He will be very glad to answer any questions pertaining to the program. A group of concerned citizens from Sudan, Fieldton, Springlake, Earth, and Anton met at the community hall in Earth Friday for the purpose of mailing fund raising letters to businessmen, farmers, ranchers, and other individuals in the area.

The letters stated that we can have a successful growing season without damaging hail storms. In addition to suppressing hail over the entire county, the 1972 Better Weather, Inc. plan calls for side benefits of stimulating gentle rain fall from thunderstorms and it is a known fact that no tomatoes have developed out of seeded clouds. Hale County has supported a very successful hail suppression program since 1970 and they plan an even bigger program this year and if Lamb County goes in with Hale County this year a fourth airplane will be added for better protection. If Lamb County wants the benefits of such a program all we have to do is pay for it, according to members of the Lamb County Better Weather, Inc., but the full amount of money must be raised by March 20 because the government does not subsidize the program nor does any large or small chemical company. If the goal of \$160,000 dollars is not reached by March 20 a weather improvement program for the year will not be possible. This year's program is to include all of Lamb County and will run from May 10 through November 1. The rate per acre is divided into two categories: Dryland - 12¢ for landlord, 12¢ for tenant, 25¢ for owner-operator; Irrigated - 25¢ for landlord, 25¢ for tenant, 50¢ for owner-operator; \$25 for city homes, and \$25 and up for businesses. The Lamb County Better Weather, Inc. reminds everyone that time is short and they urge each individual's support in doing his small part to make this program the best and biggest success. 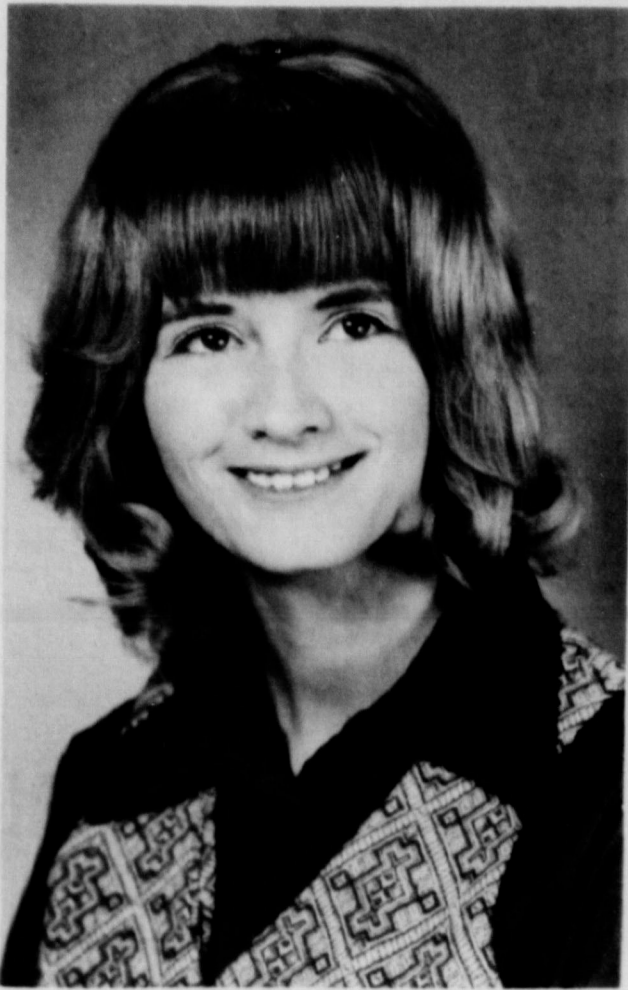
Applications Being Taken for Caretaker

Sharon Jackson was selected as point counter and Delma Gonzales and Rhonda Weaver will serve as color guards.

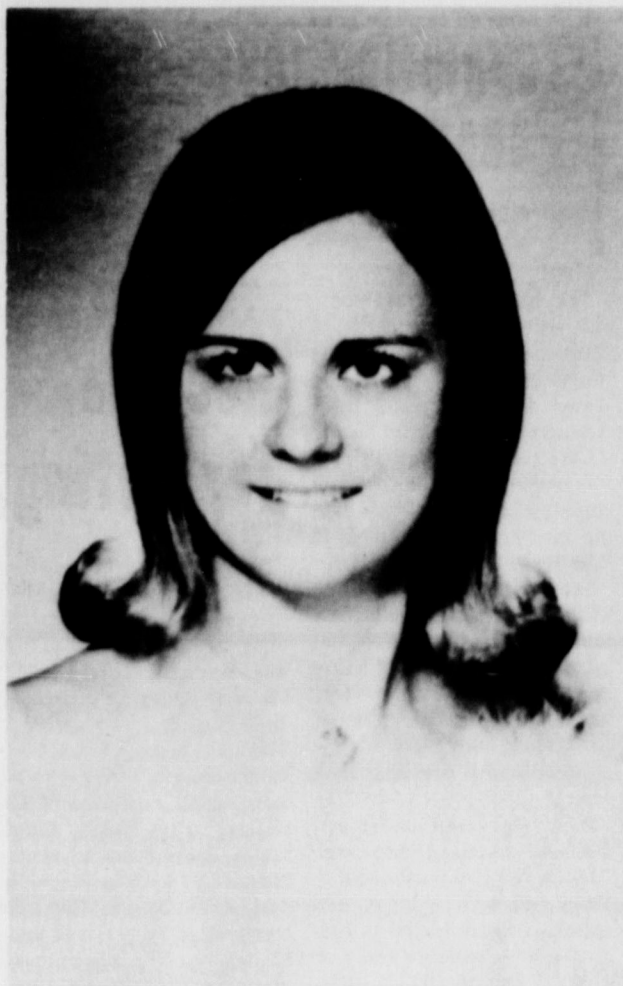
The meeting opened with an outside flag ceremony, the Pledge of Allegiance, the Brownie Promise, and the Brownie smile song.

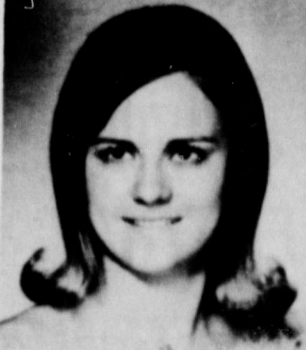

CHRISTIAN LOVE CHARACTERIZED

The next few weeks I want to write about the nature of Christian love. Read 1 Corinthians 13:4-7 and you will find listed at least fifteen characteristics I want to write about. Love covers such a multitude of things today I feel the necessity to define the kind of love Paul means in 1 Corinthians 13. Charles B. Williams says, "The word for love, 'agape' in Greek, expresses the highest form of love, not simply an emotional outburst of feeling toward another, as in mother, child, brother, sister, but an intelligent, voluntary placement of deep affection of another."

With that brief background let us move on to discover "love is very patient and kind." Phillips states it, "this love of which I speak is slow to lose patience--it looks for a way of being constructive." I like the way Phillips says that.

William Barclay further tells us that the word which is used in the Greek New Testament for patient always describes patience with people and not patience with circumstances.

This really puts it where we live. We come in contact with people every day. Are we patient with them? What about those at home? Often we are the least patient with those we are closest to. This includes friends as well as family.

It is sometimes difficult to be patient with those where you work.

Patience flows us sometimes when we are attempting to explain to those of slow understanding.

Christian love has a constructive side called kindness.

In the past I have known some Christians who were very unkind. The goal they desired to reach was admirable but the means by which they attempted to reach it was not in kindness. Nor patience for that matter. We often forget when we are dealing with human life we are often dealing with something as fragile as crystal. If it isn't handled carefully it can be shattered.

I recall seeing a cartoon of two little boys on the lawn of the church. One little fellow was on top of the other with his left hand on the other kid's throat and his right fist drawn back about to give him one across the lip. The caption read, "I'll teach you to 'be ye kind' if it's the last thing I do." His intention was good. His way of going about it was questionable.

Christian love is both patient and kind.
