Underneath all this I feel obligated to defend the State of Arkansas. (Though it can't produce potatoes without the aid of our seed and soil). It did produce several fine characters, just for instance, Job Simpson and, (Yep, you guessed it,) your writer also, almost all my relatives are in Arkansas. Might be a few more in that state that is fine besides my relatives, but there can't be many cause my folks populate that state pretty thickly. My Grandfather was Senator in Arkansas for a number of years. He, to me was one of the finest people I ever knew. He held his shoulders high, never dwelled on self pity. Most of all I remember how he spoke for his State of Arkansas. Maybe that's where I learned to speak up for my state. (Even at the risk of being boastful.)

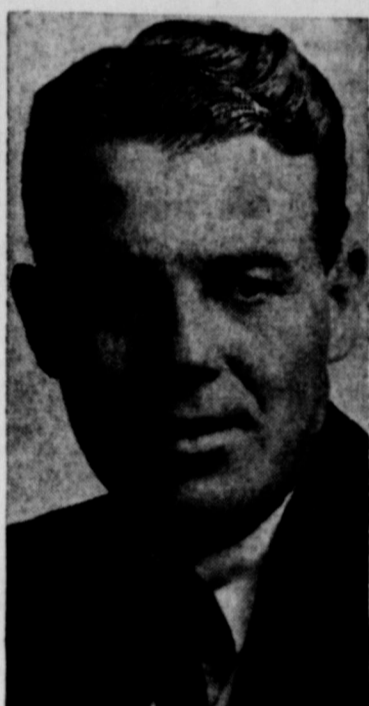

Telephone rates quoted Springlake, for a dial exchange system toll free to Earth to be installed and in operation by the first quarter of 1960 were as follows:

- 1 party business telephone \$10.00
- 2 party business telephone \$8.00
- 1 party residential lines \$5.25
- 2 party residential lines \$4.50
- 4 party residential lines \$4.00

Zone 1-8 party lines \$5.00 (no ready to serve charges)  
Zone 2-8 party lines 9.50 (plus a \$50.00 ready to serve charge which is paid at time of installation)

Kemper failed to bring his map to define the exact boundaries for zones one and two. This he promised to present when he returned, within the next couple of weeks, with zone ordinances for action on rates by the Council.

The reason for zoning the area is the costs involved in great distances from the exchange to the residences in zones one and two. The company had to find some way to serve that area and yet make it feasible to go that distance for the few subscribers in zone two. That, Kemper gave as the reason for the \$50.00 ready to serve charge.

The figures were presented to the council after months of studying cost analysis involved in the Springlake project. These figures according to Kemper, include purchasing a 90, new building for the exchange, complete new equipment such as lines, poles and everything involved in this new plant.

Kemper said, "To give Springlake a dial exchange earlier, I had hoped the company would have used exchange that would be suitable for Springlake, but found we had nothing that would justify the needs of that area."

In explanation of the 1960 date Kemper said engineers would have to study the area and send all the data and specifications to the plant manufacturer before the exchange, which is tailored for a specific area could be manufactured, and he expected that to take at least 18 months. Then to be sure of installation at a certain date they had to add at least a year to the estimated 18 months for manufacturing.

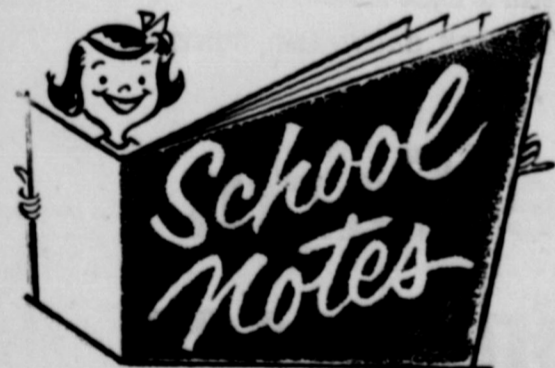

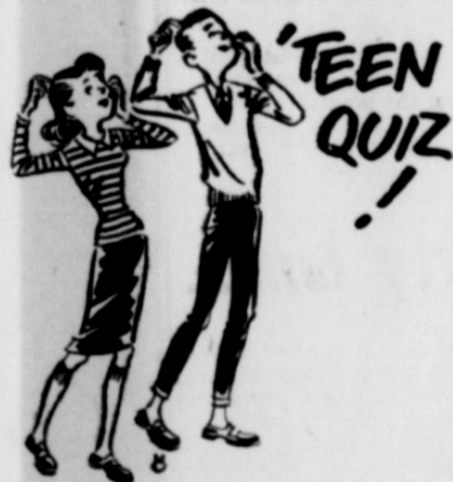

## Acreage Reserve Payments For 1958 Wheat Announced By ASC Office

Lamar D. Aten, Jr., manager of Lamb County ASC Office, announced Friday the average payment rate for 1958 wheat in Acreage Reserve at \$22.00 per acre, adding that there is a limitation of \$3000.00 on the total amount of 1958 Acreage Reserve payments which may be made to any one producer, irrespective of weather or not he has more than one eligible commodity placed in the Acreage Reserve.

The ASC Manager also stated that applications will be taken, starting August 26, in the Wheat Acreage Reserve Program; and that it will be necessary to establish a soil bank base for each farm that participates in the 1958 Acreage Reserve Program.

"When a Soil Bank base has previously been established under the Conservation Reserve Program the same base will be applicable for 1958 Acreage Reserve Program and in acceptance of applications preference will be given on a "first come first served" basis as long as funds are available", Mr. Aten said.

He also advises operators that they will not be permitted to withdraw from the program after closing date for signing agreements. That date is October 4, 1957.

## Social Security Disabled Insurance Payment Being Issued in August

More than 100,000 disabled workers all over the nation have been notified that they are entitled to social security disability insurance benefits and will receive their first benefit checks during August, John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office announced today. Most of the checks will be delivered August 3rd and the remaining ones will be mailed on following days.

In making this announcement, Mr. Hutton noted that action is being taken as speedily as possible on all disability applications and that many other disabled workers, who may not yet have received notice of final action on their applications, will be receiving their first checks in coming months. No further action is necessary on their part, he said.

In the first six months of 1957, applications for these new disability insurance benefits increased to a rate of about 12,000 a week throughout the Nation. Although social security benefit checks for a particular month are ordinarily mailed out for delivery on the 3rd of the following month, the heavy load of disability applications slowed up processing and made it impossible to get checks issued on August 3 to all entitled to disability benefits for the month of July.

All disabled workers who meet requirements of the law, and whose applications have been filed with their social security offices before

the end of December 1957, Mr. Hutton said, will get benefit payments for the months of July through December. After December, payments cannot be made for any month before the month of application.

In order to get disability insurance benefits, a person must be between 50 and 65 years of age and must have a long-lasting disability so severe that he is not able to engage in any substantial gainful activity. He must have worked under social security for five out of the ten years before he became disabled, including a year and a half out of the three years just before his disability began.

In addition to the disability benefit sections of the law which provide for a partial replacement of earnings during a disabled worker's middle years, there is a 1954 amendment to the law providing that disabled people of any age who meet the disability and work requirements may apply to have their social security records frozen. When a worker's security record is frozen, his own and his family's future benefit rights are protected.

## Perennial Sweet Sudan Developed

College Station — A synthetic, tetraploid of the sorghum species has been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station after 15 years of breeding and selection.

This tetraploid, pehhiennial sweet Sudangrass, was obtained by doubling the chromosomes of Common Sudangrass by treatment with colchicine and crossing it with Johnsongrass. It has good forage qualities with sweet and juicy stalks, good fertility and seed production qualities, and a good perennial root growth habit intermediate between Johnsongrass and Sudangrass. Its roots do not penetrate as deeply as those of Johnsongrass, so it is unlikely to become a pest.

A leaflet just released by the Experiment Station, "Perennial Sudangrass", gives pertinent information on this new grass. Included in the leaflet are sections on growth habits, palatability and productivity, forage qualities, seeding habits, its capabilities as a cover crop and sources of seed. Seed should be available for planting from commercial seed companies in the summer of 1958.

## Cotton Production Estimate For Lamb County Is 163,000 Bales

LUBBOCK — The first 1957 cotton production estimate for the Texas High Plains, as of August 1, shows an estimated 1,654,000 bales expected off this year's crop, agricultural officials report.

This production is based on allotted acreage, stands and crop conditions as of August 1 from 23 High Plains counties. This 1957 crop estimate is more than 200,000 bales higher than the first crop estimate off the 1956 cotton crop which actually produced the second biggest crop in history in this area — 1,640,000 bales.

The Lubbock Cotton Exchange and the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in making the crop estimate said that the estimate is on the conservative side, due to the lateness of the crop and the fact that so much dryland is dependent on rain in August. Dry land was estimated at 160 to 200 pounds yield. If this estimate is too low, and should it be increased by 75 pounds per acre for the dry land acreage, then another 100,000 bales or so could be produced and production will break all existing records. If the big acreage counties come through this year along with the high yielding counties and the dry land equals one-half bales than this year's crop could easily top 1,750,000 bales.

Estimated acreages of Lamb County are: Dryland Acreage, 53,000; Irrigated Acreage, 140,000; Total estimated acreages are 193,000 bales.

AUSTIN — There will be a regional meeting of game wardens in the Possum Kingdom area at Possum Kingdom Monday, to discuss regulations affecting that area in hunting and fishing, it has been announced by the Director of Law Enforcement.

No material changes affect the area, according to the Director. Spear fishing, however, will be discussed at length. The Director believes it will be possible to develop this type of fishing, where the water is clear enough, to help rid the lakes of gar and carp. He warned, however, that game fish must not be taken by the frogmen.

The Director also announced that Max Kluge, long time warden at Corpus Christi, has resigned, effective on the appointment of a successor. Kluge plans to go into business.

H. A. Ellis, supervisor at Tyler will retire August 1, and will be replaced by Jack L. Hardy.

### MADE BLANCO STREAM SURVEY

Black Bass and Sunfish are found pretty well through the waters of the Blanco River in Blanco, Kendall and Haynes counties, according to a project report just made by biologists of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Elgin M. C. Dietz was project leader of the study made at 27 stations along the meanderings of the river. A total of 7352 specimens was taken, representing 11 families and 35 species and one hybrid, according to the report. Thirty-two collections were made with seines and nets. Many minnows were taken, but enough bass showed up to indicate the waters of the Blanco are still good for them. Quite a few catfish also were taken.

The Rio Grande perch also showed up in sizeable quantities, but not as many as are found in the San Marcos River. It is a transplanted fish, generally considered as



undesirable in fishing impoundments.

### MORE WHITING AREA IS LEASED

An additional 650 acres of habitat for white-winged doves has been obtained in Hidalgo County. It was announced today by the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission. The land was leased at \$650 a year for two years from the Missionary Society, Oblate Fathers of Texas of Bexar County.

The Commission has been interested in getting additional tracts of land in the whitening area, having previously acquired two other tracts. In this way it is hoped to maintain native whitening nesting areas until the new citrus orchards in the valley attain sufficient size to hold the birds.

### BIOLOGISTS STUDY GOOSE MANAGEMENT

Goose management may be next on the program for wildlife biologists.

This was the announcement this week of the Director of Wildlife Restoration of the Texas Game and Fish Commission. He with J. R. Sigleton, coastal duck biologist, will attend a meeting in Santa Fe on August 1 and 2. Here the Central Flyway Council will discuss duck and goose problems of the central area.

In studying geese the biologists have found that flock management rather than flyway may be the answer to the goose problem. Geese fly from their nesting areas to the same area in the south each year, the biologists have found. By bringing their young, the same route is followed each year by the flocks.

## To Demonstrate Remote Control Kitchen at Fair

A remarkable remote control kitchen which electronically taken over housekeeping duties at the wave of a hand will be demonstrated in the Electric Building at the 1957 State Fair of Texas, October 5-20.

The RCA Whirlpool Miracle Kitchen will show possible future mechanical kitchen innovations being developed in the Whirlpool-Seeger engineering and research laboratories.

The kitchen's master control panel makes meal planning and preparation, and the tiresome chore of cleaning up afterwards, as easy as twisting a dial.

In the spotless, filtered, air-conditioned kitchen, a self-propelled serving cart detaches itself from a dishwashing mechanism in the wall, moves to the dining table, delivers complete table service or receives soiled dishes, then returns to its nest in the wall to dispose of waste and do the dishes.

A "mechanical maid" mobile floor cleaner scrubs, dries, waxes or polishes the floor, functioning automatically on its own.

At the wave of a hand, a refrigerator moves down from a wall cabinet to convenient reach-in level. The frost-free unit dispenses an inexhaustible supply of clear ice, in sizes from large cubes to fine powder.

Meal preparation is simplified by self-cleaning, automatic cooking facilities. A completely automatic meal maker activated by a remote control moves selected foods from a cold storage to cooling compartments. A canned food dispenser delivers a can intact or opens it automatically, releases contents and destroys the can. Combination cooking and serving utensils are made so the exterior remains cool while food heats.

The planning center, which is the heart and brain of the Miracle Kitchen, has touch controls for food selection, receipt selection, the mobile dishwashing cart, the floor cleaner and the automatic meal maker. Here a rotating TV monitor shows at a glance activity at the front door, nursery, game room or any other location in the house.

## Serious Outbreak Of Sorghum Smut Reported

College Station — Serious field infestations of grain sorghum with head smut in the Coastal Bend area and Medina county are reported by Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

This disease, said Smith, destroys the entire grain sorghum head by transforming into a mass of dark-brown powdery spores. The first indication of the disease is noted at the time the plants commence heading when the large gall bulges from the boot. The gall is first covered with a whitish membrane which soon breaks and allows the smut spores to scatter with wind and rain to other plants, the soil and plant refuse where they overwinter.

Infected plants are shorter, said Smith, but the tiller are of normal height and sterile. On Combine 7078 the main heads are sterile with the tillers smutted.

Seed treatment is effective only in fields where the fungus has not already been introduced into the soil. Seed treatment will control covered kernel smut and is a big aid, points out the pathologist, in preventing the introduction of head smut into areas now free of the disease. Such fungicides as Arasan, Phygon, Spergon, Dow 9B or Delsan are recommended for the seed treating job.

Once fields are badly infected, Smith said, sorghums should not be planted for as long a period as possible or else resistant varieties should be used. He pointed out that Martin milo is not as susceptible as Combine 7078 and that observations indicate that Hegari is resistant. RS 610 and the other Texas hybrids recently introduced are known to be susceptible to the disease, he said.

Smith urges farmers to check their fields carefully for the disease and to use the known practices for preventing a further spread of the outbreaks. Seed from infected fields should not be used as a source of planting seed, and farmers in free areas should treat all planting seed to prevent the introduction of head smut into their fields.

## 1957 Cotton Defoliation Guide Available

College Station — This year's late cotton crop and high rainfall may make cotton defoliation even more important in most sections of the state, according to Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist. But this does not apply to the High Plains area where they need all of the maturity they can get to beat frost, he adds.

In the rest of the state where farmers must meet the pink bollworm deadline, the specialist says that defoliation will probably be necessary. In the sections of South Texas, the Gulf Coast and Central Texas where strippers are to be used, it is a must.

In Central Texas, the small plants and dry weather usually make it possible to use a stripper with only light defoliation. But with this year's increased rainfall, the plants are larger and Elliott says that defoliation may have to be used.

A publication just released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "Cotton Defoliation Guide for Texas", gives much information on the 1957 use of defoliants.

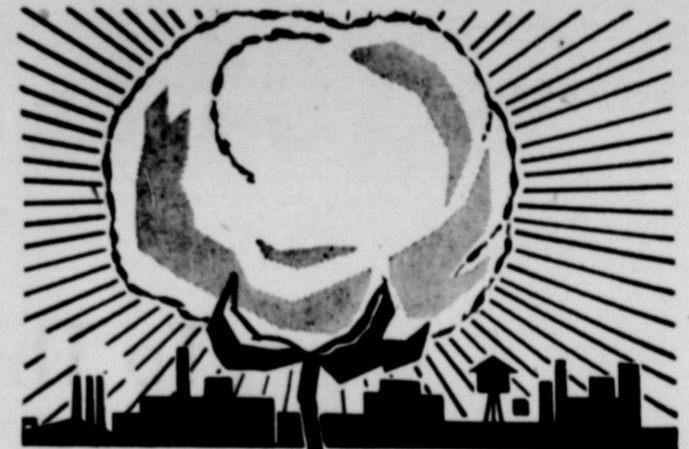
