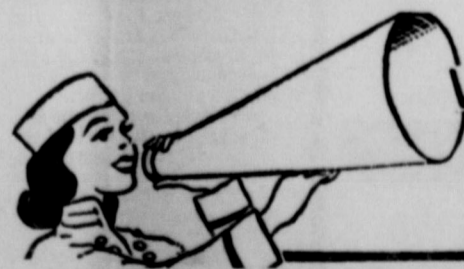

Tips on Touring

Three Tips For Tots

Smart mothers have discovered that motoring with youngsters can be a breeze instead of a tornado. The trick is to keep the children—especially the very young—busy and happy.

Here are three of my travel-tested tips: the mystery box, the wiggle platform and the shoe-bag filing cabinet.



The mystery box is a hatbox or fruitcake tin. Before leaving home, secretly decorate it, and fill it with inexpensive toys, wrapped separately in festive paper. Then, on the trip, when the youngsters show signs of restlessness or boredom, pull out the mystery box and let 'em dig—for one toy. Budget toys and dig to the length of the trip. Note: select soft toys, wooden models, drawing books—things that won't hurt the child or distract the driver.

The wiggle platform is a rest or play area in the back of the car. To make one, stack luggage on the floor until it's level with the back seat. Over this, place a crib or air mattress, cover with a quilt. Take a pillow for each child.

The shoe bag is hung over the back of the front seat. Secure it with two bicycle clamps or metal headbands. Use some pockets for clean-up items: paper toweling, a plastic bottle of liquid cleanser, soap leaves, disposable washcloths. Other pockets make a filing cabinet for dark glasses, camera, toys, reading or drawing materials.

Fifteen PCC's Now Operate In Texas

A poison control center (PCC) is a place which helps family doctors keep patients from becoming statistics.

Each year a hundred or so Texans — mostly children — become statistics by virtue of being accidentally poisoned. In the last four years, State Health Department record keepers have added 364 new names to the grim list of deaths by poisoning. PCC's undoubtedly have kept the list from being much longer.

Fifteen PCC's now operate in Texas under local physicians' guidance. The most recent one was set up in San Antonio July 18. Others are located in Abilene, Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Fort Worth, Galveston, Grand Prairie, Harlingen, Houston, Tyler, Wichita Falls, Odessa, San Angelo and Waco.

Hugh D. McGaw, a State Health Department occupational health engineer who works intimately with them, describes a PCC's round-the-clock operation like this:

"A curious youngster eats some of his mother's cosmetics and it makes him sick. His mother calls the doctor, but he doesn't know what toxic ingredients the cosmetic had in it. So he calls the nearest PCC, reports the brand name. A quick check of an index card file reveals the toxic substance and the antidote."

Twelve of Texas' 15 PCC's are equipped to provide emergency treatment, in addition to supplying detailed information on antidotes on a moment's notice.

McGaw says that PCC's in Texas' major cities handle some 150-250 emergency calls every month. And the volume is increasing all the time, with more and more potentially hazardous products being marketed each year.

intended to answer queries directly from the public," says McGaw. "They're set up to serve the physician who serves the patient. This is the way they can be of most benefit."

Even if the ingested product turns out to be harmless, the PCC has still saved the patient the discomfort of having his stomach pumped, McGaw points out.

He and other state health officials would like to see centers in the Panhandle, on the Southwestern border, and in far West Texas so all areas of Texas would be within an economical telephone call of a center.

The Department's division of occupational health supplies a file of information on poisonous materials and their antidotes after the center has been established. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

Dallas—Farmers who hire workers for harvesting fall crops were reminded today that the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act sets a 16-year age minimum for the employment of children in agriculture during school hours.

The reminder came from Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Division here, the agency which administers this law.

"Today and in the foreseeable future, the need for youngsters to meet even higher educational standards is beyond question," he said. "The child's chance for success in later years can depend on whether he enrolls in school this fall."

Mr. Rogers pointed out that children may lawfully work on farms before and after school hours or on weekends, but that their place is in the classroom when school is in session in the school district where the child is currently living.

"The law protects the children of migratory workers as well as local children," he said. "The only exception to the law is the child working exclusively for his parents or guardian."

An age certificate showing that the youngster is at least 16 is the best protection the farmer can have against inadvertent violation. In Texas, these certificates are available, as a public service, from local Texas Employment Commission offices.

He added that the Federal Child-labor law applies to farmers who engage in interstate commerce or ship their products in interstate commerce, either directly or to

**Very Hot Weather
Excellent for Growth
of Irrigated Cotton**

The dry, hot weather during the past week has resulted in excellent growth and fruiting in irrigated cotton, while some dry land plantings have begun to suffer from lack of sufficient moisture. The majority of the dryland cotton in the sandy areas where rains were heavier this season are not burning noticeably.

Thrips populations continue to be of no importance in cotton over the area.

Fleahoppers continue to cause heavy damage in younger cotton and plantings which have not suited well earlier. Heavy fleahopper infestations were reported in Howard, Lubbock, Childress, Glasscock, Crosby, and Motley counties. Medium infestations were found in parts of Dawson, Lubbock, Garza, Hockley, Knox, Mitchell, Tom Green, Lamb, Runnels, Floyd, Crosby, and Lynn counties. Due to the stage of growth and fruiting of much of the cotton in this area, population numbers alone do not generally give us enough information to determine whether to control the insect or not. A knowledge of both population numbers and the amount of damage resulting is needed to make the decision on whether to control or not. Cotton which is well fruited at this time of the season can stand much larger fleahopper populations than earlier in the season. A thumb rule which is often used in checking older cotton is to check the terminal growth for dead squares and if the plant is holding 3 out of every 4 forms produced, damage is considered very light. The combination of damage, population numbers, and condition of the plant (both growth and fruiting) should give the needed information to determine if control measures are required.

Bollworms have apparently let up during the past two weeks in most counties. Only Gaines, Reeves, and Glasscock counties have reported severe damage. It was noted that most of the worms were large and had entered the bolls. Very few eggs or small worms were reported in Dawson, Garza, Mitchell, Terry, Childress, Tom Green, Runnels, Glasscock, Hardeman, and Yoakum counties reported medium infestations. Cotton should be closely watched for the appearance of eggs and small worms.

Boll weevil populations are increasing rapidly in parts of Hardeman, Wilbarger, and Wichita co. The emergence of the second generation adults has brought with it heavy feeding and oviposition

damage in cotton plantings in these counties. Control measures should be taken when the adults begin emergence and continued where damage is heavy until the population has been sufficiently reduced. Boll weevils were also reported in Tom Green, Childress, and Runnels counties.

Cabbage loopers were found in cotton in all counties reporting this week. Bacterial and virus diseases were noted in many areas and were holding the number of cabbage loopers down. Heavy infestations were reported in Reeves and Runnels counties, but were only light or medium in the other reporting counties.

Grasshoppers, lygus bugs, and cotton square borers were reported in cotton plantings, but no serious problems were noted. The finding of cotton leafworms were reported in Hale, Hockley, and Gaines counties. These were the first reports of finding the insect in this area this season. For control recommendations please refer to the Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insect, published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Copies of this Guide may be picked up at the office of your County Agent. The information used in the "Cotton Insect Situation" release is compiled from reports received from county agents, vocational agriculture teachers, personnel of A & M College System, branches of the U.S.D.A., commercial cotton inspectors, chemical companies and others.

We hope that everyone who does any field checking will send us a report of the situation as you find it.

Irrigation on barley increased returns \$29.56 per acre over dryland barley at the High Plains Research Foundation in the 1959-60 test. Cardiova barley was used in the test which compared yield and returns between dryland barley and that if irrigated, fertilized barley.

The dryland barley yielded 9 bushels per acre compared to 67.5 bushels per acre from the irrigated barley.

The irrigated barley received two four-inch applications of water along with 200 pounds of 10-20-0 fertilizer per acre.

At 75 cents per bushel, income from the dryland acreage was \$6.72 per acre. Irrigation cost was \$6.00 per acre and the fertilizer cost totaled \$7.72 per acre. Deducting these costs from the 50.00 received, the net income from the irrigated, fertilized test was \$36.28 per acre. James Valliant, water engineer at the Foundation, conducted the tests.

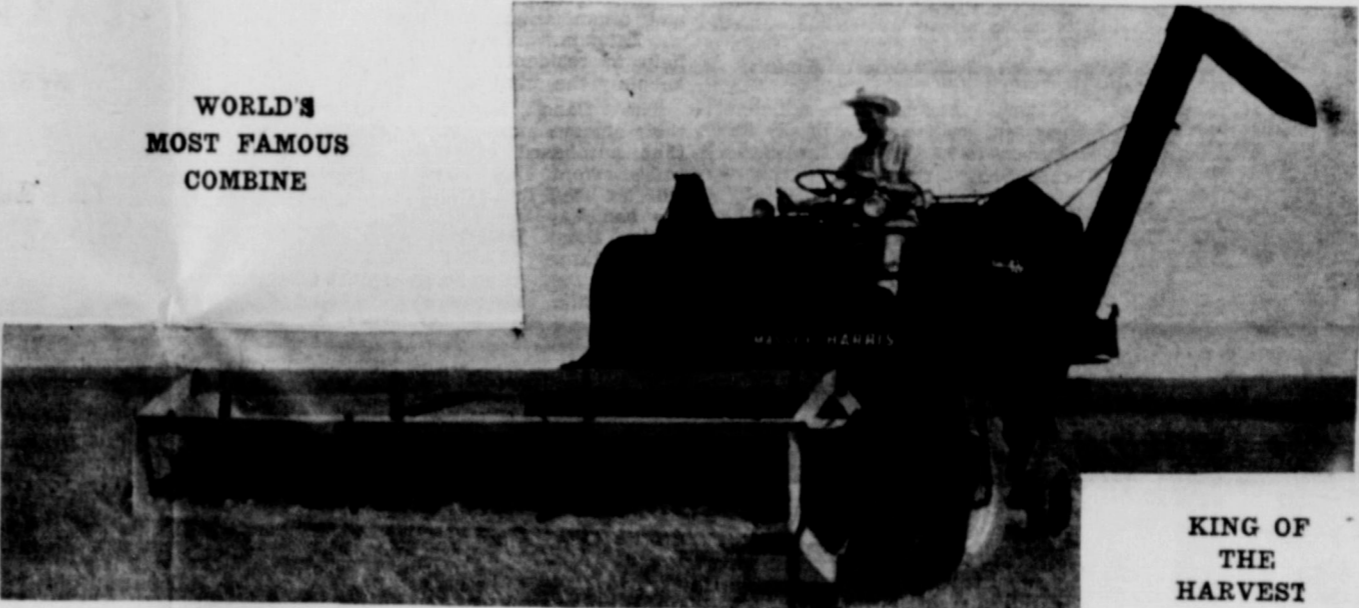

Farm Housing Regulation Changed

Under a recent change in the eligibility requirement for Farm Housing loans, a farmer who owns a farm that will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities may, if he meets other eligibility requirements, be able to obtain a Farm Housing loan.

Farm Housing loans are made by the Farmers Home Administration and are used to construct and repair needed farm houses and farm service buildings. These requirements are that the applicant lacks the resources needed to obtain credit elsewhere, be a citizen of the United States, and have sufficient income from farm and other sources to pay farm operating and family living expenses and meet payments, when due, on his debts.

Applications for this type of credit may be made at the County Office of the Farmers Home Administration located in the Post Office Building in Littlefield, Texas.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in money to and from their homes to and from the Capitol building which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the official gazette of the State of Texas.

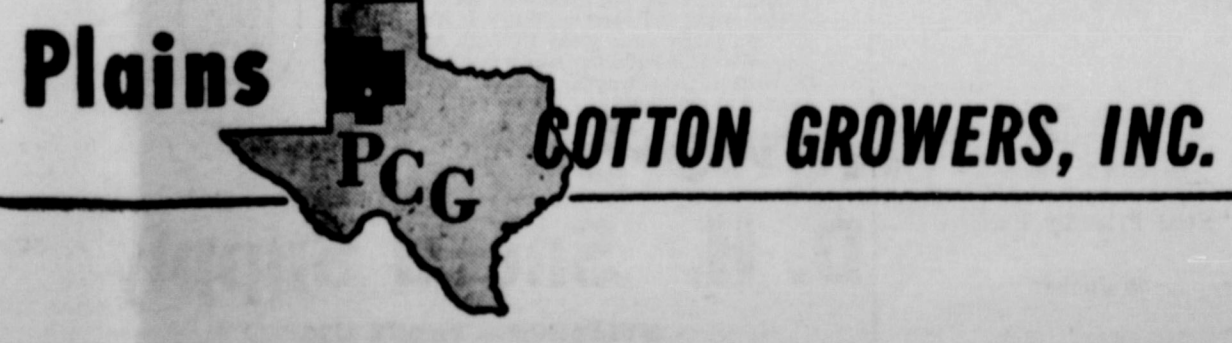

**Insect Infestation
Show No Changes**

Cotton insect infestation showed no marked change from those of a week ago. In most areas the early season insects had ceased to pose a problem. Some localities reported sufficient infestations of some late season insects to warrant control. Such infestations were generally limited to a small portion of the total acreage.

Fleahoppers were reported in light occasional heavy populations. No serious damage was indicated. Although these insects often occur in greater numbers during August, damage is generally light since cotton normally has a heavy fruit set at this time.

Bollworm activity seemed to increase slightly in many fields over that of the previous week. Although infestations were still light in a majority of fields, egg and worm counts were slightly greater than a week ago. While counts are still low in most fields on the High Plains, parts of occa-

ional fields have been treated for control of the worms. Heavier infestations were reported in Dickens, Knox, Martin, Mason, Midland and Presidio counties. All cotton should be checked frequently for appearance of eggs and small worms. Infestations often build up a week to ten days following irrigation. Examine both plant terminals and forms to secure accurate infestation counts.

Cabbage looper egg counts have increased in most fields. Some hatching was noted late in the week. Should heavy hatching occur, use control applications
