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## School To Purchase Lights And Busses

In the regular meeting of the Springlake-Earth School Board Monday, November 11 the board discussed the purchase of new lights for Wolverine Stadium and two new school busses along with other business on the agenda.

Looking at the month's enrollment figures the board noted an increase of fourteen students over last month. Total enrollment for this month is 892 students as opposed to 882 last month's enrollment at this time. The breakdown of this total enrollment shows 467 in Elementary, 158 in Junior High, 243 in High School and 29 in Special Education.

The board then decided to purchase new lights for Wolverine Stadium. The new lights will top 80 foot poles and are being purchased at a cost of approximately \$5,700. The necessary materials will be provided by Southwestern Public Service at wholesale cost. Dave Cavitt, manager of the local SWPS, has agreed to donate the labor.

The new lighting facilities will be a nice addition for the field. Plans are to place the poles in the rear of the bleachers rather than in front as they now stand. The present lights and poles will be offered for sale.

In other action the board decided to buy two new school busses. The busses are to be purchased through the state allocation transportation fund. To be replaced are a 1959 Chevrolet, 54 passenger bus; and 1956 International, 72 passenger.

Last year on bids, the State Board of Control listed the following quotations for a 54 passenger bus: March-\$5,127; April-\$4,130; May-\$5,084; and June-\$3,225. During the same months last year the following bids were given for a 74 passenger bus: March-\$6,326; April-\$6,338; May-\$6,326; June-\$6,370.

The board members also approved the hiring of Mrs. Robert Bridge as tax assessor-collector for the school. Mrs. Bridge will fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mrs. Dallas Clynch.

The board voted to buy new Cyclorama Curtains for the stage. The back curtains will be purchased from Waco Stage Equipment Company at a cost of \$460. Including installation the cost would have been \$560, but the board voted to install the curtains with school personnel.

In final action the members reviewed delinquent taxes and decided to postpone action. Present for the meeting were, Bill Mann, school superintendent; Orval Cleavinger, president; John Bridges, P. A. Washington, Norman Hinchliffe, and Weldon Barton.

## Voters To Decide City Sales Tax Issue December 17

The marching competition began at 10 a. m. in Levelland with 35 bands participating. Entered in the class A competition were 13 bands with Springlake-Earth, Falls, and Spur earning firsts. The only second division given in Class A went to Happy. A total of ten Division I ratings were given during the day with the AA competition ending at 5 p. m.

Judges for the event were Pat Patterson of Sweetwater, James Jerrell of Ft. Stockton, and Tim Jones of Hamlin.

Bill Woods of Littlefield was contest chairman and to his knowledge and foresight the participating bands were able to shoot their films on a background of beautiful green grass. The Littlefield schools had the field painted at a cost of over \$400 especially for the contest, giving the bands a better marching surface and a brighter background for the color films.

The Wolverine Band film will be submitted to be presented at the Texas Band Masters Convention next summer before an audience of over 2000 band directors.

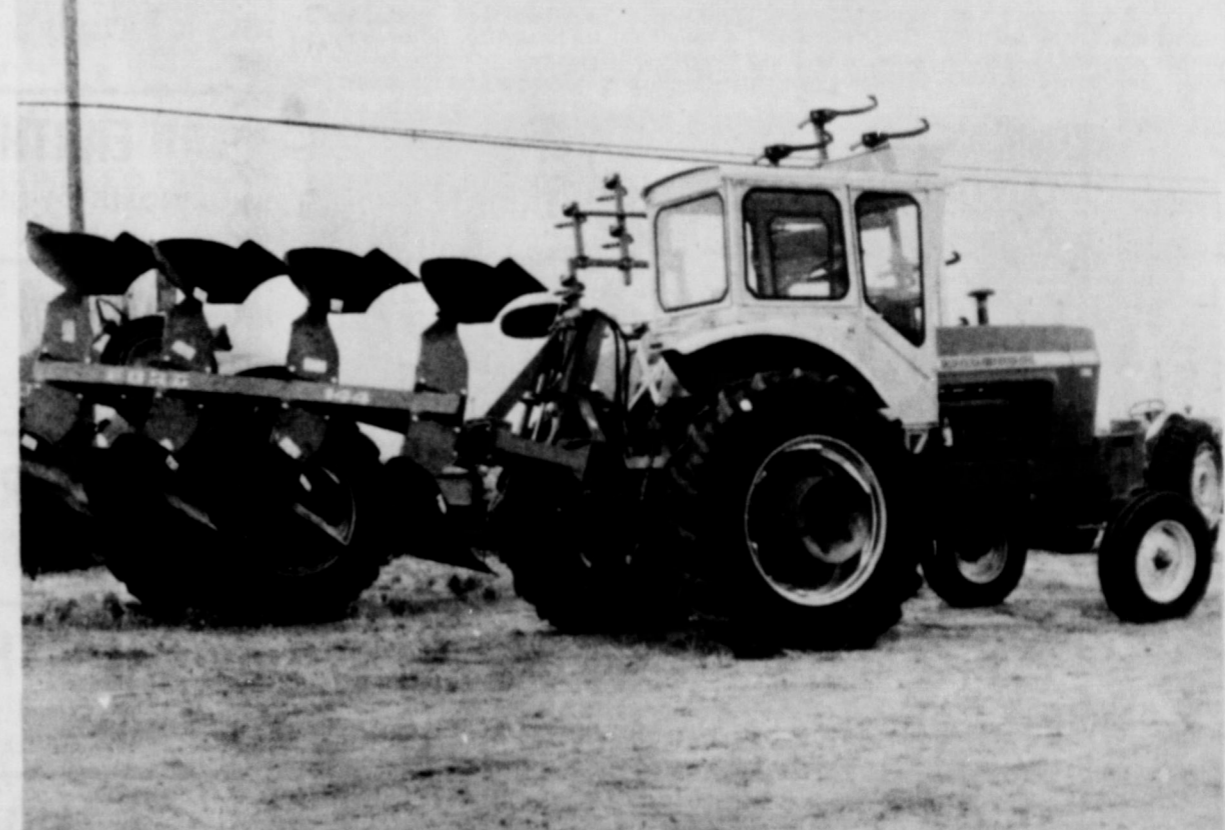

## Wolverines Gamble Fails, Loose 23-22

What is the cost for experience? Sometimes it is very costly, but the price must be paid, and the young Wolverine team of Springlake-Earth has been paying dearly.

Friday night the Wolverines fought hard to bring off a victory against Vega. It all boiled down to one big play, kick for one point and be satisfied with a tie or gamble and go for broke.

The Wolverines did gamble, because they did not want to settle for anything less than victory. The price was high, but the thought of victory forced that decision, and all the local fans were proud to see they had the heart to try.

Things started fast and furious from start to the finish of the Vega game. The Wolverines wasted little time after receiving the kickoff to show they wanted to play.

Jerry Barden started things rolling with Hoyt Glasscock picking out one yard up the middle followed by Bridges getting 8. Trying the same play with Bridges being trapped for no gain, and facing a fourth and one, Barton booted the ball to the 15 yard line where a host of Wolverines forced the Vega ball carrier to fumble and the Wolverines recovered on the 15 yard line.

Terry Bridge was stopped for no gain on the first down but on his second effort found running room and scampered 15 yards to pay dirt. Hoyt kicked the extra point and with the clock showing 9:30 left to play in the first quarter the Wolverines had a 7 to 0 lead.

Both teams settled down and really played hard defensive ball and it was late in the second quarter with only 4:37 left to play before Jackie Richardson the shifty little Vega quarterback went over on a keeper play from one yard out. Preston Davis kicked the extra point and the score was all tied up 7-7.

After the kickoff to the Wolverines Barden had a pass intercepted on the 40 yard line and it took 8 plays, before Jackie Richardson fooled the entire squad on some beautiful ball handling and on a keeper rolled out and scored from 17 yards away. Felix Ramirez ran the extra point and put Vega out in front 15-7.

This did not seem to discourage the Wolverines for Bridges picked up 10 yards up the middle followed by another 38 yard

scamper through the middle of the Vega line and Hoyt added 2 yards before the Wolverines pulled a meeky one themselves.

Hoyt took the handoff and tossed a strike to Steve Sanderson who hauled the ball in and was finally brought down on the 3 yard line. With only 4 seconds left to play Bridges slashed his way up the middle for the Wolverine touchdown. 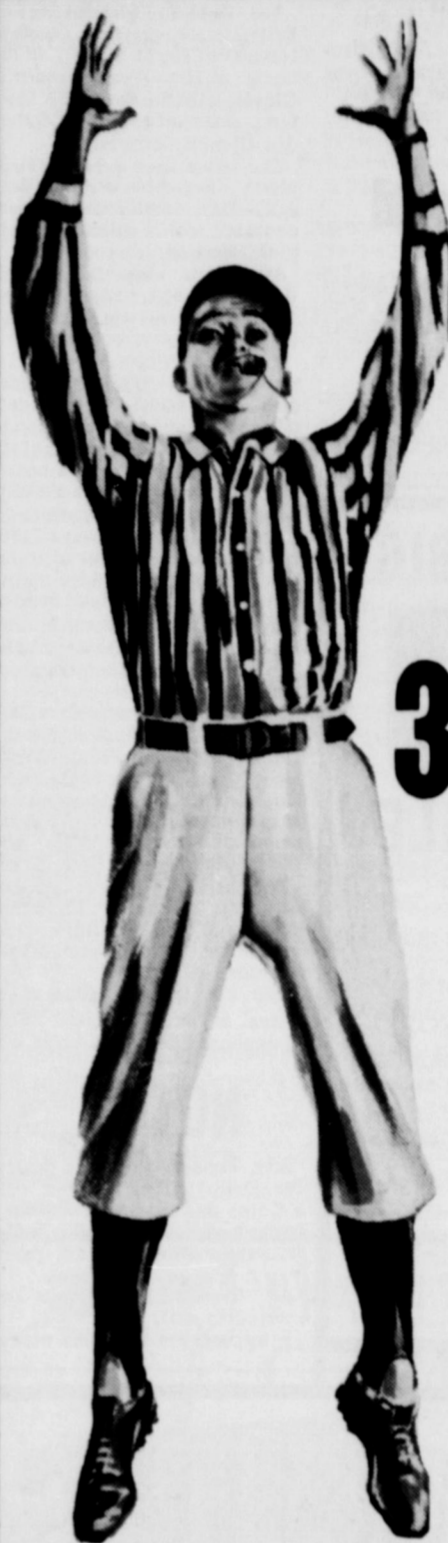

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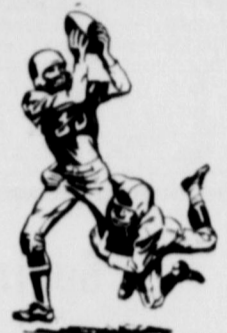

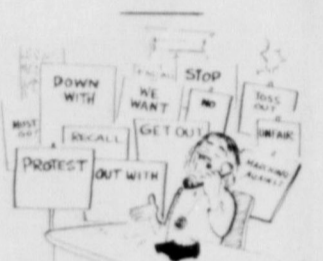
## Jr High Defeats Vega

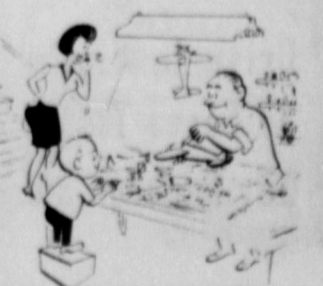

NO. 70 AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE (S); APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLAR-

## ING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EARTH, LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Earth, Texas, on the 17th day of December, 1968, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

Section 2. That said Election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit: Polling Place-City Hall, Earth, Texas.

Presiding Officers W. C. MAXCEY

Presiding Judge DAVE CAVITT Alternate Presiding Judge

The presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two (2) clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the

City of Earth, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

## OFFICIAL BALLOT

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6, 66, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the bal-

lot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City of Earth, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place of the City of Earth not less than Twenty (20) days prior to the date set

herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the EARTH NEWS-SUN is a newspaper published within the City of Earth, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City of Earth.

Section 7. SEVERABILITY. If any section or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared to be void, ineffective or unconstitutional for any cause whatsoever, such declaration or holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining Sections and provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 8. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. The fact that the City of Earth needs more revenue for the efficient operation, growth and improvements, constitutes and creates an urgent necessity,

requiring that this ordinance be immediately passed as an emergency measure and any and all rules, if any, requiring more than one reading are suspended, and this ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and shall be in force and effect immediately from and after its passage, and as required by law. PASSED AND APPROVED, this 8th day of November, 1968.



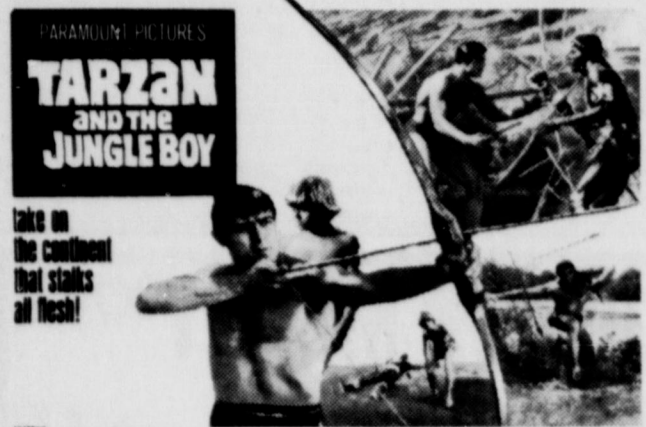
