1964 Building Permits Below Last Year

Earth's building permits were at a stand-still in November, but for the first six months, through May 1964, a total of \$248,885 was given by the City Secretary, Mrs. Rubye Anderson.

June was a record month, with \$48,000. From June 1 to December 1 the total was \$68,425, giving a total so far this year of \$317,310, as compared to that of the same time last year, \$398,075, with \$80,756 below last year's figure.

City Passes Ordinance To Punish Disturbers

The City Council of Earth adopted Ordinance No. 56 on December 7, 1964. All members were present for the adoption of said ordinance.

The ordinance contains the fact that citizens need to be aware of what constitutes disturbing the peace, and the penalties thereafter:

"It is unlawful for any person to go into or near any public place or private house, and use loud or obscene language or swearing; by mechanical means, or by operating automobiles without mufflers; to expose his or her person to another person 16 years or over; to display any weapon in a manner to disturb the person or persons at such place or home. Violation of the above mentioned disturbances will be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00."

This ordinance is now in effect from and after the date of its passage, and publication as required by law.

Lamb County Bale Count Up 46,913 In A Week

Favorable conditions prevailed and Lamb County gins weighed and ginned 46,913 bales, to push this year's total to 84,494 bales. Last week the gins turned out 14,740 to mark the start of the rush season.

The 84,494 total is roughly 1,400 bales ahead of last year's total for the same period, when gins had turned out 83,118 bales by December 4.

The Littlefield office of the Texas Employment Commission reports that all 40 of the area gins have gone on a 24 hour schedule to keep up with the rush, but in spite of the increased hours, a check Saturday morning showed a number of trailers still on the yard. Area ginners received a chance to cut into the back log of work late in the week, as a cold, damp spell moved into the county to slow down the harvest tempo, and prevent the hauling of additional trailers.

The TEC and County ginners are staying with their estimates that the harvest will be complete by Christmas, providing the weather stays favorable for picking and pulling operations.

Based on the estimates of the ASC office and other agricultural agencies, the harvest is only starting, as the total county figure remains 198,000 bales for 1964.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Earth, Lamb County, Texas:

SECTION 1

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go into or near any public place or into or near any private house and use loud and vociferous or obscene language or swear or curse or yell or shriek or make similar loud noises by mechanical means or by sounding automobile horns or by operating automobile horns without mufflers, or expose his or her person to another person of the age of 16 years or over, or rudely display any pistol or deadly weapon in a manner calculated to disturb the person or persons present at such place or house.

SECTION 2

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00.

SECTION 3

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 4

This ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and publication as required by law.

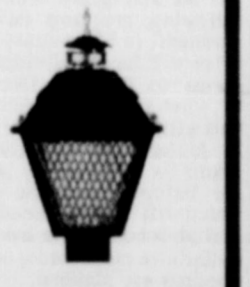

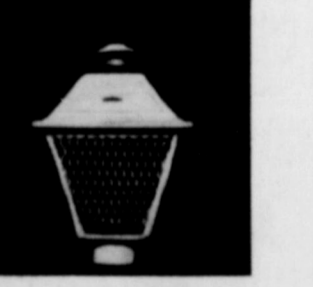

Many Eye Injuries Caused By Christmas Tree Decorations

A Christmas memo to Texas parents on trees and toys: Don't let a needless eye accident wreck your family's holiday happiness.

The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness cautioned here today that accidents around the Christmas tree and from unsafe children's toys will be the principal causes of eye injuries during the Yule season. The Society's warning came as part of its annual "Safe Gifts From Santa" campaign.

The traditional family Christmas tree with its fragile decorations has damaged many eyes in recent years, reported Senator Criss Cole, State Chairman of the Texas Society. A sharp pine needle punctured the eye of a West Coast woman as she bent over to unplug the tree lights. A two-year-old was hospitalized after broken ornament fragments got into her left eye. An exploding Christmas tree light bulb cut the eye of a young Western boy.

"Throughout the holidays, remind all the family members, young and old alike, about the hazards of shattered ornaments and lights, the pointed needles and wreaths and trees, the keen edges of wrapping materials, and the threat of fire," Senator Criss Cole said. "A good measure of common sense will keep the holidays happy."

The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness estimates that eye accidents will strike nearly 12,800 American youngsters during the Christmas period. Wise toy purchases would do much to reduce this total.

"Youngsters often ask for Christmas toys that are too advanced for them" said Senator Criss Cole. "A normally safe toy such as a chemistry set or tool kit can cost an eye if mishandled in small or inexperienced hands. Make sure your child is capable of handling safely every thing he gets from Santa. Missile-type toys like darts and archery sets are particularly dangerous to eyesight. Above all, if any of these gifts are on your Christmas list, make sure that the child is well grounded in the rules of safety before he uses them. Later may be too late."

Other toy-buying hints from the Texas Society: Look for sturdy construction with shatter-resistant and non-flammable materials. Toys should have no detachable parts, springs or gears that can fly into the eyes. Edges should be smooth, corners rounded and mechanisms enclosed.

Cotton Harvest Interrupted By Adverse Weather

Cotton sample receipts increased sharply at the three South Plains USDA Classing Offices during the past week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Office. Ideal harvesting conditions until Thursday enabled farmers to get into fields and begin stripping their cotton. The three USDA Classing Offices received about 50,000 samples daily during the past week.

During the week ending Wednesday, December 2, the Lubbock, Brownfield, and Lamesa Offices classed 193,300 samples. The Lubbock Office classed 151,100, the Brownfield Office 26,400 and the Lamesa Office 15,800.

Total samples classed at the three offices this season was 544,100 compared with 624,800 by the same date last year. Trading in new crop cotton in the Lubbock market was steady during the past week, but prices paid farmers declined. Agricultural Marketing Service reports indicate prices paid for

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Winterizing Home Increases Comfort, Economy

With cooler weather already here and more just around the corner, many homeowners are making plans to winterize their homes for increased winter comfort and economy.

A good place to start this job is with the doors and windows, advises W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M University. Many windows and doors fit loosely but can be tightened easily with weather stripping.

Storm sashes can be helpful in reducing heat loss from the house. In northern areas, addition of storm windows, doors, and weather stripping can reduce the fuel bill considerably.

Proper insulation in the unheated attic will also cut fuel bills,

says Allen. Place the insulation between the attic floor joists to help reduce heat loss from the rooms below. With this insulation, however, there should be ventilation in the attic. Vents placed in the gable ends of the house, under the eaves or installed in the roof will be adequate. The engineer suggests about four square feet of clear openings for each 1,000 square feet of attic floor.

Storm doors, storm windows, and attic insulation not only cut heat loss and save fuel but also reduce drafts. This means a more uniform heating system throughout the house, points out Allen. Next summer the insulation in the attic will help keep the house cooler, too.
