Two elections are scheduled in the next few days, the Springlake School Trustee election which is Saturday, April 1, and the City Election, Tuesday, April 4 in Earth.

The School Trustee election will be held in the study hall of the high school building.

The polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Election judges and clerks will be R. H. Belov, George Richards, B. Campbell and Hershel Sanders with R. W. Kimbell serving as alternate.

Three posts will be filled at the election. A. E. Wheatley, Leon Dent and Roger Haberer, whose terms expire, have filed for re-election. Others that have filed as candidates are W. O. (Buzzy) Jones, Jack Angeley, James H. Busby and Mrs. Earl Parish.

Earth City Election Tuesday April 4

Voters will go to the polls Tuesday, April 4 to elect two aldermen in the Earth City Election. The terms of Weldon Barton and L. S. Griffin will expire.

Candidates for aldermen are Weldon Barton, who has filed his application for re-election, and M. E. Kelley, who has also filed for the post.

The election will be held in the usual polling place which is the Earth Community Building.

Election judge will be Carroll McDonald and clerks will be Mrs. Minnie Pate and Mrs. Lynn Glasscock.

The polls will be open at 7 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m.

Citizens are urged to go to the polls and vote in the Trustee Election and Earth Citizens are urged to vote in the City election.

Senator Election Tuesday

A United States Senator will also be elected, Tuesday to fill the unexpired term of Lyndon B. Johnson, who resigned after he was elected Vice-president.

During the time since his resignation and until his successor is elected, William A. Blakley, of Dallas, has been serving as interim senator under appointment by Gov. Daniel. Previously, Mr. Blakley had served for a time as Senator from Texas by appointment of Gov. Shivers.

There will appear the names of 71 Texans, who want to be Senator (one to be elected), on the printed ballot.

Later, on the campus of West Texas College, he engaged in boxing, and in 1958 at his graduation, he received his B. S. degree in P.E. Since then, he has been awarded his Master's degree in education. Before coming our way, Mr. Mahan coached at Happy and at Boys' Ranch at Tascosas, Texas.

During his sparetime he enjoys fishing and playing baseball, which is one of his favorite sports. This summer, Mr. Mahan will turn insurance adjuster for the Floyd West Company, working all over the state.

"Springlake school spirit is greatly improving," he believes. According to him, if there is one thing that could stand even more improvement, it would be to have more wins in all sports. 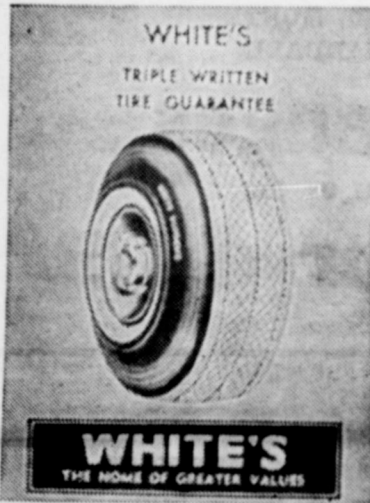

Senator Blakley Asks Extension Of Sugar Act

Senator William A. Blakley asked the Senate Finance Committee last week to give Texas growers an opportunity to show how they can solve the nation's sugar crisis.

Blakley wired the request to Senator Harry F. Byrd, chairman of the committee which will take up a house-approved bill to extend the sugar act through 1962. He released the following telegram through his state headquarters in Austin.

"I respectfully request hearings on HR 5463 in order that the people of Texas and other areas may have a full opportunity to present information and data to support their need and desire to join in the production and refining of sugar," Blakley's telegram said. "Hearings are urgently needed in order that your committee may fully consider the best interests of our domestic economy in this particular area before passing this legislation which is so vitally important."

Blakley has already joined with Senators Clinton Anderson of New Mexico and Robert Kerr of Oklahoma in sponsoring a senate bill to lift restrictions on Sugar Beet acres to at least 25,000 acres. If approved, increased acreage could open up a new and important industry in West Texas, leading to the establishment of Sugar Refineries, Blakley believes.

On a West Texas tour, Blakley said a solution to the Sugar problem exists "Right here in the great Plains."

"There should already be a flourishing Sugar Beet industry in this area just as we have a great Cane Sugar industry on the Texas Gulf Coast," He said. "I will do everything I can to help you accomplish this."
