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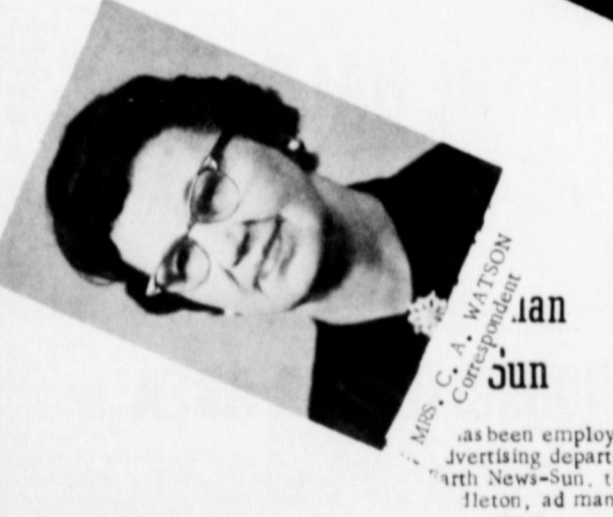
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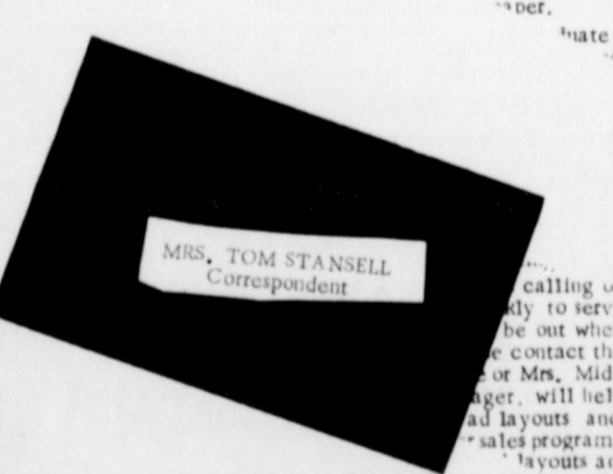

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## General Telephone Company To Build New Office In Earth

Replacement of Office and Equipment

General Telephone Company has purchased lots and ordered equipment to replace the central office in Earth. The new office will be located in Block 6, Lots 6, 7, and 8 in the townsite of Earth.

Construction on the 33X35 ft. building is expected to start in December, 1967 and complete in March 1968. The installation of equipment will begin upon completion of the building and complete in October, 1968.

With the replacement of the Earth Central Office and equipment, there will also be offered four-party rural service to

all multi-party subscribers. This should give better service to all subscribers and especially to the rural customers. It will enable customers to move from one location to another and keep the same telephone number.

All telephone numbers will be changed at the time of conversion which is October 22, 1968 but we feel there will be a minimum of trouble due to the 1969 directory being issued in September, 1968 rather than January as has previously been done. The 1968 directory will continue to be in effect from January 1968 through October 22, 1968 at which time the 1969 directory will replace it.

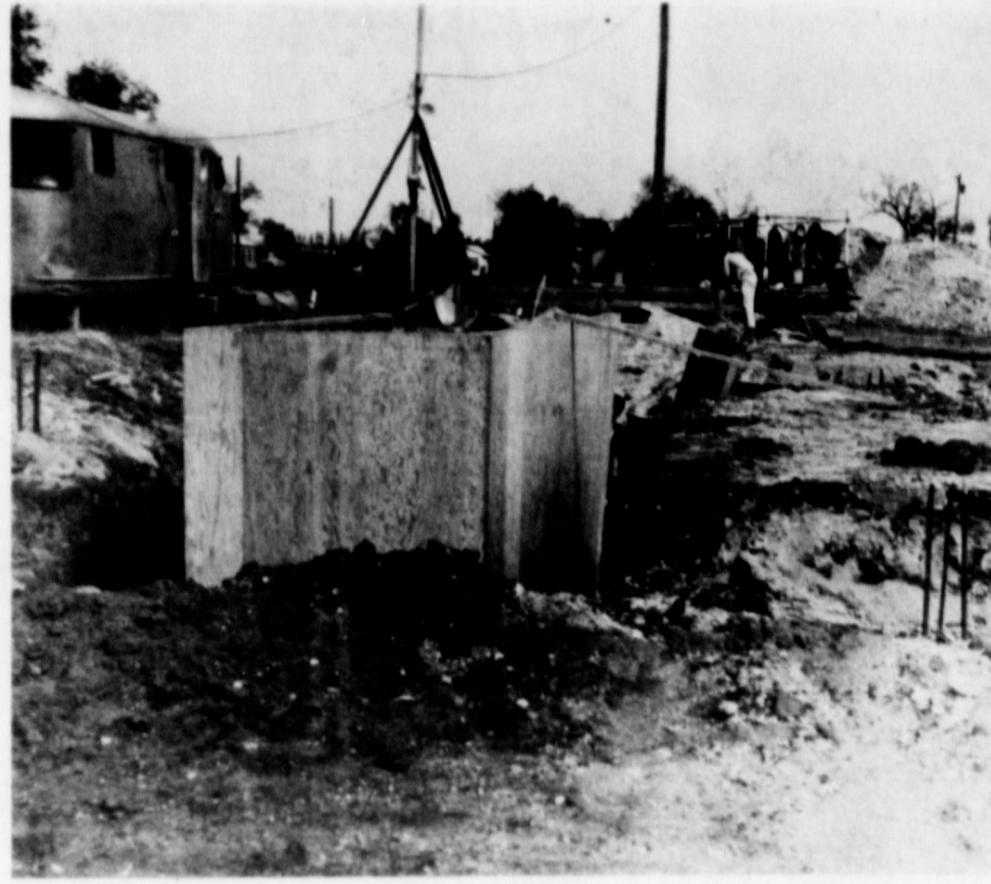

## Tips On Soybeans

You get paid for the crop you deliver to the elevator, not for what you leave in the field. An Ohio survey found that the average harvesting loss on soybeans in that state was 13%. This is almost four bushels per acre on a 30 bushel yield, or about \$10.00 per acre. The study further showed that with proper management this loss could be reduced to less than 3%.

The most important thing is to be ready when the beans are ready. When the moisture gets down to 13% have that machine ready to go. The poor management will wait until his beans are ready before he gets his machine ready and limp through his harvest without replacing worn parts or making necessary adjustments to do the best combining job. Check your combine thoroughly. Replace worn parts and cracked V-belts. Check slip clutches. Check engine

speed, beater speed, and cylinder speed. Make sure that these are set according to manufacturer's specifications for soybeans. Locate all adjustments and know how to use them.

The most difficult problem in harvesting soybeans is to get ALL the beans into the machine. About 80% of the total loss is failure to get the beans into the machine. Nearly 50% of this is shatter loss. Excessive reel speed is one cause of shattering. The reel should travel 25% faster than ground speed. If the reel is 12.5 ft. in circumference, it should turn 10 revolutions in 100 feet.

Cut the beans as low as possible. The cutterbar should be operated right on the ground to get all the beans. This usually requires reducing ground speed to around 2 1/2 to 3 miles per hour.

Most combines have a fixed knife speed. As ground speed increases beyond 3 mph, the knife begins stripping the beans before the stalk is cut and these beans fall from the cutterbar and are lost. Uneven stubble height is an indication of excessive forward speed. Also, as forward speed increases, height of cut increases resulting in more pods being left on the stalk.

If manufacturer's specifications are not available the following general rules may be helpful: (1) Slowest possible cylinder speed (300-400 rpm), (2) widest possible concave clearance, (3) reel speed 25% faster than ground speed; reel bats high in plant (just low enough for control); center of reel about one foot ahead of cutter bar, (4) cut low and go slow (3 mph or less). Remember, a loss of 4 beans

## Desalting Unit Opens on Coast

A new type, super-efficiency seawater desalting plant, that may make possible substantial reductions in the cost of desalting seawater was dedicated recently in San Diego, Calif.

According to Aqua-Chem officials, the new design technology and operating data that are provided by the plant will be utilized in the design and construction of the nuclear-powered 150 million gallon per day plant now planned by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California on the 43 acre man-made Bolsa Island off Huntington Beach at a cost of some \$485 million.

Built by Aqua-Chemical, Inc. of Waukesha, Wis., the plant will produce one-million gallons per day.

The Bolsa Island plant will more than double the total installed capacity of all desalting plants in operation throughout the world today.

per square foot is equal to 1 bushel per acre. An additional 3 to 6 bushels per acre will double the average soybean grower's net profit. One place to get those additional bushels is by reducing harvest loss. Every bushel saved at harvest is clear profit.

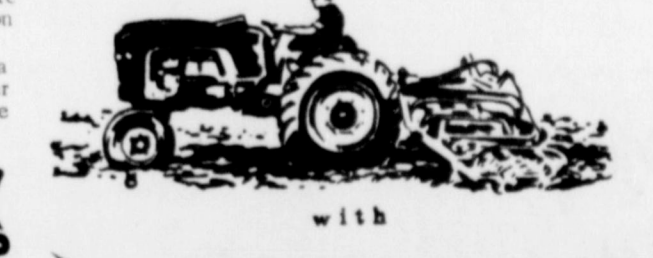

## Recommend Early Cotton Stalk Destruction

Boll weevils caused extensive damage in 1967 in a number of the state's cotton producing areas and emphasizes the importance of an early stalk destruction program, advised Extension Entomologist John Thomas at Texas A&M University.

Early cotton stalk destruction adds, is very important in reducing both pink bollworm and boll weevil populations the following year. To be most effective, the program should cover a wide area. Stalks should be shredded as soon as possible after harvest, preferably with a fall-type shredder, he says.

Such a machine destroys about 90 percent of the pink bollworm larvae in the plant residue, as compared with 50 percent for the more conventional rotary-type shredder, he says.

Boll weevil require a number of days feeding on squares and bolls to prepare themselves for entering diapause. Where stalks are shredded and plowed under the food supply is removed and a high percent of the boll weevil population is deprived of food necessary for overwinter-

ing, explains Thomas. After the cotton crop residue has been shredded, fields should be plowed so the crop residue is buried at least 6 inches deep. Plowing under kills even more larvae than the shredding operation alone.

Irrigation or rain following plowing aids in the decomposition of crop residues, Thomas adds. If moisture is low, pre-irrigation or early spring rains greatly aid in this decomposition.

Thomas encourages all producers to contact their county Extension agent for additional information concerning early stalk destruction as an aid for controlling two of the most damaging of all cotton insects.

Thomas emphasizes the importance of early harvest, clean fields and crop residue destruction in effectively and economically controlling pink bollworm and reducing boll weevil populations for 1968.

In light of the tremendous boll weevil populations which have developed in many areas of the state in 1967, it will be most important that producers shred and plow under crop residue as early as possible following harvest, says the entomologist.

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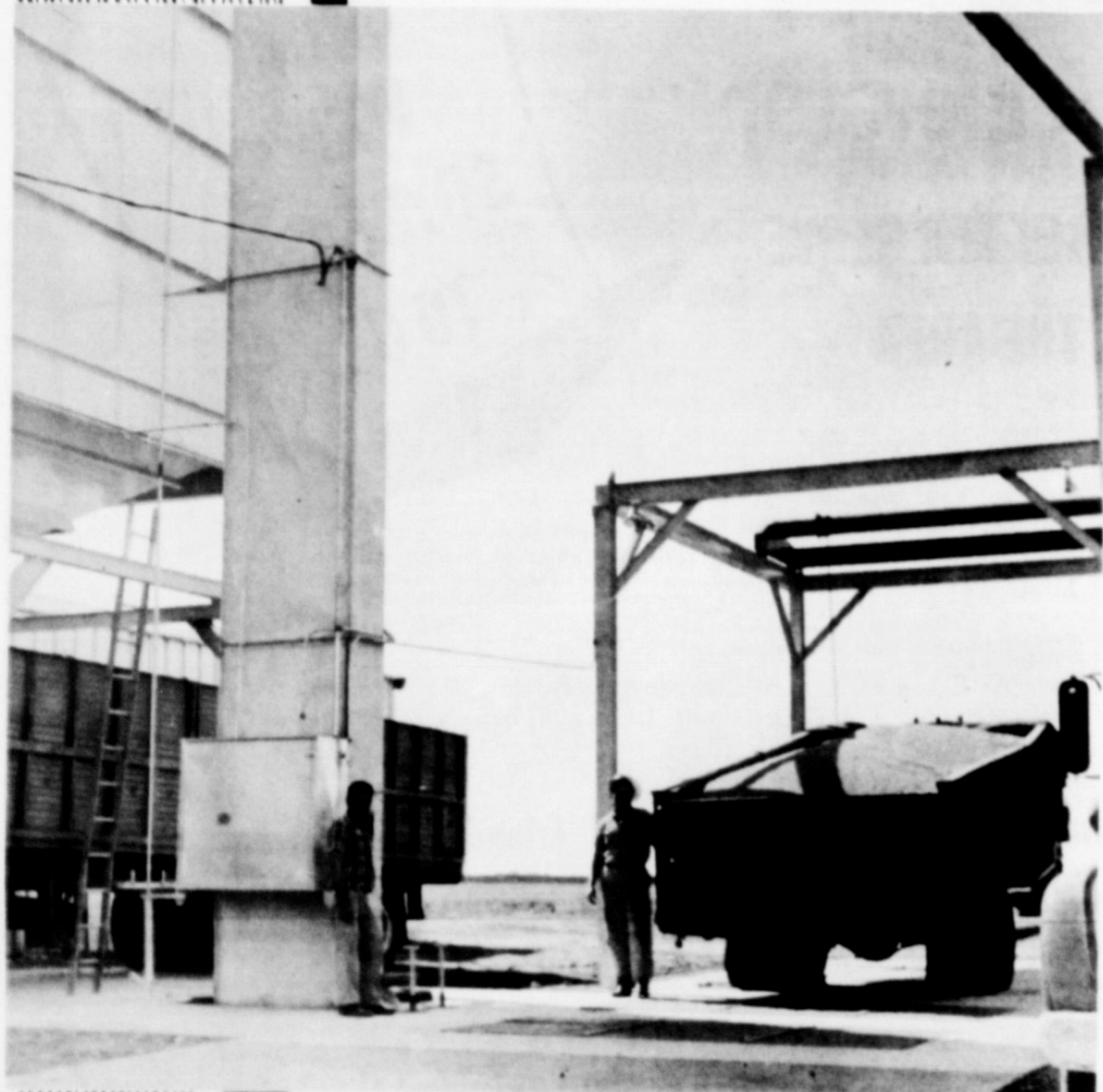

## Earth-Springlake Hospital District Trial To Go To Amarillo

A letter and a check from W. Reed Quilliam, Jr., attorney for the contestants in the Earth-Springlake Hospital District controversy, asked that all information and evidence be prepared and sent to the Seventh Supreme Judicial District of Texas in Amarillo where the contestants hope to appeal the judgment handed down by District Judge, Pat Boone in a trial September 7, in which Judge Boone, upheld the May 27 election that created the Hospital District.

A transcript on "everything that took place in the courtroom" along with papers, petitions, amendments, answers, etc. constituting all aspects and evidence of the case is to be sent to a three-judge court in Amarillo for examination. This court may either uphold, reverse or modify the ruling of the 154 District Court.

Each attorney will have sufficient time to provide a brief summary. The contestants will attempt to show points where they consider the District Judge Pat Boone in error in his ruling, the contestees stressing rulings he thinks should be upheld.

Which ever side should win in this court, the loser could then file for a re-hearing at Amarillo and, in turn, the loser of that court can file for a hearing at the Supreme Court of Texas which would be the final decision.

The case is entitled Robert Akin, et al, Contestants, Vs. O. J. Mangum, et al, Contestees.

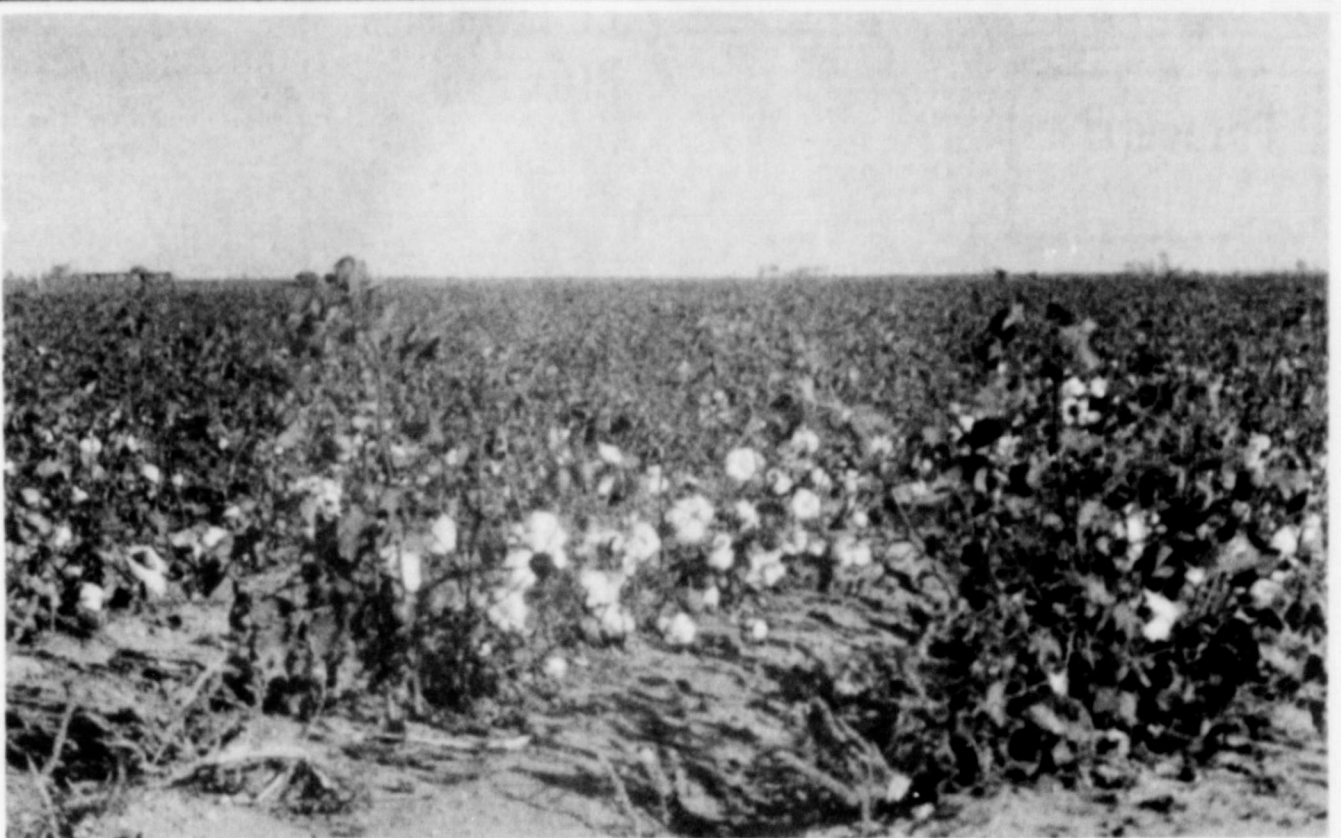

## School Board Studies Enrollment Figures, Taxes

Members of the local school board met Monday night in regular session to discuss enrollment figures, rules for the truant officer, delinquent taxes and insurance coverage for the school campus.

Minutes were read and current bills approved and paid before the group went into the discussion of current enrollment figures.

The overall enrollment figure at present is 946. Last year's enrollment figure in October was 966.

There are 525 enrolled in the elementary classes with a breakdown of the current enrollment as follows: first grade, 105; second grade, 79; third grade, 91; fourth grade, 86; fifth grade, 83; sixth grade 83.

The junior high enrollment is 173, with 90 students in the seventh grade and 83 in the eighth.

213 students are enrolled in high school. Of this figure, there are 68 freshmen, 61 sophomores, 51 juniors, and 33 seniors. The Special Education classes have 35 students presently enrolled. The group discussed and set up rules for truant officer, W. A. Hatfield to follow. The rules

include (1) Be alert for children and school age youngsters under 17 residing in the district and not enrolled in school. (2) Look for new families who move into the district and their children do not enroll in school immediately. (3) Call school nurse and principals daily to check on children who have been absent attendance to the extent of filing charges if necessary. (4) Advise with the superintendent of school and school staff relative to school attendance problems.

The board also examined and approved the school audit report. They also examined the preliminary application for foundation funds. They discovered the State Aid Fund to be less this year, since county values had been increased.

The group went over the delinquent tax roll and voted to file suits on three people, who had failed to make any effort to take care of their back taxes.

The group reviewed the total insurance coverage on all buildings on the school campus and added coverage on all new

buildings. Those having no insurance included the FFA cottage, fieldhouse, press box and bleachers, and the last two teacherages moved onto the campus.

Break-down on insurance coverage on the buildings are as follows: FFA cottage, \$17,500; fieldhouse, \$3,000; press box, and bleachers, \$3,000; elementary school, \$160,000; gymnasium and auditorium, \$171,000; high school, \$100,000; junior high \$70,000; old gymnasium, \$15,000; cafeteria, \$40,000; shop building, \$20,000; old lunchroom, \$3,

000; and all houses on the campus have from \$2,500 to \$5,000 insurance coverage.

The group looked over the bids submitted for the installation of a fence, and decided to erect a fence down the east side of the campus beginning with the band hall and out to the road and extending the fence to the south end of the school property. The new fence will be a 6 foot U. S. Steel cyclone fence. Superintendent Mann said the trees and old fence would be took down, but he expected to wait until after football season to begin.

Voter Registration Certificates may be obtained from the City Secretary. Every person must obtain a Voter Registration Certificate in order to vote in 1968, regardless of age. Persons over 60 years of age are NOT exempt any more.

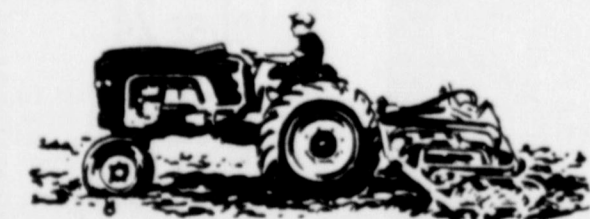

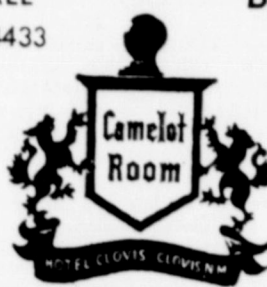

**Capt. Ricketts, Commanding Officer of Naval Missile Center**

Captain Collin J. Ricketts, U. S. Navy replaced Captain Carl O. Holmquist as Commanding Officer and director in command of the Naval Missile Center at Point Mugu, Oxnard, California.

Captain Ricketts is married to the former Hazel Hite of Earth, daughter of Lena Hite.

Captain Collin J. Ricketts was born in Farmington, New Mexico, on September 30, 1919. He attended the New Mexico State University at Las Cruces, where he earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in mechanical engineering.

Captain Ricketts graduated from college early to join the Navy's V-5 Aviation Cadet Program in April of 1941. In March 1942 he completed his flight training at the Naval Air Station, Corpus Christi, Texas, and was commissioned an ensign in the USNR. Captain Ricketts joined VP-51 (later designated VPB-101) in April 1942 and served with this squadron in the Pacific until December 1943. For combat missions flown with this squadron, Captain Ricketts was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

In January 1945 Captain Ricketts was ordered to the Navy Post Graduate School at MIT, Cambridge, Massachusetts. After a year of undergraduate study at MIT, he was sent to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York, to study gas turbines. There he completed his post graduate studies and received a master's degree in June 1947.

Upon completion of post graduate school, Captain Ricketts was granted a permanent commission in the United States Navy and designated an Aeronautical Engineering Duty Officer. He was assigned to the Naval Air Missile Test Center, Point Mugu, where he served from August 1947 to July 1950. Captain Ricketts spent the next six years in the guided missile and target drone field, serving from 1950 to 1953 in the Engineering Development Services

Department at Johnsville, Pennsylvania, and the following three years as the head of the Missile Production Branch in the Bureau of Aeronautics.

In 1950 Captain Ricketts was assigned to the Naval Air Engineering Facility (SE) in Philadelphia, where he entered the Ships Installation field. In 1960 he joined the staff of COMNAV-ATOPAC as SI Officer. This was followed by a tour in the Bureau of Naval Weapons from 1962 to 1965 as Director of the ship Aeronautics Division. Captain Ricketts was ordered to COMPAIRWESTPAC staff where he served as Assistant Chief of Staff for Material until receiving his present assignment.

His additional medals and awards include the American Defense Service Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with five bronze stars, the American Campaign Medal, and the World War II Victory Medal.

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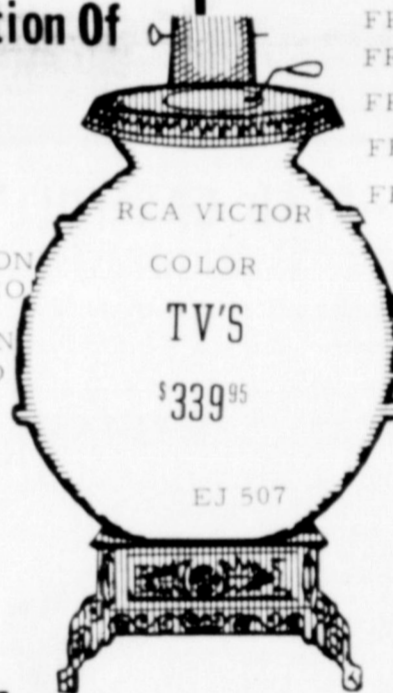

**Important Facts About NEWSPAPERS**

- Eighty percent of America's nearly 10,000 newspapers are weeklies serving rural, small town and suburban "hometown" communities. Less than four percent are metropolitan dailies; three-fourths of the 1,754 dailies are published in cities of less than 25,000 population.
- Circulation of the median-size daily is about 10,000 and of the non-size weekly, 3,000.
- Daily circulation of newspapers in the U.S. and Canada last year rose to 61,397,252, a gain of a million over 1965 and an increase of 20 percent since 1946.
- Circulation of 8,023 weekly newspapers was an estimated 26,888,196 and an increase of 80,000 over 1965 and an increase of 19 percent since 1950.
- Readers spend more than \$2 billion annually to buy and read daily newspapers and another \$85 million for weekly newspapers.
- Advertising revenue of daily newspapers in 1966 (\$4.9 billion) broke all paper records, topping 1965 revenue by 9 1/2 percent and nearly doubling the dollar volume of weekly newspapers in 1966 is estimated to exceed \$675 million.
- Newsprint used by newspapers in 1966 (9 million tons) was up seven percent over the year before, the largest one-year increase on record. Using newsprint consumption as an indicator of volume in the newspaper business, its growth has exceeded the rapid growth of the U.S. economy as a whole since World War II by 21.3 percent.
- Employment by newspapers averaged 353,800 during 1966, a 2 percent increase over 1965 and an increase of 42 percent since 1947.
- For new plants and equipment, 1966 and weeklies have spent more than \$1 billion for new plants and modernization in the past decade.
- Enrollment at Journalism Schools was up 16.3 percent in 1966 over 1965 (22,319 vs. 19,219) and up nearly 100 percent over 1960.

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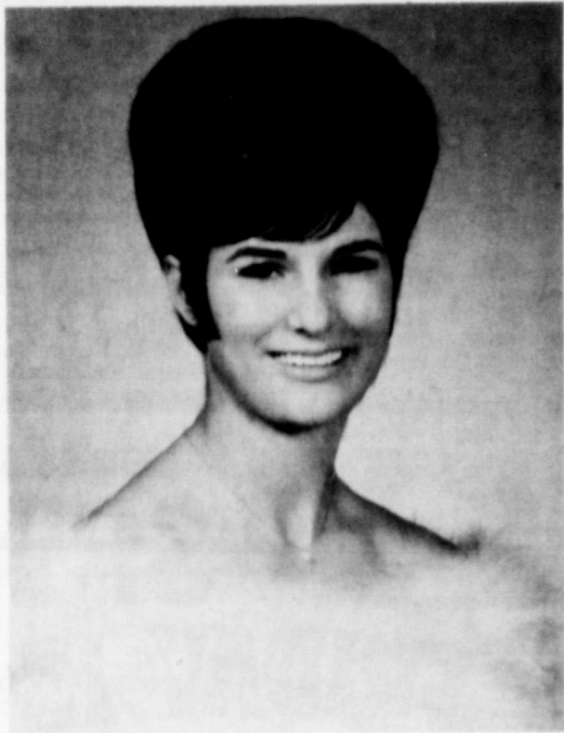
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## Linda Jordan Is Cheerleader At WTSU

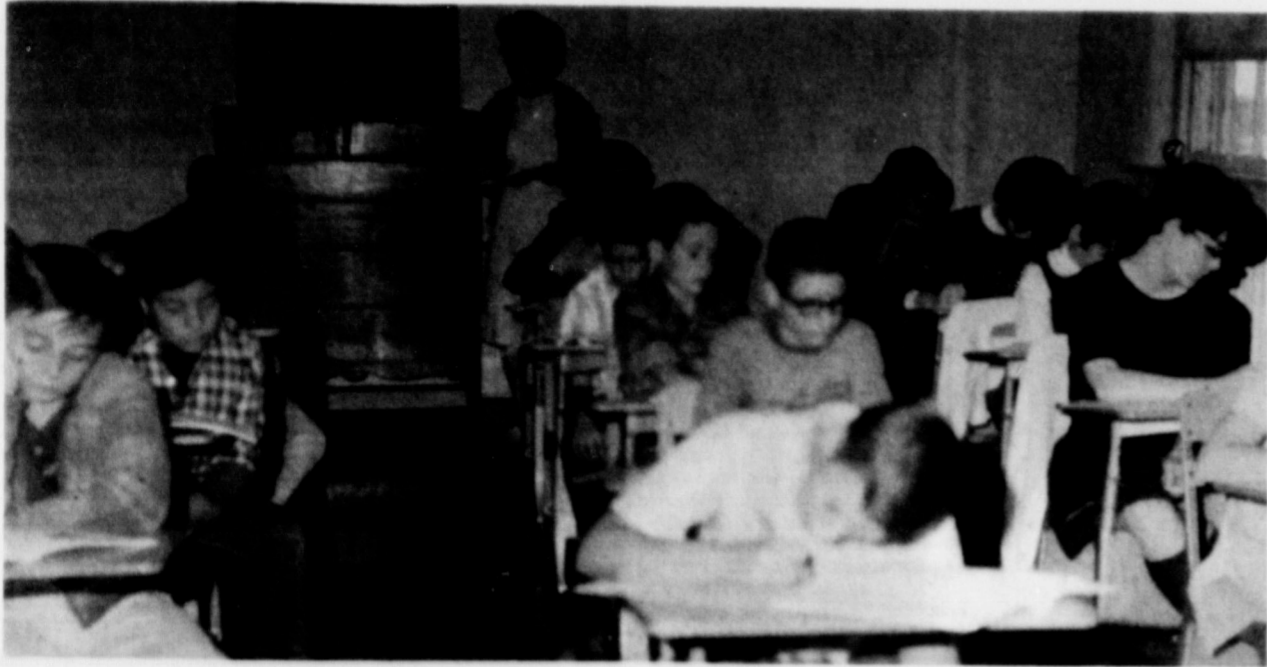
