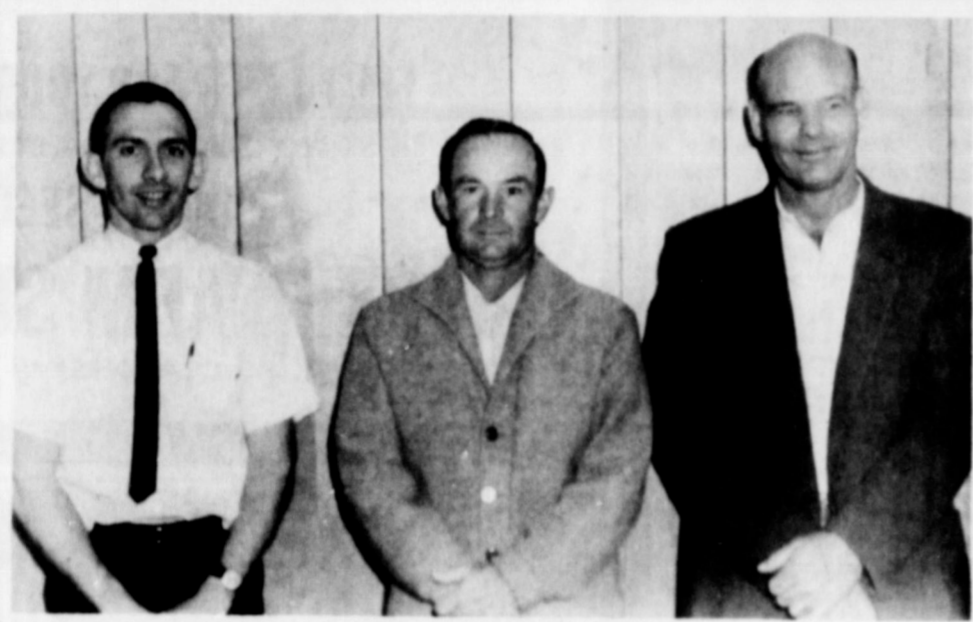

E. C. "Shorty" Kelley Elected Mayor

A total of 236 votes were cast in the Earth City election Tuesday, when E. C. "Shorty" Kelley was elected mayor with 137 votes, a majority of 40 votes over Marcus Messer's 97 votes.
For the alderman posts, Neil Pounds drew 195 votes, Dudley Chesney, 133 votes, L. H. "Slim" Galloway, 98, and was trailed by Jimmy Bitner who had 42 votes.
Two write in votes were cast in the election. One was balloted for M. E. Kelley as mayor and one for Wendell Clayton, also for mayor.

Kelley, Pounds, and Chesney were elected to serve two year terms.
Aldermen remaining on the council include Donald Runyon, Eldon Parish, and Richard Stockstill, each who will serve one more year.
Phil Raught, manager of the local Pioneer Natural Gas Company, served as election judge, with Leroy Wilkerson, manager of Southwest Public Service Company, alternating. Jack Rylant and Minnie Pate served as clerks.

from July 1, 1964 to June 30, 1965. Emergency care had been extended to 654,000 persons. Recovery aid had been extended 46,000 families at an average daily cost of over \$43,200. So, Red Cross funds are not only used for Service to our Military but also aid humanity in disasters.

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Sen. Jack Hightower Announces For Re-Election To State Senate

State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon today formally announced his candidacy in the Democratic Primary for re-election to a second term in the Texas Senate. He seeks election in the new 30th Senatorial District which includes Lamb County.

Senator Hightower, 39, was the choice of a wide margin of voters in 1964 to succeed the well-known Sen. George Cotton Moffett of Chillicothe, longtime agricultural leader.

During his first term in the Senate, Sen. Hightower became well-known as an effective and dedicated legislator. A native of Memphis, Texas, where his mother, Mrs. Walter Hightower, still resides, Sen. Hightower moved to Vernon in 1951 to begin the practice of law upon his graduation from Baylor University. He served in the U. S. Navy during World War II.

He is a leader in civic, religious and fraternal affairs on the local and state level. His wife, the former Colleen Ward, is a native of Tulsa, Texas, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ward of that city. They have three daughters, Ann, 13, Amy, 9, and Alison, 6.

The recent Supreme Court decision concerning redistricting caused a major rearrangement of Senatorial Districts in West Texas. The new 30th district now contains 90 thousand voters, approximately 80% of whom live in that part of the new district heretofore represented by Senator Hightower and approximately 40% live in that part of the district heretofore represented by another Senator.

"In order to properly represent the people a Senator should know them, their problems and their needs. I have been privileged to know many people all over the wide area that is now the 30th District. I hope to become better acquainted with many hundreds more during this campaign. My promise is to serve you sincerely," Senator Hightower said.

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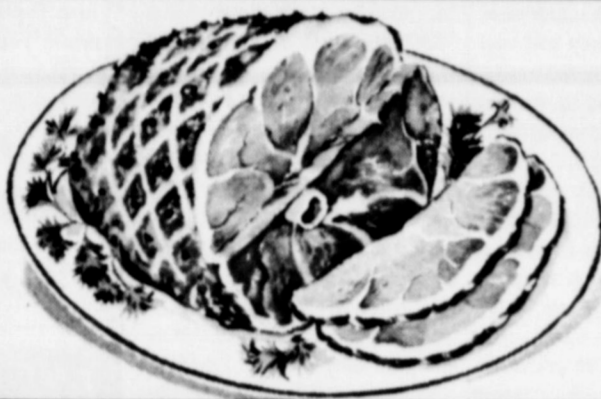

The cancer problem today is big. It involves all of us. Cancer is impartial when it attacks. But the cancer problem is not at all as gloomy as it was a few years ago. Modern science and education have made great inroads on the disease. There are 1,400,000 Americans alive today, cured of cancer. A quarter of a century ago, there were only 260,000.

Twenty years ago only one out of four stricken with the disease was saved. Now it is one out of three. It could be one out of two that is, if all of us exercised necessary precautions. This is why education is so important--people must know the facts and be persuaded to act in time. Action requires a health checkup by a physician every year and being constantly on the alert to cancer's seven danger signals.

Research is most important. The lives of half of those who develop cancer depend on future research. The American Cancer Society needs more research funds to support more of the projects recommended by the distinguished scientists who are on its Research Advisory Council.

Your dedicated leadership is needed and appreciated in the crusade against cancer. When the final victory over cancer is achieved--and that day will come you can proudly say, "I had a

part in it." Physicians could cure about half of all cancer patients, if people came for examination in time.

These are Cancer's 7 Danger Signals:

1. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
 2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.
 3. A sore that does not heal.
 4. Change in bowel or bladder habits.
 5. Hoarseness or cough.
 6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
 7. Change in a wart or mole.
- If a signal lasts longer than two weeks, consult a physician. Cancer starts and may spread without pain. A danger signal may seem unimportant, but do not delay.

So when a volunteer comes to your door "Open your doors and your hearts."
