



## Street Paving Project Gets Underway Here Keen Interest Shown in Politics, Voters Go to Polls Saturday

With campaigns nearing an end and keen interest shown in politics, Earth and Lamb County residents will go to the polls Saturday, July 26 to cast their votes in the Democratic Primary Election. Residents are qualified to vote in the election by virtue of having paid their poll taxes or by reason of exemption from poll taxes.

The polling place in Earth will be at the Community Building, with polls opening at 8 a. m. and closing at 7 p. m.

O. B. Whitford will be election judge, assisted by L. T. Smith and Guy Kelley.

Springlake election will be held in the Community Building.

Election judge will be Gus Parish, and Jess Watson, clerks will be Lowell Watson and W. T. "Bill" Clayton.

Pleasant Valley Community Building will the voting place for those in that area.

Fred Determan will be election judge, Jerry Allison will serve as assistant judge.

Principal interest in state offices is that of U. S. Senator, being sought by William Blakely and Ralph Yarbro. Another major item is the governor's race with candidates Henry B. Gonzales, Joe Irwin, W. Lee O'Daniel and incumbent Price Daniels.

The hottest interest is that of the State Senator, 39th Senatorial Dist. in which candidates Karl Lovelady of Muleshoe and Leroy Saul of Kress are seeking the post now held by Andy Rogers of Childress.

Edna Casperson of George Mahon, who is unopposed. State Representative, Jess Osborn is also unopposed.

County interest in the election has grown steadily in the past week, with the County Treasurer, County Commissioners, County Judge and Justice of the Peace offices each having several candidates seeking election.

There are four candidates for County Treasurers' office. They are Mrs. Bill Pass (incumbent), Mrs. Lucy Moreland, A. S. (Pete) Parrack and L. D. Stanaford.

Three Commissioner Candidates for Precinct two are W. W. Powell, Clyde Goodwin and Thero Branscum; County Judge has two candidates, they are Pat Boone Jr. incumbent and Paul Lewis.

Justice of Peace offices in both precinct two and four each have three candidates. Precinct 2 candidates are W. A. "Bill" Corzine, L. H. "Shorty" Randolph, J. L. Walker.

Precinct 4 are Justice of Peace O. M. Edwards (incumbent), Gus M. Shaw and R. V. Armstrong. Other candidates who are without an opponent are Commissioner, Precinct 4, Hubert Dykes, County Clerk, Charles Jones, County Superintendent, Jerry Lumsden, District Court Clerk, Ernest Owens, District Attorney, Bill Sheehan, and District Judge, E. A. Bills.

A total of 284 Lamb County voters had cast absentee ballots Tuesday, according to tabulations in the County Clerk's office. Deadline for filing absentee ballots in person was at 5 p. m. Tuesday, July 22. However ballots will be received by mail until 1 p. m. election date, but must be post-marked before midnight July 22.

Persons who were eligible to cast absentee ballots were qualified voters who planned or were out of the county on election day or those who were unable to go to regular polls due to health reasons.

The "Hitchhiker," DeVon Smith was met at the Earth City Limits with a float carrying a rocket and four Earth beauties, La Rue Glasscock, Janice Prather, Patty Mann and Polly Jean Middleton.

Smith was welcomed to Earth by Mayor Marcus Messer. Messer said, "Some have spent millions of dollars trying to get to the Moon, but we have already accomplished this, we have a man who has been to Moon, Mars and other planets and we have brought him to Earth."

Ted Borum, president of the Earth Chamber of Commerce, presented Smith with a plaque and a globe shaped container filled with a little bit of Earth to prove he had visited Earth, also one for him to give to President Eisenhower.


Mayor Messer presented him with a certificate declaring him an honorary citizen of Earth.

Marshal Kelley, postmaster, said "he was glad to postmark his certificate, this being the only post-office on Earth, named Earth." Smith will present the certificate to Eisenhower.

The welcome ceremonies in honor of the "Interplanetary Hitchhiker" was pictured on Channel 13 TV program Saturday and Sunday nights at 10:30 p. m. Gil Lamb manager of KMUL Radio Sta. was present to record the ceremony. Newspaper representatives from many newspapers over Texas were here to get the story.

Smith left Earth at 4 p. m. Monday enroute to Washington, D. C. hoping to see the President in person and present him with the planet certificate stamped by postmasters of Planetary Cities. Smith will be wearing his Earth NEWS-paper shirt presented to him by the four girls. The NEWSpaper shirt was printed at the Earth News-Sun and designed and made by Mrs. J. B. Inglis.





## Springlake Baptist Church To Observe Tenth Anniversary Sunday, July 27

The First Baptist Church of Springlake was formally and officially organized Tuesday night, July 27, 1948 when representatives of several Churches of the West Plains Association sat as an advisory council. The meeting was held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Clayton. Rev. John Cory, pastor of Amherst Church and Associational Moderator was elected chairman.

A motion to go into the calling of a pastor carried. Rev. C. T. Jordan

was extended a unanimous call and on the acceptance of this call turned the chairmanship back to Rev. Cory to attend to other matters of business. Jack Howell was elected Sunday School superintendent. Mrs. Kenneth Parish was elected as acting clerk. Plains Association and visitors of like faith were declared the "Organizing Council."

The resolution of the Organization was adopted which included a pledge to cooperate with the Southern Baptist Convention and the Baptist General Convention of Texas, also a pledge to accept the Baptist articles of Faith and the Church Covenant.

By common consent the name was adopted as "First Baptist Church" of Springlake. W. T. Clayton and G. F. Howell were recognized as official deacons. Mrs. J. T. Gibson was elected church clerk and W. T. Clayton as Treasurer.

The church was then declared by the council as officially recognized. Eighty persons were present at this organization. There were seventy-five Charter Members.

We met in the Primitive Baptist Church for some time. Gus Parish gave land to the Church in the Parish Addition. We erected a big tent and held the first Revival with Rev. E. F. Cole, evangelist of Ft. Worth, Texas and Olen S. Miles of Austin as song director. This Revival was held Sept. 3 through 12, 1948. With Baptisms in Mr. Roach's stock tank.

Precinct Commissioner no. 1, George Brown, levelled the ground for the Church and parsonage and opened the street by the Church.

Two barracks were secured and moved to the grounds in October, 1948, these were used until the New Church Building was built. The Church accepted the bid by Mr. Mize of Floydada, Texas to build the new Church building.

A gift of \$1000 was received from State headquarters.

Sept. 21, 1948 the ladies met and organized the W. M. U. Mrs. Gus Parish was elected president for the year of 1948-49. Mrs. W. T. Clayton was elected young people director for the year 1948-49. Training Union was organized Sept. 13, 1948 with A. H. Jones director. Brotherhood was organized March 15, 1949. First Vacation Bible School was June, 1949. Shelby Collier, director of the International Choir of Wayland College, conducting the school.

Sept. 25, 1949, Leslie Watson, Ernest Baker and Troy Blackburn, were recognized and ordained as deacons.

After cold weather we carried our baptismal candidates to Olton Baptist Church for baptism. March 12, 1950 we had our first Baptism in our new completed Church, and in our new beautiful baptistry. Baptistry scene was painted by Mark Tong a Chinese student and artist of Wayland College.

Rev. C. T. Jordan resigned on June 24, 1951. Rev. Joe Kayser, the music director of the Church at this time, was called as assistant pastor.

In September, 1951 Rev. John T. Williams pastor of Southside Baptist Church of Olney, Texas was

home at Beeville, Texas.

A new wing has been added on to the Church building to provide class rooms for the increasing membership. The auditorium has been redecorated along with the kitchen, dining hall and three classrooms.

There are three pianos including one Baldwin Grand. A paid nursery worker is employed to keep the nursery for any occasion as well as specified times, a janitor is also employed to care for the Church building.

One member of the church carries a \$10,000 endowment for Wayland College. There are special gifts that go to Wayland. In the fall of 1953, \$1000 from the Church treasurer was given to Wayland to help pay teacher salary.

A camp cottage was built at the Baptist Encampment near Floydada, Texas in 1954. This is a large two room block structure, 28x36 ft. Each room has a shower and rest room. With a screened in porch along the entire front of the building.

A Mexican Mission was completed in Springlake across the street from Springlake Baptist Church in Sept. of 1954, constructed of concrete blocks, 26x28 ft. In July of 1956 the building was dedicated.

At the Worker's conference at Luma Chapel Oct. 29, 1954 the Springlake Baptist Church was presented "certificate of recognition as giving \$1,000 or more per member to Wayland College."

The church property up to this time is valued at \$75,000.

In March 1957 the church voted to build a much needed Educational Building and work began in the spring.

In August of 1957 the Educational Building was completed and ready for use. The wing included a new office for General Secretary's office, large entrance hall equipped with water fountains, a Beginner Department, Junior Department of four rooms, Young Adult Department with five rooms which is also the dining room when the accordion doors are opened, with a modern kitchen on the north. The kitchen is equipped with a new electric range. There is a

rest room for the men and one for the women with a powder room.

In May of 1957 the church ordained Billy Wayne Clayton, Ernest Green and F. W. Bearden as deacons and in the fall of 1957 Earl Parish was recognized by the church as a deacon as he had joined the church by letter in September, August 28, 1957. Bro. John T. Williams tendered his resignation to the First Baptist Church at Springlake, leaving the field on September 8, 1957.

Rev. Clifford Jester was called to pastor the First Baptist Church of Springlake and assumed the pastorate of the church October 13, 1957. Rev. Jester graduated from Lakeview High School and he and Mrs. Jester attended Wayland College in Plainview. He was formerly pastor of the First Baptist Church of Lella Lake, Texas. Rev. and Mrs. Jester and daughters Donna and Debbie moved into the parsonage at Springlake October 7, 1957. Rev. Jester is leading the work here in a great way for the Lord

and there has been a great number of additions to the church since he came on the field.

Under the leadership of Rev. Jester, the church entered the Achievement Plan Program for 1957-58. The members of the First Baptist Church are laboring together to try to improve and better the church, the community and the world. Some of the outstanding improvements in the church is a new church library, a recreation play ground for the children. The making of a scrapbook that can be made into church albums so each member who cares to may purchase one. Sunday, July 27, 1958 marks the 10th anniversary of the church. We know that each member's prayer will be that the First Baptist Church of Springlake will ever march on to higher ground with the Lord's work. We urge each member or anyone who has ever been a member of this church to be present Sunday, July 27 for the 10th anniversary of the church.

### IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

Thinking of buying or building a new home this year? Whether you buy a completed house or simply a lot to build on, how will you know whether you are receiving a good title to the property you purchase? The safest method is to have a title examination made—that is, a careful study of the abstract and other title evidence.

Here are a few of the common sources of trouble in real estate transactions to show why the minor expense of title examination is justified.

Many people sign "earnest money contracts" believing that they are mere receipts with no serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things, the kind of title you must accept.

A "warranty deed" from a respectable seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee a marketable title.

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he is available a good title is much better than a law suit.

The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property. An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state.

Some purchasers of land feel safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortgage lenders. This seems logical but is a dangerous theory. Mortgage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because, among other reasons, the chances are that the mortgage will be paid off so that no expense in perfecting the title would ever need be incurred. It is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase.

Walker, chairman of the conference subcommittee, said that this year's program will feature top industry leaders who will discuss topics of interest to all segments of the cotton industry.

George W. Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice President of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., said that the Texas High Plains was fortunate in obtaining the Spinner-Breeder Conference here this year.

"Many of the top people and leaders of the cotton industry will attend this conference and we hope to take advantage of this opportunity to show them the great potential of cotton production here on the plains."

Pfeifferberger said that the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. staff would help with arrangements for the conference. Tours of cotton producing and cotton breeding fa-

# THE COUNTRY EDITOR

ONE OF THE most vital races in Saturday's Democratic primary is that of State Senator. There is much more involved than mere personality. Since the issues have been clouded by gossip, slander, false rumors and even defamations of character, the voter has a tremendous personal responsibility to sift truth from fiction, prejudice from objective appraisal, and fact from fancy.

WE ARE NOT supporting Senator Andy Rogers, the incumbent, because we think he is perfect, because he has pleased us all the time, because we think he is the only resident of the 30th Senatorial district capable of serving with ability and integrity. We are supporting him because he towers head and shoulders above the two men who now seek his place in the Senate. So completely objectionable are the other two men, in our opinion, that we would have to scratch both names if the name of Senator Rogers did not appear on the ballot.

HERE ARE SOME of our reasons for having to support Rogers. He is the incumbent, having served only one complete term in the Senate, and it is our belief that an incumbent deserves re-election unless there is a good reason why he should not be re-elected. In the case of a Senator, seniority is of utmost importance. It would be extremely unwise for a district to throw its seniority in the Senate to the wind. Senator Rogers already has the job. We owe nothing to a person, even a friend, who covets the job of his neighbor.

Secondly, anyone who studies Rogers' record carefully will soon find that he thinks like the typical resident of the 30th district. We have not always seen eye to eye with Rogers on every issue that has come up, in fact, on occasion we have attacked some of his decisions editorially — but we have approved his action in a huge majority of cases. In voting, our choice is not to select the perfect candidate, according to our own specifications — our choice is to vote for the man who most nearly reaches perfection.

While Senator Rogers' batting average in the Senate is high, in our opinion, the voting records of his opponents are completely unpalatable in too many instances.

ONE OF ROGERS' opponents has represented big business interests, including the utilities monopoly, much more effectively than he has represented the farmers and small town businessmen of the 30th district.

The other man in the race, when he was in the Legislature, voted for exempting utility companies from the license fee (required of other appliance dealers) for the privilege of selling gas and electric appliances, parts and repairs in towns of 3,000 or less. He voted for a two per cent gross receipts tax on soft drink bottlers which Gov. Shivers offered. It was adopted 15-14, so his was the key vote. Later, the Senate reversed itself and killed this tax. He also voted to table Aikin's effort to reduce this bottler's tax to one per cent. Then Aikin tried to exempt milk from the bottler's tax and this candidate voted not to exempt milk.

THIS CANDIDATE introduced a bill to give the state a first lien on any property owned by old-age recipients and to require that it be foreclosed on their deaths and the state welfare department would get back all they had been paid. This idea has been pushed by anti-pension folks ever since. He also introduced a bill regulating sale, distribution or possession of oleomargarine which hurts every cotton farmer. And most objectionable of all, he supported a TWO PER CENT STATE INCOME TAX PROPOSAL!

This is to say that Senator Rogers, the incumbent, is much better qualified to serve an agricultural district than either of his opponents. Ask any informed farmer who is familiar with REA and other major farm problems. Ask informed leaders of any farm organization who have had occasion to make trips to Austin in the interest of farm problems.

IN THE THIRD place, we would have to vote for Andy Rogers because the special interests groups, the gas pipeline group, the utilities monopoly, the anti-farm group, those who would like to have federal and state control of underground water, those who consistently try to keep the lid on Austin scandals, those who do not want practitioners of the healing arts controlled or licensed by the state, those who have proved themselves enemies of the Farm to Market road program, those who abhor independent thinking, those who try to tell legislators to get on their team or else they will have to smear them, all have combined to try to move heaven and earth to defeat Senator Rogers. Rogers has been threatened by these interests which warned him not to run. He was told to be a good boy, to go back to Childress and settle down, and he wouldn't be hurt by the character assassins and gangsters who have a great deal of influence in Austin.

Perhaps Rogers would have retained his job in Childress and made a living for his family had he not been threatened as he was. But there is something in a red-blooded American that causes him not to yield to gangster tactics. So Rogers defied the warnings.

We need more men like Rogers in Austin, men who will put principle above politics, men who will not sacrifice honor for expediency. Men like Rogers are and will be in a minority for sometime, but at least they will speak out against corruption so we can hear. To fail

to re-lect Rogers would not be a step in the right direction.

AND FINALLY, even if we did not have the reasons mentioned above for supporting Rogers, even if we did not believe him to be the best man intellectually, morally and spiritually, we would have to support him because of the campaign techniques used by his opponents or supporters of his opponents.

This race, from the time it started with the mailing of anonymous smear literature, has been one of the filthiest races in the history of Texas politics.

We have had "Port Arthur" type stories in circulation almost weekly since early spring. Some of the false stories planted here and there have been petty. Others have been outright libelous. They include, for example, the testimony of a former medical doctor who lost his license, who has served numerous terms in penitentiaries in several states including Florida, Maryland and Oklahoma, who is at present under indictment for performing an abortion in a Dallas tourist court, who perjured himself when under oath he voluntarily made statements made a week apart in direct conflict, who was convicted three times for being a confidence man.

Yet there are those having an interest in getting Rogers out of the Senate who produce a completely false statement signed by this character in trouble up to his neck which they expect people to believe in preference to the word of Senator Rogers, other members of the Legislature, official records in Austin, and even newspapers and public officials who have not been particularly friendly to Senator Rogers. And, strangely enough, one of the men attempting to unseat Senator Rogers served on the House investigating committee and would have access to the official records which had they contained information adversely affecting the senator, would have made a perfect rope with which to hang Rogers. Yet, instead of bringing about the prosecution of Senator Rogers, had there been any basis for doing so, he does nothing about it. Either this man is guilty of negligence of duty or the whispered charges against Senator Rogers are complete fabrications.

ALL OF THESE false stories, planted and distributed, appeal only to "the moron vote" because of their utter absurdity.

As a Tullia pastor told us when we showed him some of the smear literature now in circulation against Senator Rogers, "When I see something like that, it spurs me on to vote for the man who has been slandered and wronged."

ARE WE TO assume that Rogers' opposition has so little to offer the voters of this district that they must base their campaign on such things as the testimony of an ex-con, and a several - times loser, and also other stories of equal veracity?



## INDEXING

Andy Rogers may be defeated some day. He may not run for re-election. At least he has not announced.

But win, lose or draw, Andy Rogers has something to remember that is fine and wonderful.

His most memorable moment must be the Appreciation Dinner and program given Monday night at Tulia.

I have never seen anything like it in my life. I do not think anyone who attended has ever seen anything like it.

—Mr. and Mrs. N. D. Rogers, along with Georgia Ann and, of course, Andy must have felt wonderful Monday night. And still do.

The idea for the Appreciation Dinner did not originate in Childress. In fact, as far as I know, Childress residents did not have anything to do with it.

And when Andy heard about the proposal, he said that it could not be done.

Andy was wrong. And I imagine right now he is happy that he was wrong. I would be.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING:

A dozen leaders in the district were programmed to speak. They, typically, represented a cross-section of Plains life.

One was the Senator's pastor. He lauded the honoree for his fight against liquor, narcotics, and low literature. "Senator Rogers is always on the right side of every moral issue," said the churchman. "He wants and works for a high moral atmosphere to prevail."

A county teachers' association president called attention to Senator Rogers' work in behalf of public education. A Memphis druggist related that Rogers has always had an "open ear" for the small businessman.

A district judge praised the quality of legislation introduced and supported by the Senator. A mayor and insurance man emphasized the value of Andy Rogers' fight against corruption in Austin, particularly in connection with the insurance investigations.

Said an official of one of the veterans' organizations: "Andy told us for a long time there was serious trouble in the veteran's lab program. He was right. And when this was cleaned up, Andy worked hard to see that this good program was not scrapped."

A newspaper editor and publisher, a former president of the Panhandle Press Association, observed: "This is the first time I've ever heard of people traveling so far just for a state senator. But it's fitting," he added, "for Andy Rogers for a job well done."

Spokesmen for the major farm organizations expressed approval of the Senator's record on farm-to-market roads, local ownership of underground water, rural electrification, and other legislation of concern to agriculture. Said the farm spokesman who rounded out the program:

"In view of all Andy Rogers has done for agriculture, I'm amazed to hear from the other speakers this evening that he's had time for such effective work for so many others, too." The farmer concluded:

"Andy Rogers must use a six-row political tractor!" The Senator acknowledged the praise-filled evening with obvious humility. He spoke humbly, too, of his "close personal friend" — Lewis B. Taylor of Austin and Waco—who had been stricken with a fatal heart attack there a few minutes earlier.

To the series of "thank you's" which had been expressed during the evening, Rogers responded:

"What's been accomplished, you've done. The credit belongs to you, to my parents, and to my wife who have all supported me so strongly. I really feel like I owe you all an appreciation dinner."


