Springlake Woman Injured In

Mrs. Elton Schaefer of Springlake was injured when the car in which she was riding collided with another vehicle about 11:30 a.m., Saturday, October 30, at an intersection on an unpaved county road four miles north and two miles west of Springlake. She was taken to Medical Arts Hospital in Littlefield by private automobile and treated for minor head and chest injuries. She was dismissed from the hospital Monday morning.

Mrs. Schaefer was a passenger in a 1971 model Dodge automobile being driven by her husband Elton Schaefer, who was not hurt in the accident.

The couple were traveling south on the road and were enroute to Lubbock when the accident occurred.

The driver of the other vehicle Mrs. Clinton D. Holliman, a mail carrier from Hart, was also taken to a hospital in Dimmitt by private automobile where she was treated and released. Her mother-in-law, Mrs. Annie Holliman, who was a passenger in the pickup was not injured.

Mrs. Holliman was travelling east when the 1971 Ford pickup she was driving and the Schaefer's car collided with each other.

Mrs. Schaefer stated that there was no stop sign at the intersection and that neither of the drivers saw the other vehicle until it was too late to avoid an accident.

Investigating officer, Bill Angel of the Highway Patrol office in Littlefield said that he issued a citation for a right away violation to Schaefer.

Angel also said that both vehicles were heavily damaged, but he felt that the Schaefer's

automobile probably received worse damages than the pickup did.

The Hostess gift awarded at each meeting was won last Thursday by Mrs. Marie Bibby.

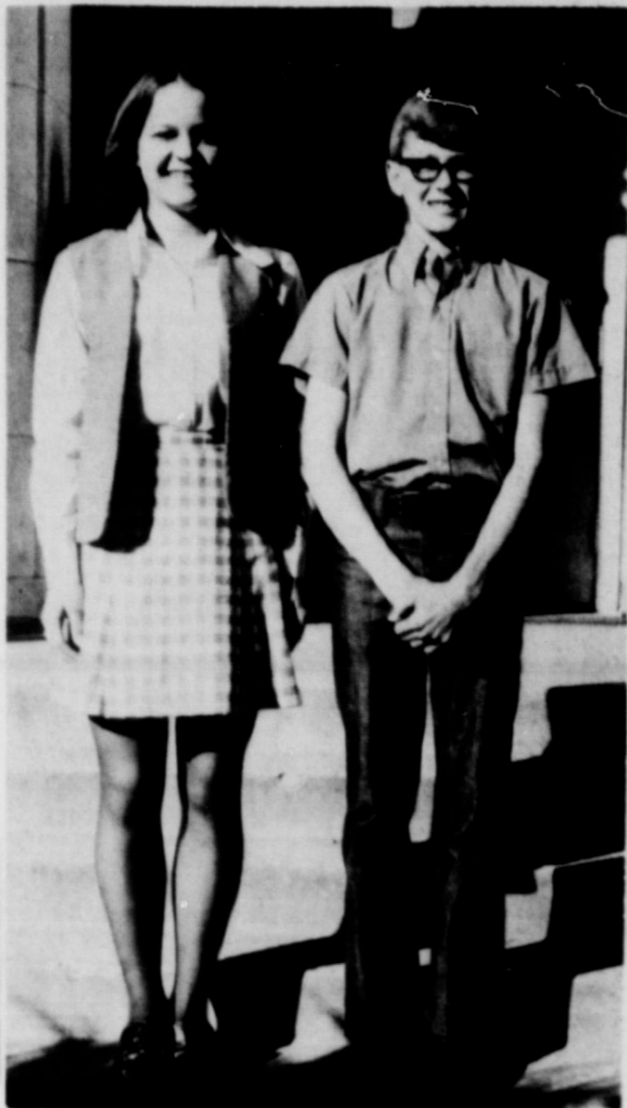

Resentment is most likely to occur when a person finds himself (or herself) out of right relationship with God. Check yourself and see if that is not true.

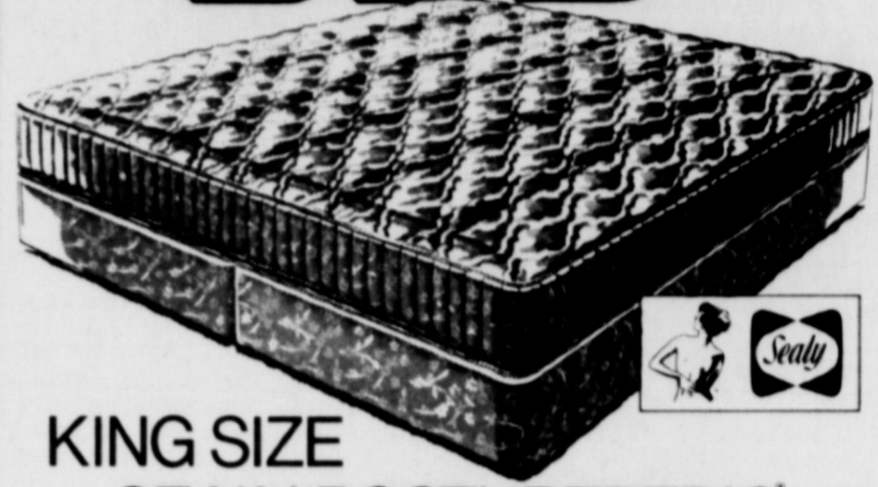
What can be done about it? Face it squarely for what it really is -- sin. A sin that God is delighted to forgive if

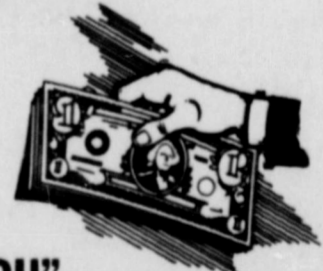

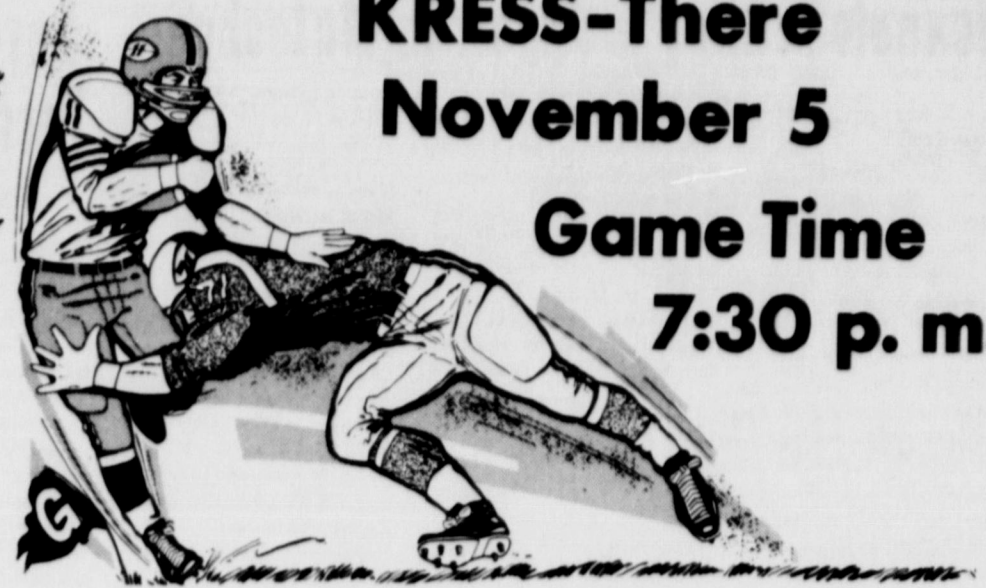

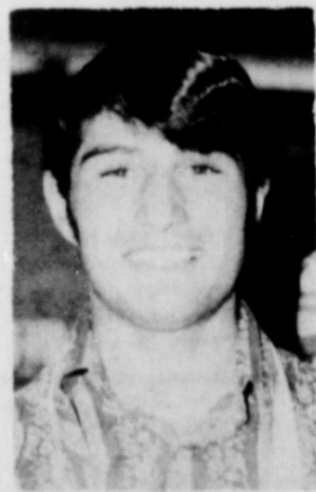
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
