Lewis, Bridges, Barton Show Grand Champions At Local Show

Kent Lewis, Bruce Bridges, and Craig Barton earned Grand Championship honors the past week-end at the annual Springlake-Earth Junior Livestock Show, one of the most successful in the history of Earth.

Approximately 150 persons attended the local show to view the finest quality animals ever exhibited in this area. Competition was keen in every phase, with thirty-two FFA and 4-H members showing a total of 74 animals.

A 102 pound Hampshire lamb claimed the Grand Champion Honors for Kent Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thurman Lewis. Bruce Bridges was the proud owner of a 217 pound medium-weight Duroc barrow that was named Grand Champion. Bruce is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Bridges.

The Grand Champion Steer went to a 936 pound Angus heavyweight owned by Craig Barton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Barton.

Shella Lewis captured the Reserve Champion honors, showing an 89 pound Finewool Lamb. A 200 pound lightweight Crossbred claimed the Reserve Champion barrow honors for Brad Bridges.

Reserve Champion Steer honors went to an 807 pound Hereford owned by Bruce Bridges.

Shella Lewis was owner of the 72 pound Southdown Lamb named Breed Champion. A 98 pound Finewool Lamb and a 102 pound Mediumweight Lamb owned by Kent Lewis were Breed Champions in those two divisions.

A 217 pound Duroc owned by Bruce Bridges was Breed Champion in that division. Other Breed Champions in the swine division were a 210 pound Hampshire shown by David Hinchliffe, a 200 pound Crossbred shown by Brad Bridges, and a 205 pound Poland China owned by Donald Templeton.

In the steer division Craig Barton showed a 965 pound heavyweight Angus named Breed Champion in that division. Other titles of Breed Champions went to Bruce Bridges's 832 pound Hereford and Welda Barton, 1,065 pound Crossbred.

Following the show, showmanship and new exhibitor awards were presented. The showmanship award is presented to one exhibitor in each class, who best demonstrates his ability to handle his animal in the ring. Showmanship awards went to Shella Lewis, lambs, and Welda Barton, swine and steers.

When an exhibitor enters a class for the first time, he is automatically eligible to compete for the new exhibitor award. This presentation is made to the new exhibitor in each class accumulating the highest number of points. New exhibitor awards were presented

to Shella Lewis, lambs, Donald Templeton, swine, and Craig Barton, steers.

Livestock Show Nets \$12,287.48

Last weekend, the Earth Show Barn was the scene of one of the most successful Junior Livestock Shows ever held in Earth with the 55 animals in the sale netting a total of \$12,287.48.

Approximately 150 persons were on hand to view the fine livestock shown by local youth. Buyers from eleven towns and communities were present to bid for their choice of the quality stock.

According to Kenneth Hinson, a member of the Board of Directors for the show, the stock shown by the FFA and 4-H members was better than in the past and the sale was equal to those in previous years.

The total of 55 animals sold included 42 barrows, 10 steers, and 3 lambs. The average price paid per pound was \$2.30 for lambs, 66 cents for hogs, excluding the Grand and Reserve Grand Champions and 61.9 cents for steers. Buyers from area towns included those from Muleshoe, Amherst, Olton, Sunnyside, Lazbuddie, Springlake, Dimmitt, Hart, Pleasant Valley, and Flagg.

The Grand Champion of the Show titles went to Kent Lewis,

Bruce Bridges, and Craig Barton. Kent showed the Grand Champion Lamb, a 102 pound Hampshire Mediumweight, that sold for \$2,200 a pound to Citizens State Bank, Earth.

Shella Lewis was the owner of the Reserve Champion, an 89 pound Finewool Lamb. The lamb was sold to Dent Farm Supply for \$2,600 a pound.

The Grand Champion Barrow was a 217 pound medium-weight Duroc owned by Bruce Bridges. It sold to Citizens State Bank for \$1,650 a pound.

Craig Barton was the proud owner of the Grand Champion Steer, a heavyweight Angus weighing 936 pounds. Citizen's State Bank was again the buyer at \$1.30 a pound.

The Reserve Champion (Swine) went to a 200 pound lightweight Crossbred owned by Brad Bridges. Reserve Champion honors in the steer division were won by a 807 pound Hereford owned by Bruce Bridges.

Brad Bridges barrow sold to Sun-Vue Fertilizer for \$1,900 a pound. Earth Oil and Gas purchased Bruce Bridges Hereford at \$1.10 a pound.

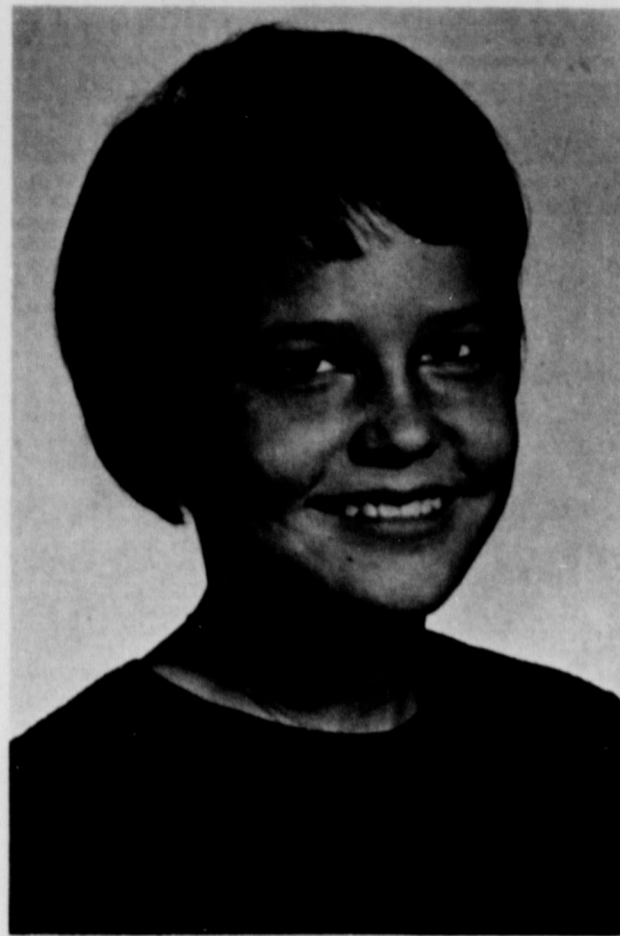
Jo Anne Coker Winner In Music Festival

Know What You Buy, Warns HD Agent

Don't jump to conclusions about foods you buy, cautions Lady Clare Phillips, Co. Home Demonstration Agent. A prime example is non-dairy cream substitutes and whipped toppings. Don't assume they are lower in saturated fats than their dairy counterparts.

A study of 14 cream substitutes by a Harvard University scientist revealed that substitutes have up to 20 per cent more saturated fatty acids than the dairy creams they replace. Many of them are made with highly saturated coconut oil. The dairy substitutes are not necessarily lower in calories, either, Mrs. Phillips adds.


It is common knowledge that people used a system of barter or direct trade before money came into use. The obvious supposition is that money evolved directly from these barter transactions after people finally realized that a better system was needed for determining values and exchanging wealth. This is not entirely correct since monetary systems were already in use while barter was going on. The earliest money really originated in religious and social customs. It was used for ransom, purchasing brides, ceremonial offerings and showing-off with various forms of ornamentation. Used originally to discharge religious, legal and ritualistic obligations, its value as a medium of commercial exchange eventually became apparent to the tradespeople who then began to adapt it to the uses of the market-

place.
