

Fishing and Weather

Every year, more families find time for fishing on vacation trips. You may be a woman who has never baited a hook, but you can help your family make better plans if you remember this: Weather plays a hig role in fishing. a big role in fishing.



Experts say fish bite best just after a "cold front" has moved through. A cold front is a mass of cold air, usually accompanied by thunder storms. It makes for ideal fishing conditions. Rain has washed down insects and cooled the surface water; there's a dark sky for protection and a rising barometer that seems to pep up the fish.

When this happens, the fish forget their usual caution. They'll come into the shallows and snap up anything that looks good—and this includes your bait or artificial lures.

The important thing is timing—



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

Rabies Reported In Parts of State

College Station, — Many reports of rabid animals chiefly foxes and skunks - are coming from over the State, says Edwin Cooper, extension wildlife specialist.

Since complete eradication of animals subject to carrying rables is the possibility of contracting the disease, Cooper continues.

Contrary to popular belief, rabid animals do not have "running fits" nor "froth at the mouth." A rabid animal is usually characterized by symptoms of paralysis and loss of their usual fear of which appears to be acting stran-
