Outdoors business is picking up rapidly right now. When the weather begins to get a little cooler conditions will be exactly right for bass. The hunters have already started on doves, with open season on other game coming a long soon.

Let's talk about fishing first. Although a lot of fishermen take home a full string in Summer, its pretty generally agreed that Fall is a better time, for several reasons.

In cooler weather, fish are inclined to move around more. That takes more energy, and the fish therefore are prompted to do more feeding.

Thus, in fall, the bass are hungry and their normal sources of food are apt to be somewhat scanty, so they look with favor on your minnow or plug.

Old timers in the bass fishing game have started already, as a matter of fact. Their top-water lures dusted off and hooks sharpened, they may be seen at daylight these mornings and late afternoons, moving along slowly in their boats, tossing plugs or flies along the edges of weed bed, under willows, close to stumps and rocks.

Such a procedure is calculated to pay off, especially when that change in weather comes. Want advice? Try just before and just after the first norther.

Those Old Cats

Catfishing has been the best bet for most anglers during the summer, and in many lakes and streams, the trotline operators have been highly successful. Catfishing is good in Texas the year round. Here's a fish that responds readily to almost any bait, offers excellent sport to the still fisherman, and affords a tasty dish for the table.

A word about carp. This fish was imported from Europe many years ago. There, it was and is considered a delicacy. Taken handily in most Texas lakes and streams, the carp is a valiant and he comes in king sizes. Rig your line with a nylon leader, and tie your sinker so the fish won't feel tension when he samples the dough bait. Let him run with it and then strike—hard.

Now about coastal fishing—the outlook is excellent. Back in 1951 there was a freeze that killed many game fish. But now, the

young have had time to mature.

Indication of good salt water fishing came in the summer, when many anglers returned with record catches of trout. In numbers and in sizes they were better than they had been for years.

Nine-pound trout were captured. A pair of Austin anglers, Steve Elhelberger and Eldon Powell, took 229 speck, weighing 394 pounds, in 3 and one-half hours from the intercoastal canal near Austin. The fish took shrimp as long as the supply lasted, then they hit spoons.

That was the biggest catch ever made by two fishermen as far as the boatman knew.

Come fall, there will be more catches of trout, and the redfish will start striking. When it gets a little cooler, the sheepshead will be active.

Plenty of Birds

Dove hunters know that the supply of these birds is abundant this season. Spring rains caused the cover crops to grow well. Rains during the season will cause the birds to scatter, and cold weather will inspire them to migrate southward, but all considered, the dove hunting prospects are superb.

The same applies to quail. Not only has there been a good normal hatch, but landowners have contributed to the supply.

Hunters Get Ready

Range is good for deer and antelope, as a result of spring rains, and the hunters are getting that look in their eyes. Unquestionably, there will be a fine deer harvest this season.

Turkeys abound, too, but there has been a reduction in limit in some counties. And that statement calls for a warning.

Check your local regulations before you go hunting, because county laws vary widely.

From Canada, the news is that there has been a fine season for the duck and goose hatch. These birds will be in Texas when wintry winds blow.

Survey Shows Irrigation Still Expanding in Area

College Station — Almost a quarter of a million acres was added to the total acreage being irrigated in the High Plains area of Texas during the past year. Water to take care of the additional acreage and to permit a better job of irrigating existing lands came from an additional 5,653 wells.

These facts were revealed in the annual survey of irrigation on the High Plains recently released by D. W. Sherrill, irrigation agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with headquarters in Lubbock. Sherrill's report covered irrigation activities in 42 counties.

Information in the survey was obtained from data supplied by the agricultural agents in the counties concerned, and points up the great importance of irrigation to the Plain's agricultural industry.

The report shows that 18,344 farms in the 42 counties are irrigated. The total acreage under irrigation now stands at 4,568,880 acres and the number of wells at 42,225. Hale county farmers are now irrigating 500,000 acres and lead the area in that respect. Lubbock and Hockley counties have the largest number of irrigated farms and number of wells. Seven counties in the area, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Lamb, Hale and Lubbock, are listed as having in excess of 300,000 acres each under irrigation.

Natural gas is being used for fuel on 19,644 wells, butane on 16,226 and electricity on 5,840 wells. The list on 12,307 wells was listed as under 125 feet and over 125 feet on 29,918 wells.

Blowing fuses, flickering lights, and shrinking TV pictures when additional electrical appliances are turned on are all signs that circuits are overloaded.

For safety's sake, call in an electrical contractor when this occurs, advises Ulrich. Don't play "bandy-man" with something that can be as dangerous as electricity. Don't

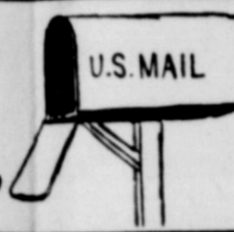

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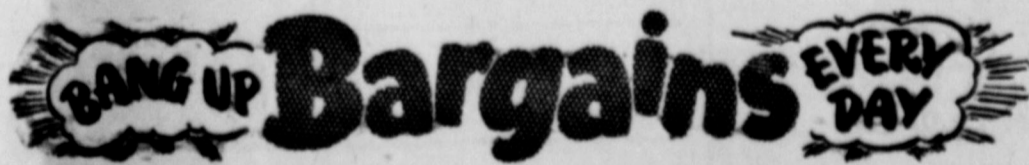

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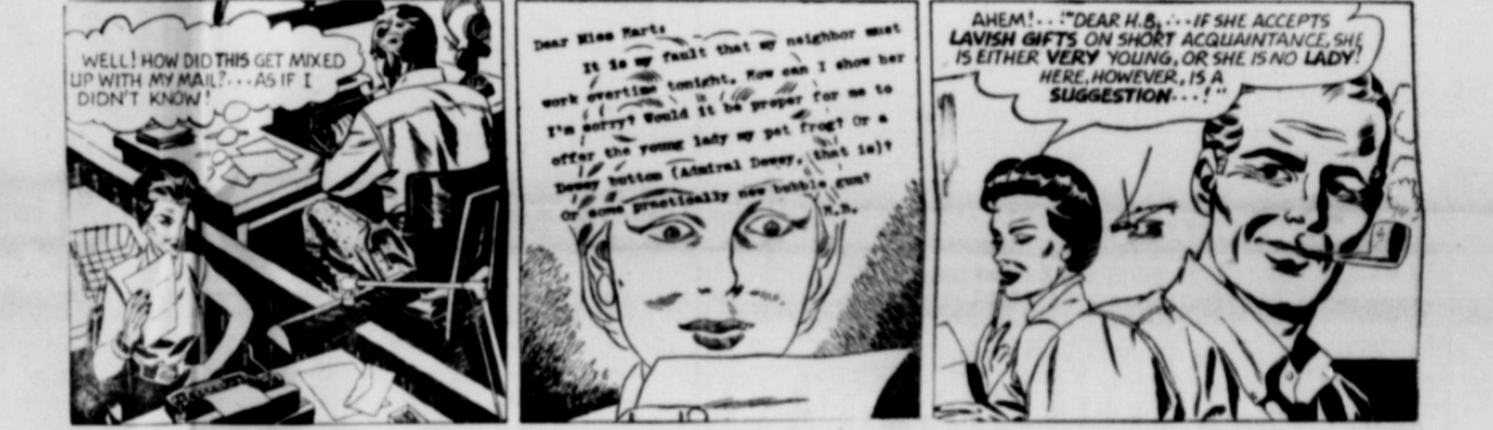

Survey To Determine Rehabilitation Needs Of Post - Polio Patients In County

A county-wide survey to discover the current rehabilitation needs of all post-polio patients is being conducted this month by the Lamb County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Rev. Donald W. Luckemeyer, chapter chairman, announced today.

The local survey is part of a nationwide project by the National Foundation to compile a roster of polio cases of all ages and degree of disability, regardless of date the disease began.

"Modern medicine has made impressive strides in developing new rehabilitation techniques in recent years," Rev. Luckemeyer said. "Pilot surveys already undertaken show that there are thousands of polio-handicapped in the United States who have not yet had an opportunity for medical evaluation to determine if they might benefit from these new techniques."

"The March of Dimes organization, having scored a tremendous victory in its war on polio, does not now propose to walk off and leave the wounded behind as long as help for them is possible. We wish to find everyone who has had polio, whether paralytic or non-paralytic. We want to know what the special problems may be so that they may be helped to regain useful lives, if humanly possible even though it will take a considerable period of time."

Information sought for each patient includes whether he is employed or attends school, is he can climb stairs and dress himself, whether he receives regular treat-

ment, and if he uses a respiratory aid. Information gained will be helpful to all related agencies and organizations.

Rev. Luckemeyer asks that all persons who have ever had polio, whether disabled or not — send their names and address directly to Mrs. Buster Owens, Jr., secretary, Lamb County Chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, 129 East 17th Street, Littlefield, Texas.

This information is urgently needed and should be sent at once.

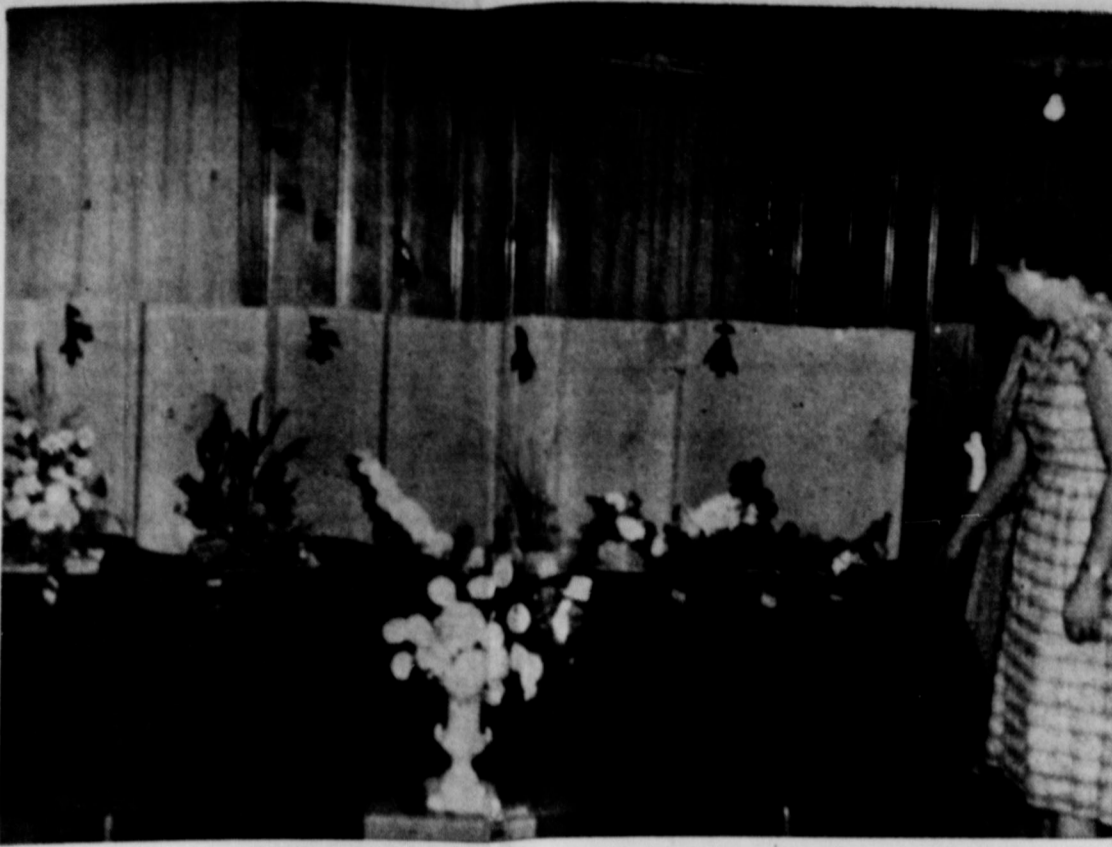
