governor's race was still undecided early Wednesday morning, Dolph Briscoe had a slight edge over Republican Henry C. Grover, 891,000 to 868,000.

Grover's strong showing came as one of the biggest surprises of the campaign.

Democratic incumbent Jesse James moved to a 20,000 vote lead Tuesday night over Maurice Angly for State Treasurer.

The latest unofficial tabulations on the constitutional amendments were:

Amendments 1, 9, and 11 were defeated while amendments 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 12, 13, and 14 carried.

There was a total of 4,651 votes cast in Lamb County. Earth cast 473 votes, Springlake Precinct 15 cast 101, Springlake Precinct 13 cast 99, Pleasant Valley cast 66 votes, and Littlefield cast 2,423.

763 votes were cast in Olton, 389 in Sudan, and Amherst had 337 votes cast.

How Lamb County voted will be found elsewhere in paper.

In the liquor election in Littlefield, a total of 2,235 votes were cast. The liquor bill was defeated by the narrow margin of 33 votes. There were 1134 cast against, compared to 1101 for the sale of liquor.

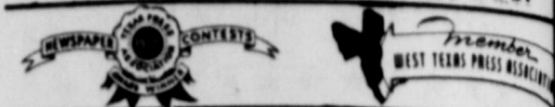

Dear Polly,

In regard to the called school board meeting, Monday night, November 6, 1972, at 8 p.m. of which we were in attendance, we feel there was a violation of the law, in that, the school superintendent, Mr. William L. Mann, advised various people that the meeting would be closed to the public and also to the press. Our law prohibits closing a meeting except for very limited purposes, none of which pertained to this particular issue. No school official can legally call a closed meeting. Only the school board can make this decision by a majority vote.

In an attempt to close the meeting, the High School Principal, Ward Cooksey and Band Director, Tom Scellette, claimed that the called meeting was to air a complaint against them. The parents of the students involved specifically stated in their written request to Mr. Jerry Kelley, that they were asking for the Board of Trustees to review the punishment given for an unexcused absence.

The type of punishment exerted in their situation far exceeded the punishment set forth in the Student Handbook. The parents of the students involved made the statement that they never intended anyone's reputation or character to be involved in this issue.

From all indication, the School Board has allowed the Administration to make policy on a day to day basis, which is against the existing written policy of the school. Apparently there is no consistency in the way our students are punished. The punishment is apparently decided after a rule has been violated, at the discretion of the Administration. The Student Handbook is to inform the students and parents regarding current rules, regulations and punishment. Yet, our current Handbook is very inadequate as far as what type of disciplinary action can be taken against them or what extent the punishment will be when they violate a rule or regulation even though they do have their Student Handbook in their possession.

Cotton Harvest Off to Slow Start

The first cotton sample of the 1972-73 season was classed September 14, 1972, by the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. W. K. Palmer, Officer-in-Charge, reported, that only 1,191 cotton samples from the current crop had been received through Friday, November 3rd.

This compares to a total of 1,757 samples at this time last year.

Most of this early cotton has been harvested in Dawson, Lynn and Gaines counties but first bales have been harvested over the entire area.

Palmer stated that the seasonal classing offices at Brownfield and Levelland are expected to begin receiving samples

for classification on Monday, November 13th. Most of the early harvested cotton has been long staple cotton which was machine picked and hail damaged and chemically defoliated cotton which was stripped.

Quality of this early cotton varied widely depending on the condition of the fields at the time of harvest.

Grades of these first bales have been predominantly Middling and Strict Low Middling. Staple length has averaged approximately 1 1/4 inch and micronaire of most cotton has been in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Price quotations on the Lubbock market for cotton in the premium micronaire range of 3.5 to 4.9 ranged from the

loan for low grade, short staple cotton to \$27.50 per bale over the loan for high grade, long staple cotton. Prices quoted by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange for the most predominant quantities were: Middling 31/32 - 23.05, Middling 1-inch - 24.25, Middling 1-1/16 - 27.50, Strict Low Middling 31/32 - 22.30, Strict Low Middling 1-inch - 23.50, and Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 - 25.00.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$42 to \$50 per ton and averaged \$46 per ton.

VA Reminds Veterans to Have Errors in Record Corrected

The Veterans Administration today reminded veterans who find errors in their military records of their right to have them corrected.

Jack Coker, Director, Veterans Administration Regional Office, Waco, pointed out that while some errors may seem trivial, correction of others could prove important, resulting in eligibility for VA and other benefits.

Generally, a veteran is expected to file a request for correction within three years. However, it was noted that this deadline may be waived in the interest of justice.

Officials explained that a

veteran, his survivors, or legal representative can file written applications for correction of records with the branch of service in which the veteran served.

Department of Defense form "Application for Correction of Military or Naval Record," is available at VA offices, the agency said.

The committee is comprised of the above elected officials, plus Curtis Wilkinson, County attorney; Mary Beth Willey, county clerk; E. D. McNeese, sheriff; County Judge G. T. Sides who acts as chairman of the committee, and three persons whose names were drawn from the last list of grand jurors, James "Sandy" Sanderson, Winston Cummings and Quentin Hodge.

At the meeting of the Grievance Committee this month, the members voted 7-2 for a recommendation to give the officials at \$1,200 annual raise each with two of the three grand jury members voting against the raises.

The committee was unanimous in granting the request

from Herbert Dunn for an increase in traveling expenses from \$996.96 to \$1,500 annually. Because the vote was unanimous, this went into effect immediately without the consent of the commissioners' court.
