covered by McKenzie's Raiders in 1872 when they were in search of the Comanches' hiding place, is filled with salt or sodium. SPADE-This townsite was originally part of the famous Spade Ranch and was named after the Spade brand because it could not be altered by cattle rustlers. SPRINGLAKE-The Springlake Ranch, named for a large spring-fed lake about fifteen miles away, provided the name for this town. SPRINGLAKE SCHOOL-This name derived from the spring-fed lake nearby.

SUDAN-The adaptability of the soil around this town for the growing of Sudan grass provided the name for this town. SUDAN AIR FIELD-The airfield is near the town of Sudan. YELLOW HOUSE-When this site became headquarters for a division of the XIT Ranch in 1880, it was so named because of the yellow color of the clay in the nearby Yellow House Canyon. YELLOW LAKE-This lake was named for the yellow color of the soil around it and for the Yellow House Ranch on which the lake is located.

Local Students Compete In Houston Stock Show

Melvin Chisum, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Springlake-Earth High School announced that Randy Bills, Elaine Bills, Brad Bridges, Jeff Washington, Allen Been, Micky Price, Kirk O'Hair, Petra Lewis and Cary Sawyer (representing 4-H) will compete in the Junior Division of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo next week.

The group will leave Monday, February 24 at 5 a. m. and return home Saturday, March 1. They will spend Monday night in Temple and arrive in Houston Tuesday afternoon.

This is the largest junior livestock show in the country. These young people will join adult exhibitors in seeking premiums of more than \$400,000, a new record for the Houston show. Around 19,000 entries are expected.

The show will again be held in the show's \$12.5 million facility with rodeo performances in the Astrodome.

All major beef and dairy breeds, swine, sheep and goats, horses, rabbits and poultry will compete for top premiums offered.

A record 22 auction sales will be held this year, including sales for three breeds which have never been sold at auction at the Houston show.

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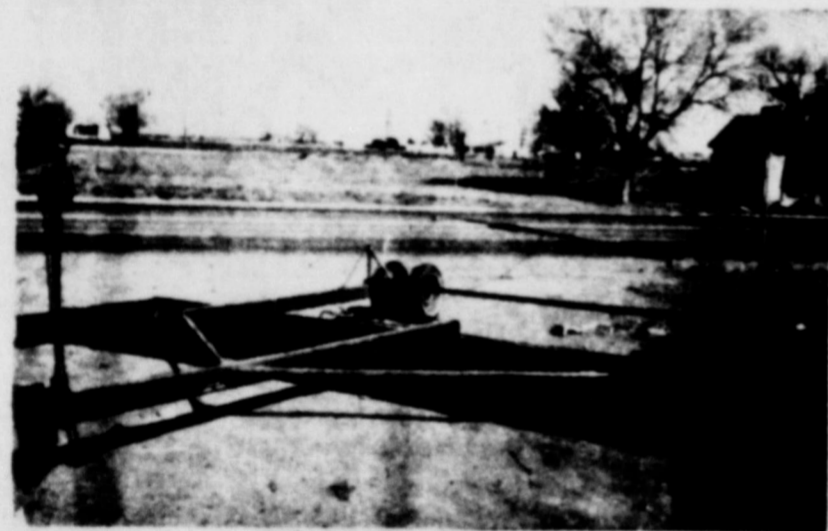
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Mr. & Miss Irresistible Named

Cooperative Association and is a deacon of the First Baptist Church of Olton and is a Sunday School teacher for a class of 10-year old boys.

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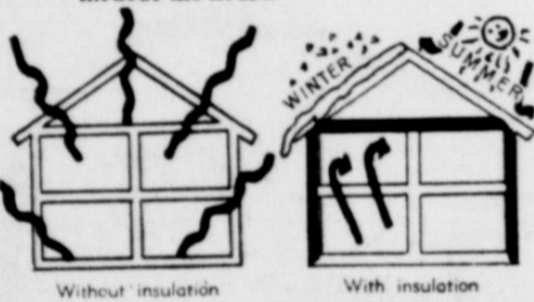

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TEXAS TALK

COTTON PLANTING — Temperatures, even when considerably above freezing, severely limit the growth of cotton. This is especially true for planting time. It is generally agreed that cotton emerges faster and grows better when the seeds are not planted until the soil temperature 8 inches below the surface stays above 60 degrees Fahrenheit for at least ten days. Depending on who is running the figures, average planting time for cotton on the Plains of Texas is either May 3rd or 4th.

MAJOR GROUPS — Formal designation of the three major cotton groups is described by authorities as: Asiatic Diploid, American Diploid and American Amphidiploid. Polynesian hybrids are generally grouped with the American Amphidiploid. Diploid refers to the composition of the cotton cell. Hybrids are developed to improve staple qualities, shorten growing season and enhance drought resistance.
