V. M. Peterman, chairman of the Lamb County Historical Society will be in charge of dedication services, and will be privileged to unveil the plaque.

Rev. Walter Barthoef, pastor of the First Christian Church of Muleshoe will give the invocation.

Master of ceremonies will be Kenneth Duncan of Pleasant Valley.

Mrs. Bonnie Haberer will introduce some of the students that attended school there 54 years ago, back in the pioneering days of 1921. Some of the trustees of the school are hopefully going to attend the services.

The little school was a good school in those early days, but when schools in the nation consolidated, Pleasant Valley was consolidated with Muleshoe and Springlake.

This one would imagine would leave the little school vacant. Not in Pleasant Valley, the folks who populate P. V. community have pride in their community, their youth and in Americanism. They used the building for scout meeting, civic groups and as a social center for Pleasant Valley community gatherings.

It was always a place for neighbor to visit neighbor in the early days when there were not too many activities to attend.

Mrs. Bonnie Haberer, who has lived all her entire adult life there, can recall clearly when the community used the little school building for community dances. There was no drinking just Pleasant Valley folks gathered to dance and play music.

The school building was moved to the present site several years ago. The new auditorium was built in 1956. Again, Pleasant Valley folks showed they were of a very high calibre, and still wished to retain association with their neighbors, like in the early days. Most of all they wanted their children to love their home and community as they themselves loved it. So they worked to get together funds to build the auditorium.

The old school building, that held many memories was adjoined to the auditorium. It was left as it was, only the cloak rooms were made into rest rooms. Kitchen appliances added made a kitchen for the community.

The entire community building has had a face lifting, new roof and set in order getting ready for the dedication Sunday. You are invited, if you wish to see a proud community inhabited by some of the finest people on earth.

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## 7 Accidents In County In February

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of February, 1975, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1975 shows a total of 16 accidents resulting in no persons killed and eight persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for February, 1975, shows a total of 435 accidents resulting in 12 persons killed and 199 persons injured as compared to February, 1974, with 322 accidents resulting in ten persons killed and 208 persons injured. This was 113 more accidents, two more killed and nine less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 12 traffic deaths for the month of February, 1975, occurred in the following counties; two in Potter; one each in Archer, Cochran, Collingsworth, Hale, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lubbock, Palo Pinto, Randall and Wichita.

## SP Alcoholism Counseling Headquarters Moves To Lamb County

Littlefield--(Special)---Headquarters of the South Plains Alcoholism Counseling Services Project has been moved to the Lamb County Community Action Neighborhood Center building on North U. S. Highway 385 in Littlefield, according to Howard Maddera, Executive/Director of the South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. Prior to moving to Littlefield, the headquarters of the alcoholism counseling services project was in Levelland.

Joe B. Meador is the Coordinator/Counselor for the 14 county project and Miss Laura Crayton is the secretary for the operation and both will be stationed in the Littlefield office. Alcoholism Counselor for Lamb, Hale and Bailey Counties is David Carey, stationed at 1200 Galveston in Plainview.

Mrs. Paula Valdez is Alcoholism Counselor for Garza, Lynn and Terry Counties and is stationed in Post and Clarence Walters is Alcoholism Counselor for Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, King and Motley Counties, and is stationed in Crosbyton.

An Alcoholism Counselor position is now being filled in Brownfield and this counselor will cover Yoakum, Hockley and Cochran Counties. Alcoholism counseling for the 14 county area has the approval of the South Plains Association of Governments and county officials, city officials, law enforcement officials in the area have all agreed that the program has potential to touch the indigenous people of poverty as well as others who have problems resulting from alcohol abuse and alcoholism.

Since the program has been in operation the alcoholism counselors have initiated two DWI classes for court probates and have done followup of clients who attended the classes. Counselors have participated in four DWI classes held in area counties.

Alcohol abusers who realize they have a problem are aided through counseling sessions held by the counselors and referrals are made to five health providers in the area that offer treatment. Group meetings to discuss the disease of alcoholism, the nation's fourth killer disease, in counties.

One unique feature the project has brought about is six groups of Spanish speaking people and two programs designed for Blacks, Mexican-American and Black people have not been able in the past to enter the alcoholism programs offered within the area in an acceptable and feasible way. Goal of the ethnic minority groups is to design programs where people actually feel that they have their own group in which they may study the results of alcohol abuse and alcoholism on "home turf."

School systems including universities and colleges in this region have a keen interest in the way to deal with alcohol abusers since the disease is on the rise and even in high schools a large per cent of the students who once used hard drugs are turning to alcohol because society accepts drinking as well as law enforcement to a certain extent.

Any person in State Planning Region II may receive free counseling service by contacting any one of the alcoholism counselors. Persons who wish to contact alcoholism counselor and do not know how, may call 806-385-3756 in Littlefield and they will be told how to reach the alcoholism counselors.

The large area, 14 counties, cannot be adequately covered at all times by alcoholism counselors, but local volunteers who have joined the battle to curb alcohol abuse can aid in counseling and referral. Some 100 volunteers in the 14 county area will be aiding the project staff prior to June 30 it is as-

## Cattle Numbers Up But Feeding Down

Cattle feeding is down in Texas but the number of cows and calves is up. While cattle feeding has remained under pressure during the past two years, the breeding herd should be under pressure to be reduced in 1975, according to a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"In Texas cattle feeding on February 1 was 47 per cent below levels last year," points out Dr. Ed Uvacek. "At the same time feeding levels were down 37 per cent in the seven major cattle feeding states."

Uvacek says that placement of cattle and calves into Texas feedlots has also dropped considerably, being down 56 per cent in January compared to the same month a year ago. Placements were down 42 per cent in the seven major feeding states.

"With most feedlots facing a breakeven cost for Choice steers of about \$42-45 per hundredweight, and market prices nowhere near that level, the feeding industry will continue at a crisis level," contends Uvacek. On the other hand, the number of breeding cows in the United States is up four per cent over last year, with cow and heifer numbers up six per cent in Texas.

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"This means a large calf crop in 1975 that will continue to add to the woes of the cow-calf operator," notes the specialist. "These excess supplies should stimulate a liquidation of cows during the year."

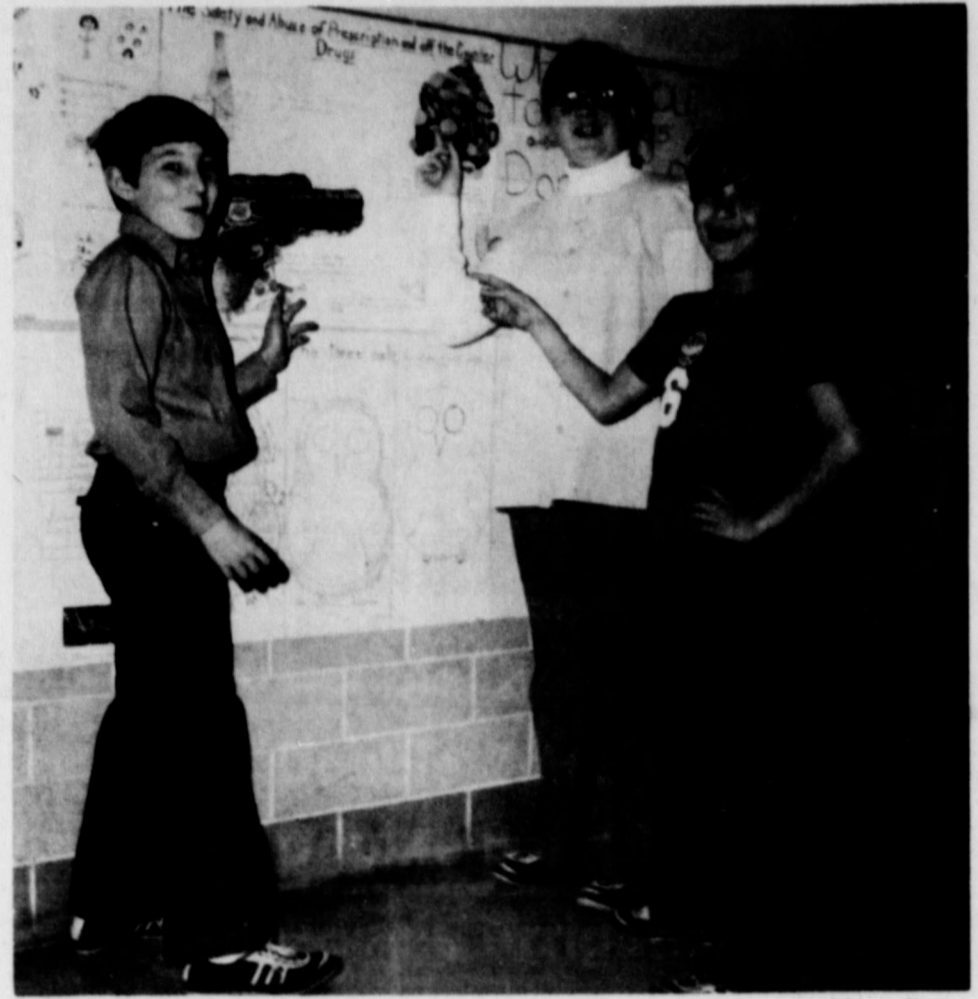

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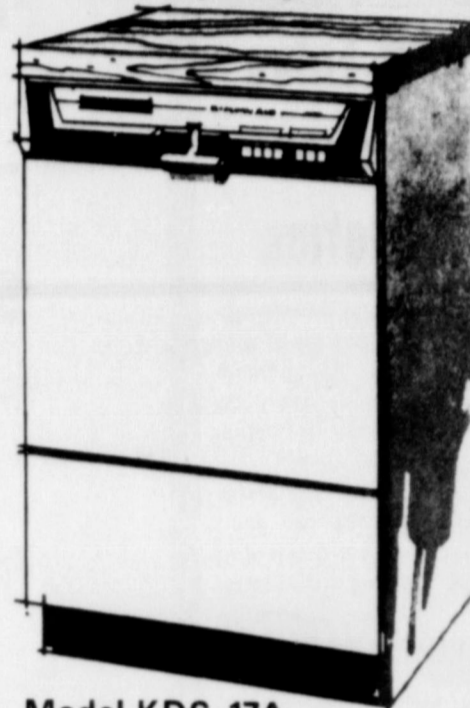

**TEXAS TALK**  
By CALVIN WOOD and EARL JORDAN

Q: How much water is actually needed for the production of a good cotton crop?

A: In most areas of Texas, with the exception of a couple of times of the year, the most prevalent answer would be "All we can get". More specifically, authorities now estimate the weight of water evaporated from an acre of cotton during a typical summer day to be as much as 68,000 pounds. That's equivalent to more than a quarter of an inch of rainfall a day. Considerably more than we can count on having. Irrigation supplements the rainfall wherever possible to provide an effective 20 inches of moisture during the average growing season.

In some areas of the really arid Southwest, farmers sometimes irrigate enough to provide the equivalent of 32 inches of rainfall through the course of a full year.

Rainfall can be most harmful just after planting when the water may lower the soil temperature below 58 degrees.
