WHAT TO LOOK FOR Walk diagonally across fields from two different directions, and inspect plants. Thrips damage is light if the newest unfolding leaves show only a slight brownish tinge along the edges, with no silvering of these or older leaves, and only an occasional thrips is seen. Damage is medium if the newest leaves show considerable, browning along the edges and some silvering on the underside of most leaves, and thrips are found readily. Damage is heavy if silvering of leaves is readily noticeable, terminal buds show injury, plant is ragged and deformed, and thrips are numerous.
