Seriously, though I was proud indeed to receive the book, Lincoln has always been one of my favorite people. As I read the book I began to relive my trip to Washington, D. C. last summer, remembering our trip to the Ford Theatre where Lincoln was assassinated, which is now the Lincoln Museum. Also of touring the house across the street where Lincoln died.

The feeling one has as they stand where a "Great American" stood gives one the desire to always appreciate our great American Heritage. Remembering the hardships which Lincoln underwent, one can't help but admire a man who educated himself the best he possibly could, never letting an opportunity pass. (We were so interested that we had to pay a \$10 fine for overparking when we came out of the Ford Theatre).

In going way back in the history of OUR Nation, there's no place like Washington, D. C. We spent hours in the Smithsonian Institute. We also visited George Washington's mother's home. The home of his sister, the spot where he supposedly cut down the Cherry Tree, also toured the Capitol and White House, (for the women readers, I saw the blue room, the red room, and many of the rooms) and walked on a little part of the Red Carpet they roll out for visitors.

We followed the trenches of the Civil War for several miles at Fredricksburg, Virginia, and if those things of history don't wield up a desire to be a true American then something is wrong.

In Washington's mother's home, a deep feeling that she worshiped God, and taught the love of God by her daily walk was there. Her bedspread she herself had woven portrayed Biblical meanings the Dove of Peace, everything in the house had a meaning, each pointing to her Love of the Master. To me a truly Great American would have to have the imprints of the Love of God in his heart.

Yet today, we Americans are prone to take Our Great Heritage, as fiction, something that never really happened. It doesn't seem to bother us that we are sadly neglecting to measure up to the policies of Our Forefathers who wanted more out of life than to be classed as swine, where personal ability meant nothing, their ambition futile. They wanted and fought to give us a land that we, by our personal ability could succeed or flop, according to our own personal ambitions, ability, and determination to succeed, plus the effort we were willing to put behind our dreams. Nowhere in the world is the opportunity so great as in this country of OURS, nowhere is the standard of living so high as in America.

Yet, somewhere other "Land, and we who know that Americanism is the only answer are to lazy to stand up and be counted. We're selling out so to speak for the dollar, not looking into the future as to what the payday will mean.

When we stop to think of a cross section survey of what the teenagers think today about how Our Nation should be run, then it should cause us to have chills run down our spine that can not be warmed by merely turning up the furnace a notch.

This being National FFA Week, the Springlake FFA would like to give the history and qualifications of the FFA and some of the progress the local chapter has made.

The FFA is a national organization that extends from the state of Washington to Puerto Rico and from the state of Maine to Hawaii. All business is carried on by the boys regularly enrolled in agriculture. An advisor is available to give the boys information on their projects and their chapter program of work.

The FFA is divided into five groups, local, district, area, state and national. The local division is made up of the local FFA chapter in our community. The district is made up of seven schools in our county and adjacent counties. The area is made up of 105 schools in the upper western part of the Panhandle. The state is made up of approximately 1900 schools over the State of Texas. The National is made up of the forty nine states and Puerto Rico.

There is a president, vice-president, sentinel, reporter, treasurer, and secretary. These officers are elected by the boys.

There are four degrees to be held in FFA. The Greenhand made up of freshmen boys, chapter farmers, state farmers and American farmer.

Freshmen boys automatically hold the Greenhand degree. To be a Chapter Farmer you must clear fifty dollars on your project. To hold the State Farmer degree a boy must have made a profit of five hundred dollars on his project. To hold the American Farmer degree you must have been a State Farmer and clear one thousand dollars on your project.

The FFA Creed is the standards and principles the boys stand on in their FFA organization.

The Springlake FFA chapter would like to thank the following merchants for their support in making our program a success: Farmers Union, Jaycees, Sanders Lumber Co., Higginbotham-Bartlett, the Odd Fellows, Springlake and Earth Elevators and many other individuals too numerous to losses and 8 wins. The girls won mention.

At this time the chapter has fifty-five barrows and no steers on feed for the winter show. We have thirty-five registered Poland China sows and gilts, nineteen Berkshire gilts, and twelve Hampshire sows. Boars available within the chapter are; one five hundred dollar Hampshire, one five hundred fifteen dollar Berkshire, one, one thousand dollar Poland China, and two smaller Poland China boars.

The chapter breeding program for 1959 includes the Grand Champion barrow at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show, Grand Champion barrow at the Houston Fat Stock Show and Grand Champion at the State Fair of Texas.

Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection Slows To A Snail's Pace

Motor Vehicle Safety inspections in Lamb County have slowed to a snail's pace only 756 vehicles were inspected during January.

The inspections brought the total checked since September 1, when this years sticker went on sale, to 3480 or 25 percent of the 13500 registered vehicles in this county.

Captain Alan Johnson, Supervisor of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service in this Region of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety has urged vehicle owners to have their vehicles inspected as early as possible to avoid delays in the last minute rush.

In past years crowds during the last few days before the deadline have lined up for several blocks waiting to get into the inspection stations.

The safety inspection sticker which must be on all registered vehicles operated over public streets, roads and highways by midnight, April 15 may be obtained at any of the 20 approved vehicle inspection stations in this county.

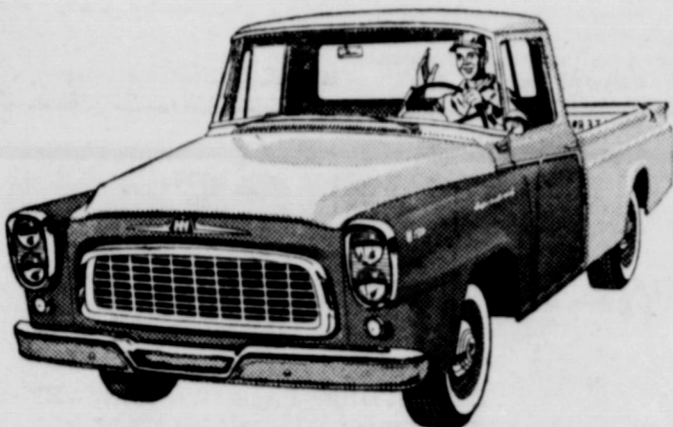

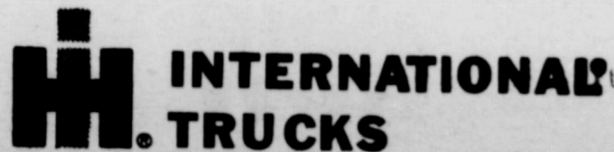

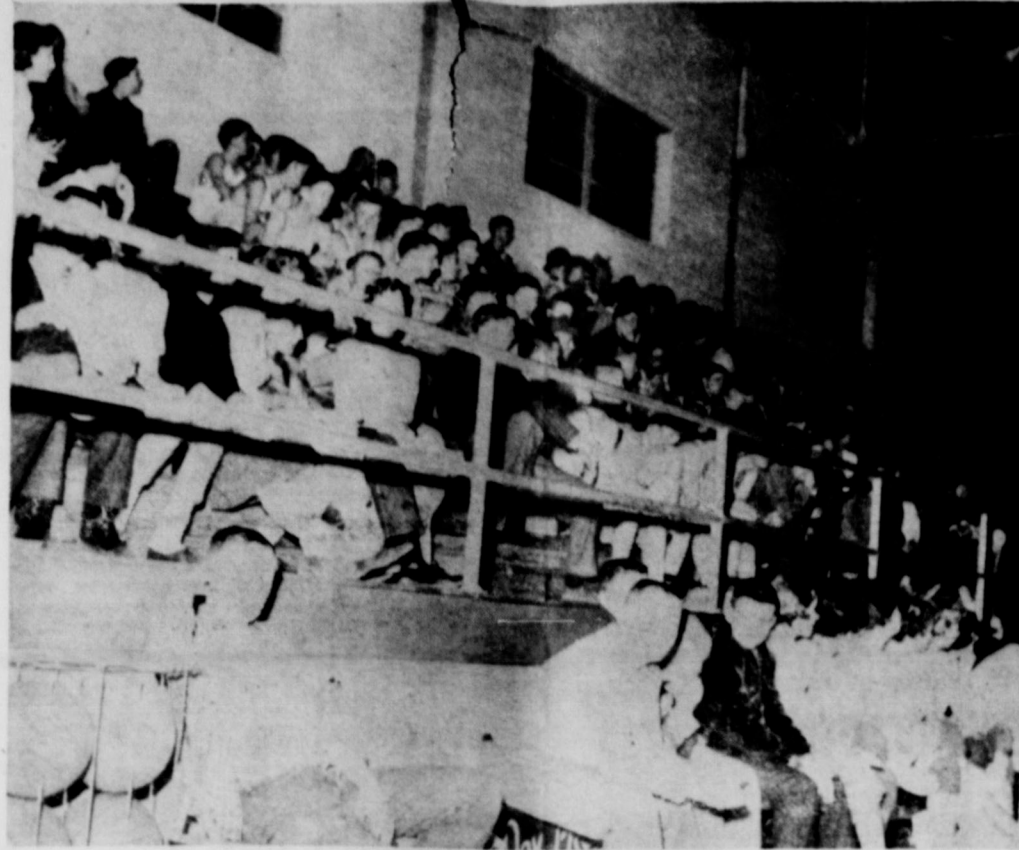
Junior High Wolverine Teams Take Double Victory From Lazbuddie

Safe Drivers Insurance Plan Revision Won't Give Motorists Much Relief

Austin — "The five revisions in the Texas Safe Drivers Insurance Plan announced by the Board of Insurance on February 5, won't give the public as much relief as a small dose of sassafras tea," according to Vestal Lemmons, general manager of the National Association of Independent Insurers.

None of the five changes is of any real significance or benefit to the public, Lemmons asserted. As an example, he cited what he termed the "Possum clause," a change in the plan that exempts accidents caused by striking wild animals.

"This revision will be of great benefit to those people who hit a possum while driving at a tremendous rate of speed," Lemmons said. "Their insurance rate won't go up."

"But," he added, "you'd better not hit mama's old red rooster, and don't run over old Rover, because these violent acts could result in severe penalties on your automobile insurance."

Lemmons reiterated the position of the NAAI with respect to merit rating in general. "We believe in the principle of merit rating and we believe that careful drivers should be accorded rate recognition," he said.

"But, no merit rating plan, however carefully it may be drawn, can ever be successful under the Texas single-rate law."

Lemmons said the furor which the safe-driver insurance plan had caused was only a mild prelude to the extreme public dissatisfaction that would develop.

"The Board of Insurance, with the helping hand of certain select segments of the industry has labored long under heavy pressure. Unfortunately, the only result of this long labor has been to bring forth an unworkable monstrosity," he continued.

Lemmons said that apparently the only recourse left to the public was to urge members of the legislature to amend the law.

He predicted unless the plan be termed it safe driver "penalty" plan was made optional and not compulsory the public would demand that the legislature enact a law prohibiting all such compulsory plans.

ARE BUILDING STOCKS OVERLY DEPRESSED?

The mildly pessimistic predictions that have been voiced about the prospects for the building industry for 1960 may be in for some revisions. If current reports can be used as a partial yardstick for forecasting this year's prospects then the near term future is brighter than recent projections. Home building could exceed the one million two hundred thousand estimated starts. Building issues were extremely poor market performers last year and have been so far this year. In 1958 building issues advanced as a group only 4% by year end in contrast to the overall market which improved better than 8.8% based on Hemphill Noyes Dollar Averages. In January of this year with the market down 6.7%, building stocks slumped 7.2%.

It appears that present pessimism about the industry has been overdone and that the group does not deserve the poor investor rating that it has had over the past year.

Probably no piece of unfavorable economic news has received so much attention since the steel strike as the impending downturn in home construction. Predictions that housing starts would fall to the 1,200,000 level from last year's estimated 1,350,000 was widely heralded as one of the more depressing factors in an otherwise rosy economic forecast. Yet at the close of last year, while many were bemoaning this down trend many

builders and others close to the industry were optimistically forecasting a good year in 1960. Now, one key housing indicator has shown a substantial rise in December and has given indications that the expected slow first half may show a better construction pace than originally envisioned.

In December the Federal Housing Administration received 13% more home mortgage applications than it did in November. This is an unusual jump because applications normally show a seasonal decline in December from November. While this may be a freak bunching of applications, it nevertheless, sharply reversed a declining trend which occurred in the last half of 1959.

One other bullish factor is that actual new home starts in December were greater than initially expected.

There are many building companies that are expected to report higher earnings this year than last and several that appear to offer interesting prospects at present levels. Among issues that we especially favor at this time are *Pittsburgh Plate Glass*, *National Homes* and *American Radiator*. FMS

Social Security Rules Apply To Farmers and Ranchers Also

Social Security rules also apply to farmers and ranchers. According to Howard O. Nichols of Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock, farm and ranch employers must report and pay Social Security taxes on cash wages paid to each farm and ranch worker whose total wages amounts to \$150 a year, or if the worker performs agricultural services on 20 or more days and receives cash wages on a time basis. Mr. Nichols said that Internal Revenue has two free booklets for farmers, ranchers and their employees: Circular A, or the more comprehensive Farmers' Tax Guide, 1960 edition.

Although self-help by taxpayers is stressed again this year by Uncle Sam's collection agency, the Internal Revenue phone number is PO 5-5706-7-8. Special taxpayer assistance day for especially knotty problems is every Monday from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The IRS office is located 1600 19th St., Lubbock.

Important Change In Legislature Effects All Farmers With Cotton Allotments

There is an important change in Legislation that should be called to the attention of all farmers with cotton allotments.

Under a new Law, passed at the last Session of Congress, if cotton is not regarded as planted under provisions of the Soil Bank Act or the Great Plains Program — A FARM MUST PLANT 75 PER CENT OF THE ALLOTTED ACRES OR ACREAGE MUST BE RELEASED. AT THE COUNTY ASC OFFICE; OTHERWISE THE ALLOTMENT ON THE FARM WILL BE REDUCED IN 1960.

A farmer who releases his allotment acres can maintain the cotton allotment history on his farm, provided cotton is planted one out of three years.

If you don't plan to use all or part of your 1960 cotton allotment acres Go to your County ASC Office and release them before it is too late to get history credit on your farm.

Cotton growers who would like to have their cotton acreage increased must apply for additional acres, on the form provided, if they want to get their share of released acres. They should, also, assist their ASC committee by encouraging non-growers to release unwanted cotton acres.

Apply NOW for the acres you actually want and will plant. Your request will furnish your Committee with justification necessary to obtain release acres from counties with "excess acres".

There were around one-half million available cotton allotment acres that were not utilized in 1959.

Final dates for release and re-apportionment of released acres has been set for each county. If you don't know these dates are, it will pay you to find out and act before it is too late.

Earth - Springlake To Receive New Telephone Numbers When Exchange Is Completed

Telephone customers in Earth and Springlake will be assigned a new type of telephone number when the establishment of the Springlake exchange occurs in the near future.

number will be composed of seven digits. R. E. Saunders, district manager, explained that the new system eventually will replace the more familiar two letter-five number (2L5N) system inaugurated

when the telephone industry first launched its long range program to permit operators and customers to dial direct from one city to another. He stated that 2L5N system is being replaced as rapidly as possible in order that all number combinations appearing on the telephone dial can be utilized. The old 2L5N system required a prefix such as CHerry or TWilight; however, because no words in the English language begin with the letter combination WX or JK or JL, then no telephone numbers be-

ginning with 99 or 55 could be assigned; thereby limiting number assignments. ... being assigned 2L5N telephone numbers increased, the necessity for using all possible number combinations on the dial increased. In other words, in some areas we are running out of possible letter prefixes, the district manager said. As a result of this realization, a study was undertaken in Wichita Falls, Texas, to determine whether assigning seven digit telephone numbers proved satisfactory to

customers and operators. Conclusion of the extensive study was that the ANN plan not only was satisfactory, but even eliminated some previous dialing errors resulting from confusion between the numeral zero and the letter O. Saunders, stated that progress on the outside plant of the Springlake Exchange had been slowed down considerably, due to the weather, but they were still slowly making some progress, but not nearly so fast as they had hoped for.
