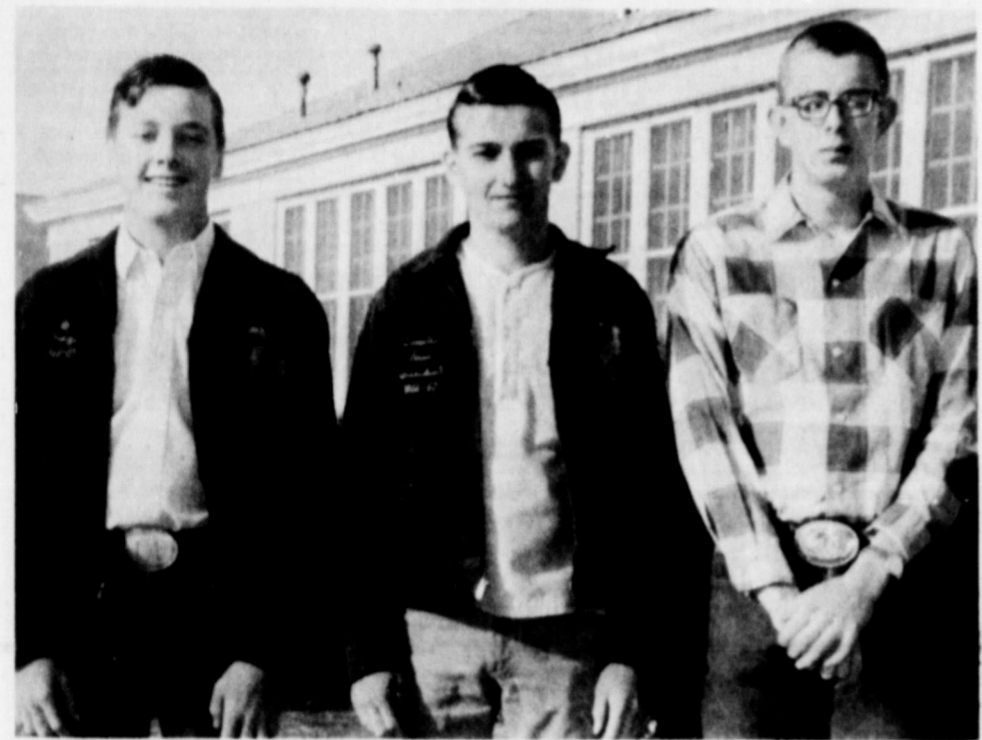

Local School Receives \$496.35 From State Tournament

Three checks totaling \$496.35 have been received by Springlake-Earth school, as full payment for their participation in the Girls State Basketball Tournament in Austin March 9, 10 and 11.

The checks were sent to each school, as the auditor worked out details from the eighteen schools participating. The first check received by Springlake-Earth was a mileage check for \$87, figured at the rate of 10 cents a mile for the round trip to and from Austin. All 18 schools were paid on the same basis.

Bells, (telephone bells, that is) will be ringing this week, as a special committee calls Springlake-Earth residents, to remind them that the Mobile

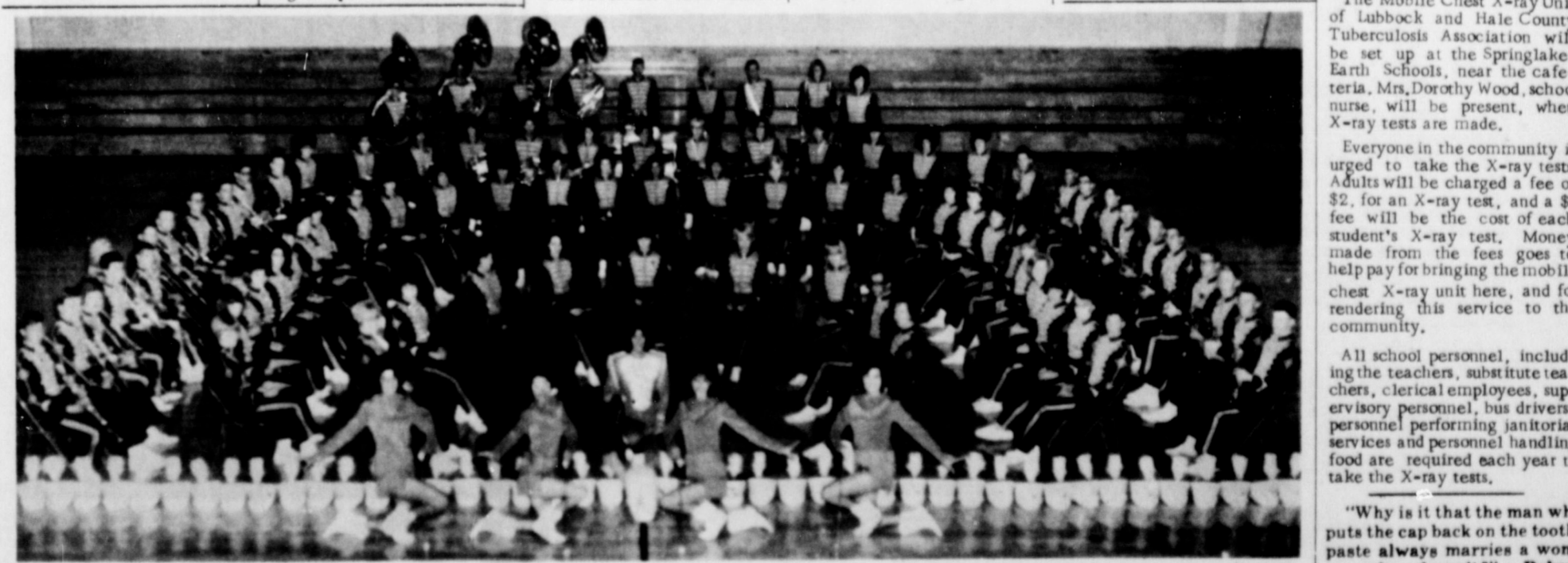
X-ray Unit will be in this area Tuesday, May 9. The Earth and Springlake Lions Clubs will sponsor the annual program.

The Mobile Chest X-Ray Unit of Lubbock and Hale County Tuberculosis Association will be set up at the Springlake-Earth Schools, near the cafeteria.

Everyone in the community is urged to take the X-ray tests. Adults will be charged a fee of \$2. for an X-ray test, and a \$1 fee will be the cost of each student's X-ray test.

All school personnel, including the teachers, substitute teachers, clerical employees, supervisory personnel, bus drivers, personnel performing janitorial services and personnel handling food are required each year to take the X-ray tests.

Working an old saw to death can be tiring as well as boring. But, in reading of the newest outbursts of protest marches by our bearded beatniks, not to mention our draft card burning patriots, the subject cannot be simply overlooked. What these people need is good old fashioned therapy. Mental, of course. I suppose everyone knows that psychotherapy is the oldest form of treatment known to man. It was in use long before doctors and medicines came on the scene and one simply does not read of the Greek youths burning their shields or melting their armor in protest. That these groups are a minority cannot be doubted, but that they are increasing in number can no longer be overlooked either. There is definitely something lacking in their mental make-up and what worries me is that they seem to have a complete lack of purpose or dedication to anything. They protest just to be protesting. I mentioned mental therapy. I believe that if the great majority of these off-beats would take the time to discuss what this life is about, and what this country really means to all of us, it would help them immeasurably. Who would they discuss it with? I believe the best source available is what we affectionately call the "Oldtimers."

I recently had about a four, maybe five hour visit with one of the local men whom I would classify as definitely being good therapy if one would listen and heed. He talked of many things. He spoke with quiet conviction and sincerity. The things he said were truths and if all the beatniks in this country could listen to him, there is a great possibility they would find their "Place in the Sun", and stop all the unnecessary nonsense they are doing in an effort to relieve the tension they must feel. I am speaking of B.V. Padon.

Mr. Padon talked quietly on religion and what it meant to people. He was most definitely not superficial. He spoke of working the land and what good, honest labor can do for mankind. He told of the need for honesty among men, and of the necessity of disciplining children as they grew, but that with discipline love must be shown. Mr. Padon was by no means blustering. He did no shouting, was not emotional; there was no frantic waving of the arms or loud, vociferous swearing as some think they have to do to make a point. What he said, he said simply, truthfully, and with a solemn honesty that made you listen.

It does not behoove me to quote Mr. Padon verbatim, though I remember clearly the things he said. It does behoove me to say I am glad there are people such as he still around today. This is good. It reminds me that there is reason for faith in this nation and the people that go to make it up. For men like Mr. Padon can equal hundreds, nay, myriads of off-beat characters that feel they must find expression in shameful acts against the very country that gives them their freedom.

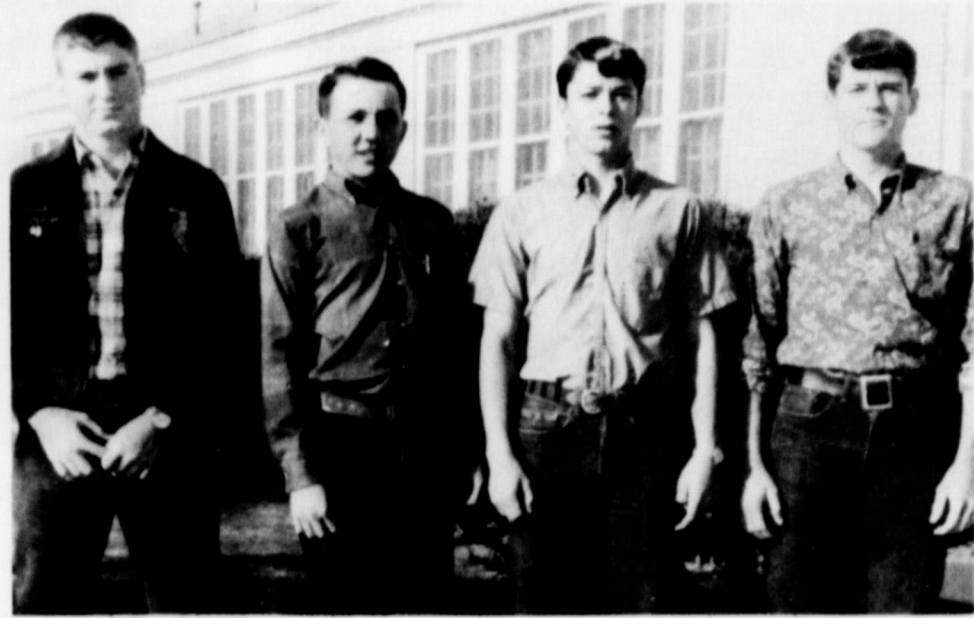
