it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of \$5,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds of the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or appointment, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men

at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States;" and:

"Against the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Section 2. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1926,

A. & M. SHORT COURSE

Newspaper men of Texas owe it to their communities to attend the Farmer Short Course at A. & M. August 2 to 7. The Agricultural Writers Conference is held during the short course and, as Mrs. Warner states, "You would get enough inspiration that one week to make a better paper the other 51 weeks of the year."

Each bank should have a representative at the A. & M. Farmers Short Course. You are trying to be of service to your community and your community is strictly agriculture. By attending the short course you will see many ways that your bank may be of service to the community.

Each community in Hall county should send from one to a dozen boys and girls, and one or more farmers who during that week, will get a vision of better farming and better home-life conditions. Farming is becoming more business-like every year, and farmers who make an effort to learn better methods of farming and marketing will be the leaders of their communities.

The railroad fare is low, and living conditions cheap during the

short course. It will be a good vacation, and a profitable one to all who will attend.

Some of the farmers are getting uneasy about the cotton flea. This is a new insect for the Panhandle; in fact is new to Texas. It looks like that the farmer is up against just one darn thing after another. If it is not drouth, it is too much rain, if it is neither, it is too much hail; if it isn't drouth, rain or hail, it's the boll worm or weevil; and if it isn't any of those, it is the cotton flea. And after all have had their little say, along comes an overproduction and the price goes to the bottom. Diversification is the only sure remedy.

Tourists passing through Memphis have a hard time finding the way out to the north on account of the streets being torn up for paving. Some signs showing the way should be placed at each corner where turns are to be made. This would help the bewildered travelers.

Street signs and house numbers would give Memphis the appearance of a real live city, and not a wide place in the middle of the road.

The Memphis Democrat celebrated its 18th birthday, last week and with J. Claude Wells at its head, it is "rarin' to go" for another 18 years. Hall county is now recognized as one of the best agricultural counties in the state but 18 years ago folks were saying that it was useless to try to farm down there—it was just a cow country and never would be anything else. Among the agencies that brought about a change from that viewpoint was the Democrat and there can be no doubt that other changes will be influenced in the future by its attitude—and that attitude can be relied upon to be on the side of Memphis and Hall county.—The Southwest Plainsman.

TYPHOID FEVER PREVENTABLE SAYS MEDICO

You can keep from having typhoid fever, as it is a preventable disease, is the statement issued by Dr. H. O. Sappington, state health officer, who urges vaccination by one's family physician as a means of protection from this malady, which last year claimed 578 victims in Texas.

"Camping parties and cross-country motorists should by all means secure this immunization against typhoid before leaving home as they may be subjected to infection from various sources. The most common methods by which typhoid is transmitted are flies, contaminated water, milk and other food-stuffs. The fact that water is clear is no guarantee of its safety, and springs and other inviting pools of water often contain myriads of invisible disease germs. Motorists and campers should boil all water used by them unless it is obtained from an approved municipal supply."

"Typhoid is a filth disease, and is acquired by the entrance into the body through the mouth of colon bacilli expelled in the body wastes of a typhoid patient. For this reason, excreta of typhoid sufferers should be disposed of in a safe manner to prevent infection of others. The installation of sewer systems has practically eliminated typhoid from our cities, and has made it primarily a disease of rural districts by the installation of sanitary closets, plans for which can be had on request to your state board of health.

"Approximately 4 percent of all persons having typhoid become 'carriers' of the disease, and though fully well, still expel the germs in their excrete, thereby endangering the health of all with whom they come in contact. Convalescent patients should have laboratory examinations made to determine if they are carriers." G. C. Barrier of Lubbock was a visitor here last Friday.

Dairy horses passing through a big puddle of water in a Boston street suddenly jumped about in lively fashion. Investigation revealed that a short circuited electric conduit had given the puddle a charge of 120 volts.

A seaplane will be used by large whaling companies for the first time in history when the season opens next winter in northern waters. The seaplane will go ahead of the fleet and signal when it spots a 'blow.'

"Conversion of the old Drovers Packing company plant at Fifth street and the Kaw river, Kansas City, Kas., into a modern cold storage and warehouse, was announced today.

F. A. Finch of Kansas City and Eureka, Kas., is president of the new company. Mr. Finch was receiver of the property from the time it went into receivership as a packing plant in 1921.

When the remodeling is completed the plant will have a capacity of 100 tons of ice production daily. It will have an ice storage capacity of 3000 tons and a warehouse storage capacity for fruits, vegetables and meats of 500 cars."

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

A resolution proposing an amendment to Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas. Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State Occupation taxes and poll tax of one dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of 21 and 60 years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (\$1.00) dollar on the hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or

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common school districts created by general or special law."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.
