The most noticeable thing in this dazzling age is the rapid change taking place in all human activities. Yesterday, dingy steam locomotives — today, colorful diesels — tomorrow, brilliant atomic locomotion.

Yesterday, Earth was a cow-poke's waystop for makin' and molasses — today, it's a hotrod boulevard of flaming cars in quest of malts, movies and merriment.

Yesterday, we all lived in the country and worked for a living. Today, some "unfortunates" still live in the country and have to do 90 percent of their farming over a steaming hot cup of town coffee.

Of course, this is said in fun, but regardless of whoever or what ever wrought this revolutionary movement, our town is keeping perfect step with it. And the new social and economic gait calls for civic readjustments and reforms locally.

A few of these were discussed last week. This week I want to discuss building regulations and traffic.

The importance of codes regulating the construction, wiring, plumbing and heating of new dwellings and business buildings is well understood by contractors. About the only regulation in existence in Earth is an ordinance prescribing the installation of natural gas lines.

The location of new buildings with reference to property boundaries is not regulated here. As a result, there are houses so located that rain water from the eaves falls on adjoining property. This constitutes an infringement on the rights of a neighbor and a serious fire hazard as well.

Second. There are many justifiable criticisms of our traffic situation here. Can you visualize what would happen if Highway 70 were removed from Earth? Just such a thing MAY happen unless we cooperate with the Highway department by controlling traffic and parking inside the city limits.

As an example, let's look at a case in our own county. Through Littlefield almost a mile of business houses are situated along Highway 84. This constitutes an unnecessary slow down of through traffic, consequently it is scheduled for rerouting, which leaves said businesses facing the railroad tracks. When 70 is rerouted around Earth, we'll not even have the railroad tracks to face. 70 is the artery through which our life blood flows!

The only way we can satisfy the Highway Department is to widen 70 through Earth, inaugurate parallel parking and stop double parking in that thoroughfare. Shall we wait until we lose the Highway before we realize this?

Such problems as these face the next city administration. How will they be handled? Telephones, water rates, fire zone enforcement and many others loom on the horizon.

Local Youngsters Will Obtain Polio Vaccine

First and second grade students of Springlake Schools and Earth in Lamb County and Texas who received Salk polio vaccine blanks Tuesday according to Grade School Principal C. P. Martin.

Parents of the children are to sign the blanks and return them to school, not later than Friday, March 18, if they wish their child to receive the free vaccination.

However, signing the blank does not require the child to take the vaccine, therefore if any parent at a later date wishes to withdraw the request they may do so, but there will only be as much vaccine allotted as is signed for.

Mr. Martin reported that the local schools are hoping to be among the first to receive the vaccinations which will be given

some time in April. He said that the schools will probably be notified only twelve hours ahead of time and that parents should be in readiness at all times to have their child or children vaccinated. He said that if the child should at that time be gone, he more than likely would not have another chance to receive the vaccination.

A report on the effectiveness of the Salk vaccine in trial tests made on more than one million children is expected to be published about April 1, and whether or not the vaccine will be given this year depends on this report. Medical authorities are confident,

however, that the report will be favorable. George White, county chairman of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis said that some vaccine would be commercially available at a cost of about \$45 per immunization. Pregnant women will be given the vaccine free of charge by the Foundation. The vaccinations for local schools will be given at Sudan. Present organization plans call for one mother to be present for each five children receiving the vaccine.

The date for the vaccinations will be announced as soon as the Foundation releases the vaccine material. The vaccination consists of a series of three shots; the second to be given one week after the first, and the third to be given one month after the second.
