Democrats Victorious In State and County Races

Texas voters went to the polls Tuesday to elect candidates of their choice, resulting in Democratic victory for the state's leading officers, three of whom are from West Texas.

John Connally was elected Governor, against Jack Cox, a quick-thinking Republican candidate. Preston Smith, won the seat of Lieutenant Governor against his opponent, Bill Hayes. For Attorney General, Waggoner Carr beat down his opponent T. Everton Kennerly. In the hotly-contested race for Congressman-at-large, Joe Pool was declared winner over Des, Barry.

Fire Damages Earth Elevator Thursday

A portion of the Earth Elevator suffered heavy damage on Thursday morning when a grain storage facility was destroyed in a spectacular fire which raged out of control for approximately 2 hours, with a loss estimated at \$150,000.

An automatic fire alarm at the elevator, sounded a warning at 6:47 a. m. which was heard for several miles. The Earth Volunteer Fire Department rushed to the scene with two trucks. Roaring flames began to pour from the head house about 7 a. m. with the head house collapsing at 7:40.

The blaze was under partial control by 9 a. m., but smoke continued to belch forth from the huge storage for the biggest part of the day. Fire Departments from Earth, Springlake, Olton, Littlefield, and Muleshoe joined in extinguishing the raging fire. The blaze originated at the top of the sheet metal elevator according to a spokesman. Machinery toppled into the grain bins below. The fire departments prevented spread of the flames to other facilities, including two large warehouses, a mill house and office building. The firemen did an excellent job and are to be commended for their efforts.

Electric power in the immediate vicinity was temporarily disconnected. Spokesman for the company said that a small fire in the hen pit occurred Wednesday afternoon, but was quickly extinguished by Bunk Knox and Mike Dent. Knox checked the elevator at 9 p. m. Wednesday and Deputy V. L. Smith, Jr., fire chief, made a check during the night and everything was reported to be normal. Cause of the small blaze and Thursday's blaze has not been determined. Intermittent blazes flared up Thursday after the big fire was extinguished, but the five fire departments quickly put them out. One fireman was slightly injured when a pressure hose he was helping with, whipped loose (Cont. to Page 3)

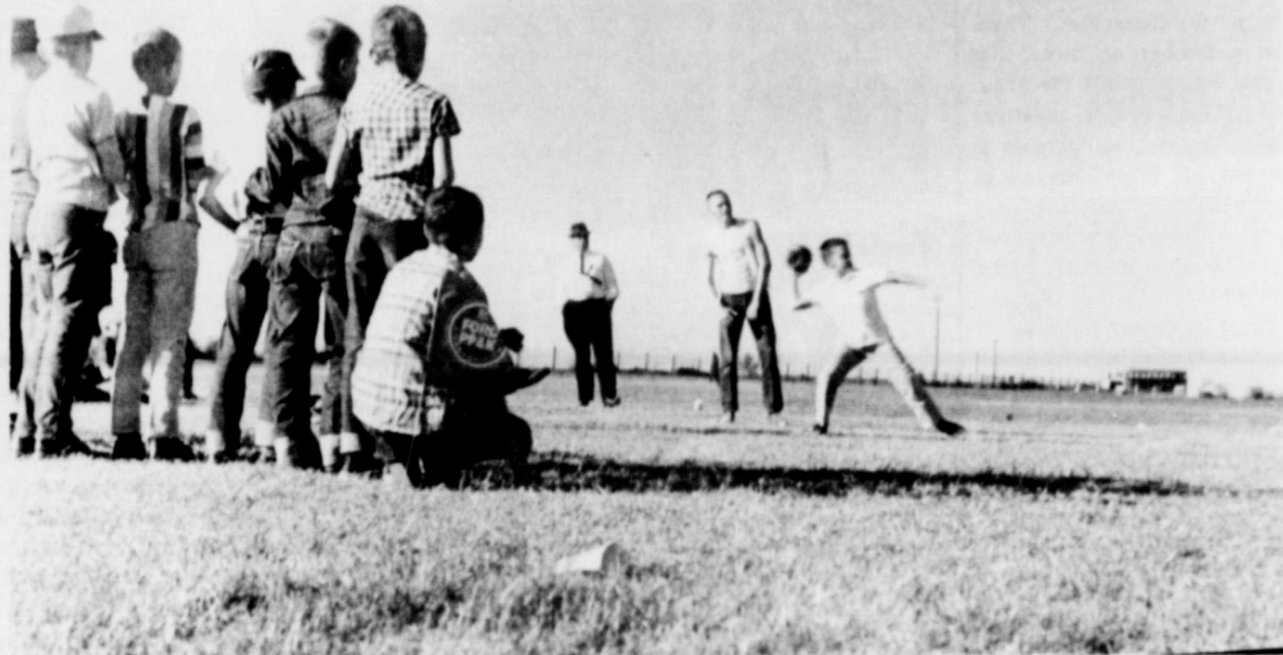

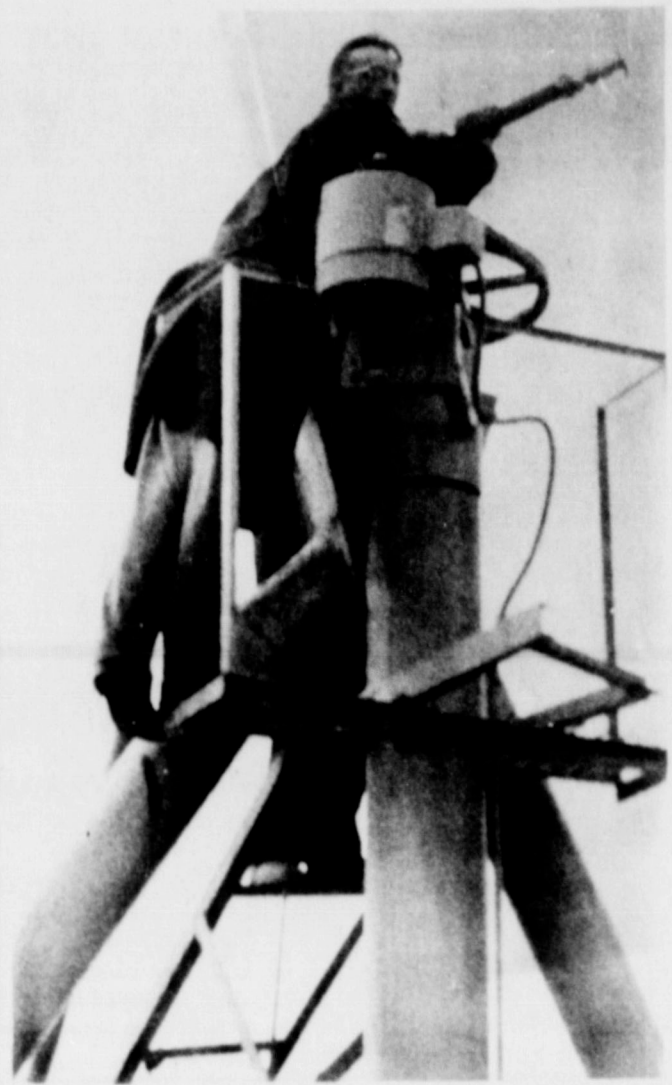
Webelos den met at the Jaycee building Monday night with 6 members present. The boys worked on Webelos requirements and played games dur-

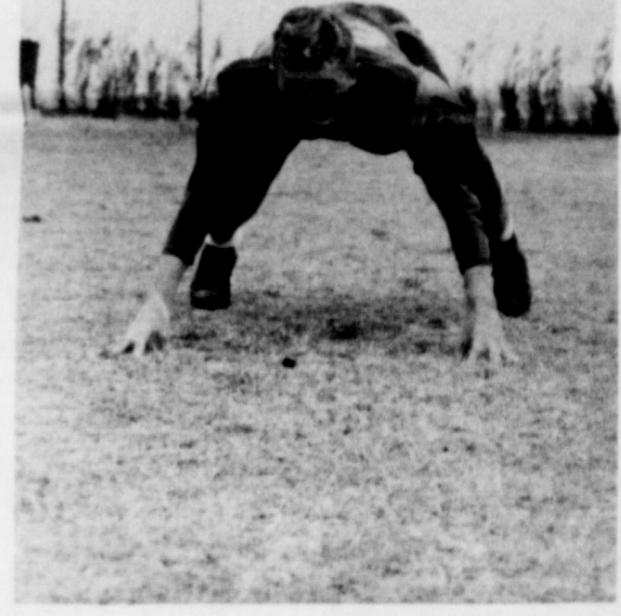
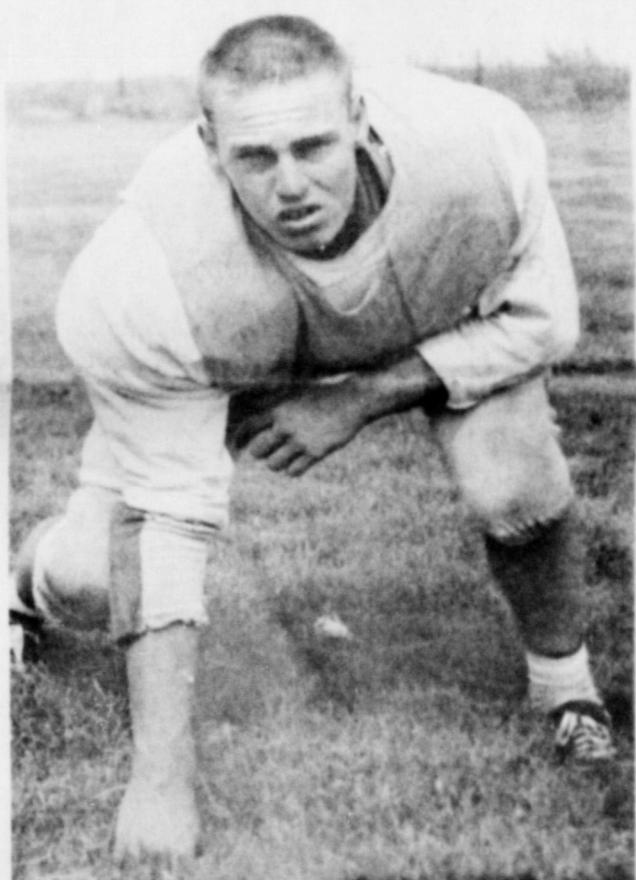

### OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

By—Vern Sanford

Right now is the time to make your deer hunt successful. Many a hunter will go into the woods this fall with a gun he's never seen before. He may not know how it will shoot, or even whether it will shoot. Up will jump a buck. He'll shoot . . . and miss. Or worse still, inflict a wound from which he may die later, without benefit to anyone. Hunting big game with a big

bore gun, without first getting acquainted with it, is one of the most senseless things a hunter can do.

Plain talk you say? That's what it's intended to be. It's fun to get in a little practice shooting. And that's what we're trying to encourage. Practice shooting not only improves your hunting skills and keeps the ammunition manufacturers in business, but it also provides the 11 per cent excise tax from which you derive better hunting. Fortunately most deer hunters own their guns. But a lot of hunters neglect them from year to year.

On the other hand there is the

spontaneous hunter, the fellow who decides all of a sudden to go hunting. He borrows or leases a gun for the occasion, gets a few cartridges, goes out and misses a few shots, then gripes about it the rest of his life.

One man I know won't lend a deer rifle for just that reason. He has several guns. In fact, gun collecting is one of his hobbies. He says if a man wants to hunt he should have enough interest to have a gun available that he knows something about.

Another hunter I know had a good deer rifle—in fact several of them—until his boys grew up. Then they took them over. For the last 20 or more years

he's borrowed a gun each year to hunt with and always gets his buck. But he knows guns, and he's well acquainted with the guns he borrows.

It is getting progressively easier for a hunter to get acquainted with his rifle. Scattered over the state are literally hundreds of rifle ranges where a person can shoot-in the gun. Many gun stores have a place where you can sight-in your rifle or take a few practice shots.

A little dry firing in your own home also is helpful. Here you get the practice of throwing the gun to your shoulder. You get the feel of it. And you learn how to line up the sights.

Deer rifles now are divided into categories.

First there is the lever action, short barrel rifle that usually is used with open sights. These are particularly well adapted to the brush country and the hill country. Basically .30/.30 caliber, they are adequate for the white-tailed deer. They are easy to handle and almost fool proof.

Then there is the bolt action rifle, usually equipped with the telescopic sight. Herein lies one of the problems. Despite the ruggedness of the sight or the mount, it is easier for this gun to get out of alignment. It should be shot-in before the season opens, then properly cased so the sight will not get out of alignment.

Last fall a man we know shot-in his gun, a new model 70 Winchester in the powerful .264 caliber. He had it equipped with one of the best variable scopes money could buy. On a hunting trip he stored it in a cloth case which he packed into the crowded luggage compartment of a small plane. When he got to Colorado he missed his first shot, at a big buck, by six feet. This year he vows he'll pack the gun differently and check it out when he gets into camp.
