Over 40,000 piano pupils from coast to coast will participate in this annual piano playing event held in 403 music centers throughout the country.

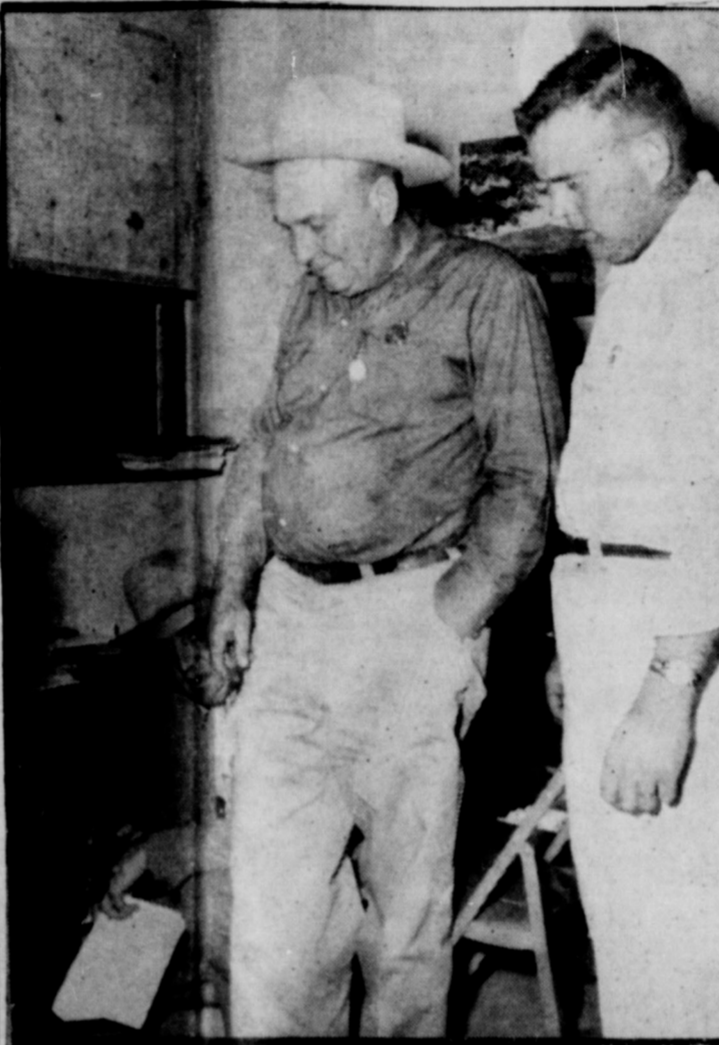

Two Springlake Firms Burglarized Friday Night, Safe And Money Taken

Two burglaries in Springlake Friday night netted the intruders a safe with its contents at one business and \$3 to \$4 in change at another.

Bold burglars pried open the front doors at Elroy's 66 Station and at the Busby Motor Company to gain entry.

A safe and its contents and about \$24 in the cash register were taken from the station. The total estimated value of the loss was \$500, made by owner, Elroy Wislan.

The safe, which had not been found Tuesday, also contained several important papers.

About \$3 or \$4 in nickels and dimes were missing from the automobile firm, according to Loyd Hood, manager. The intruders had pried open a locked cabinet but none of the contents were missing. No merchandise was taken from either firm.

The robberies were believed to have occurred after 11 p.m.

Deputies V. L. Smith of Olton and Joe Ebling of Earth conducted the investigation.

Several suspects were questioned, but no arrests had been made in connection with the burglaries.
