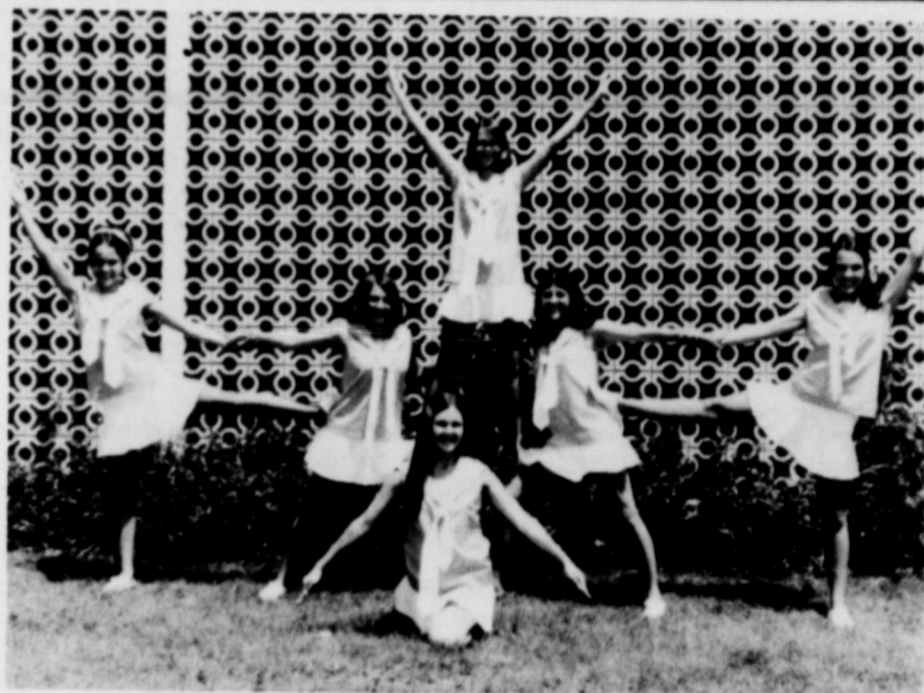

## Trustees Vote To Rebuild Bleachers

Members of the Springlake-Earth Board of Trustees voted to replace the bleachers on the south side of the Wolverine Football Stadium during their regular monthly session held Monday evening, June 14.

During a previous meeting, the Trustees voted to strip the bleachers down to the framework in order to be able to precisely determine if the bleachers should be completely rebuilt or if they should be rebuilt on the now existing framework. It was determined that the framework needed to be reconstructed and a complete rebuilding process is now being negotiated. Lumber from the south side bleachers will be sold to the highest bidder during a meeting July 8. Those interested in bidding on the lumber should have their bids into the school business office by 4 p. m. on the afternoon of Thursday, July 8. At that time the lumber will be sold to the highest bidder.

During the regular meeting, the average daily attendance for the 1970-71 school year was reviewed. The ADA for the first nine weeks reporting period showed an attendance of 739,90; second nine weeks, 736,55; third nine weeks, 709,47; and the fourth nine weeks, 703,13. The average attendance for the year was 722,26. ADA for the 1969-70 school year was reported at 773 and the drop recorded this year results in the loss of state salaries for two teachers for the 1971-72 school year. The Board noted that if the 71-72 year starts with the same number of students as the 70-71

year ended with, and if attendance is on the same level, still another teacher will be lost next year.

The Board approved the employment of Mrs. Nancy Baucum as junior high math teacher for the forthcoming year. They also approved the employment of Mrs. Jo Houchin as tax assessor-collector.

A study and review of the present school examination exemption policy was begun by members during the session.

Members set the date of their monthly July meeting for Thursday, July 8, instead of the regular second Monday meeting date of July 12.

## SS Class Has Book Review

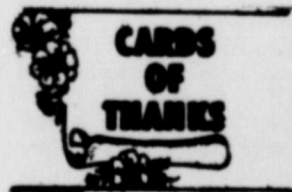

**TSA Predicts 500 Lives Will Be Saved**

AUSTIN -- "The Texas Legislature's passage of a strong bill aimed at the abusive drinker-driver can save the lives of more than 500 Texans in the next two years," according to J. U. Parker, President of the Texas Safety Association.

Parker, a Houston safety consultant, made the prediction recently in a release from the Austin headquarters of the statewide safety organization.

As a part of the Governor's Traffic Safety Program, the legislature passed and sent to the Governor May 25, a bill establishing 0.10 percent blood-alcohol concentration as a presumption of being under the influence of intoxicating liquor while driving a motor vehicle.

"This measure will probably save more Texas lives in years to come than any other single piece of legislation enacted by the legislature this session if it is properly enforced throughout the state," Parker stated.

The TSA president said that more than half of the fatalities last year in Texas highway crashes involved abusive drinkers, even though this group makes up only about 7 percent of the driving public.

"Texas has taken a great step forward in controlling its number one highway menace with the passage of this measure. The legislature, Governor Smith, and the people of Texas are to be commended for their vigorous efforts in securing this life-saving action," said Parker. "High praise also needs to be paid to the news media of Texas for the part it played in informing Texans of the need for such legislation. The efforts of newspapers, radio and television stations, and magazines throughout the state provided factual information about the problem of the abusive drinker-driver," Parker commented. Parker also commended the legislature for passage of a bill that made changes in the Texas Traffic Code which brings the state more nearly into compliance with the Uniform Traffic Code. The bill was signed into law by Governor Smith April 27th.
