Applications For Postmaster Of Springlake Open Until December 8

An examination for Postmaster at Springlake, Texas, \$4620 a year, will be open for acceptance of application until Dec. 8, 1959, the Commission announced today.

Competitors for the postmaster-vacancy in this city must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would command the respect and confidence of patrons of the post office. They must also show that their background will enable them to maintain simple records of accounts or that it has given them a knowledge of postal procedures.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

Quiet Colors Best Choice For Exterior

Choosing exterior color for a house shouldn't be as great a problem as most people make it, says William Manker, a leading Southern California color planning consultant.

Manker, a former art instructor and ceramicist who now works as a color planning consultant for California home builders, offers these suggestions for exterior color:

1. Unless you have a particular theme color in mind, consider using an off white. It is a good base color because it has the capability of attracting other colors to it. Off white can be used effectively as a sidewall or roof color, but rarely for both.

2. Whatever color is chosen for sidewalls, Manker prefers a neutral shade of asphalt shingles for the roof, such as one of the soft, earthy, brown colors or a blue-gray blend. He points out that a roof lasts for many years, and a neutral color here does not restrict the home owner's choice of color for re-painting.

3. When off white is selected for sidewalls and a neutral shade for the roof, almost any color can be chosen for trim. Manker suggests caution here, however, since a color on windows and trim that is too sharp or contrasty can make a house appear "chopped up." A good idea, he says, is to use a light pastel color on trim and windows, possibly adding a "bright spot" or two of accent color for the entrance door or detail at the entrance.

4. In general, women in the family should be given the "say-so" on colors, inside and out. Manker says this is because women not only are more conscious of color and its value, but, as a rule, can see colors better than many men. About ninety percent of women, he says, have good color perception, while only about 65 percent of men can see colors well.

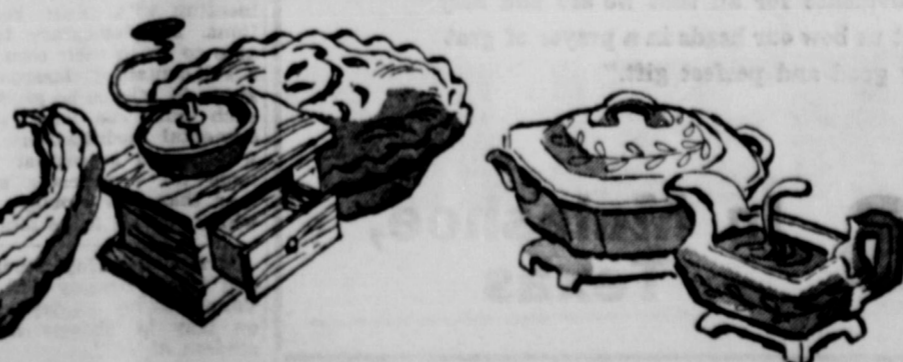

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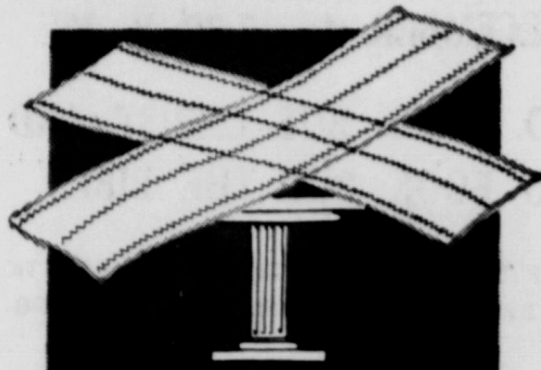

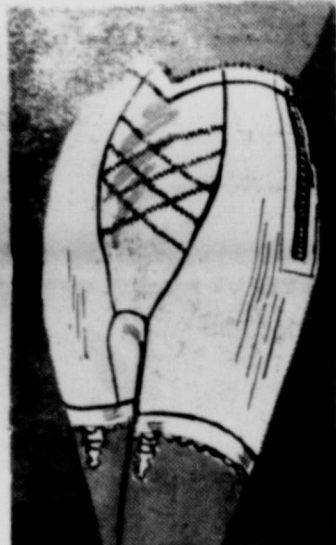

The camp, located at Kerrville in the Hill country of Central Texas, is free to any crippled, blind, deaf or mute child between the ages of seven and 16. The 16 permanent buildings dotting the 504 hillside acres represent an investment of more than \$600,000.

At the camp, these youngsters who have been denied a normal childhood through no fault of their own learn to shed their shyness imposed by their handicaps. By mutual association with other handicapped children and by skillful and gentle counseling, these youngsters have found the freedom to grow, mentally and spiritually, into useful citizens of tomorrow.

While the Lions are paying tribute to their camp, we would like to pay tribute to the Lions and their friends who have supported this great venture of the heart. We know a man never stands so straight as when he stoops to help a crippled child.

Curriculum Revision Conference Held

Texas Public School Curriculum Reports and Revision Recommendations were made in Lubbock at Monterey High, Saturday, November 14th by the Texas Classroom Teachers Association Conference.

Mr. W. R. Goodson, Coordinator, Texas Curriculum Studies, Texas Education Agency, gave the "Overview of the Texas Curriculum Study. He said that the compilation of data would go on beginning in March to such time as the findings would be completed as recommended. After this, a period of five or more years would be taken to find out which recommendations selected were working best throughout the state. After the overview, sectional meetings were in session. This writer attended the Science Department. The first general science session, for all grades, started at eleven and discussions went on until about noon. The chairman of this study group was Mr. Glen Harrison of Plainview and a list of resource persons among whom was Texas Techs representative, J. W. Day.

Mr. Day carried further what Mr. Goodson had already said that some schools will not go beyond grade nine in science for most of their pupils' abilities, while the especially gifted will be encouraged to go even to the thirteenth grade in science. These will be pupils who by their special aptitudes for science are able to do much independent laboratory work independently and on their own free time. Mr. Day said that it would be better for high schools, as well as elementary schools to accomplish or try to accomplish a few things well, rather than to do much in science haphazardly.

Several comments and reports were made from the floor, during the general session. Andrew School was asked to make a report of its outstanding science program and several other reports were made. The Springlake Elementary School System was the only school reporting a science workshop conducted by the science text-book company's representatives. Much interest was shown. In the afternoon, the elementary science teachers and other interested officials discussed for another hour-and-a-half, different methods used in each school. "The mobile laboratory idea, used by the Springlake School System was related and it was found that other schools used this method in varying degrees.

Mr. Harrison summed up the meeting with these recommendations. All elementary teachers be able to teach their own science in a self-contained classroom, a state guide in science be given, and that such guide be used with environmental modifications, also he was partial to regular laboratory tools for elementary schools rather than the mobile laboratory which seemed to be much used.

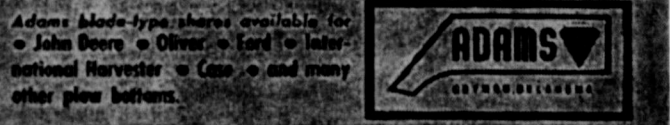

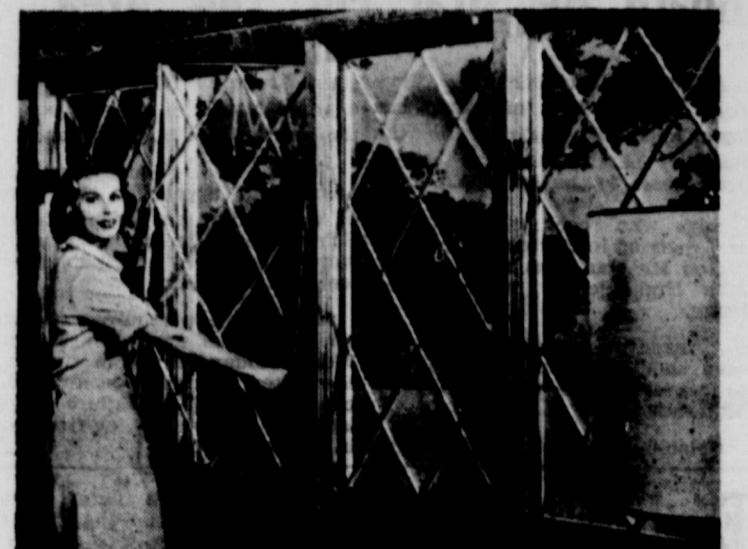

Time-Tested Building Material

Asphalt Valued By Man For 50 Centuries

One of the most thoroughly tested home building materials in use today is asphalt. Its waterproofing abilities were first discovered more than 5,000 years ago. Today it is the principal ingredient in asphalt shingles, the most popular roofing material in the United States.

One of the earliest uses of asphalt was to waterproof the reed basket that floated the baby Moses through the bulrushes. Noah caulked his ark with asphalt and workmen on the Tower of Babel used asphalt as mortar for the block walls. Egyptians developed an asphalt mixture to help preserve mummies and Babylonians used asphalt to build walls.

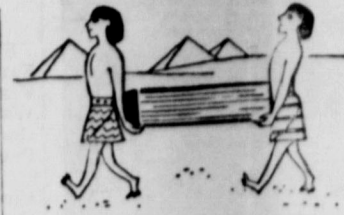
The early Greek nations prized asphalt so highly that wars were fought over possession of areas where "magic asphalt" was a natural resource. Marc Antony gave large asphalt producing



areas to Cleopatra as a gift fit for a queen.

The first formula for asphalt roofing was discovered in the late eighteenth century and years of research that followed led to the development of modern asphalt shingles.

The effective protection of asphalt shingles is provided by saturating felt with waterproof



asphalt. To this is added a heavier asphalt shield to help protect the saturated felt from the heat of the sun and rough weather.

More weather resistance is insured with a final surface of mineral granules. These make the roof more durable by giving the shingle a tough coat of rock that resists wear and keeps the sun from drying out delicate oils in the asphalt. The granules also provide color and fire-resistance.
