Lions See Film "Reaching For the Stars"

Leroy Wilkerson, manager of the local Southwestern Public Service Company, was guest speaker at the Earth Lions Club noon luncheon on Tuesday.

Wilkerson's gave a short summary of Southwestern Public Service Company's participation in a research program of atomic power, and showed a filmstrip entitled "Reaching For the Stars."

Wilkerson said, "Since 1957, the Southwestern Public Service Company, along with nine (9) other investor-owned electric companies in the Southwest, has been participating in a very dramatic research program on atomic power."

We, and our partners in this research, are literally "Reaching for the Stars," in our research of atomic power.

"The successful conclusion of this research," he went on, would be, in common words, to harness the power of the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes."

power, but in the entire field of Physical sciences."

In concluding his program to the local Lions, he added, "Thus, with this kind of advantage, in time, and with the best possible present day power plants. The electric companies here in the Southwest have grasped the opportunity to open up new vistas in scientific research." This program on nuclear fusion research is the largest privately financed effort in this field in the entire world, that is carried on without government funds, Wilkerson told his audience.

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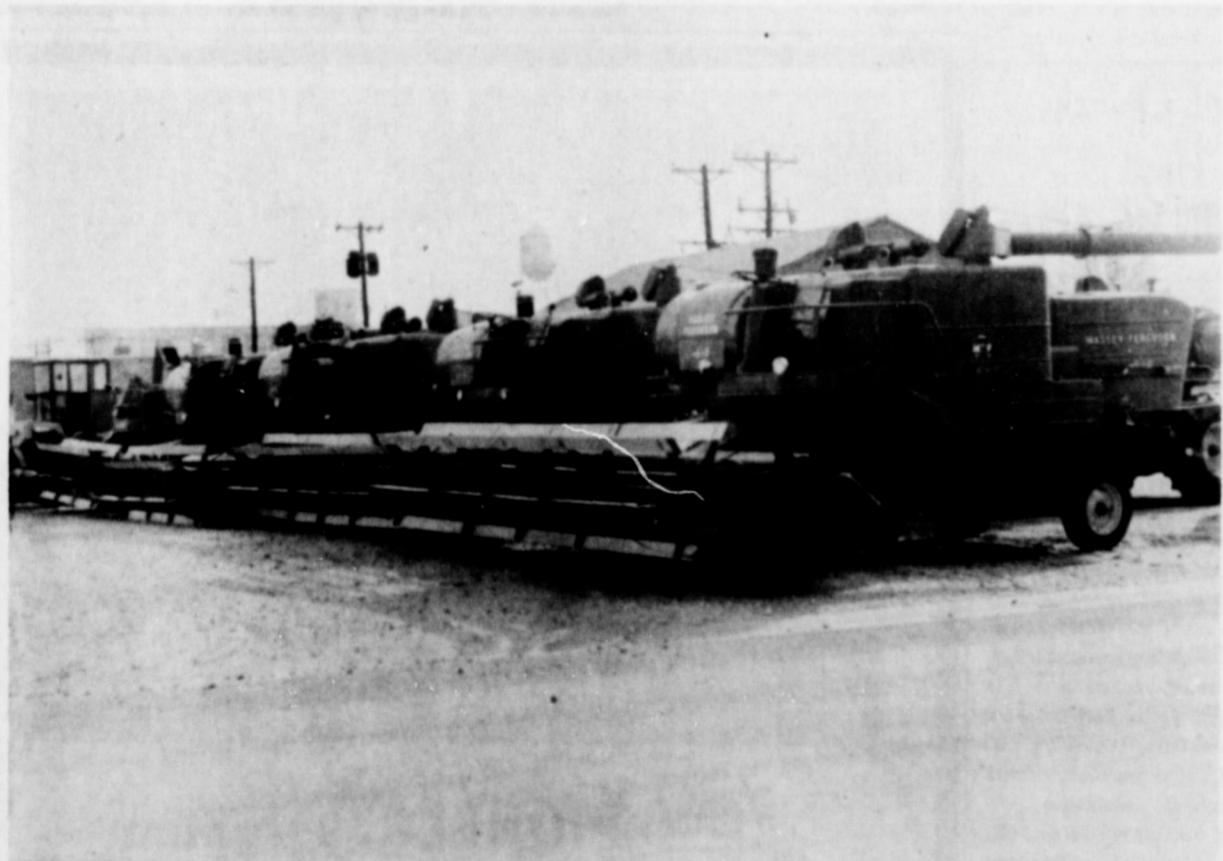
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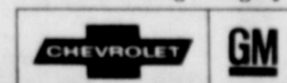
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V. D. Coker Rites Held

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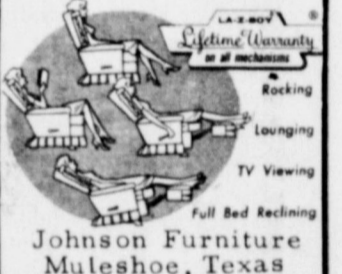

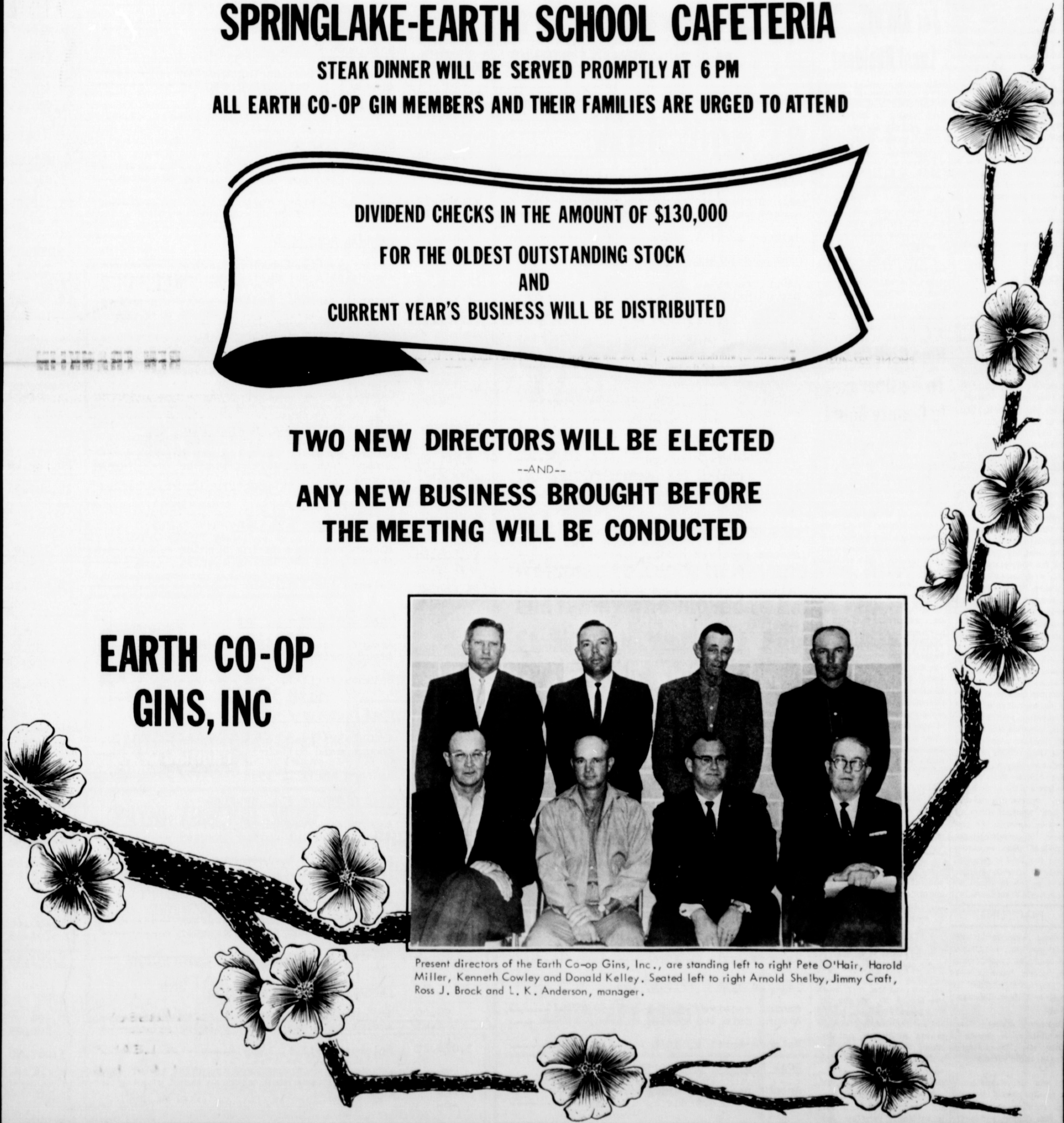
