## Annual F. F. A. Rodeo Winners Announced

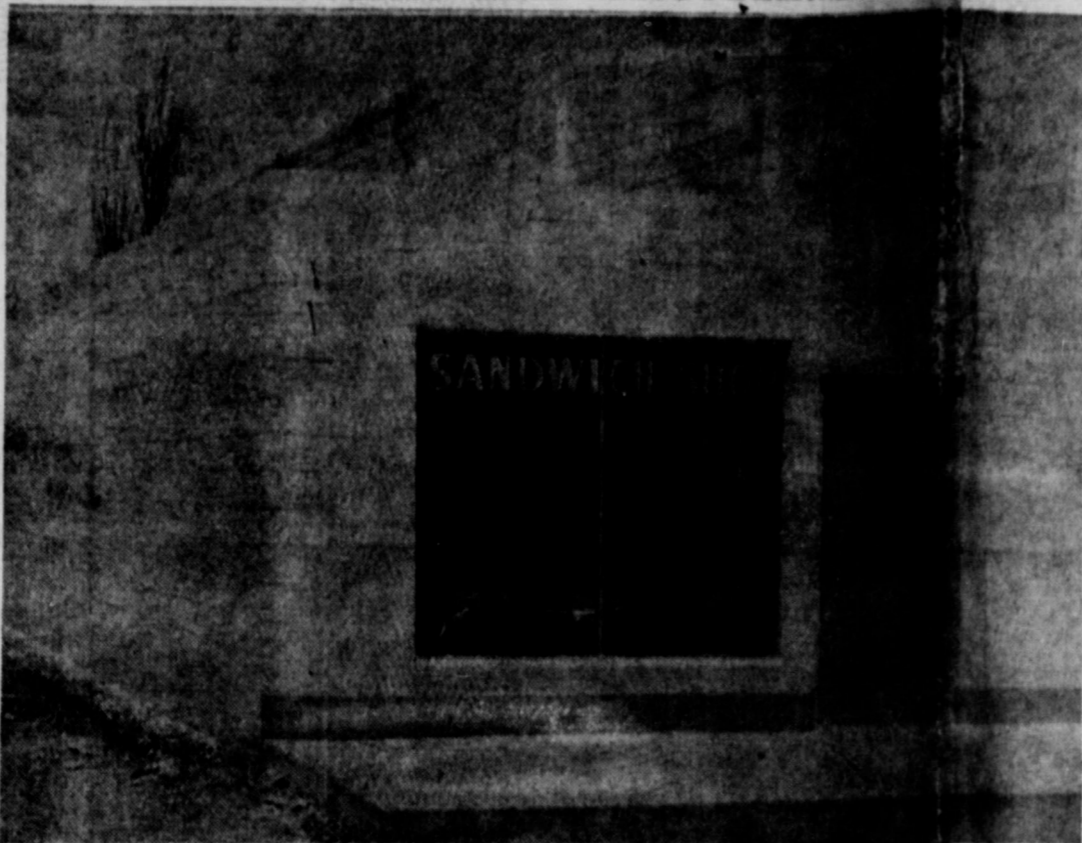
The final performance of the Springlake F. F. A. Rodeo was completed Thursday night with a good attendance in spite of the cold, damp weather.

A copy of the Springlake Area Telephone Survey and a map of the City is now in the District Office of General Telephone, Engineers of the Company are studying the data to determine costs involved in setting up a telephone service that will justify the needs of the City and rural area surrounding Springlake.

Fred Mathis, District Manager of General Telephone in Littlefield, stated that the Company would be in a position to begin bargaining with Springlake City Commission as soon as this initial cost had been determined. This figure will be used by the Company in determining service rates for the area.

Billy Wayne Clayton, chairman of the Telephone Survey Committee said, "In case General Telephone does not consider our needs justify our demands for improved City Service as well as service for our rural area. We will begin negotiations with the Bailey Co. Electric Co-operative Assn. of Muleshoe, in an effort to see what they can offer us." Clayton proceeded, saying he had already talked with D. B. Lancaster, manager of the Company, who said after studying the subscribers survey, there was indeed a good possibility of obtaining both Improved City Service as well as rural service.

If General Telephone does not think it feasible to furnish the type of service Springlake needs, there is a possibility that Bailey County Electric Co-operative Ass'n. will negotiate with Gen. Telephone in an effort to purchase the present equipment in the City of Springlake owned by that Company, with the prospect of running a franchise an setting up both City and Rural Service.

Springlake City Commission will not grant a franchise to any company until improved City Service as well as rural service can be obtained.

Clayton said, if an agreement cannot be reached with either Company, there was still a possibility of securing service from a private company.

### Unbalanced Diet of Mesquite Beans Can Cause Jaw and Tongue Trouble in Cattle

Beans have long been considered "life savers" by ranchmen, especially during drought periods. But a condition which was first noted in 1941 south of Pecos is now prevalent along the Pecos River in Texas and New Mexico and in many other parts of Texas and Oklahoma. The condition known as "jaw and tongue trouble" has been reproduced by feeding large quantities of mesquite beans.

Dr. J. W. Dolahite and W. V. Anthony both of the Marfa laboratory of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, have found through continued studies that mesquite beans was the one food consistently eaten by all affected animals. Too, the pastures usually contained either dry alkali sycamore or tobosa grass. Taking their cue from these facts, the research workers started feeding trials in 1955 to determine if jaw and tongue trouble could be produced by feeding mesquite beans, it was.

It is the belief of the research workers that apparently, the rumen bacteria which digest cellulose and synthesize vitamin B are destroyed when cattle consume large amounts of mesquite beans over a considerable period of time. The resulting malnutrition and vitamin B deficiency produce the serious malady in cattle.

The saliva of affected cattle hangs from the mouth in long strings and superficially resembles meringue. The feed trough or salt box will contain several quarts of saliva. Animals chew continuously, often holding their heads to one side as if chewing was painful. In some cases, about 25 percent, animals protrude their tongues a half inch to four inches while from 10 to 50 percent of the animals may have swelling under the jaw and throat. These swellings may come and go. The salivary glands often are enlarged.

Animals are usually anemic and

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### IT'S THE LAW in TEXAS

#### THINK BEFORE SIGNING

Whenever you are asked to sign something, your signature should be a warning signal that in some way you may become legally obligated by what you sign.

Usually you are asked to sign something as a result of a business transaction, such as a contract, a receipt, an order, a release, an option, a mortgage or a deed. For

become emaciated, often losing 50 percent of their weight. Their hair coat may be very long, but after summer shedding large denuded areas appear. Too, animals are nervous and some have muscular tremors, especially around the face and muzzle.

When symptoms of jaw and tongue trouble appear, the damage has already been done, say the scientists. Often the ranchmen does not realize that he is in trouble until the mesquite beans are gone and he starts feeding hay.

The animals will gain weight on a good concentrate ration, but they cannot utilize hay. If lush green pasture is available, sick animals will apparently recover, but should be sold as soon as they are in good condition. Most, point out Dolahite and Anthony, will not be able to again digest dry roughage. It is advisable, therefore, to market cattle as soon as possible after the first symptoms appear.

Attempts at treatment have been discouraging, say the scientists. They are, however, continuing their work in an effort to find remedies. It is hoped that additional studies will suggest supplements which can be fed with mesquite beans in order that this excellent source of range feed may be utilized without affecting the health of the animals.

Complete details of the investigations are given in Progress Report 1931 issued by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

Know what you are signing and what the document contains. Understand clearly what it means. Don't be confused by its title — a "statement" may be a release of all your claims, or a "contract" may be a negotiable promissory note. "Co-signing" a note may result in your having to pay it.

Read EVERYTHING in any document. Clauses in fine print may be important. Remember, too, that oral promises not included in writing may be unenforceable.

Take nothing for granted.

Check and verify the document. Be sure the dates, prices, names and conditions filled in are correct. You are bound by what it says, not by what you thought it said.

Ask questions. Inquire about conditions and items of importance to you. Don't sign unless you understand what it means. Language clearly stating what you want can be inserted. If substantial sums are involved, consult with your attorney.

Retain a copy. Be sure the proper persons sign. Request and retain a copy. Record it, if necessary, with the proper public official.

Like your fingerprint, your signature is unique. No one else has one exactly like it. Only sign it, and affixing it may set into motion events of great legal consequence. Treat it with the importance it deserves, and do not bestow it carelessly. If in doubt, seek information and advice.

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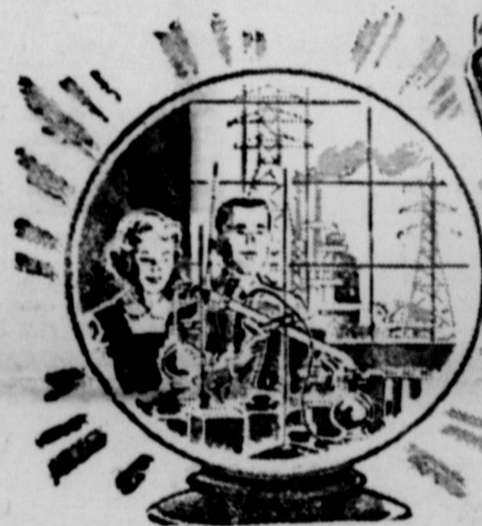

# REA Bill Passes Out of House After Much Study

Representative Saul today advised the press that the House Bill No. 547, commonly known as the REA Bill, was successfully passed out of the House after probably the most industrious study and effort by the House of any measure considered this session. Saul revealed that the sub-committee and the whole committee of State Affairs had worked in excess of 150 hours in research and consultation on which this vital measure affecting the future of the REA program in Texas.

Saul's committee, with complete

cooperation from the whole committee and interested members of the House accumulated material and facts which resulted in an all time record for the "biggest grandfather clause" in the history of Texas. Saul explained that a grandfather clause is legislative lingo for keeping a situation status-quo, which means no rights can be disturbed now held by any Texas citizen affected by legislation. In other words, no lights on the farms, in the homes, or property of any REA customer or service will be turned off.

Saul revealed that his committee's biggest obstacle was to overcome a proposed limitation that the REA service within city limits be limited to a ten year period. The bill recommended by Saul's committee and adopted by the House carried no ten year limitation and protected the REA from infringement by private power companies forever.

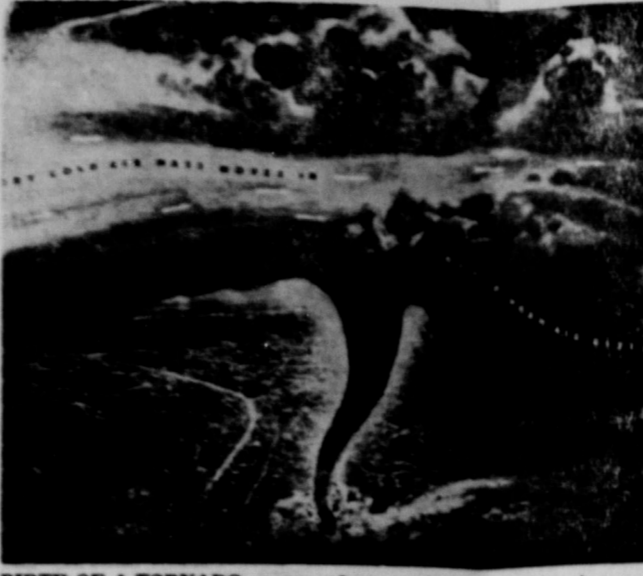

## Wheat Quotas To Be Approved June 20 This Year

As announced by Lamar D. Aten, Jr., Manager of Lamb County ASC Office, Littlefield, Thursday, June 20, has been set as the date for a referendum to determine producer approval or disapproval of wheat quotas.

The ASC manager also stated that the minimum national average support for 1958 crop wheat in the 36 State commercial area has been set at \$1.78 per bushel, if quotas are approved, this price reflects 75 percent of estimated transitional parity; and that for price-support computations, the wheat supply is estimated at 141.8 percent of the normal supply and

indicates a support level at the minimum of the variable range or 75 percent of parity.

At least two-thirds of the producers voting in the referendum on June 20 must approve quotas for the 1958 crop before they can be put in effect, said Mr. Aten.

For the benefit of the wheat grower 15 acres of wheat for harvest Manager given the following information:

"Growers who will have more than 15 acres of wheat to harvest as gain in 1958 come under the regulation of quotas and will be eligible to vote in the referendum. Marketing quotas have been approved by farmers for the last four wheat crops. In last year's

referendum on quotas for the 1957 crop, 87.4 percent of the farmers voting favored quotas. In the previous vote on 1956 quotas the vote was 77.5 percent favorable.

The law provides for a variable national average wheat price support level on the basis of the estimated supply of wheat available for the marketing year. The variable range is 75 to 90 percent of parity. The wheat supply for the 1958-59 wheat marketing year is now estimated at 141.8 percent of a normal supply for the 1958-59 marketing year. If the net supply is more than 10 percent of the normal supply a support level of 75 percent of parity is indicated. This gives the minimum national average support of \$1.78 per bushel. "This minimum average support will not be reduced but may be increased if a combination of the actual wheat parity price as of July 1, 1958, and the wheat supply relationships as of that same date indicate a higher support price.

## Religion Needed Behind The Wheel Of Your Auto

AUSTIN. — J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association said today, "In no place is religion more practical than behind the wheel of a car."

The problem of traffic accidents is not merely a technical problem of engineering, licensing and enforcement, Musick explained. It is basically a human problem. Accidents are caused by drivers, not by automobiles. "All the advances made in automobile design, better and safer streets and highways, and new techniques and devices for efficient traffic movement will not solve the traffic accident problem until drivers really become aware of their moral and social obligation behind the wheel of a car," the traffic expert said. "Deliberate or intentional violation of a traffic law or sign, or

of the dictates of common sense or courtesy, takes the 'accident' factor out of traffic accidents. Such accidents place the burden of guilt upon the negligent driver. And if death results, the guilty driver also has broken the Commandment—Thou Shalt Not Kill."

"It is time for all persons who profess any religious faith, to accept their moral responsibilities in helping to prevent traffic accidents," Musick said.

"Anger, impatience, selfishness—have no place on the roads. They lead to accidents and often to death. Love, courtesy and consideration, on the other hand, will reduce traffic accidents."

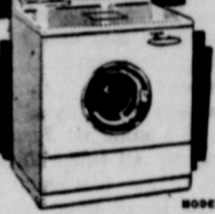

Peeler, Hereford, President of the Association which includes Grain Sorghum Producers thru out the High Plains Area of Texas and New Mexico, said, "We are glad our Association was among the first to urge the establishment of the High Plains Station. Research conducted here will be of benefit to all Grain Sorghum producing areas. We are expecting large numbers of visitors not only from the High Plains Area, but also from the 300 to 400 miles around to come to the Station to observe and study the experiments."

Grain Sorghum research will include fertilizer with time, rate and method of application, and irrigation studies. The crop research will include 49 varieties in 4 row plots 100 feet long replicated four times and 101 experimental strains for observation in single row plots. In addition, the general crop will consist of larger acreages of several different varieties.

Mr. Peeler stated, "The Association hopes to be able to furnish support for additional research on problems of Grain Sorghum production, consumption and marketing."

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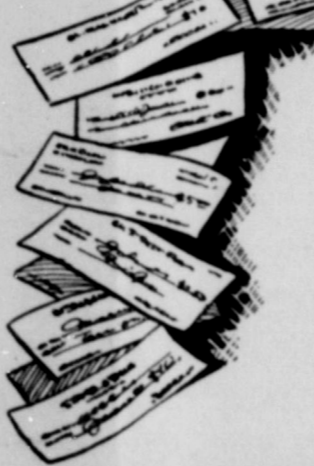

## Tech Scientists Study Cheddar Cheese Process

LUBBOCK — Ten per cent can be cut from the time and labor required to prepare bulk cheddar for cheese, Texas Tech scientists report.

Secret of the improvement is in providing better "working conditions" for the acid-producing bacteria, Researcher Ed Jarman said. The acid is the primary factor in cheddar formation.

Economic importance of the discovery can be seen in the fact that more than 900 million pounds of cheddar or cheddar types of cheese are produced in this country annually. Eighty per cent of bulk

cheddar goes into process cheese. In conventional preparation, bulk cheddar is cooked at about 104 degrees Fahrenheit.

By testing the influence of rate and temperature on acid development, the Tech scientists found that acid-producing bacteria were most efficient at temperatures between 90 and 96 degrees F.

Higher temperatures inhibited such bacterial activity.

Numerous trials were made at varying temperatures and cooking times to determine the most efficient method of producing bulk cheddar.

Jarman said the Texas Tech method should top at least an hour off a nine-hour bulk cheddar operation.

Although there was some bitterness noted in bulk cheddar produced by the Tech method, that bitterness was not apparent in processed cheese — made from such cheddar, Jarman declared.

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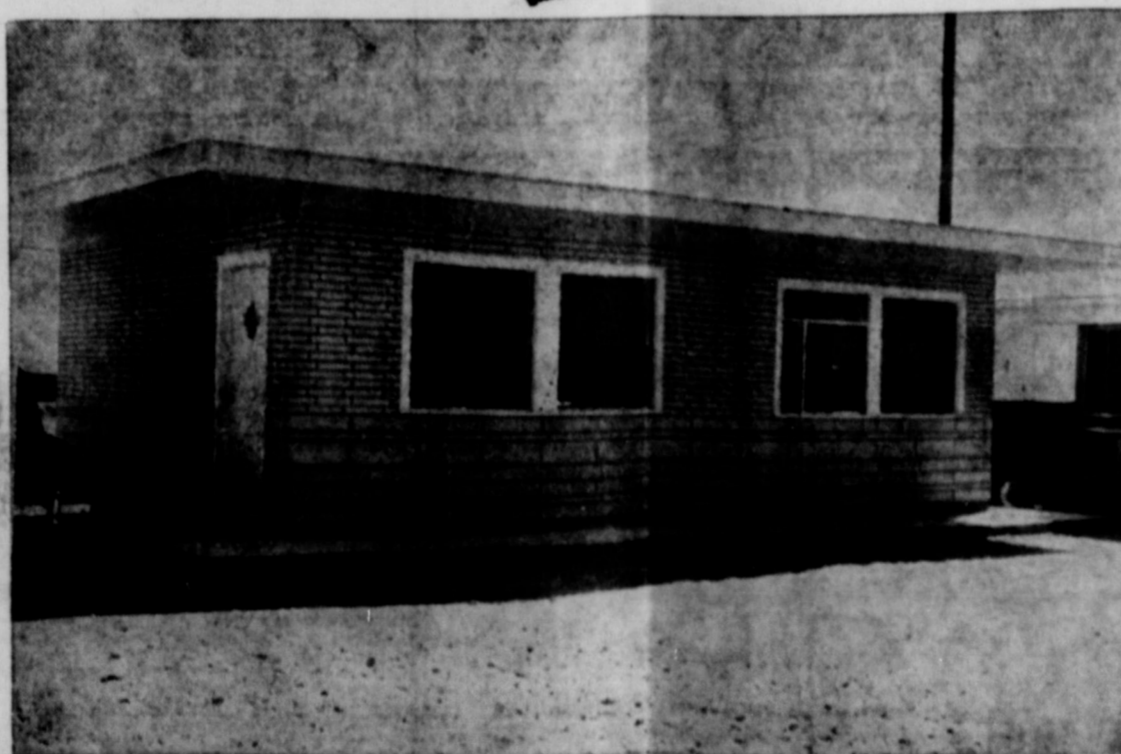

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**Scientific 'Chaperone' For Natural Gas Lines Announced**

**LUBBOCK —** A Texas Tech researcher will attempt to create a scientific "chaperone" to keep a more accurate check on the behavior of natural gas in transmission lines.

As much as \$2,500 may be saved each day at a single pipeline transmission point by determining the deviation of natural gas from ideal gas laws, and compensating for it in volume measurement, according to W. L. Ducker, petroleum engineering professor conducting the project.

Because of certain characteristics of gas in lines between source and consumer, there presently is no way to measure or audit accurately the total gas in the system, Ducker explained. The current method of measuring gas is with an orifice meter, which records pressure only.

Ducker said, "The pipeline people call the gas deviation factor 'z'. Knowledge of the 'z' factor is necessary to determine accurate volume. Without the factor, volume measurement may be off as much as one per cent."

A periodic laboratory measure of special gravity is not necessarily accurate because gas in the transmission lines is constantly changing, Ducker pointed out. The problem, he said, is to find a simple, accurate means of sampling gas continually and making a direct and accurate determination of volume. Ducker said he hopes to develop an attachment which will indicate on a graph a minute-by-minute determination of the 'z' factor.

The project is being done in conjunction with the Tech Office of Research, a central agency of information and counsel on such work at the institution.
