

Wheat Growers Issue Last Call For Corn Growers

The Dimmitt Wheat Growers are in an all-out campaign to finish the selling of marketing contracts to local and area farmers for corn to be processed in the multimillion dollar corn milling plant in Dimmitt.

The board of directors have set the deadline for the farmer's sign-up at April 10. To-date only about 65 per cent of the \$2 1/2 million dollars needed for the project has been subscribed for. Aaron Isaacs, general manager of Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc. stated, "Farmers waiting for a year or two before going into the program will be disappointed, because after the deadline of April 10 no contracts would be available."

Larry Love, Dimmitt Wheat Growers agronomist, said he feels that some of the producers can't believe the profits they'll make by taking part in the processing and marketing of their corn products.

"It's the difference between what a farmer gets for his wheat and what the baker gets for a loaf of bread," Love said. "The farmer comes out on the short

end. The real money comes from the processing of the finished product."

"Consider the man who wants to grow 200 acres of corn for the mill, and averages 6,000 pounds per acre, which is the area's present average," he said.

"In the first place he'll get \$10.45 more gross return per acre from corn than from milo," Love explained. "Then he'll get a return on his share of the mill's earnings which start in 1970."

"During its first 10 years, the mill will produce total earnings of \$590.88 per acre for him, on his original investment of \$47 per acre. On his 200 acres, that's a total of \$118,176," Love explained.

"By law, a cooperative has to pay a member at least 20 per cent of his earnings in cash. So over the 10-year period, the man with 200 acres of corn and an average yield would get a minimum of \$23,635 additional cash from his 200 acres-over and above his regular crop earnings."

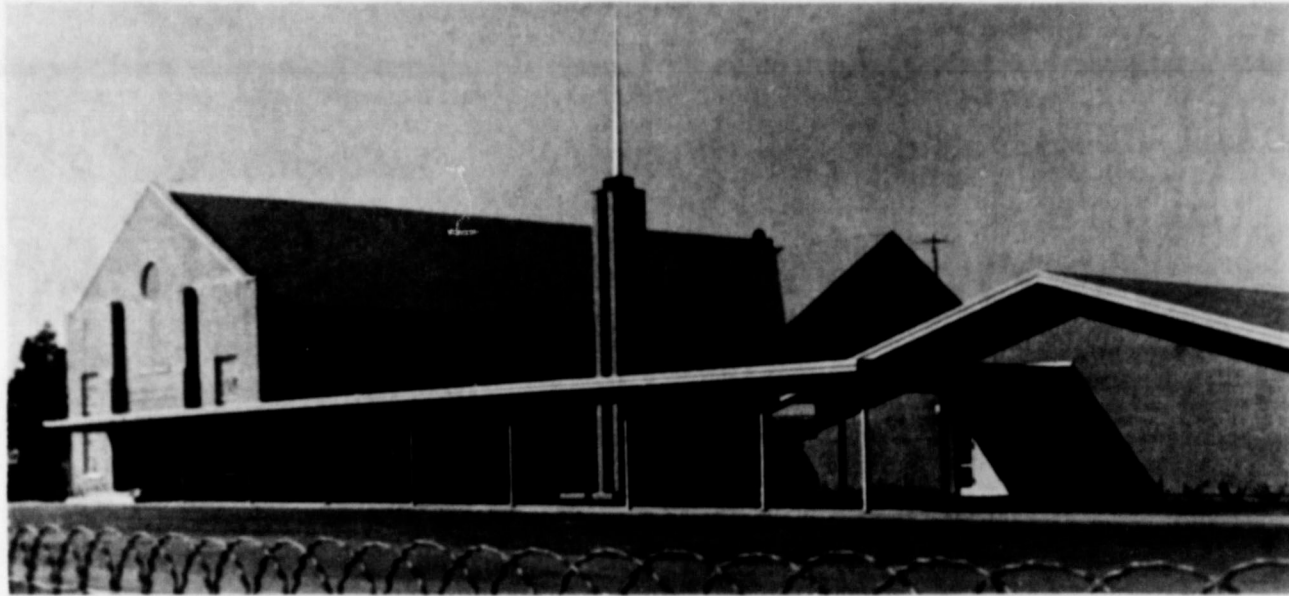

Four Elections Set For Saturday

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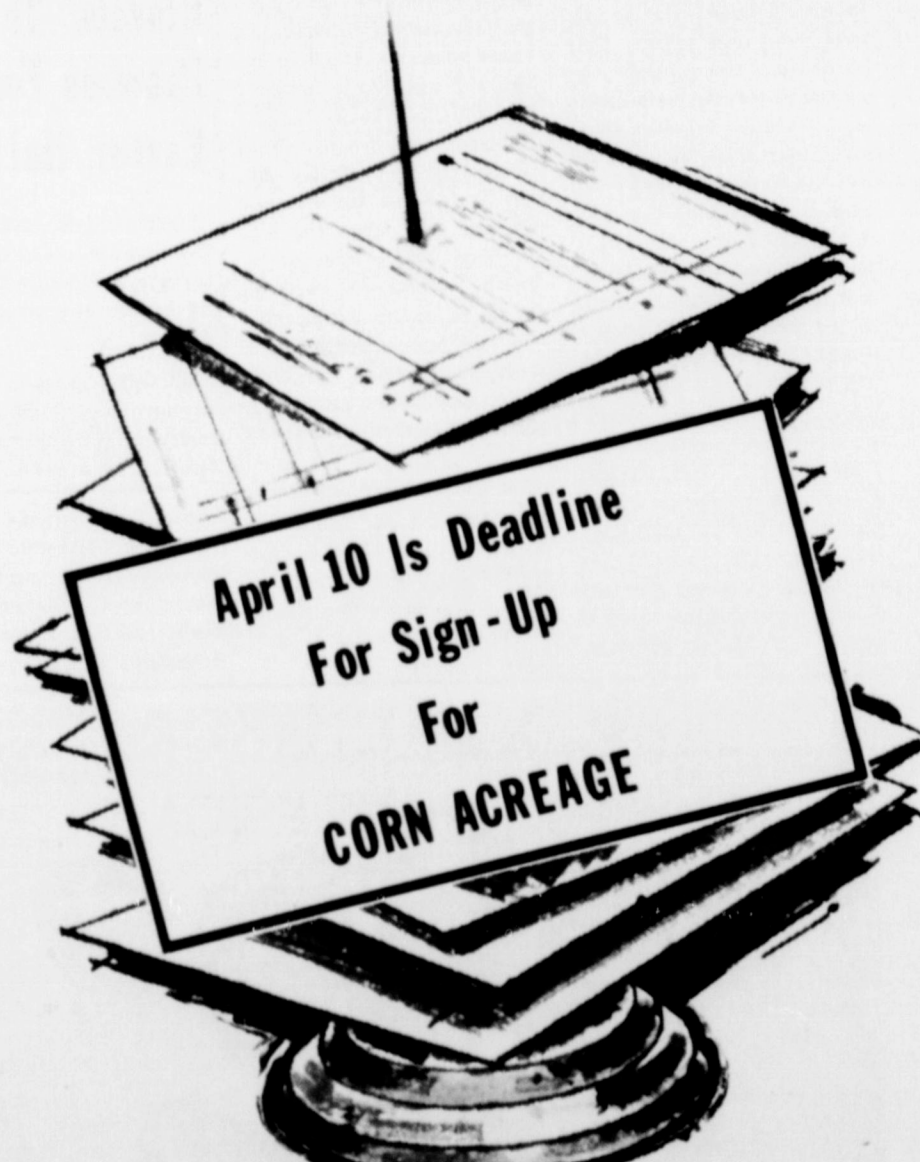
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History Of The First Baptist Church

BAPTIST HISTORY

When the W. E. Halsell's established the Town of Earth, they built and furnished a building that was to be used as a school, or for a Community meeting place. This was where we met for Church. There were three main denominations, Methodist, Church of Christ and Baptist. We all met together for a Union Sunday School, each church had one Sunday a month for their own preaching services. Generally these services were led by Layman. Occasionally we would have a Missionary preach, or we would sing, have

scripture reading and prayer. Singing was one of the favorite ways of worship.

There was talk of organizing a "Community Church", some in the community thought this was best. Most of us wanted a Church that we could call our very own. We were few in number, money was very scarce, and there were many obstacles to overcome but we Baptist started praying, talking, gathering and seeking the leadership of God in the matter. Brother G. I. Britton our Missionary of Plainview gave us much encouragement and advice.

Finally word was spread around that all Baptists who were interested in Organizing a Church to

please meet at the W. M. Saylor's home. (Their Home is known as the Skeeter Brock Place.) On the following Sunday afternoon, it was August 10, 1926. The day was very hot and dry but did not quench our spirits.

After prayer, scripture reading, meditation, testimonies, and discussions each one present was asked to tell of their own convictions, beliefs, faith in God, why we felt we needed a Baptist Church. We voted to organize, and to ask Bro. G. I. Britton to come help us get started. He came on Aug. 30, 1926 and was our moderator, assisted by Bro. R. C. Malone.

As Plato once said--"The beginning is the most important part of the work, the 1,000 mile journey starts with the first step."

Bro. Thurman Bailey was our first pastor, he was called as Pastor in October 24, 1926. He was a teacher at Wayland College and doing work toward his degrees. He came to preach one Sunday each month, the fourth Sunday.

On Nov. 28th, 1926 after a message by Bro. Bailey, Church went into conference. The first item of business was building a church building.

WE VOTED TO BUILD

The Methodist people wanted to help us build, and then when they were ready to build we could in turn help them. This worked out to be such a wonderful plan as we could not afford a full time pastor. The Methodist used the Church half time. They had some of the

best pastors, we loved them just like they were our own.

We Baptist and Methodist shared and enjoyed using many things together such as community service. Brush Arbor, we canned for Orphans Home, made Quilts for needy, bought a piano and many, many other things together.

The charter members were Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Bel, Mr. R. E. Barton, Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Herrell, Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Kelley, Mrs. J. W. Kelley, Mr. and Mrs. A. S. Mize, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Saylor, Pauline Saylor, Mrs. R. M. Starnes, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Wilkinson. Of the seventeen Charter members three are still active members.

The Women of the community organized what was called "The Helping Hand Club." This Club was to help and assist in any way possible with the furnishing of the Church, to help build the Arbor, buy a piano, assist in the building in any way possible.

Various projects for raising money were used, selling home made ice cream, serving dinners, making quilts charging 10¢ to get your name embroidered on the quilt.

Bro. Bailey served for nearly two years. Then in 1928, Bro. E. G. Pennington came as half time pastor and served until April 27, 1930.

On June 15, 1930, Bro. Earl Landtroop was called and served one year. September 7, 1930, two more deacons were elected, Ray Kelley and Leonard Roberts. June 29, 1931, Bro. Vernie Pipes was called as pastor. During the winter of 1932 night church services were discontinued for the lack of money to pay bills.

Our budget for the entire year of 1932 taken from a church letter was \$667.51. The letter gave a breakdown in the figures as follows: Pastor's Salary, \$425.58; incidentals, \$74.00; Visiting Ministers, \$79.01; Sunday School expenses, \$88.92. Total \$667.51.

That year also showed an increase in membership of 62. There were 24 by experience and Baptism and 38 by letter. There was a decrease of 11 by letter.

Bro. E. S. Carpenter was called as pastor May 12, 1933, and served only a few months. At this time, Bro. Pipes came back.

The first budget adopted by the church was on May 8, 1934, with the following acting as a budget committee: Guy Kelley, T. F. Koonce, Mrs. C. W. Terry, Mrs. M. E. Kelley, Mr. Homer Hodge, and Mrs. Labert Mize. Also this year the church voted to build a new building with the following appointed as Finance Committee: A. M. Sanders, D. L. Allen, Ray Kelley, Obie Wilbanks, A. S. Mize, J. W. Kelley, R. E. Barton, T. W. Cook. The building committee was J. B. Pare, Homer Hodge, Marshal Kelley, Ray Ivey, and Bob Kelley.

The first church parsonage was bought at Plainview and moved on lots joining the church. Bro. Pipes resigned December 8, 1935, and Bro. Landtroop came back and served 2 years.

The young people organized the first BYPU in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Marshal Kelley, due to insufficient funds to pay fuel at the church.

Bro. C. T. Jordan began his work on May 2, 1937, and in September of that year, building was started on a new church which is now at the west end of the present building. Services were held in the school gym while the building was being constructed. The "Laying of the Cornerstone" service was held December 8, 1937, with Bro. A. A. Bain preaching the sermon. They were able to have services in the basement of the new building on December 19, 1937, and continued work on the building. On Sunday, March 20, 1938, the first service was held in the new auditorium. There was a record attendance of 247 in Sunday School with \$40 offering. Din-

ner was served at the church and a wonderful program of preaching and singing filled the afternoon.

On Sunday, May 19, 1940, the church building was dedicated, and the notes were burned. The pastor preached the sermon and Uncle Bob Kelley led the dedicatory prayer.

Bro. Landtroop, a former pastor also brought a message on the church covenant.

Bro. J. L. Hardin was ordained on January 5, 1941.

March 2, 1941, Bro. Harold Russ was called as pastor and served for 2 years. Bro. Russ always remembered our boys in service with letters, quarterly and more often if possible. He also mailed each boy a new testament to be carried in his pocket.

Bro. W. E. McGraw was called in September, 1942, and served 3 years. He was called into the Armed Service. During his pastorate, a building fund was started and a baptistry committee was appointed to secure plans and build a baptistry.

Bro. C. T. Jordan was called back in February 17, 1946, and served 2 years. Then Bro. Bruce Giles came in 1948 and served

5 years. During his pastorate, the present building was erected, and held its formal opening and homecoming June 10, 1951. It was a bricked-veneered frame structure, joining the old church building. The new auditorium was furnished with oak pews and had a seating capacity of 620, including seats for 120 persons in the balcony. The auditorium is 48 X 90 feet.

In 1953, the M. T. Howard property was purchased on the northwest corner of the block and the three bedroom brick home for the pastor was built. Bro. Cecil Meadows was the first to occupy the new parsonage. He served as pastor until October, 1962.

During these years, property was purchased and buildings built and furnished for both colored people and Spanish in the south part of town.

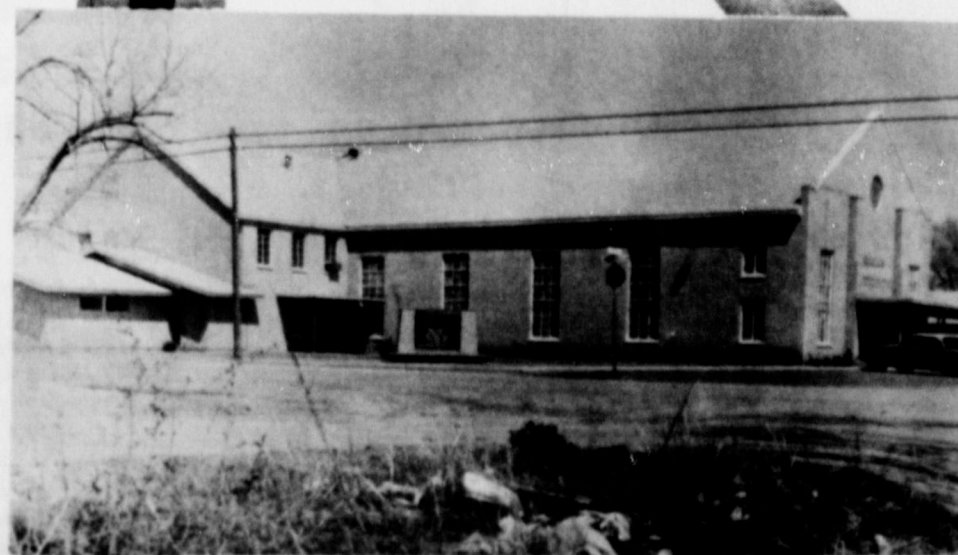

The present auditorium has been remodeled with Mahogany paneling throughout and carpet has been laid on the aisles, choir, and rostrum. The vestibule has full glassed doors and tiled flooring. A complete modern air conditioning and heating system has been installed.

NEW CHURCH BUILDING

The \$125,000 building program for the First Baptist Church in Earth has just recently been completed.

The new educational building has a floor space of 9,761 sq. ft. The remodeling of the older building covered 3,744 square feet.

The new structure just constructed is of brick matching the existing Church auditorium. It is located on the east and built in a reversed "L" shape joining the old structure to give the over-all appearance of a "U" shaped church building.

The new structure houses 21 individual class rooms, 8 department assembly rooms, four restrooms, and a long hallway running the entire length of the new building.

The walls of the new building are of vinyl material. The floors in the adult department while the intermediate department and fellowship hall are covered with tile.

Acoustical tile block ceilings are featured throughout the building.

The building features central air conditioning and heating, with refrigerated air and gas circulating heat. Seven new mechanical units have been installed to take care of localized heating and cooling. There is a total of 46 1/2 tons of air conditioning in the church.

On the east side of the new structure is a full length driveway leading to the new paved parking area in the rear of the building. A sheltered unloading space covers the driveway.

A covered walkway connecting the front of the new building with that of the old one was also erected.

Remodeling of the old building consisted of 9 individual class rooms and 2 department assembly rooms and includes a pastor's study.

There is a unique fire alarm system which localizes any portion of the church should a fire break out in the church.

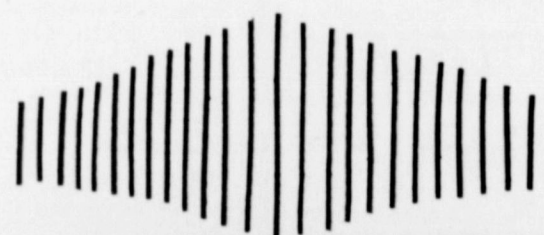
A communication system was installed to enable departments to report to each other.

The church has a lighted spire extending 20 feet above the roof of the church. This is wired with a time clock, and lights up daily as the sun goes down.

The paved parking area in the rear of the parsonage is available for recreational purposes.
