Weekly Gin Report

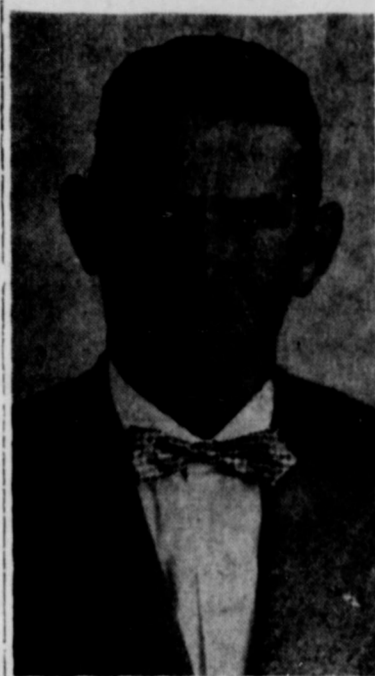
A total of 126 bales of 1957 cotton has been ginned in the Springlake and Earth area.

Cotton harvest is getting underway later this season because of the later spring planting.

The first bale for this year was delivered to the gin Sept. 16. Last season's first bale was ginned August 28. The first bale of the 1955 season was ginned on Sept. 10.

At his time last year a total of 1341 bales had been ginned at Earth, 2043 bales at Springlake and 833 bales at the three rural gins.

EDITORIAL - RELIGION AND NEWSPAPER SERVE PEOPLE TOGETHER

Sunday is the sixth day of National Newspaper Week. Specifically, it is "Religion and the Press Day."

In a very real sense the press and the pulpit are partners. It may seem at times that the two are far apart, but in the deeper sense they are not.

You have heard it said that churches and news papers rise and fall together, in every land bent under a tyrant's yoke, two things stand out: (1) a controlled press and (2) an intimidated church. You may put it down for a truism that there cannot long be a free church in a nation which has a slave press. By the same token, a free press will not endure alongside an imprisoned church.

The two thus are dependent on each other and complementary to each other. The press maintains freedom of mind and the church preserves freedom of the spirit. Both are necessary. Take one away and the other is sorely distressed.

Perhaps it is significant that the first Article of the Bill of Rights recognize this church-press partnership by providing specifically that Congress shall make no law (1) respecting the establishment of religion and (2) abridging freedom of press or speech. A third prohibition forbids any abridgement of the right to assemble together. It is significant that the founders of our country placed these two guarantees of press freedom and religious freedom together back to back.

As newspapers of this nation observe their "week" and dedicate themselves to the cherished task of keeping the people informed, they salute the churches of the land for their transcendent responsibility of keeping people faithful to their religious beliefs.

No faithful nation served by an informed press is likely to ever fall prey to false doctrine or false god.

Hail Causes Damage In Area

Hail stones, in various sizes pelted the Earth area Thursday afternoon around 6 p.m., causing damage ranging from light in some areas to heavy in other parts, to cotton and feed crops. Some cotton fields looked as though a defoliant chemical had been applied. Many large bolls were strewn and beaten in the middles between the cotton rows. Where grain crops were almost ready for harvest, shattered grain covered the ground as though it had been sewn. Leaves on some grain crops were shredded, while the most severely hit cotton was completely barren of leaves.

The hail damaged streak began north of Sudan and hopped about over an area extending to the Nazareth and Hart communities.

Very light damage was reported in the Springlake vicinity, the hail becoming more severe about two miles west and five miles north of Springlake.

Various amounts of damage to cotton was reported, ranging up to possibly 75 per cent. Some damage may not be apparent until it is seen in the grade of the cotton after it is ginned.

The accident occurred seven miles west and six and one-half miles north of Earth, as Dent was driving east along the road and was met headon by a Chevrolet truck, driven by Jud Clark, of the Laxbodie community, who was making a left hand turn, heading west. Johnson grass and weeds in the bar ditch restricted the view, and the drivers did not see each other in time to avoid contact.

Dent suffered a broken rib, lacerations around the left eye, deep cuts on the arm and bruises and scratches.

Clark was bruised in his chest. The extent of his injuries had not been determined. Both are hospitalized at Muleshoe.

Dent's car was reported to be a total loss. The steering wheel in Clark's truck was broken and the wheels were knocked out from under it.

Grain Sorghum Loans Processed

A total of 33 grain Sorghum loans have been processed through the Lamb County ASC Office, up to Friday of last week, according to Lamar D. Aten Jr., manager.

Aten states that all producers who are renters, in bringing their warehouse receipts to the ASC office for the purpose of securing a grain loan, should be accompanied by their landlord, who is also required to sign the loan papers. In the event this is not convenient the renter may call at the ASC office previous to applying for the loan and pick up the A. B. Lien waiver and secure the landlord's signature to this document. This procedure would, in the ASC managers' opinion, save considerable time.

Aten further explained that in case the warehouse receipt reports tenant's part of the grain the landlord is not required to sign the loan papers.

The ASC manager also stated that not only does the landlord have to sign the loan papers, but any lienholder against the grain crop, and that the reason for these releases is that the Commodity Credit must hold the first lien against the grain.

Lamb County Farm Bureau Membership Drive October 7-10

Lamb County Farm Bureau's annual membership drive will get underway October 7 and will last through October 10, according to Vic Diersing, county membership chairman.

Goal for the drive has been set for 1000 members. The organization already has 810 new members and renewals signed up so far this year. Last year the membership figure was 920.

The membership drive in the county is tied in with the statewide campaign for new members. The Texas Farm Bureau is concentrating efforts now to enroll as many new members as possible in the first part of the year. In line with this, Governor Price Daniel proclaimed February 17-23 as "Texas Farm Bureau Organization Week."

The state organization has a quota of 75,000 members for 1957. However, many counties have voluntarily accepted goals higher than their quotas. This could bring in some 80,000 members this year, enough to make Texas the largest Farm Bureau in the South. Kentucky, with 77,000 in 1956, is currently tops in the region. Texas had a membership of 70,159 last year.

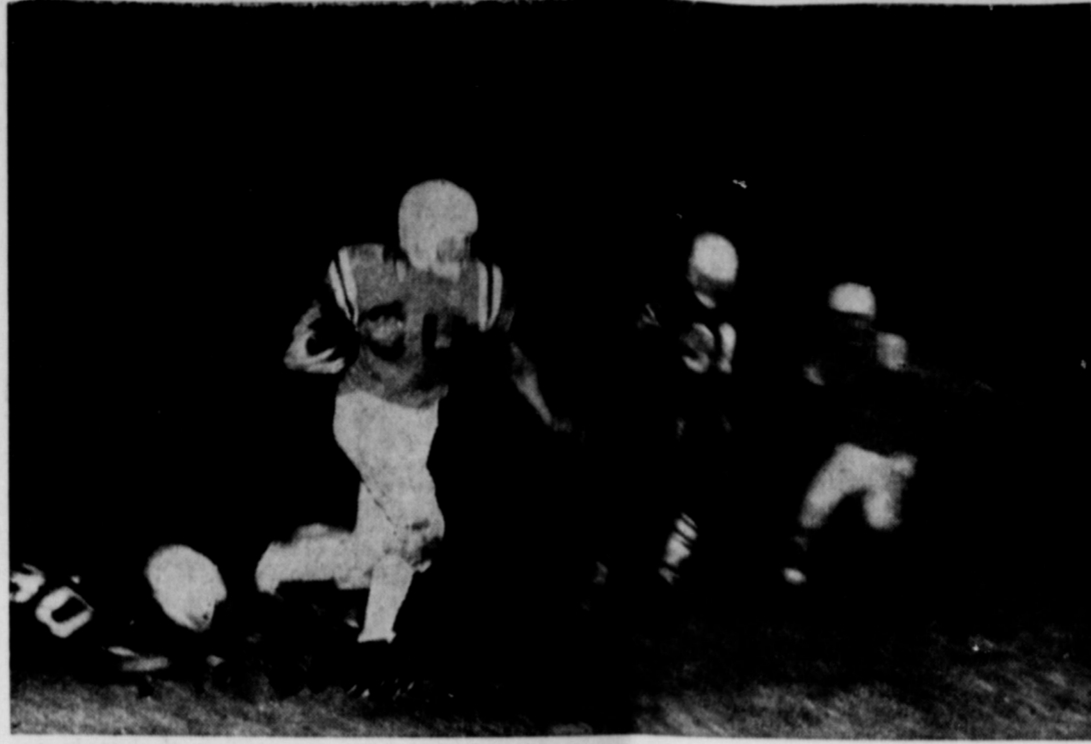

But I do know a boy who gives up, lacks determination and courage on the football field, will also probably lack these things when he begins the battle of life. Fellows, nothing comes easy that is worthwhile.

The Wolverines travel to Chosbyton Friday to battle another good team beginning at 8 p.m. Let's all make the trip and let our boys know we are with them 100 percent. If we appear critical it is only because we are thinking of the boys themselves and want to do

what we can to encourage them to put everything they have into everything they do, whether it be football or otherwise. It's not the score that matters too much, it's whether the boys are trying and we believe they are.

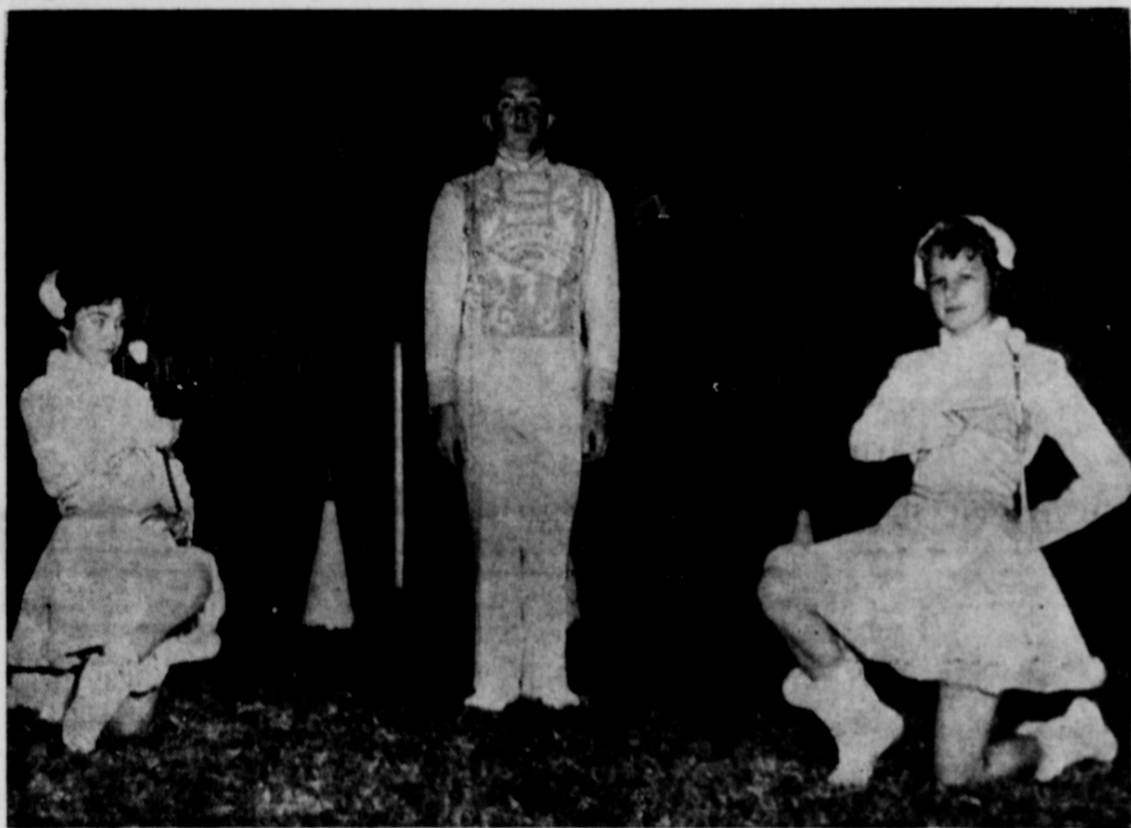
