

# Largest Vote In County's History Expected Saturday

The largest turnout of voters in the history of Lamb County is expected to make their way to the polls Saturday, May 6 and vote in the primary elections.

The Democratic election ballot will list six candidates for governor. They are John Connally, Marshall Formby, Edwin A. Walker, Price Daniel, Don Yarborough and Will Wilson.

Five names are on the ballot for lieutenant governor. They are James Turman, Crawford Martin, Preston Smith, Robert Baker and Jarrard Secrest.

The Democrats seem never to fall short of candidates for all posts, as six are running for attorney general. These candidates are W. T. McDonald, Bob Looney,

Tom Reavley, Tom James, Les Proctor and Waggoner Carr.

Congressman - at large lists Woodrow Wilson Bean, Phil Willis, Russell T. Van Keuren, Manley Head, Joe Pool, Warren G. Moore, Charles H. Stevenson, Jr.

For associate justice of Supreme Court, place no. 1 is Meade F. Griffin and Jesse Owens.

For associate justice of Supreme Court, place no. 2, James R. Nowell is unopposed. For associate justice of Supreme Court, place no. 4 are Zollie Steakley of Travis County and Willard G. (Bill) Street of Lamb County.

In the race for judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Otis Danagan and W. A. Morrison are listed. For Railroad Commissioner,

William J. Murray, Jr. is unopposed.

For Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term) two candidates are seeking this post. They are Ben Ramsey and Keith Wheatly. Robert S. Calvert is unopposed for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

For State treasurer, Jesse James of Travis County is unopposed. For Commissioner of General Land Office, Jerry Sauter is the only Democrat listed. For Commissioner of Agriculture the Democrats have John C. White and Everett Haley, Jr.

The post of Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, is Democratic candidate Alton B. Chapman.

William H. Evans is unopposed in his efforts to become a mem-

ber of the State Board of Education.

For Representative in the U.S. Congress, George Mahon of Lubbock County.

For State Senator, 20th District, Andy Rogers is seeking reelection. For State Representative of the 91st District, much interest has been kindled in Lamb County. On the Democratic ballot, W. T. (Bill) Miller, E. M. Nelson and Bill Clayton.

Pat Boone, Jr. is unopposed as District Judge, Ernest L. Owen is unopposed as District Clerk, For County Judge, J. B. (Ossie) Lewis, and Truitt Sides are listed.

Charles D. Jones is unopposed for County Clerk. Also for County Treasurer, Larry Moreland is unopposed.

For County School Superintendent, C. R. Stevens is seeking this post. For chairman Lamb County executive committee is Pat Boone Sr.

For County Commissioner, Precinct 2, Henry W. Lewis of earth is unopposed.

For Justice of Peace, Precinct 2, A. Glasscock of Earth is unopposed.

For Precinct Chairman, voting precinct no. 2, James R. Littleton, Jr. is unopposed.

J. Frank Ford, Jr. is seeking the post of State Representative, 51st District.

*Is gambling economically justified?*

Virgil W. Peterson, director of the Chicago Crime Commission, testifies "Gambling drains the salaries, savings and investments of a community into a business enterprise that serves no human need. Those who benefit from gambling profits are almost without exception members of the underworld who invariably control the gambling business."

Gambling is the biggest single cause of such crimes as embezzlement and invariably brings in its wake a mounting stack of unpaid bills, skipped installment payments, repossessed automobiles and furniture, and lapsed insurance policies.

*Since some people gamble anyway, shouldn't we make it legal in order to police it?*

The Chairman of the United States Senate Investigating Committee says no. "No plan for legalized gambling that was presented to us seemed to carry any guarantee of success."

*Isn't race track gambling a good source of tax revenue?*

Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin says, "The idea that legalized gambling will be a revenue-raiser is an illusion. Every dollar raised from such sources means five dollars spent in higher police costs, higher court costs, higher penitentiary costs and higher relief costs."

*But after all, isn't pari-mutuel gambling pretty harmless? So a guy loses two dollars.*

This is the same, tired, fallacious combination of words mouthed by every gambling profiteer from Al Capone to Benny Binion.



The sad fact of gambling can be told in four words of Damon Runyon, "horse players die broke." A two-dollar bet is murder. Gambling . . . two dollars . . . ten dollars . . . a hundred to recoup . . . is a cause of broken marriages, neglected children, poverty and sometimes suicide.

Ask a bank examiner. Ask a divorce court judge. Ask a probation officer. Ask your retail credit association. Ask the relief people. The easy money boys won't give you the answer.

Small wonder that the three D's of gambling have been described as Debt, Degradation and Death.

You won't succumb to the fever, nor will we. But frankly we don't want our kids to be exposed to such characters as Hot Horse Herbie, Harry the Horse, Bookie Bob and John the Boss.

We don't want our kids to grow up around a race track.

Do you?

**Bacterial Blight  
Of Cotton Subject  
Of New Publication**

College Station — Bacterial blight occurs throughout the world where cotton is grown. It is one of the most damaging plant diseases in Texas, and during recent years has caused an estimated \$37 million yearly loss to Texas growers.

Several races and varieties of this pathogen are known, but only two are widely distributed. The organism enters the plant through

open stomata and wounds in the leaves, bolls and stems. The bacteria break down the cell wall of the spongy tissues, releasing cellular juices.

Infected leaves soon turn yellow and are shed, and excessive leaf shedding reduces the yielding ability of the plant. Boll lesions provide ports of entry for boll-rotting fungi, thus bacterial blight is one of the principal causes of boll rot.

The blight organism may overwinter in the soil on decomposed plant debris, but more commonly is carried from season to season within and on planting seed. Once in a field the disease is spread from plant to plant and from old to new tissues by wind-driven, splashing rains. The disease may also be disseminated from field to field by whirlwinds, running water, equipment and gin trash.

Bacterial blight can be controlled by a combination of four practices: rotating cotton with other crops, planting disease-free seed, growing resistant varieties and fertilizing with nitrogen.

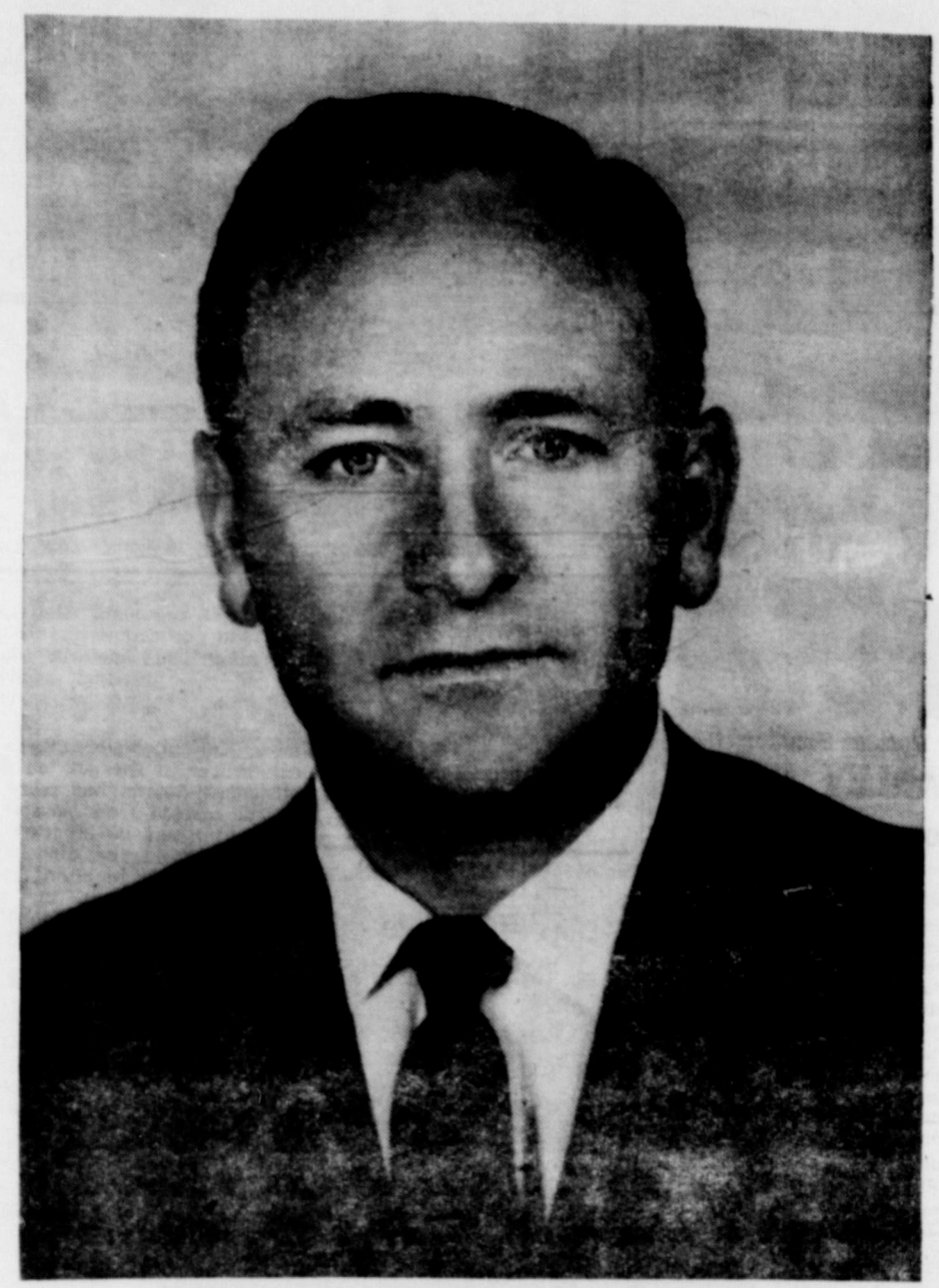

### Cotton Classing Service Available

COLLEGE STATION — Growers who wish to have their cotton classed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture under provisions of the Smith-Doxey Act should apply for these services as soon as their cotton is planted, says Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist.

The Smith-Doxey Act provides for one free classification for each eligible bale of cotton. Samples must be submitted by a bonded sampler or by a public warehouse which issues negotiable receipts, explains Elliott.

Each cotton improvement group, except those in southern Texas, must file an application with the cotton classing office serving its territory not later than August 1. Those in counties south of a line from Dimmitt to Karnes to Matagorda must file an application by June 1.

Prompt application filing is necessary because time is needed for each group to arrange for submitting samples by an approved sampling agent to the proper classing office, says Elliott. At least 15 days are required to process applications and deliver sampling supplies.

Application forms for these services may be obtained from county agents, cotton classing offices of the Cotton Division of the AMS, or from the area office in Dallas.

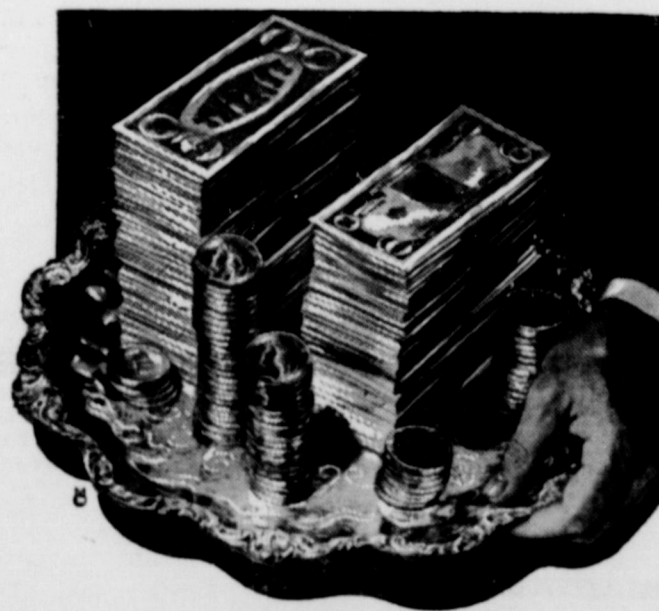
