All will explain the latest happenings on their situation.

## Dick Evans and Verdena Curtis Selected Outstanding Students

The award for Earth's outstanding citizen was presented to Jarvis Angeley, climaxing the 4th annual Chamber of Commerce banquet held at the school cafeteria Friday night.

Angeley, a farmer and civic leader, was described by Bud Irvine, Earth Church of Christ minister, as a citizen that has always worked for his town and has been a good neighbor, good citizen and a good man.

Angeley who was speechless when the award was made, later said, "I will have to go to work now, to live up to this honor."

Dick Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Evans and Verdena Curtis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Curtis, Rt. 1, Dimmitt were presented awards for the outstanding students of the Springlake High School.

The awards included outstanding citizenship, leadership, and scholarship.

Evans, a 17 year old senior student, has been outstanding in athletics and is president of the Student Council. He plans to enroll in Texa Tech to study engineering or architecture.

Miss Curtis is also a 17 year old senior, and a member of the Student Council. She was recently the recipient of a \$500 Texas Home Demonstration scholarship. Miss Curtis has been active and devoted much time to 4-H club and FFA work. Her plans are to study homemaking at West Texas State College.

Principal speaker was Marshall Formby, of Plainview, former chairman of the State Highway Commission.

Formby, who was born in Hopkins County but now lives at

Plainview, is an attorney and owner of several Texas radio stations. During his six years on the Highway Commission, he has traveled to every area of Texas many times.

In his talk to the Chamber of Commerce audience, Formby said that leadership is here for development of a greater place to live and that the chamber of commerce represents a cross section of the community.

Formby said, that he was not going to get excited about Russia's scientific progress in hurling satellites into outer space. He said this country was not asleep and that we had the greatest scientists in the world. He toured Russia four years ago with a group of United States radio and newspaper editors and got a good look at the Russian education system.

"America has enough youths with natural inclination to science to cope with any scientific achievement which might come from Red emphasis on scientific education," Formby said. "I'm not going to get excited about the Russians, neither am I going to ignore them. However, I do not believe that the future of mankind is going to be fashioned in the slave laboratories behind the Iron Curtain. A man in Russia has nothing to say about his government, said Formby.

"Our system of free enterprise is still the best. The Communist system has killed the individual's incentive for progress. In the final analysis," Formby said, "We should keep the United States spiritually and financially strong and keep a good armament program to help prevent another world war."

Formby said the percentage of Russian youths attending college was very small and that their schools were not superior to American schools. He stressed the fact that during the past 50 years, Russian schools have produced only three Nobel prize winners, while the schools of this country have produced nearly 40.

Referring to the development of communities, he said that towns have personalities like people. He added that towns and cities have this responsibility of building churches, schools, roads, parks, streets and other necessary improvements which serve people.

"Many young folks want to live in their home towns and become a part of the communities when they grow up," Formby said. "You have a responsibility to help provide for them opportunities. That is all they ask of you."

Prior to Formby's address, new officers and directors of the Earth Chamber of Commerce were introduced by Carroll McDonald, vice president; A. D. Taylor, secretary-treasurer; M. H. Been, A. D. Taylor, Ted Borum, Phil Raught, Bill Beasley, Paul Wood, Bill Bryant, Carroll McDonald, Carlis Bills and Golden Ferguson, are directors.

Supt. Bill Mann was toastmaster for the event. Invocation was by Elroy Wislan. Dinner music was presented by Linda Kay Lawrence. Special music was presented by Norman Hemphill and the Springlake School Music Department, which included, Sharon Wheatley, Linda Kay Lawrence, Lenette Dutton and Mrs. George Laing, pianist.

Welcome and introduction of guests was given by Jarvis Angeley. Guests were present from Oton, Muleshoe, Pleasant Valley, Dimmitt and Littlefield. 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

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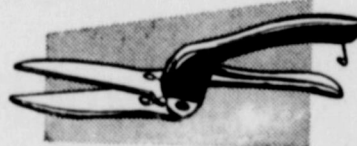
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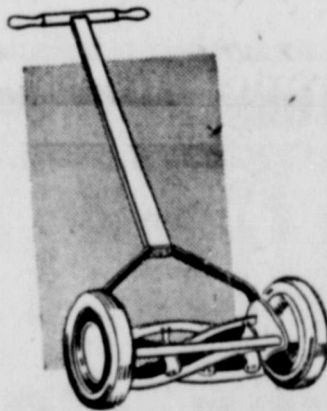

## Charter Granted Now Known As High Plains Research Foundation

The rapid progress of the High Plains Station at Halfway in Hale County in attaining full stature as an agricultural research center now warrants reorganization of the station on an independent basis, Karl Hohlitzelle of Dallas, President of the Texas Research Foundation, announced Saturday, April 18.

"Texas Research Foundation established and staffed the 310-acre High Plains Station in the fall of 1956 at the request of farmers, ranchmen, businessmen and industrialists in that region," Mr. Hohlitzelle said.

"The phenomenal success with which our neighbors on the High Plains have developed that station into a fully functioning research center in an incredibly short period is heartening confirmation of the Foundation's self-help philosophy."

A charter from the State of Texas for the new institution to be known as the High Plains Research Foundation, was granted on April 8, 1959, with the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees being Frank Moore, R. Virgil

Payne, Harold Hinn, Grady Tunnell, Jason Gordon, Hale County; Roy Mack, George Pfeiffenberger, Lubbock County; Ewal Quebe, Floyd County; R. G. Peeler, Deaf Smith County; Grady Goodpasture, Terry County and Virgil Patterson, Potter County.

Mr. Hinn, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the High Plains Research Foundation, expressed gratitude to Texas Research Foundation for providing leadership for the establishment and development of the facilities at Halfway in Hale County. "Without the assistance of Dr. C. L. Lardell and his staff at Renner to get the research program underway the High Plains Station could never become a reality," Mr. Hinn stated.

"The industrial and agricultural growth of our region had presented agriculture with a number of pressing problems whose solutions demanded on the spot research," Mr. Hinn said.

"On several different occasions, we approached state agencies and the legislature with a request to

provide facilities for meeting our needs, but each time our effort was fruitless."

Mr. Hinn described the more pressing of the region's major farm problems as being the efficient use and conservation of water, determination of fertilizer response for profitable fertility management and a need for a new crop.

"Because of the lack of an experiment station, farmers had to resort to private water, soil and crop experiments, which proved costly and unsatisfactory," Mr. Hinn continued.

He expressed pleasure with the

progress which the High Plains Station is making in attacking the major problems. The station has enjoyed widespread acceptance by farmers and businessmen from the beginning.

Mr. Hinn saw for the High Plains Research Foundation a future growth and achievement which would assure it a permanent place in the development of the great High Plains country.

Mr. Hohlitzelle said that effective May 1, 1959, all operations of the former High Plains Station of Texas Research Foundation will be turned over to the High Plains Research Foundation.
