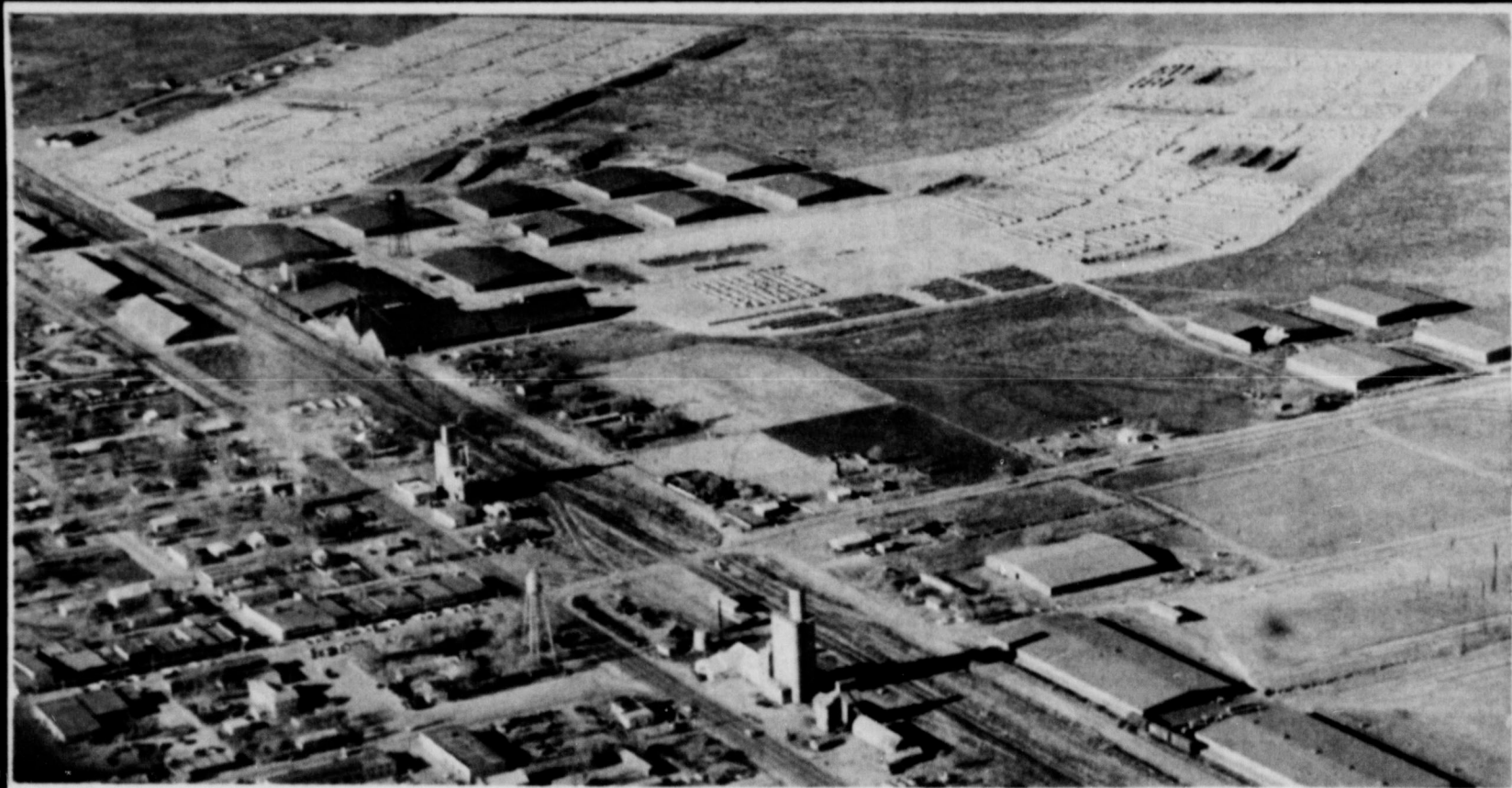

## Cotton Harvest On Increase Over Plains

Cotton harvesting continued to increase on the South Plains during the past week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing of the USDA.

The total number of samples classed during the week ending Wednesday, October 14th at the Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa offices amounted to 14,200. This brings the season total to 24,850, compared to 39,200 as of the same date last year. Daily samples receipts at the three offices are now running about 4,250 samples. Receipts are expected to increase this week as some farmers begin stripping operations.

Trading in the new crop cotton on the Lubbock market has been rather slow due to the small volume of cotton harvested. Prices quoted range from about loan levels to 45 points above the CCC loan rates for White grades, and 35 to 100 points over the loan for Light Spotted grades.

Quotations for some of the predominant grades and staples are: Middling 15/16, 28.75, Mid-

ling 31/32, 29.35, SMS 15/16, 27.65, SLM 31/32, 28.10, Middling Light Spotted 31/32, 28.30. Prices paid farmers for cotton seed continue to average \$45 per ton.

## Highlights and Sidelights

An increase of \$107,000,000 in state expenditures for higher education and doubled tuitions in state colleges and universities is proposed.

Texas Commission on Higher Education recommends a \$457,100,000 budget for upper level institutions during the 1965-67 biennium. Figure includes \$307,500,000 for 22 state-supported senior colleges and universities. Tuitions under the Commission's recommendation would be hiked from \$50 to \$100 a semester. Last increase was in 1957, when the rate was raised from \$25. If the Legislature approves this hike, revenues would be boosted \$33,000,000, leaving some \$74,000,000 more needed from tax funds.

Overall budget increase of 45.2 per cent would permit a 23 per cent faculty salary raise. Previously, the Commission had asked a \$5,900,000 supplemental appropriation for faculty salaries.

Commission also recommended "Phasing out" Texas Southern University's law school.

Gov. John Connally returned from the Southern Governors' Conference in San Antonio with a new honor and a new assignment.

Already chairman of the National Democratic Governors' Caucus, he was unanimously elected chairman of the Southern Conference of chief executives.

In a three-day session, the governors discussed a variety of state problems and adopted 14 resolutions. Among the latter was one urging a federal constitutional amendment to permit states to take other factors than population into consideration in reapportioning their senates. Resolution was aimed at nullifying a U.S. Supreme Court decision ordering both houses of state legislatures apportioned on the basis of population alone.

Three governors blocked action on Alabama Gov. George Wallace's resolution calling on the federal government to "leave operation of public schools entirely in the hands of the state. State Democratic Committee has authorized Chairman Marvin Watson of Daingerfield to enter a bid for the 1968 Democratic Convention in Texas.

Watson will name a committee to consider possible host cities.

Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for a man convicted of murder, because his attorney filed an appeal after the deadline. Court heard argument that the trial attorney for the defendant lacked sufficient experience.

Third Court of Civil Appeals heard pleas that the new state loan shark law was applied unconstitutionally in an Austin district court. Court had ordered package store owner E. L. Parker to stop lending money at rates over 10 per cent without a license.

State Supreme Court upheld an appellate court's "time is of the essence" ruling in deciding the contract contest between Concord Oil Company of San Antonio and Alco Oil and Gas of Illinois. Court said termination of the contract by letter held precedence over a telephone promise to "wait and see."

Witnesses protesting adoption of three high school biology textbooks charged that evolution is an atheistic, unscientific and materialistic theory that should not be taught in public schools.

State Textbook Committee took protests into consideration after a public hearing. Actually, eight books on the list were opposed. Principal targets were the three books developed by the National Science Foundation.

Texas Railroad Commission set oil production for November at 28.4 per cent of potential.

Figure represents a slight increase over October, which was limited to 2,860,000 barrels daily under a 27.9 per cent of potential order.

A statewide citizens committee has approved a new program of mental health services. Earlier, a steering committee

## A Message From A Guy Named George...

A MESSAGE FROM A GUY NAMED GEORGE

Dear Fellow Citizen: My name is George. I'm an all-around handyman-and I'd like you to feel free to use my services for any and all chores, errands and duties which you

had recommended creation of a single agency, Texas Department of Mental Health, to administer state-financed mental health services, including all mental hospital facilities.

Earlier, he had lauded Gulf States Marine Commission for efforts to develop the fishing industry and bring sea resources to the public for general benefit.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr told Texas Water Conservation Association all units of government must work with private enterprise and individuals to assure a water supply adequate to meet Texas needs.

Brig. Gen. R. H. Free, commander of U.S. Army Engineers, said Texas must have an overall program of water development.

The screwworm eradication program, which was conceived by individual livestock producers in Texas and later embraced by State and Federal animal health authorities, now is such a big success that only 102 cases of screwworm infestation have been reported in Texas this year. This compares to 3,000 by this time in 1963, and 50,000 cases in the last half of 1962.

Employment statistics from the Texas Employment Commission shows a big increase in August. There were 3,322,300 jobholders in the non-farm category in July, compared with 3,325,600 in August. More significant was a drop in unemployment; 152,500 were looking for work in August, compared to 159,500 in July, and 174,500 in August of 1963.

Governor's committee on Aging, chaired by State Senator Walter H. Richter of Gonzales, will ask the next Legislature to establish a permanent Texas Commission on Aging.

Texas' 1964-65 citrus crop will be four and a half times greater than last season's 740,000 boxes reports USDA's Crop and Livestock reporting service.

CLRS estimated a 3,400,000 box fruit crop for the coming season, including 2,400,000 boxes of grapefruit and 1,000,000 boxes of oranges.

Widespread showers and heavy rains in the Falcon Reservoir watershed of the Lower Rio Grande Valley were credited with assuring proper fruit sizing.

State Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst postponed until December 15 the hearing on an application from Portland Savings and Loan Association.

Attorney General Carr filed two more suits alleging slant hole oil well activities in five Rusk County wells against H. L. Long and J. K. Maxwell, both of Kilgore.

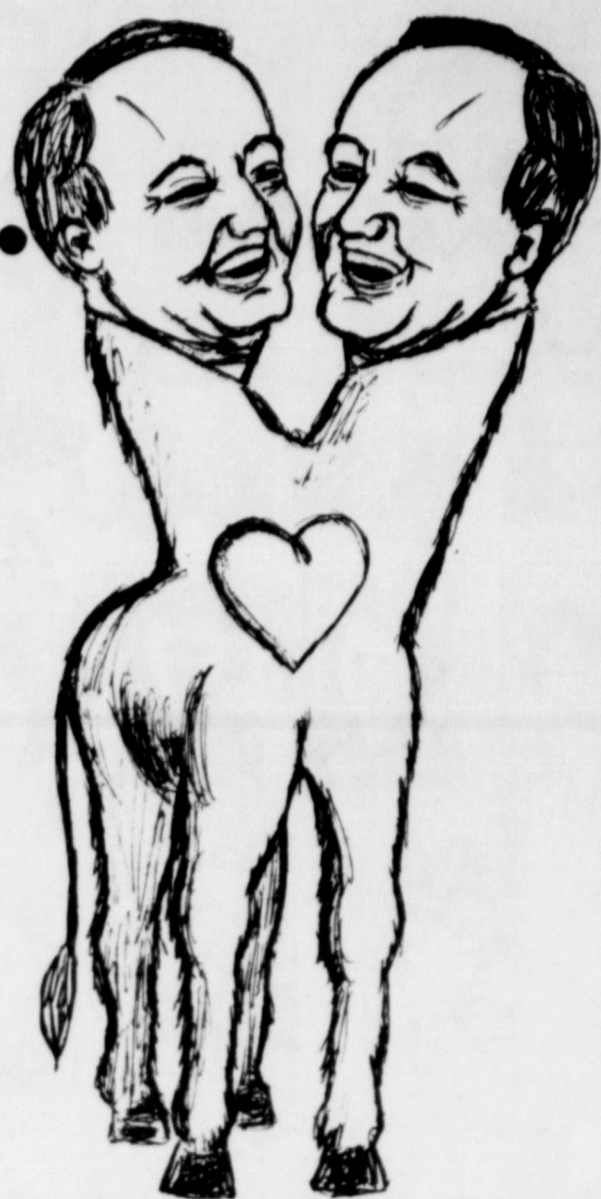

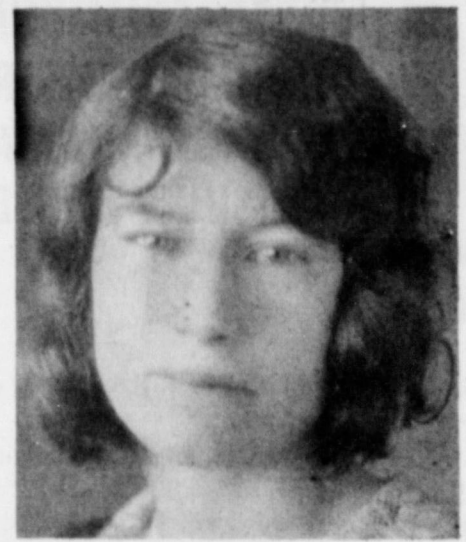

# Defoliation Is Important Step in Cotton Harvesting

If and when to defoliate is more than likely one of the problems cotton farmers are considering at this time. Defoliation to the cotton farmer is a very important step in harvesting, but it can also be very costly and damaging if used too early. Maturity of the cotton boll is the prime factor to be considered cautions W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Agricultural Marketing Service's Cotton Classing Office, Lubbock, Texas. An Extension Service Bulletin suggests that at least 60 per cent of the bolls on a cotton stalk should be open before applying defoliant. The bulletin gives detailed instructions on defoliating, types of materials available, and conditions under which they are recommended.

because when the defoliant is applied and becomes effective, the maturity processes are stopped. Then, when the cotton is harvested, which in most cases included mature and immature bolls, chances are that the classification assigned to the staple length will be Wasty. Wasty cotton is defined as cotton which has a fiber that is weak, irregular, and immature, and such cotton carries a price penalty. If too many bolls are immature, the lint turnout is usually reduced, so the farmer that defoliates too early loses in two ways, a reduced grade and less cotton. Your County Agent has a bulletin which gives specific and detailed information as to when, how, and what of defoliants. It would be wise to study all information available before defoliating your cotton.

## National Cleaner Air Week October 25-31

You may be able to choose the water you drink and be selective about your choice of food, but whatever air is around you is the air you are going to breathe.

As a matter of fact, you automatically breathe about 80 pounds or 15,000 quarts of whatever air is available each day, while you only eat about three pounds of food and drink at the most about four quarts of water.

A healthy mind and body requires clean, fresh air. This fact coupled with the growing air pollution problem caused by an ever growing human and industrial population is causing concern about the state of our air.

And because of this concern, President Johnson set aside October 25 through 31 as Cleaner Air Week.

This is an excellent period for all of us to evaluate the air cleanliness of our communities. If it's not all that it should be, then it is time to evaluate the efforts the community is making to control air cleanliness.

If isn't only the big industrial cities that have difficulties, a Texas town that has any kind of industry, chemical plants, petroleum refineries, cotton gins or such, may have air pollution without realizing it. Should there be such a problem it certainly would be well to take inventory of the efforts your community is making in your behalf, regarding cleaner air.

Already there is much study and effort being done in Texas

to evaluate and remedy some of the air pollution problems. The State Department of Health has completed its part in a national air pollution appraisal.

In addition, the Health Department, through the cooperation of local health units, and the National Air Sampling Network of the Public Health Service, maintains twenty-four air sampling stations in points of highest population around the State.

Air samples collected at these stations are analyzed for degree of pollution loading and radioactivity.

One city and two counties have their own separate programs for studying air pollution. And several have an air pollution committee.

Dear Mr. Congressman:

This letter is concerned with issues which are vital to our particular section of the country. I have some very definite convictions about certain matters, and I would welcome the opportunity of discussing these issues face to face if your schedule could be arranged to do so.

In my opinion the economic growth of West Texas has been retarded by the foreign investments of our federal government. Through the Oil Compact, Texas has been forced to absorb a great percentage of foreign oil, while our own wells have been allowed to produce on the maximum of only 10 days a month. In my opinion, this is not fair to our area.

I believe that the cattlemen in our district have a just complaint over the importation of foreign beef, and that the farmers of our area have been denied support and encouragement to raise sugar beets and other crops because of foreign imports.

I am concerned that our district has lagged behind in the development of Interstate Highways, and in industrial development until this political year.

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## Demand For Farm Products Up, But Prices Lower

An increase demand for farm products, increased farm production and stocks, increased production expenses, and lower prices for farmers make up today's general agricultural situation, reports John G. McHaney Extension economist, Texas A&M University.

Increasing personal income and an expanding population point to continued gains in consumer demand for farm products through the remainder of 1964. McHaney contributes income gains to increasing employment, rising wages, larger dividends, surge in corporate profits, and reduction in income tax rates.

Output of farm products continues to increase and will likely total above last year's level, says McHaney, and stocks of most crops were larger at the beginning of the present marketing year. Crop indications as of July 1 were brighter than those a year earlier, and the upturn in yields is expected to continue.

Production of livestock and livestock products in January-June, 1964 period was four or

five percent above last year and is expected to total a little above 1963 during July-December of this year.

Prices received by farmers in the first half of 1964 averaged two percent below last year. For the year as a whole, they are expected to average about three percent below 1963.

Although realized net farm income has remained relatively steady for the past decade, averaging about \$12 billion annually, the number of farmers and ranchers has declined steadily from 4.8 million in 1954 to 3.5 million at the present. Thus the average income per farm is rising this year to about \$3,500 compared with about \$2,500 in 1954.

Farmers who have been able to stay in agriculture may continue to have a higher income on the average, says McHaney. However, he points out that their income is higher since many had to drop out of agriculture because they were unable to compete in a very competitive business.

## Thunderbirds Fly F-100s In Reese AFB Open House

The Thunderbirds will fly the F-100's in their aerial show at Reese Air Force Base Saturday, November 7, in the manner which has made them famous throughout the world. They have earned the title of United States "Ambassadors of Goodwill."

A diamond formation of four airplanes will follow a preplanned sequence of loops, rolls, whiffers, corkscrew changes, and cloverleaf turns at high speeds at low altitude, and directly above the crowd. The demonstration will climax with the "Bomb Burst", in which the diamond will climb straight up with a roar of afterburners to break away to the four corners of the compass and dive at 12,200 miles an hour to zip at close range on cross paths in front of the spectators.

During the show, solo pilots will perform at low altitude as the diamond forms for new maneuvers so that the show is packed to capacity with thrills.

Directly after the aerial show,

members of the Thunderbirds will be with their aircraft on the Reese parking apron near the crowd and will sign autographs and talk with as many visitors as possible.

The November 7 performance is the fifth for the Thunderbirds at Reese. Along with the Thunderbirds at Reese open house, several exhibits are expected. Fighter aircraft will be available for public inspection. Other exhibits are as follows: Trained sentry dogs from the Amarillo Air Force Base; Ejection seat taken from an F-104 for the children to ride in; The 589th USAF Band from Amarillo Air Force Base.

In addition to the exhibits mentioned above, more are expected. Adequate automobile parking space for all visitors will be available at Reese for the open house and spectacular aerial show, said Col. Dudley E. Faver, Wing Commander at Reese.

## Safety Hints Offered On Mechanical Cotton Pickers

Safe operation of a mechanical cotton picker means following a few simple precautions, says Beverly G. Reeves, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Taking the picking drums out of gear before getting off the picker is the first rule. Service and adjust the picker head only when it is out of gear, advises Reeves, and remember to replace all safety shields when it is necessary to remove them. Also, lock the basket in the dump position when servicing the engine.

When turning at the ends of the rows, raise the picking unit to its highest position but do so only at half throttle or less, re-

commends the specialist.

Since cotton pickers have a high center of gravity and turn over easily, extreme care should be used when operating or turning the picker near ditches. Reeves points out that steep downgrades, such as ramps used to load or unload the machine, should be approached by backing.


Avoid applying the brakes too quickly when traveling on roads. A mechanical picker is a heavy machine, explains the specialist, and is hard to stop.

These simple suggestions have been proved by manufacturers and in the field, says Reeves. A few minutes devoted to safety can protect the cotton picker as well as the operator.

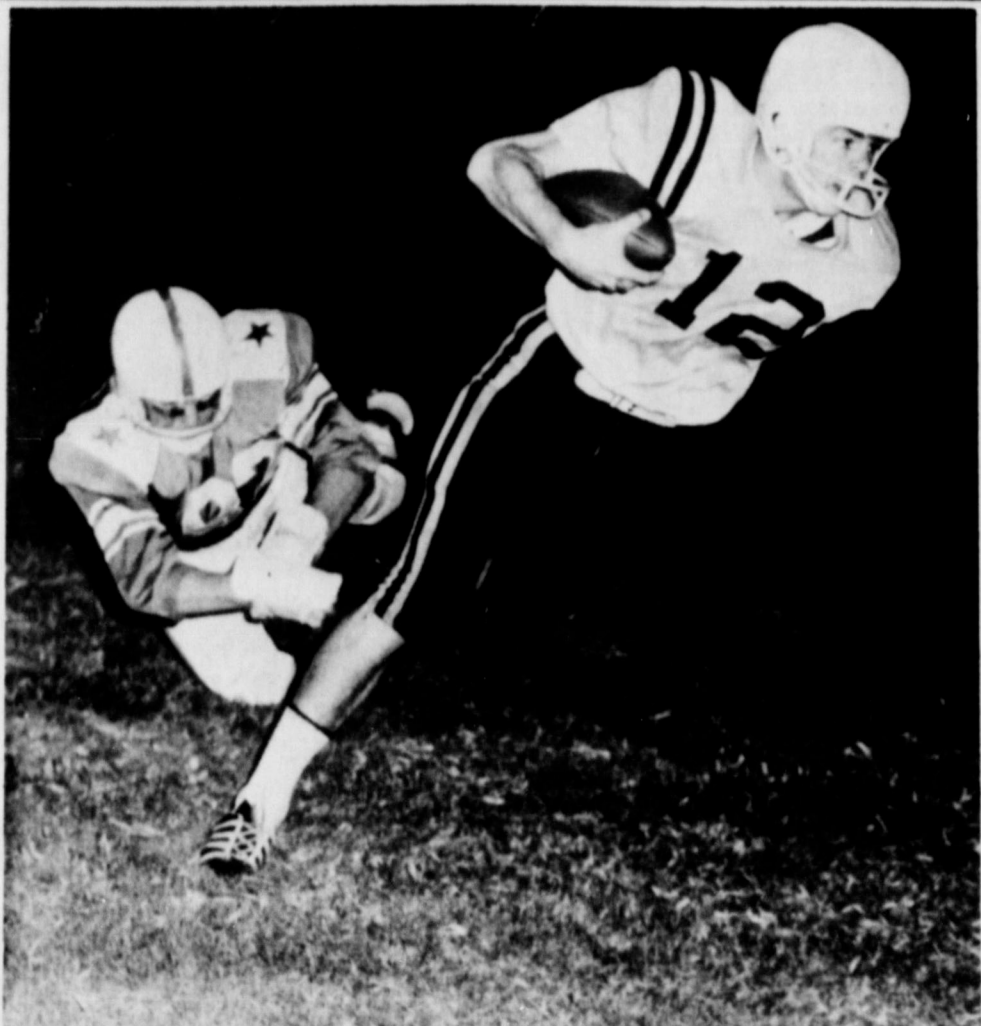

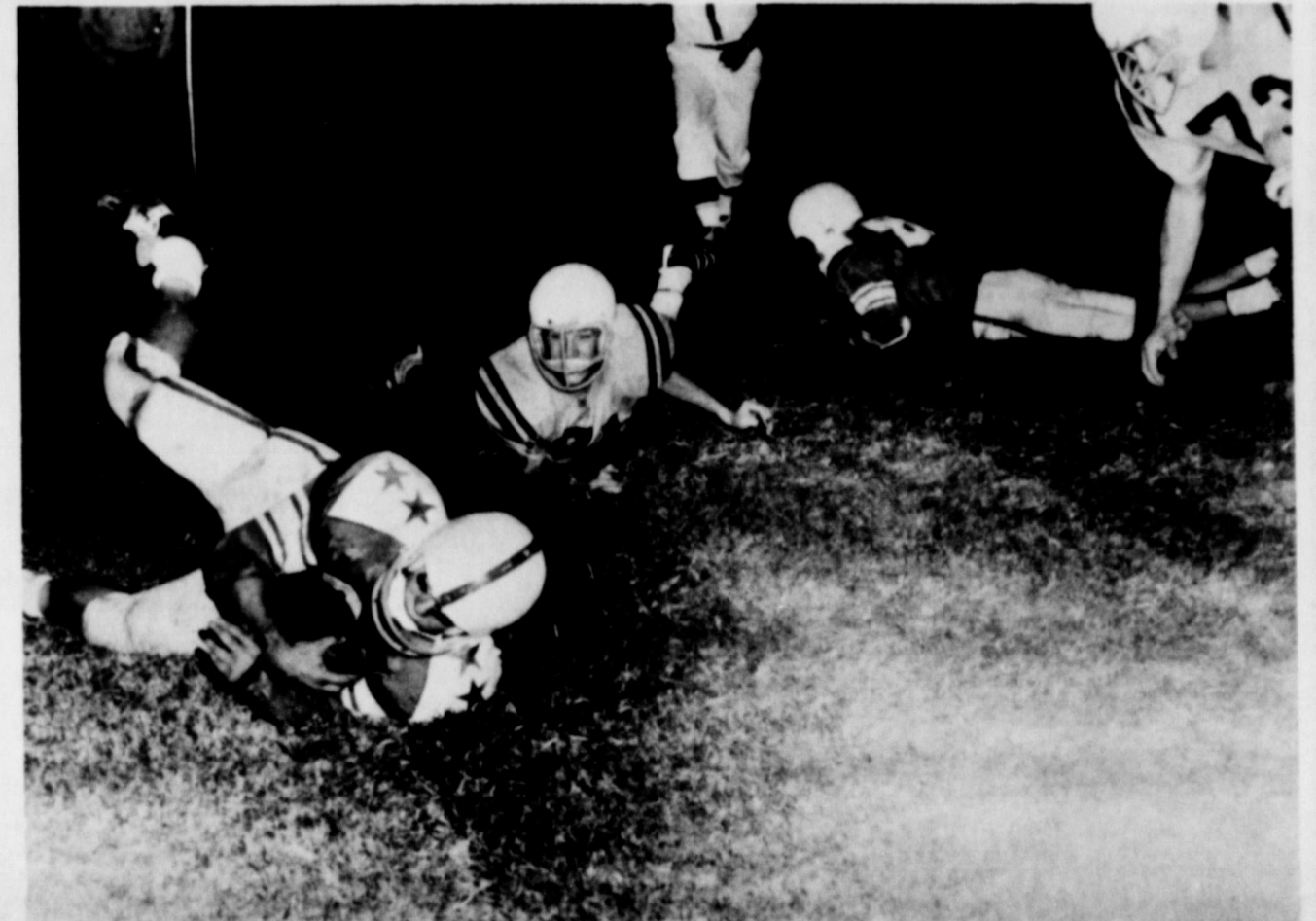

Department of Agriculture. The increase amounts to \$214,264, which runs the total state allotment for the current school year to \$6,645,429, according to John J. Slaughter, southwest area, food distribution division, Agricultural Marketing Service, Dallas.

This USDA office works with the school lunch division, Texas Education Agency, in handling the school lunch program. The increase in the Texas allotment reflects the \$9 million increase in national funds which total nearly \$130 million for the current school year, explains Slaughter. Each state receives school lunch funds on the basis of the number of USDA Type A lunches served during the 1963-64 school year and adjusted by the state per capita income.
