

Area Rain Gauges Vary

The weather Saturday morning was a re-play of the action over the previous several days with overcast skies and rain. The sun came through the clouds about noon Saturday lighting landscapes for the first time in many areas since the Tuesday before.

Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, the weather remained nice and clear much to the joy of farmers, field crews and other local residents.

Most rural people offering weather information early this week were of the opinion that immediate damage to crops might not be heavy, but were very quick to add that without more warm, dry weather damage could be considerable.

Measurements of indicated rainfall from Wednesday night up until precipitation ended late Friday morning amounted generally above two inches.

A rain gauge at the E. C. Hudson residence recorded 3 inches, but Hudson feels he could have received more rain than that because his gauge is partially covered by trees.

On the Jimmy Nix farm north

of Earth, 3 1/4 inches were recorded.

The Sunnyside Community reportedly received 3.65 inches to make a total of 16 1/2 inches this year with 11 1/2 inches being recorded since July.

Approximately five inches of rain fell in the Bula vicinity.

One rain gauge in Muleshoe recorded 1.75 inches at 8 a. m. Friday for the previous 24 hours.

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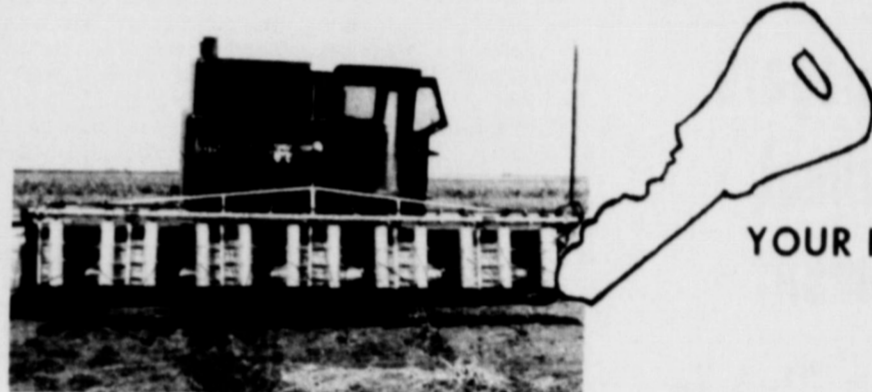
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Pauline Hucks Queen Of The Week

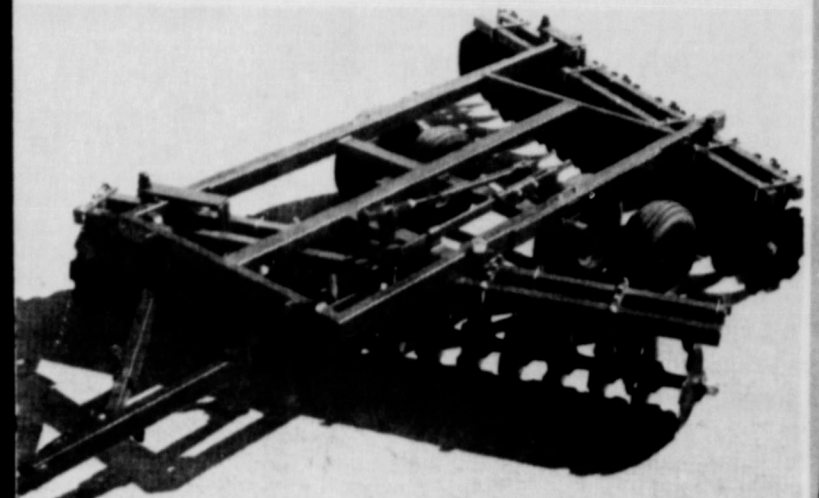

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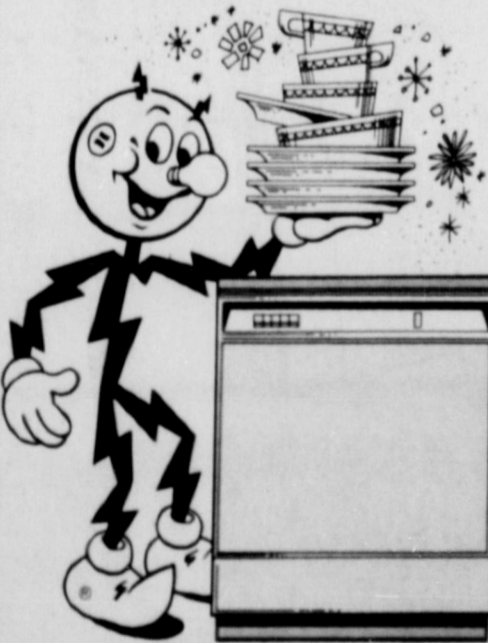

Hoyt Glasscock scored for the Wolverines from 15 yards over the left guard with 1:33 left in the half, then added the extra point.

In the fourth quarter, Daniel Frierson scored for the Bobcats on a pitchout from Jerry Matthews from the 11. Instead of going for 1 point the Bobcats chose to try for 2 with Frierson again carrying the ball over the right side to make the score 8-7.

Cotton Topping May Be Invaluable Cultural Tool

Cotton topping can be an invaluable cultural tool in High Plains farmer's box of practices, especially in this type of year where late summer rains forced cotton plants to put on extra vegetative growth, Jim Valliant, Director of Research, told farmers attending Field Day at the High Plains Research Foundation.

Valliant pointed out that in tests conducted by the Research Foundation topping of cotton over a five year period pro-

duced higher yields and returns with Paymaster 111 and Lockett 2789 than topped cotton.

In the tests the top 12 to 15 inches of the plant was removed by a rotary cutter.

Valliant said a five year average showed topping increased the yield of Paymaster 111 from 628 to 689 pounds of lint per acre and Lockett 4789 from 631 to 640 pounds of lint per acre.

Returns were increased \$6.13

and \$4.83 per acre with the two varieties when the immature cotton in the top portion of the plant was removed, Valliant noted.

Cotton topping allows removal of the vegetative top growth of the cotton plant that furnishes most of the immature cotton and trash that reduces the quality of most High Plains Cotton.

This vegetative growth uses unnecessary amounts of plant moisture and other nutrients

that could be used on cotton produced in the lower part of the plant, Valliant said. "We know that 90 per cent of cotton produced each season comes from bolls set during the first four weeks of blooming," he said. "By removing the top portion of the plant, we are insuring that the cotton set in the lower reaches of the plant has more of a chance to mature," said Valliant.

He noted that removal of the top part of the plant allows more sunlight to reach the lower bolls to raise the temperature and aid in cotton maturity.

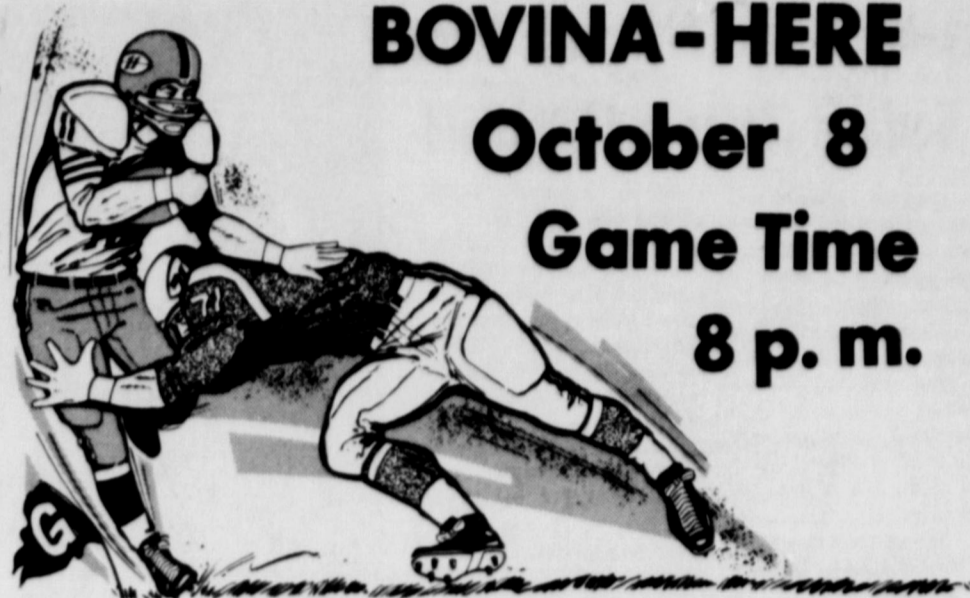

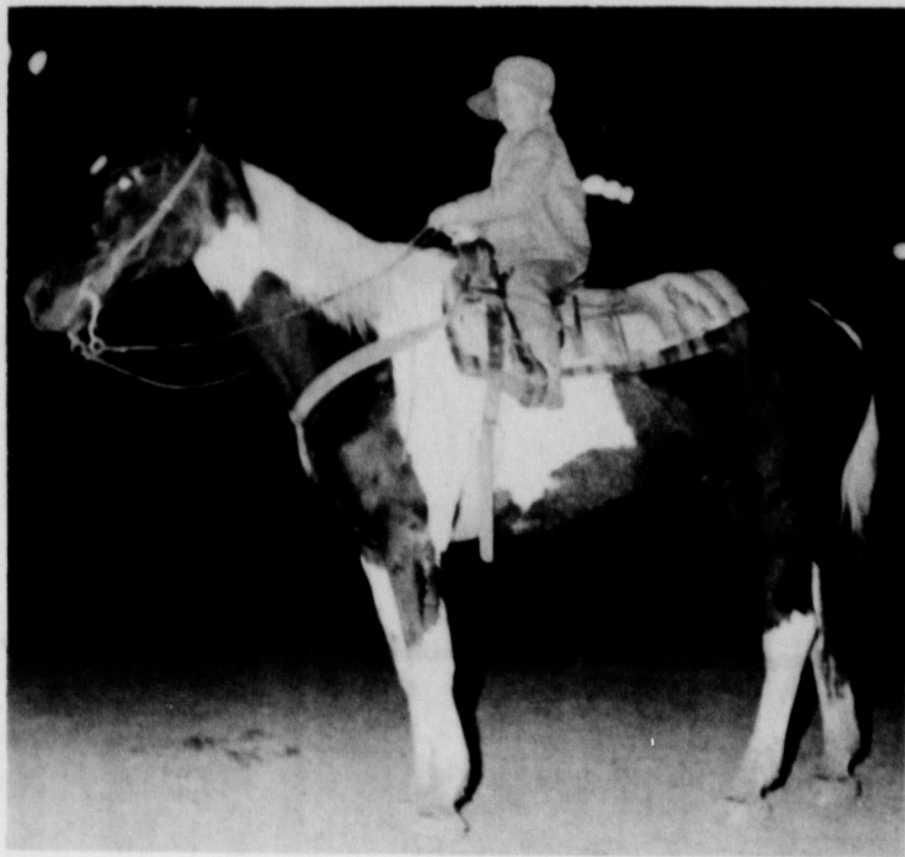

WTSU To Construct New Library, Science Buildings

CANYON -- The West Texas State University Board of Regents moved Saturday toward construction of new library and science buildings at a cost of \$6 million.

At the same time the regents approved a \$32 per semester increase in the building use fee charged students to help pay for the proposed buildings.

The regents also authorized the administration to apply to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare for an interest subsidy grant on a \$5 million loan for the construction.

The hike to \$50 a semester in the building use fee is effective next June 1 and is the first such increase at the university in a number of years. The \$18 a semester that West Texas State has been charging is one of the lowest assessed by a tax-supported four-year institution in Texas.

Under the new building use fee schedule, students carrying nine or more semester hours will pay \$50, those carrying five to eight hours will be charged \$30 and the rate will be \$20 for one to four hours.

The board was requested to designate an architect and authorize the preparation of preliminary plans. Sites for the two buildings have not been selected.

The proposed calls for each building, including equip-

ment, not to exceed \$3 million. Each of the projects would be funded by issuance of \$2.5 million in building use bonds and \$500,000 from constitutional amendment funds on hand.

The present library was built in 1952 and an addition was constructed in 1966 at a cost

of \$245,046.

The Science Building, one of the oldest on campus, was constructed in 1943 at a cost of \$175,000. In 1960 a \$301,029 addition was put up.

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Peanut Field Day Slated

COLLEGE STATION -- The annual Peanut Field Day at the Texas A&M University Plant Disease Research Station at Yoakum will be held on September 30 beginning at 1 p.m.

Tours will be conducted of various field plots and a discussion period will follow at 3 p.m., reports Dr. Arthur L. Harrison, director of research at the station which is located on State Highway 111 two miles east of Yoakum.

discussions will be presented by Texas A&M research and Extension Service personnel.

According to Harrison, some 150 to 200 people are expected to attend the annual event. The station has been in operation at the present site since

1937, and research is now being conducted on a total of 88 acres.

Harrison encourages anyone with an interest in peanut production to make plans to attend the field day.

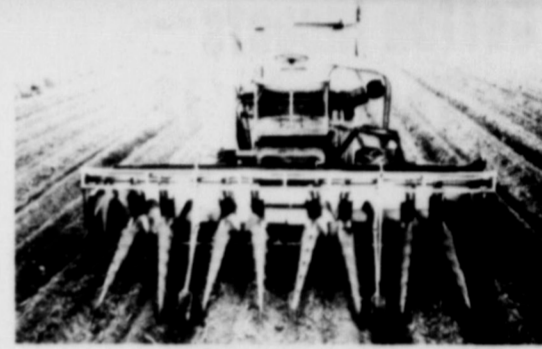
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Census Here About Buying And Improvement Expectations

Questions on consumer buying and home improvement expectations will be asked by a representative of the Bureau of the Census in this area during the first week in October, according to Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Denver.

The survey is made four times yearly as a part of a nationwide effort to guide governmental agencies in developing programs based on consumer spending patterns. A sample of residents in this area will be asked if they expect to buy a house, car, or major household appliances

during the next year and if they have made recent purchases of these items. Homeowners will be asked about home improvements and repairs made during the last three months and any planned for the future.

The July 1971 survey indicated no significant change from earlier plans this year to buy houses, but intentions to buy cars and major household appliances had declined somewhat.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept confidential by law and will be published only in the form of statistical totals.

Cotton Insects --- Big Threat In '72

COLLEGE STATION -- Cotton producers who want to be sure of having plenty of boll weevils, bollworms, budworms and pink bollworms in their crop next season are encouraged to delay harvest, stalk destruction and plowing under of crop residue until after frost.

"One way of assuring the survival of these major cotton pests for the 1972 season is to provide them with plenty of food and protection this fall and winter," says Dr. John G. Thomas, Extension entomologist at Texas A&M University. "However, with the hope that most producers want to avoid this situation, they should consider harvesting as early as possible and shredding stalks and plowing under all cotton debris at least six inches deep."

Extremely high boll weevil populations during August and September have caused extensive losses in many areas of Texas, according to Thomas. In areas where boll weevils have been particularly heavy, growers are encouraged to include an insecticide

with their desiccant or phosphate-type defoliant at the time of harvest. This reduces the number of weevils surviving in the field and later entering diapause or winter hibernation.

The number of pink bollworms observed in cotton fields throughout central and northeast Texas the past few weeks causes real concern for 1972, adds Thomas. "We have seen larger pink bollworm numbers in these fields this year than at any time in the past decade. Unless producers reduce overwintering pink bollworm numbers through early harvest and thorough stalk destruction, 1972 may very well bring back memories of the early and mid-60's."

There is definitely a cause for concern over the present cotton insect situation and what could develop next year. According to the entomologist, producers can play a key role in reducing insect numbers by harvesting early and destroying cotton stalks as soon as possible.

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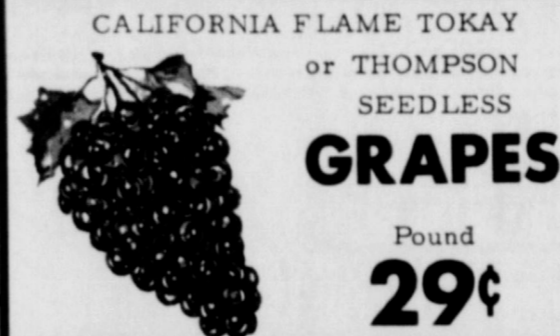
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
